For although residents of this northern section would actually reside in Novi, it is believed that they would become a part of the Northville "community" insofar as schools, churches, recreation and shopping are concerned. The need for communication between these separate units of government is therefore ly impressed by the l also evident.

Naturally, population is the factor that makes all this planning necessary. And according to the figures used at the joint city-township meeting we can expect 10-fold may not only be ver growth ultimately. Right now the population of our community area is about a new era in

approximately 7,500. Its capacity is estimated at 70,000. By 1980 it is predicted that the population will more than triple — to 25,000. Preparing for this growth is a job for the planners.

And it should be of incress (and solace) to all residents to know that this job is being done and that our planners are agreed that our present facilities can be expanded and improved to serve this growth. To neglect our future needs - regardless how distant

they may seem -- would certainly lead to a graveyard in our central business district and a hodgepodge of commercial centers on our bordess. 难 亡 推

The front page of this week's edition reports the death of Northville's "Mr. Republican" - Thomas Raymond Carrington.

Tom was born and raised in Northville, spent more than 50 years working in its business district, and was undoubtthe most familiar figure to stride its sidewalks.

He possessed a remarkable memory and loved to talk about the early days when he was a boy working in a grocery store. He held great respect for the community's leaders and soaked up every word as they discussed town business around a pot-bellied stove.

Several months ago Tom sat down at his desk to write a history of Northville as he remembered it. We had asked him to do this for publication.

Still active in his business, Tom was too busy at income tax time to undertake the chore, but promised he'd get at it as soon as possible. He had completed two handwritten pages when he

was stricken by a heart attack last August.
