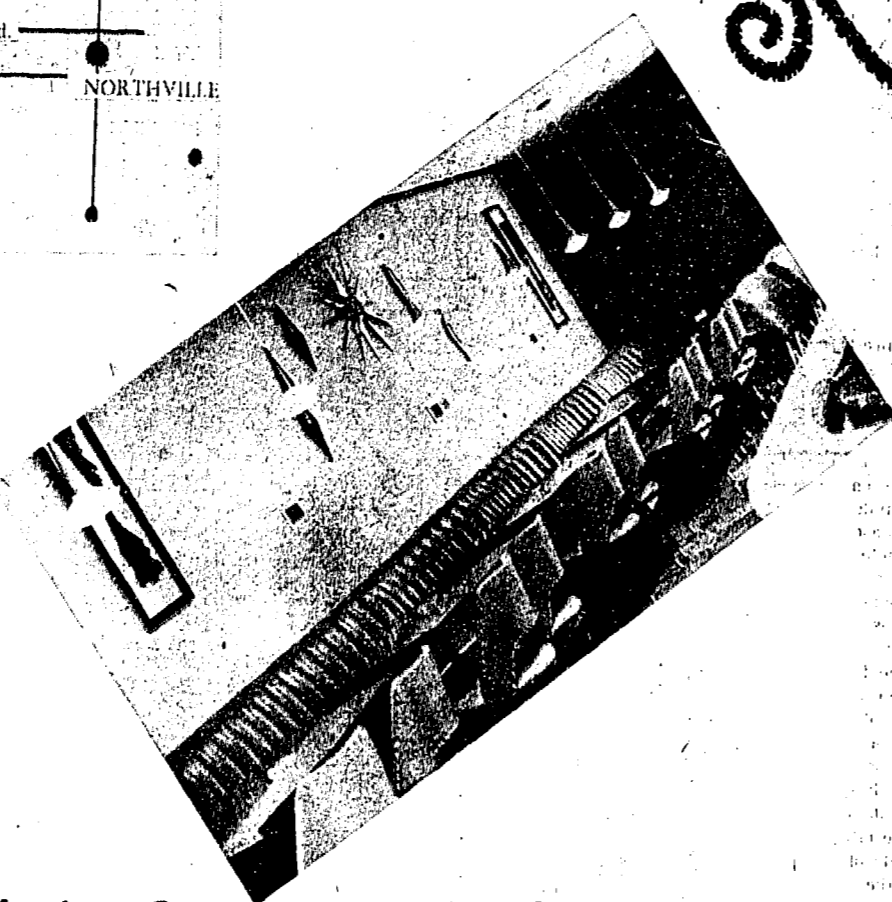
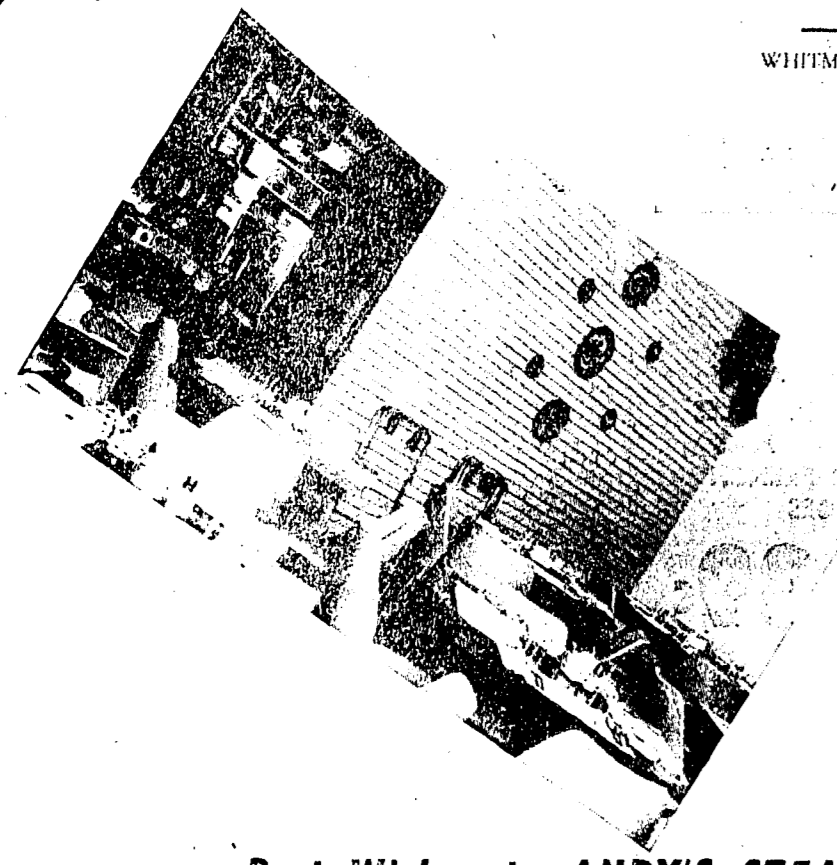
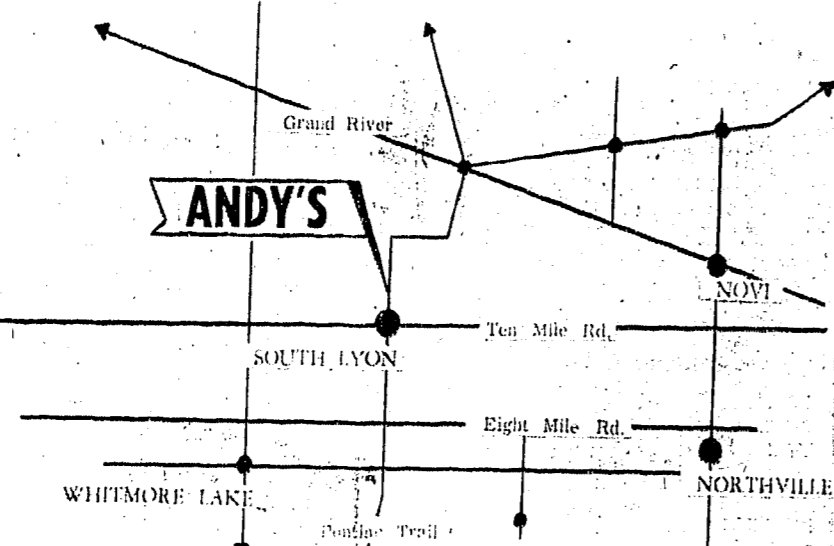

The world may love a fat man, as the saying goes. But the fat man's doctor worries about his patient's health. The chief reason is the high death rate among those who are overweight, reports Dr. Park W. Willis, III, of The University of Michigan Medical Center.
"The obese patient is more likely to develop certain diseases that may be fatal or that may have fatal complications. These include diabetes, hardening of the arteries, strokes, heart at- of the knees.
—Heat bothers him. He flushes and sweats and is prone to develop certain skin conditions.
—He has personality problems. "A lot of mental stress comes from being teased or ridiculed... and from lack of social acceptance. It has been reported that the suicide rate is much higher than normal in overweight people."
Dr. Willis lists obesity as the "commonest single disease in the United States today."

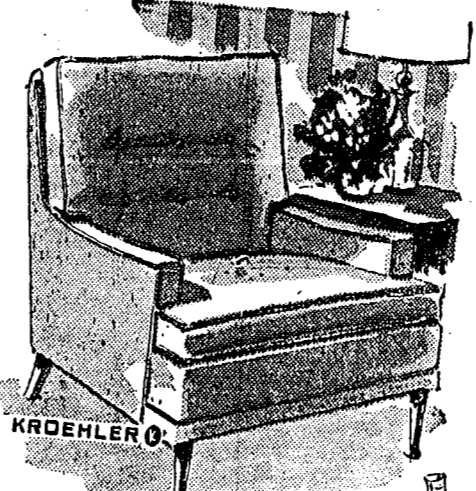
