What makes a good town?
This question was asked by the Whitehall Forum recently in an editorial appearing in that newspaper.

Another question, "What makes a dead town?" was also asked. And the answer to both questions was the same — people.

It seems that a sociologist once made a comparison study of two towns in a midwestern state. Both had been started about the same time when the same railroad came through shortly after the "land rush" got underway. Both grew about as fast for a few years.

But then one town stood still at a population of about 1,000; the other became a thriving little metropolis of some 12,000 people and was a modern, bright and progressive city.

The sociologist was curious. Why had one of these two almost identical towns prospered while the other failed?

From his study he concluded that the town that had grown and prospered had 15 or 20 people who gave their time and talent to help build their community.

The other town didn't have these people. Nothing complicated about the answer — just people who care and are possessed of the foresight, ability and patience it requires to plan for the future. That's the difference between success and failure.

Work and planning, then, would appear to be the key to success for any community.

And in Northville it is obvious that someone has been planning. We can point to a great many assets in our community that are the direct result of good planning — our school's recreation, fire area homes, water system and supply sewer system, street improvements, etc.

But planning never stops. And what will happen to Northville in five years?

This question is the bread and butter to mind that work at a meeting of the economic development committee.

"A professional" in the field of industrial and shopping center development was talking.

"Northville's probably two years away from having a shopping center on its borders," he casually observed. And he leaders he indicated within six mile road area.

Saginaw Area Seeks 4-Year College

Saginaw Valley will have a four-year institution of higher education if a group of legislators get their way this year, but there is at least one stumbling block in the offing.

The group, headed by Sen. Lester O. Begick, Bay City, Republican serving his first term in the Senate after two years in the House, has proposed a bill under which the state would establish a junior-senior year institution in the area now served on the freshman-sophomore level by Delta College.

Begick in the Senate and Rep. Russell H. Stranger, R-Clare, in the other chamber are hoping Sen. Stanley Thayer, Amherst, Republican, will go along with their proposal.

Gov. George Romney has declined to express specifically his views on the U-M proposal as opposed to the legislative measure in the House.

Residents in the Delta College area have been pushing for the creation of a four-year higher education to be established in the Delta College area. They are led by Sen. Begick and Stranger, along with a number of other legislators who have conducted a study last summer of the possibilities for offering the service, are anxious to see it through.

Has Old Spring Sprung Leak?

What's happened to Northville's famous "Old Spring"? Councilwoman Beatrice Carlson asked this question at the council table Monday night.

Hundreds of "customers" of the spring are asking the question every day. Its flow is down to a mere trickle.

I used to take two seconds to fill a gallon jug, now it takes two minutes," said one Detroit man. "I know because I've been getting water here for 20 years."

A Plymouth man, Joe Valovage, said he has been getting water from the Northville spring for five years. "It takes so long now, that I've been trying for two days," he stated.

Like other users of Northville spring water, Valovage complained that there's always a long waiting line.

The mayor instructed the city engineer to investigate.

Sewer Testing OK'ed in Wixom

Preliminary drilling to determine water table depths in the downtown area of Wixom district for the city's proposed \$800,000 downtown sewer system will begin this week.

The \$800,000 project is part of a \$2.8 million master plan for an eventual citywide sewer system.

The Wixom council voted Thursday night 4-1 in favor of authorizing Mayor Wesley E. McAtee to enter into contract with Michigan Drilling Company to perform preliminary drilling in sections 2 and 3 and parts of 4 and 5.

Sections where preliminary drilling will be begun this week start at the north end of the city and run to the center and south through the industrial area.

Preliminary drilling is now being undertaken because of the proposed lagoon treatment plant which would be used only until Oakland county builds a large interceptor sewer to serve the Wixom area by 1980.

The system would consist of nearly 120,000 feet of lines ranging in size from 12 to 48 inches from number one to the intercepting section of South Wixom road and Pontiac trail.

Number 2 — 10,700 feet of lines following the Norton drain from number one to the intercepting section of South Wixom road and Pontiac trail.

It's Official: Novi Ninth Graders Set

Novi's board of education voted last week to send Novi ninth graders to Northville for the school year 1963-64.

The Farmington school board had expressed a willingness earlier to accept Novi's 70 ninth graders next year on a one-year basis if Northville could not do so.

However, the Northville school board voted at its February 22 meeting to accept the license of the previous owner, F. W. Pearce corporation, to be transferred to the commission.

In another communication, the council was asked to rule on a liquor application change presented to the commission by Ovi Kraemer.

Kraemer asked the commission to change a building located at the corner of Novi and South Lake drive — the former Harbor restaurant — to a class C liquor license. The former license allows liquor to be served only during the spring, fall and summer while the latter allows liquor to be served year-around.

Village Lauds Detroit Plan For Water Line to Haggerty

Novi's village council learned Monday night that the Haggerty water line project would be considered a legal newspaper.

Council members also voted to ask a property owner to clean up his property, tabled another owner's complaint and passed two warrants amounting to \$7,441.

After hearing that Samuel C. Pettit no longer wishes to continue his saw mill operation between Grand River and U.S. 10 on Beck road, the council decided to send him a letter asking him to clear the property of debris.

The council took no action on a bill presented by the Novi Village council and the planning board Monday at 8 p.m. in the community building as new work items were discussed.

Council members approved a warrant, consisting mostly of payrolls, for \$4,200. They also approved a warrant for \$3,222 which included a \$922 bill for the village's new police car and a \$1,909 bill for justice court fees.

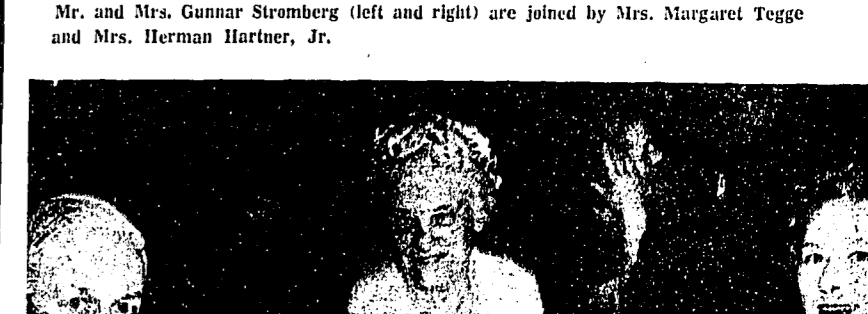

Easter Seal Drive Opens Here Today

A goal of \$50,000 was announced today for the 1963 Easter Seal Campaign in Western Wayne County by Fred A. Casterline, chairman of the Crippled Children's Committee of the Northville Rotary Club, who heads the appeal this year in Northville. He expressed confidence that the residents of Northville would cooperate fully to assure the success of the appeal. The 1963 appeal opens today and continues through Easter Sunday, April 14, to furnish rehabilitation care and treatment to crippled children and handicapped adults in the Western Wayne county area. Casterline said, "Easter Seal contributions in any amount will help purchase much needed equipment and services for



crippled children and adults. Living expenses of the average American, so has it affected the cost of rehabilitation services to our handicapped population. Expenses of medical treatment, therapy, equipment, operation of Easter Seal Centers and facilities for the disabled have greatly increased. "However, rehabilitation pays" he added. "A handicapped worker can be rehabilitated and returned back to a profitable job in business or industry for about 90 percent of what it would cost to keep him for one year at public expense. For the rest of his life, he will be paying from \$7 to \$10 in federal income taxes for every dollar spent on his rehabilitation. With help, crippled children may not have to grow up into handicapped adults."

Schools Rate High In Comparison Test

Northville's school administrators have a new yardstick to measure operating expenses by. The yardstick is like the federal government's consumer price index. Only instead of attempting to show how much more (or less) a basket of groceries costs today than yesterday, the new yardstick serves as a gauge for comparing school expenses in Northville with those in other communities. The tool in hand, it didn't take Northville school administrators long to find out that the district rates as "better than average" both in the state and throughout the nation. The idea of comparing Northville with other school districts on a large scale was born when the January issue of School Management reached Northville with other school districts' desks. The issue was devoted almost entirely to the magazine's fourth annual cost of education study - indicating costs in 1,200 school districts.

Northville's board of education turned to Dr. Kenneth MacLeod, assistant superintendent, asking him to add a Northville chapter to School Management's index. Dr. MacLeod worked for several days, finally coming up with a set of figures for the Northville district which could logically be compared with those reported by School Management. The value of developing such

yardsticks to study costs. Another, he said, might be number of employees: "It takes the same number of people to run a building whether it's full or half full. Thus, as school population expands, maintenance cost goes down." Variables aside, the bare facts show that Northville schools last year spent more money than any other district in the state. Northville spent \$291 of total per pupil expenditures (\$391) for instruction as compared to an average of \$282 throughout the nation. Armerman cautioned that the yardstick can only show dollars and cents spent by schools. "It costs seem high, then we administrators have to look behind the figures to seek the reason why." For example, he said, we find from the two studies that we're high in maintenance expenditures (9.9 percent of local total per pupil expenditures as compared with the national average of 5.5 percent). Does this mean we're spending too much for maintenance, Armerman queried. "Not necessarily," he continued. "Just the other way someone came into one of our buildings and remarked - things are so much cleaner and neater here than they used to be."

Northville's 13 percent of its budget to operation last year while most schools in the nation spent only 10 percent in this area. However, schools in region devoted some 12 percent of per pupil expenditures to operation while size 5 schools spent 10 percent. In instruction expenditures, Northville was slightly below most schools in the nation. Last year, Northville spent 74.6 percent of per pupil expenditures for instruction while the national average was 76 percent and the "quality quarter" average, 74.9 percent. Moreover, size 5 schools spent 76.8 percent of per pupil expenditures for instruction with region 3 schools spending 73.7 percent. Yet in terms of dollars, Northville is spending more for instruction (\$21 per pupil) than the average school (\$20) or region 3 schools (\$24) or size 5 schools (\$24). In instruction, Northville is topped only by "quality quarter" schools who are spending an average of \$26 per pupil.

In maintenance expenditures, Northville is, according to Armerman, "weak, but not suffering." The yardstick shows Northville as spending 9.9 percent of total per pupil expenditures for health of 42 cents. Yet, the national average in this area is 6 percent and the "quality quarter" average, 1.2 percent or \$5.75. Region 3 schools are devoting 23 percent of per pupil expenditures or \$1.11 to health and size 5 schools, .65 percent or \$2.06. Armerman concluded that free nursing service from the county health department helps to compensate for the few dollars spent for health services in the school system.

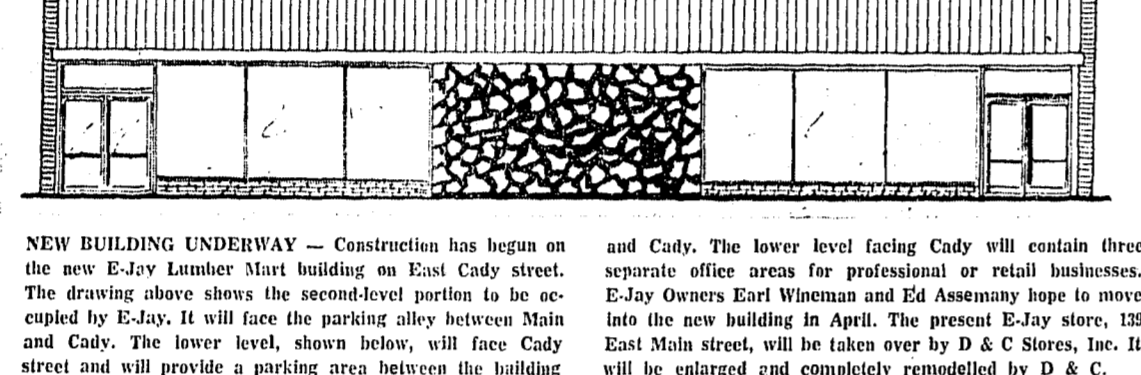
