Soon, probably within four or five weeks, area residents will be given an opportunity to invest in the future economic welfare of our community.

Their investment will not be a contribution. And its dividends should amount to more than the six per cent per annum interest the notes will bear.

The investment will enable a local industry to expand: to operate more efficiently and competitively; to handle new, larger contracts; to employ more people.

I'm referring, of course, to the announcement by Foundry Flask and Equipment company that it will soon undertake a \$185,000 plant expansion program.

Funds for the expansion were arranged through th Small Business Administration by the Northville Area Development Corporation.

Right now members of the local non-profit development corporation are completing details for launching a campaign to sell notes to local residents to help finance the

N. C. Schrader and Robert Shafer will head up this committee. Attorney Philip Ogilvie has been working out details with SBA authorities and expects that Washington approval will follow the Detroit O.K. shortly.

Eugene Cook is president of the Economic Development committee, and C. A. Smith heads up the corporation, a body within the total committee.

There are a dozen more active workers and a total of 47 individuals and businesses who have taken out memberships to support the effort.

Their only reward is the satisfaction of some measure of success plus the knowledge that the end result of such success improves the economic climate of the entire community and provides some relief to residential taxpayers.

The first project of Northville's economic group fits perfectly the purpose of the government's SBA: to help local communities help themselves by assisting small busi-

Foundry Flask is a thriving business. Thorough in vestigation by SBA gave the Weber-run firm (John A. and son, John W.) a top rating. But like so many businesses today, it does not have money to spare for buildings. Instead, their profits must be spent on improved equipment. Under such circumstances SBA will make four per . cent loans to non-profit community groups, which in turn must participate in the loan through wide-spread citizen

In this particular case, SBA is providing \$148,000: Of this amount, Manufacturers National Bank will assume 10 per cent - or \$14,800. Foundry Flask participates by giving title to its existing building and nearly two acres of, and to the development corporation - a credit of \$9,250. The remaining \$27,750 must be raised through public

sale by the corporation. Tentative plans call for notes in \$50, \$100 and \$500

denominations to be sold at six per cent interest. As security the development corporation will own a new building plus the present building and land. Foundry Flask will then lease the building over a 15-year period at a monthly rental that will permit the corporation to repay SBA, the bank and investors (the latter two at six per cen and SBA at four per cent). It will also pay any bookkeeping or other expenses incurred by the development corporation

When the loans have been repaid, Foundry Flask buye back its buildings and land for \$1.00 Meanwhile, the firm has expanded its operation, improved its facilities and aided its community by providing

SPEAKING for The Record by Bill Sliger

Charles H. Brower is president of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn, an advertising agency with a name that rolls off your tongue and a list of clients that adds up to one of the biggest, bigtime agencies in the business. As head of an organization in one of the most fiercely competitive fields of our modern age, you'd hardly expect

wer to be classified as a "square". But he'd be proud to be called exactly that. Speaking before the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce Brower challenged his audience to "dare to be

square". His address was condensed in the April edition of Reader's Digest. Using his creative talent, Brower makes some inter-

esting observations. For example: Back in our grandparents' day, "square" was one of the finest words in our language. You gave a man a square deal if you were honest; you gave him a square meal when he was hungry; you stood foresquare for right; when you were out of debt you were square with the world and you

could look a man square in the eye. Now a square is a man who never learned to get away with it. Brower notes.

He's a boob who gets so lost in his work he has to be reminded to go home: a slob who still gets all choked up when the band plays "America the Beautiful"; a square, and strictly from Squaresville.

He doesn't fit neatly into the current group of angle players, corner cutters, sharp-shooters and goof-offs. He's urdened down with old ideas of honesty, loyalty, courage and thrift

Brower sadly notes that our ancient disciplines have been abandoned as too stark for the poor feeble souls we are - and that our colleges are loaded with youngsters who ire hardly prepared for high school - and learning without discipline has produced non-books thrown together by non-writers and paintings by people who never learned to

He points out that it is easy to prove that almost all our national heroes were squares - simply by thinking what they might have said had they not been squares:

Nathan Hale: Me sny on those British? Are you trying to be funny? Do you know what they do with the spies they catch? I'll give you a news flash, chum. They hang

Patrick Henry: Sure, I'm for liberty. But we've got to be a little realistic. We're a pretty small outfit. If we start pushing the British around, someone is going to get hurt. Paul Revere: What do you mean - me ride through every Middlesex village and town? And in the middle of the night yet? Why pick on me? Am I the only man in Boston with a horse?

Another Brower observation: a recent survey of school history books issued before 1920 compared with those isued since shows that Nathan Hale said "I only regret that have but one life to give for my country" in 11 of the old texts and only one of the new; that Patrick Henry said "Give me liberty or give me death" in 12 of 14 earlier texts and in only three of 45 recent ones; and that John "Paul Iones said "I have not yet begun to fight" in nine of the old books — and in none of the new.

It's noted by Brower that 19 of 21 notable civilizations perished from the evaporation of belief from within. efully, he believes our country is going back to its old beliefs - in such things as ideas, pride, patriotism, loyalty, devotion and even hard work.

And he points to a whole new set of heroes - named Glenn, Grissom, Shepard, Carpenter, Schirra and Cooper rom little towns like Boulder, East Derby, New Concord, Mitchell, Oradell and Shawnee.



But the forces of conformity are still strong, says Brower. Too many of us are still sitting it out instead of sweating it out. Too many of us haven't got the guts to stand up and dare to be a square.
