119-YEAR-OLD HOMESTEAD - The Detroit Edison company recently awarded this centennial marker to the Hopkins sisters, Renna and Avis, whose family has owned the farm at 2910 Loon Lake road for approximately 119 years. Edison, which awards markers to homesteads which have been in one family for one-hundred or more years, only recently learned of the farm's age and promptly made the presentation. According to the sisters, the farm house was the first frame house to be built in the Wixom area. It was constructed about 1835, Calvin Hopkins, great-grandfather of the Hopkins sisters, first lived in the house in 1844. Later occupants were Greenlief and Rufus Hopkins, grandfather and father, respectively, of the sisters.
