station and monthly magazine. The Lexington is commanded by Captain John M. Miller and bears a proud war record. Commissioned in 1943 after the fourth Lexington had been sunk by torpedo during the battle of the Coral Sea, the new Lex set out to avenge her namesake. She was the only aircraft carrier in the Pacific not camouflaged at that time, and seemingly impossible to destroy, was dubhed hy the Japanese as the "Blue Ghest".

By the end of World War II the Lexington had destroyed more than 850 enemy aircraft, sunk 300,000 tons of enemy shipping and damaged another 600,000 tons. After nine years in "mothballs" the Lexington was recommissioned complete with modern angled deck, steam catapults and mirror landing system. From 1955 until 1962 she operated in the Pacific area with

the Seventh Fleet. Now the proud warrier of the Pacific is assigned to Pensacola as a training carrier in the waters of the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico. Although rescue helicopters hovered about, thankfully non of the young cadets missed their mark. Four groups - two fly

Children of Northville and Novi are among 450,-000 students who enjoy well-balanced lunches in some 2,100 Michigan schools.

That's the word from the lunch program supervisors of the two communities as they noted that the week of October 13 to 19 is National School Lunch Week.

The lunch program managers are Mrs. Marie Knapp, Northville, and Mrs. Doris Darling, Novi.

"The hot lunch program," the managers said, "means improved health and better accomplishment in school. Nationwide, the school lunch program is a one and a quarter billion dollar business, reaching more than 16 million school children daily in the United States."

In the past school year, No vi and Orchard Hills schools served 47,796 "Type A" lunches and 66,114 special milk, Mrs. Darling said.

Novi lunches are available to students for \$1.60 per week or they may be purchased daily for 35-cents. Milk is sold for 10-cents a week or .02 cents per one-half pint.

According to Mrs. Knapp, some 600 lunches are served daily in the Northville high school - or about 100 more han was served last year. Mrs. Knapp noted that about two-thirds of the food used in the hot lunch program is purchased by the school system, with the remaining one-third resulting from government sur-

Basic monthly surplus donations include powdered milk, butter, flour and; dried eggs. Occasionally, other kinds of food are supplied by the government, Mrs. Knapp said. In Northville where, the hot lunch program is limited to the high school, students can purchase a Class A lunch for

36-cents. Ala carte lunches are available at varying costs. At these prices, according to the managers, the tasty, at tractive school lunches are the alue for the money and they're far superior - nu-
