But, yet, it happened. And t know this, a great and dynamic leader John F. Kennedy had to die to put across the points for which he fought so hard It is indeed an incomprehensible loss, not only to we Americans, his family, but to the entire world. I am only 18 years old and

un til now, did not fully comprehend the meaning of "American". But now, after this neredible loss, I am beginning to realize this meaning that o many of us have never acquired and so many of you have lost. I saw many "new Americans" last Friday all around me on Michigan State university campus. In that small area 27,000 people all near my age — your future leaders, exhibited a different state of being that, up til now, was completely unfamiliar. It was a real sense of nationalism, united but shown in so many different ways. Along with my personal deep grief I must admit there was a certain pride for my fellowman. Because of this my fears were lessened — but not my sor-






