DON'T LET THE CAR(T) BEFORE THE HORSE-not at Northville, corner of Sheldon and Seven Mile Road-not during the two-month racing season. This may be the only spot in Michigan where the old rule about horses taking preference over cars is still a reality. Stopping traffic by controlling the light, is an auxiliary city police (technically, he's paid by Northville Downs) who, when he sees a horse and driver coming from the winter barns across the highway or going there from the track behind him, puts the red light on for cars from all directions. Not until the horse is safely across.

Shower Of Stars Coming

Thursday, August 8, 1968

ANN ARBOR - The annual shower of shooting stars will reach its peak between August 10 and 12, University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh says. The Perseid meteor shower,

one of the most dependable of the yearly displays in the sky, exhibits shooting stars at a higher rate than at any other time of the year - as many as one per minute. The meteors, or pieces of iron and stone, are probably no larger than a grain of sand, Prof. Losh notes. They become

visible only when they enter

the earth's atmosphere. The friction sets them burning, and most of them are consumed in the plunge. "Although Perseids may be seen in any direction, their paths, traced back, seem to ntersect in the northeast where the constellation Perseus

Hence the name given to this show," Prof. Losh explains. This constellation, sometimes called The Champion, resembles a letter "K." the U-M astronomer adds. "At the upper arm corner of binary, Algol, or The Demon, with two components revolving around each other. One brighter, the other much
