






















































This year's Homecoming theme was selected by the Student Council to be "Living in the Past". The Juniors were the winners of the float competition, with their representation of a covered wagon.




#### Counselors Attend To Student Needs



All these courses are valuable if you plan to continue your education in any field or plan to work when you graduate.







#### Enter a New World with Language





The student can take courses with a general science background or college prep courses. Any way he wishes science is a very interesting course for everyone.












#### Art Makes School Life Colorful






The Physical Education courses offered this year are Team Sports, Individual Activities, First-Aid and Health Problems. Being arranged this way students can participate in many sports.














## Sophomores Begin With New Experiences





# Wolves Take Second in League






# Golf Takes 2nd in League, 10th in State

## Wolves Finish in a Winning Spree










