# Future of Township Hall Remains Uncertain

Most Novi residents pass it several times every day. But the one-story, white frame building maintains a certain anonymity which belies its position of importance in the history of Novi

"Run a picture of it and don't reveal its location," suggests Frazer Staman, owner of the building, "and I'll bet most people won't be able to identify its location." The building-in case you were one of those who did't recognize it—is located on Novi Road between Joy Gun Shop and Staman's Insurance Agency, almost directly across the

street from the Novi City Hall, From the time it was built in 1876 until it was abandoned at the time the present municipal facilities were constructed in 1951, the building served as the center of Novi's official

Today it is most frequently referred to as the "old Town-"A lot of business was carried on in that building," says

Staman. "Things got pretty hot in there at times, too," he Staman is a good one to talk about the hall. Not only is he its present owner, but he also served as Novi township supervisor through most of the 1950's and his knowledge of Novi

goes back a good many years. Today Staman is chairman of the Oakland County Road

"The center of Novi was originally at Grand River and Wixom Road," he says. "Your original Novi started right there because that's where the post office was." "But the center of town gradually came to be Novi and Grand River, and the reason it changed was primarily

because of Walled Lake." "There used to be sort of a trolley line that carried people out to Commerce Lake. But as people began to get their own automobiles, they started driving out to Walled Lake instead and the best way to get there was by coming right down Grand River and then taking a right on Novi Road.'

Novi Hotel where the Standard station is now and my wife's father, M. J. Moeren, owned a general store where Dave's Hamburgers is now." Actually, the history of the township hall itself can be

divided into two major parts-pre-fire and post-fire. "The original building was put up in 1876," reports Staman, after persuing some old books and records. "Novi became a township in 1853 and for the first 24 years the town hall meetings were conducted in various homes and

taverns in the community. Finally, the township officials decided they needed a building of their own." The lot on which the building was constructed was donated to the township by C. C. Gage. According to Staman's records, the total cost of construction was \$800.

"Of course, we didn't have the carpeting in those days," he adds, referring to the carpeted chambers in which Novi officials presently conduct their business.

"I just haven't decided yet if that carpeting helps them make better decisions or not. I always thought we did pretty well without it, though."

The original Township Hall was destroyed by fire in 1912. Both Staman and his wife Irene remember the occasion

"There was no fire department in those days," recalls Mrs. Staman. "When they rang the bell everybody came out to fight the fire." At the time the fire took place, there were three buildings in close proximity on the west side of Novi Road-the Baptist

Church, the Township Hall, and the house in which Staman's Insurance Agency is presently located. "We had a very bad electrical storm that night," Mrs. Staman remembers, "and both the church and the hall caught on fire and burned. They rang the bell and everybody

came out and formed a bucket brigade.' "They put wet burlap bags on the roof of this house and were able to save it, but the church and the hall burned to the

The present town hall was rebuilt on the same site in 1914, two years after the fire.

Not only was the new hall the center for the township's official business transactions, it also served a certain social

"That's where they used to have the square dances," says Mrs. Staman with a smile on her face. "They had a fiddler by the name of Green, and a man named Steve Hicks was the caller. Later Guy Nichols, who used to live down on Novi Road near Twelve and a Half Mile,

"Those square dances were really big things in those days. Kids would come all the way out from Farmington for them. "And your parents used to be able to ask you to do just about anything in order to be able to go. There was one time when my parents said they weren't going to let me go-I don't think I ever did so much work in a few days time to make them change their minds."

Right around the corner, on Grand River, was Harry Hamlin's Ice Cream Parlor-a favorite stopping off point after the square dances. "You didn't have much in those days," adds Staman, "but

what you did have, you had time to enjoy." In 1951 the Township Hall was abandoned for the new quarters directly across the road. Novi Equipment, a local business, purchased the building

and used it for a number of years as a union hall. When Novi Equipment left town, the building was boarded up because it failed to measure up with today's building codes. Staman purchased it approximately five years ago, mainly because he owns the adjoining land which will be necessary in order to make the improvements that will permit it to be reopened.

"I haven't done much to improve it," he admits. "But the building is still in pretty good shape even now. There's just one big room in there. No basement. There's a little stage at one end of the building that you were supposed to stand on if you wanted to say anything so everybody could see you." As to what the future holds for the building, Staman is just

"I may try to bring it up to code," he says, "but that possibility is questionable." Just as uncertain are some "feelers" from the city to

purchase the building from the Stamens and convert it into a museum of Novi memorabilia. Until something is finally decided, it appears likely that the little, one-story, white-framed building on Novi Road will go right on being unnoticed by Novi residents.

"National holiday in the United States commemorating the harvest reaped by the Plymouth Colony in 1621, after a winter of great starvation and privation. In that year Governor William Bradford proclaimed a day of thanksgiving, and the feast was shared by all the colonists and the neighboring In-

"Although similar observances were held locally, they were sporadic and at no set time. After the American Revolution the first national Thanksgiving Day, proclaimed by President Washington, was Nov. 26, 1789. Lincoln, urged by Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, revived the custom in 1863, appointing as the date the last Thursday in November. In 1939, 1940 and 1941 Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed Thanksgiving the third Thursday in November. When a contradiction arose between Roosevelt's proclamation and some of those of state governors, Congress passed a joint resoultion in 1941 decreeing that Thanksgiving should fall on the fourth Thursday of

"The day is observed by church services and family reunions; the customary turkey is a reminder of the four wild turkeys served at the Pilgrims' first thanksgiving feast".

So Thanksgiving is steeped in dependence. Rather it was born as the result of survival from severe suffering during our nation's most primitive years.

# Gas Tax for Mass Transit?

LANSING-Two big unfinished matters await the Michigan Legislature as it returned in late

The first, and better known, is the question of whether Michigan will use a small portion of its gas tax revenues to help pay for mass transit programs for the state's urban areas.

The second is whether the legislature will raise the bonding limit for the State Housing Development Authority from its current \$300 million level.

Both issues currently are tied up in the Senate where virtually no action was taken during the brief session held toward the end of September.

THE HIGHWAY PACKAGE which Gov. William G. Milliken has at the top of his priority list, has been locked in the Senate Highways Committee since last spring.

bills which would raise the gasoline tax by two cents per gallon and allocate the increase. Three quarters of it, or 1.5 cents per gallon, would go for an accelerated highway construction program. The other one quarter, or one half cent per gallon. would go for mass transit.

Because of Fleming's intransigence, the package is in serious trouble. Lawmakers couldn't come back any sooner after the election because many of them wanted to go deer hunting rather than work, and the short time remaining reduces any chances for its success.

of Agriculture, announced that retail meat counters in Michigan will soon be displaying signs which identify companies whose sausages and other meat products meet the Michigan Department of Agriculture's high standards for "Michigan Grade 1.'' The signs are being


distributed by Michigan sausage manufacturers. Federal standards for comminuted meats permit the addition of such byproducts as snouts, stomach, lips, ears, spleens, salivary glands and esophagi. There is no minimum protein requirement, and the products may contain up to 10 percent added water. Ball said much of the consumers' outrage is

directed toward Armour, Hormel and Wilson, the three large out-of-state meat packers who filed suit in federal court in an attempt to force Michigan's higher standards down to the minimum federal requirements.

# Citizens See 'Open Doors' Program in Action

More than 40 enthusiastic school officials, city councilmen and citizens of the Novi School District toured community education facilities in Flint last week. The trip by school bus and tour was co-sponsored by Novi Jaycees and the Novi Board of Education.

Following a dinner in the Flint schools food center, representatives of Flint's community education program and those connected with community education programs in adjacent school districts answered questions of the Novi

Later the Novi group visited one of Flint's community education centers-located in Williams Elementary School. During the question and answer period the following disclosures were made concerning community education: Cooperation between city and school district is essential to a successful community education program. A community divided spells defeat.

• Key element of a good program is the hiring of a professional community education director. Utilization of laymen from within the community as instructors is recommended. Non-paid volunteer instruction is possible at the outset of a

program, but thereafter paid instruction very likely will

become necessary. Academic instruction should be taught only by accredited teachers. Major ingredients of a program include adult education.

with progress to a high school diploma; recreational-social activities for young and old; skill development; community organization activities. •It's a pretty safe assumption that some 40-percent of a community's adult population does not have a high school

• Survey of the community is necessary to determine initial programs to offer; survey of those participating in the initial programs can assist in developing future programs. • A community education director can serve also as a city's

recreation director • Future schools can incorporate facilities especially designed for community education. • Cost of community education is relatively inexpensive can be totally self-supporting.

• Generally, minimal fees are charged for classes, but senior citizens and those children or adults who are financially unable to pay are admitted free without disclosure of ▶ A chief obstacle may be the custodian, who may dislike

and the school. Community education programs are provided day and night but, according to the Principal Duane Brown, these programs offer no problem for elementary instruction during the day.

Thus, during the day both children and adults are utilizing school facilities, he said. Community services at Williams include:

Adult basic education and adult high school classes: consumer education instruction; job training, senior citizens programs, enrichment programs; a neighborhood meeting place; community learning and study center; community referral services; extension branches for community-wide

A continual center for community action and community information dissemination; programs and services for juvenile delinquents and juvenile delinquency prevention; child care center; transportation services;

Expanded school children's health services; community health referral services; planned parenthood information and instruction; nutrition education, consumer education, and homemaker instruction; parental care and well baby clinic; paraprofessional health-related training programs; and dental health education services.

Residents within the Williams school neighborhood are given first priority, but its programs are open to citizens throughout the school district, according to Brown.
