Community Education Gets Board Approval

The community education concept was endorsed by the Novi Board of Education Tuesday night, thus paving the way next month for specific recommendations of the superintendent.

And in somewhat related areas, the board appointed members to a needs assessment citizens committee and granted six halfdays of release time for high school students to permit staff work on North Central accreditation matters.

In unanimously endorsing the community education concept, the board gave Superintendent Gerald Kratz the green light to next month recommend a specific course

Dr. Kratz reported he will recommend some kind of pilot program, and ask the board to authorize appointment of a community education coordinator. He indicated the wisest choice may be to request the services of an administrative intern from Eastern Michigan University's Center for Community Education

It's hard to imagine a newsstand without Life.

The familiar photo-cover interrupted only by the red block surrounding the white-lettered LIFE has been a part of the American scene for 36 years.

Township Supervisor Lawrence Wright dropped off a first edition at our office this week.

The birth of Life was dated November 23, 1936.

Its editors decided to kill Life December 29, 1972, when a final double-issue will be published.

I've always admired Life for its quality of production. Life was first class. And maybe this refusal to be anything less is partly responsible for its demise.

Top photographs, top writers, fine reproduction techniques and quality paper stock cost money. Add the fact that a magazine cannot get into the home by the flick of an electronic switch, and you come up with the answer for the death of Life.

It's ironic that while the sentimental staffers of Life were mourning its death, the stock market reflected its opinion of the decision by recording more than a \$5 increase in Time Inc. stock, owner of

The first edition of Life contained 96 pages. Its newsstand price was 10 cents. The most recent edition of the magazine contains 92 pages and sells for 50 cents.

For those born in the Twenties or thumb through the first Life edition.

On page two opposite an in troductory article by the editors is a full-page photograph of a doctor delivering a new baby entitled: Life

There's a nine-page photo-feature on life in the shanty towns around the work-relief project at Fort Peck, Montana. The area's called Franklin Roosevelt's Wild West. Two of the shanty towns are named Delano Heights and Square Deal.

Life shows life as it is—rugged and

There's a two-page spread entitled "Overweather" in which it is stated that at heights of 35,000 feet "it never rains, never snows, never storms." It points out that commercial aviation hopes to get its airplanes up "near these placid altitudes, whip them across the continent in 8 or 10 hours."

And to do this it must first learn how to seal the plane and condition its air supply against thin atmosphere and sub-freezing temperature; and to equalize stresses and strains inside the plane.

Life also devotes a few pages to Helen Haves' childhood: to the tenth birthday of NBC radio and some of its stars—Walter Winchell, Gypsy Rose Lee, Jack Benny, Rubinoff, Rudy Vallee; to a new star named Spangler Arlington Brugh, who became Robert Taylor; to scenes from Camille with Taylor and the beautiful Greta Garbo; to pictures of Sylvia Sidney, Myrna Loy, William Powell, Peggy Hopkins Joyce.

The back-cover advertisement features "Luckies" in the familiar green package-- "a light smoke of rich, ripe-bodied tobacco—'It's

Other advertisements include a page on Williams' shaving cream that features "wiry-bearded athletes "Bill Tilden, Ed "Strangler" Lewis, Paul Runyan and Benny Friedman.

A full-page color ad by Nash features the LaFayette "400" for \$595 and the Ambassador at \$755.

A double-page spread by Hudson lists prices beginning at \$595 for the Terraplane up to \$770 for the Hudson

A full-color cigarette advertise ment urges the reader to smoke Camels "For Digestion's Sake."

It was all in that first edition of Life in the U.S. and the world in 1936. Ten cents on the newsstand.

The final edition ought to be a bargain at five times the price.

There's a story elsewhere in this edition announcing a change in policy regarding police reporting.

No longer will The Record report everything that goes to District Court.

Instead, only police matters of felony level will be reported, except in special instances where lesser crimes, accidents or police action cause particularly newsworthy

That means that the minor violations such as fighting, speeding, drunk driving, etc., which normally call for an appearance in court will be ignored by the police

Assault, breaking and entering, rape, murder—felony level violations which happen less before, it might be interesting to frequently and are usually more serious will be reported as usual.

> It was perhaps the most controversial, most frequently criticized, department of our newspaper. The number of people who have called this newspaper to have their name excluded from the court news, who have threatened and pleaded, is inestimable.

Many have laughed, more have been angered at our "small town"

They'll be happy to learn of our new "big town" professionalism.

Frankly, I'm saddened by the

But I know it is necessary and that we must bend with the times.

Our area is no longer "small" in numbers of people and occurrences of violations. Frankly, we have been unable to keep up with the high instance of police activity in Novi for several years. In other areas served by our newspapers we have also found it most difficult to keep up with all court proceedings.

But in Northville we have found both the police and the District Court most cooperative. They have made our job of sorting through reports

Like this newspaper, these officials believe that reporting violations in the local press serves as a deterrent to crime. Most drunk drivers, for example, would far rather pay a stiff fine than see their name in the newspaper.

But if our newspaper continued to report all violations that require court appearance, soon we'd have "misdemeanor" and "felony".

Meanwhile, you may be sure that if a drunk or sober driver brings his car to a halt in the display window of a local store, we'll still consider that "news" even if the people."? court calls it a misdemeanor.

So drive carefully.

Bail Out Detroit Schools?

The Detroit school system will become fiscally solvent only when Detroiters recognize their obligation to support their schools. Until they accept this obligation, I will oppose any further effort to underwrite their educational system at state expense.

Detroit currently levies 15 mills for school operation while the state average levy is 26 mills. Five times since 1968 the Detroit Board of Education has asked voters to approve a higher millage to finance their schools. Each time the millage issue has failed.

Detroit's neighbors in the suburbs have superior school systems because suburban parents have been willing to pay for quality education. Dearborn taxpayers now pay 25 mills in school tax, while Grosse Pointe and Warren taxpayers pay 33 mills. Madison Heights and East Detroit tax payers pay 37 mills; and the rate is 38 mills in Bloomfield Hills and 43 mills in Wayne City.

Detroit's 15-mill operating tax combined with a threemill construction bond tax brings the system's total levy to 18 mills. This is among the lowest in the state and second lowest among the 86 schools systems in the tri-county metropolitan area.

Because of this unwillingness to finance Detroit schools locally, state support for the Detroit system has risen from \$79.2 million in 1968-69 to \$120 million this year. This must come to an end. If Detroit receives further state subsidies to bail them

out now, there is no need for the voters in this state ever to approve another school tax millage vote again. Detroiters are going to have to realize that their school situation is serious and recognize their responsibility to support their system. Failing that, we may have to

mandate this responsibility by law, empowering the Detroit School Board to levy taxes without a popular vote. Thomas G. Sharpe State Representative

Detroit taxpayers for years have been carrying an unfair share of the burden of support for the entire state. For decades on end, they poured tax monies into the state coffers and accepted a trickle in return without so much as a complaint.

As an example, the Detroit Board of Education paid out of locally raised school monies almost \$22-million for social security for its employees.

At the same time that the state paid the cost for every other school employee. There are other similar examples. Detroit is now faced with a shrunken tax base what with the extensive properties taken off the rolls by expressways and urban renewal. We support public libraries and museums used extensively by suburbanites. And the list could go on. We can no longer carry the full load. We are asking for help.

But now, at a time when Detroit is tremendously overburdened by city property taxes in combination with a two-percent income tax and a five-percent utilities tax to an equivalent total of more than 70 mills, others in the state are insisting they will not return any help to the city which has helped them for so many years.

But what happens to the one-seventh of Michigan's children in Detroit schools is the concern of the entire state. It's time to look carefully for a resolution, not to jump to a hasty conclusion.

"You're kidding," the four young men chorused when I suggested they represent the most appreciated \ service provided by the City of Northville.

Northville's municipal garbage-trash collection is second to none, and there is no other service in this community— and that includes police, fire, library, recreation, you name it—that we citizens utilize more

"What is it about you guys that so fascinates my son?" I asked. "He has but one ambition in life and that is to become a garbage man," I told the four as they finished their rounds Friday.

"You see, he sees you out there with the truck. histling, laughing, and tossing snowballs back at the kids and he's convinced it's a great job.

"Is it really that much fun?"

One by one, Russ Turner, John Pinion, James Daniel and Al Zielinski, admitted it is a "degrading" job-not because of the nature of the work but because of the public's general attitude that "anyone who works on a garbage truck must be a dummy who can't do anything else."

It's one cruel remark after another as they make heir rounds, they admitted when pressed.

"Garbage men don't make much money but they

get a free lunch," is typical. Keeping one's self-respect in the face of this attitude, they agreed, is difficult. It's embarrassing: it

hurts even to admit to friends that they are garbage

The whistling and laughing..it's their way of ninimizing the degradation and keeping happy. They

Utilities are asked how many customers take advantage of early payment discounts, how much revenue is generated by late payment.
