

Seventh, tenth graders raise MEAP scores

Test results from the Michigan Education Assessment Program (MEAP) show that Novi's seventh and tenth graders have a better understanding of the basic skills tested than their counterparts a year ago, while understanding among fourth graders has declined.

Superintendent Robert Piwko told the school board Thursday that staff members are investigating why youngsters in the fourth grade did not score as well on the test as they have in the past.

"We can speculate, but we really can't respond until we look at this in greater detail," Piwko said.

Basic concepts in math and reading which have not been mastered by some Novi students will be reviewed by staff members to determine whether or not the concepts are introduced in the district, at what level they are introduced and how they are introduced, Piwko said.

Helen Ditzhazy, administrative assistant for instruction, said it appears from talking to curriculum directors in surrounding school districts that fourth grade scores in general were lower than they have been.

"I've found from talking to other instructional people that all fourth grade math scores have dipped. It might be a

more difficult test since this seems to be a common experience," Ditzhazy said.

Preceding the meeting Ditzhazy commented that the schools are "pleased with the seventh and tenth grade scores and not dissatisfied with the fourth grade scores."

"All the youngsters attained better than 75 percent of the objectives. We've been more pleased in other years, but we're not really displeased this year," she said.

The Michigan Education Assessment Test is administered annually to measure achievement of minimal basic skills which are essential to a child's

progress in school.

Each skill - or concept - is tested with four questions. If the student answers three of the four questions correctly, he or she is judged to have mastered the objective.

Test results are used by the school district to determine the strengths and weaknesses of individual students.

More time can be spent with students in specific areas of weakness as identified by the test.

Test results also can be used to evaluate district-wide educational programs.

For example, results of this year's reading tests have been reviewed by the district's reading teachers. Objectives tested by the Michigan Education Assessment Program have been "plugged into" the programs at each of the three elementary schools, Ditzhazy said. This enables the district to offer a uniform reading program, she explained.

Ditzhazy also stated that scores can

be misleading.

Novi students scored poorly on alphabetization. Piwko explained that it is not that students are not being taught to alphabetize, but the objective tested is very different from the way alphabetization is taught locally.

According to the standards used by the Michigan Department of Education, the results of this year's test show Novi is a "low needs school district" in both math and reading at the fourth and tenth grade level. Seventh graders fall into the "moderate needs" category for math, and the "low needs" classification in reading.

In summary the test results show:

- Some 78.8 percent of this year's entering fourth graders mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives as compared to 81.1 last year.
- Some 82.5 percent of this year's entering fourth graders mastered 75-100 percent of the math objectives as compared to 94 percent last year.
- Some 91.7 percent of this year's

seventh graders mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives as compared to 83.3 percent last year.

• Some 73.6 percent of this year's seventh graders mastered 75-100 percent of the math objectives as compared to 69 percent last year.

• Some 87.6 percent of this year's entering tenth graders mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives as compared to 74.2 percent last year.

• Some 76.1 percent of this year's entering tenth graders mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives as compared to 65.9 percent last year.

This year's test was administered to 240 fourth graders, 254 seventh graders and 226 tenth graders. Special Education students who spend more than 51 percent of the school day in a regular classroom were included in those groups.

This is the fourth year tenth graders have taken the test, while it has been administered to fourth and seventh graders for the past 12 years.

Police talks reach impasse

It now appears that contract talks between the Novi Police Officers Association (NPOA) and the city have reached an impasse and are headed for binding arbitration.

Talks apparently broke down after a sixth mediation session which was conducted Monday. Representatives of the bargaining unit and the city have been meeting for 10 months without reaching a settlement.

The city's three year contract with the NPOA expired June 30.

Alex Allie, the city's chief negotiator, reported issues where the two sides have reached impasse include holidays, wages, scheduling, vacations and a number of other economic and non-

economic issues.

Representatives of the NPOA could not be reached for comment.

Mediator Leon Cornfield, who has mediated the sessions since April, sent the bargaining teams to arbitration after the last session failed to bring about an agreement.

In the next step, both sides will prepare their final offers on the unresolved issues. Those bargaining positions will be turned over to an arbitrator along with exhibits and testimony supporting the positions.

Allie suggested that both sides could move closer together in their offers between now and formal arbitration.

The city and the police are required

to go into binding arbitration under the provisions of Public Act 312. Under the requirements of that legislation police officers are not allowed to strike so they must go to binding arbitration.

Allie said that although an impasse has been declared, a possibility remains that a settlement could be reached before arbitration begins.

He indicated he will meet with the city council to discuss the disparity in the issues and determine whether the council agrees that the city should enter arbitration.

Allie also suggested that before final arbitration begins the NPOA might be in contact with him to further discuss the contract.

According to Allie, there has been movement on the issues from both sides of the table.

"They have moved on our issues and there has been movement on our part on issues important to them," Allie said.

However, he also noted that after 10 months of bargaining "it might be time to put this in the hands of a third party."

Problems in settling the contract with the police officers became apparent before the contract expired. City and union negotiators went into mediation in April. At that point a four-day weekend which patrol officers receive every three weeks threatened the progress of the talks.

City officials wanted the contract revised to allow four-day weekends every fourth week. Police representatives want to maintain the four-day weekends every three weeks.

Charter changes approved, road assessments banned

Novi will no longer be allowed to finance construction of mile roads and repaving of residential streets by levying special assessments against abutting property owners.

Novi voters overwhelmingly supported two amendments to the city charter in last week's general election which remove the city's authority to establish special assessment districts to finance road improvement projects.

The first amendment passed by a margin of 1,200 votes (4,592 to 3,390). As a result, language will now be added to the charter prohibiting the city from financing the paving of major roads through the establishment of special assessment districts.

A second charter amendment passed by 1,098 votes (4,504 to 3,406). The amendment prohibits the city from financing the resurfacing of subdivision streets through the special assessment process.

Absentee voters were among the strongest supporters of the drive to prohibit special assessment for residential road improvements. Both amendments

received nearly 550 more positive than negative votes from absentee voters.

Residents of western Novi and North Hills subdivision, who voted in Precinct 1, also were among those who pushed the measure over the top. Proposal 1 passed by 203 votes, while Proposal 2 won by 123 votes in that precinct.

Residents of northern Novi, who voted in Precinct 4, came out strongly in favor of the charter amendments. Both proposals passed by more than 200 vote margins in Precinct 4.

The only precinct which supported neither of the amendments was Precinct 2, which included voters from Meadowbrook Glens and Novi Heights. They voted against the proposal to remove the city's authority to special assess for the repaving of subdivision streets.

Before the passage of the two amendments, the city charter allowed the city council to determine whether residents living next to a road improvement project received a "special benefit" for completion of that project. Those deemed to be deriving special benefits were

specially assessed a percentage of the cost of the project.

During the Novi Road program, residents were charged \$10 per front foot through the special assessment process. Residents in subdivisions have been charged 80 percent of the cost of repaving a subdivision street.

Former Council Member Donald Young, Jr., who led the drive to place the charter amendments on the ballot, views the passage of the proposals as a major victory for those who have objected to special assessments over the years.

City Manager Edward Kriewall said he expects the effect of the passage of the amendments will be felt in the next three to four years. Kriewall indicated that the city will have to develop new approaches for funding the paving of mile roads and resurfacing of subdivision streets.

Mayor Romaine Roethel has directed the administration to prepare a report on how road improvement projects will be funded in the future. There has been no indication as to when the report will be completed, however.

Novi voters okay Tisch plan, endorse Reagan for president

Novi voters did their part in naming Ronald Reagan the 40th President of the United States.

There were 5,863 votes for Reagan compared to 2,805 votes for Jimmy Carter when the Novi voters were total-ed election night.

The Anderson Coalition netted 784 votes in Novi.

Among the fringe parties, 94 votes were cast for Ed Clark, presidential candidate of the Libertarian Party; 14 votes for Citizen Party candidate Barry Commoner and 14 votes for Gus Hall, an independent candidate for the presidency.

Meanwhile, Novi voters registered a greater tendency to support a tax limitation voters than their counterparts across the state.

While two of three tax proposals on the ballot were defeated locally, Novi voters narrowly passed Proposal D - the Tisch amendment.

Tisch received 4,751 positive votes and 4,537 negative votes.

Two other tax proposals were defeated by wide margins. Proposal A, known as the Smith-Bullard plan, received 1,601 affirmative votes and 7,220 negative votes. Proposal C, the executive-legislative coalition plan, went down with 1,718 voters favoring the measure and 7,020 opposing it.

Novi voters agreed with voters across the state that the drinking age should not be lowered to 19. Local voters rejected the proposal by almost 3,000 votes. There were 6,106 votes opposing Proposal B and 3,135 votes in favor of lowering the drinking age.

A proposal to finance construction of prisons through an increase in the state income tax went down locally by a 2,458 vote margin.

Local voters also rejected a proposal which would have ended legislative immunity to civil arrest while the legislature is in session. Voters also opposed restrictions on the duties of the lieutenant governor.

In the race for U. S. Representative from the 19th Congressional District there was not much contest as Novi voters voted to return incumbent William Broomfield to office by giving him 6,311 votes. Some 2,216 votes were cast for Democratic candidate Wayne Daniels.

Incumbent Republican Richard Fessler easily turned back the challenge of Democrat William Roberts for State Representative from the 24th District and the results from Novi were no exception with 5,900 votes for Fessler and 2,535 votes for Roberts.

In a tight race for a newly created judgeship in the First Division of the 52nd District Court, Harold Bulgarelli received 3,008 votes, while Thomas Connelly was named on 2,871 ballots. Bulgarelli will join Martin Boyle and Michael Batchik on the bench.

In another judgeship race, Novi voters agreed with voters statewide in supporting incumbent Justices Mary Coleman and Charles Levin for reelection to the State Supreme Court.

County races for the most part had the same results in Novi as in other parts of Oakland County. The exception was the Oakland County Sheriff race which was won by incumbent Johannes

Spreen. In Novi he was narrowly defeated. There were 4,355 votes for Republican challenger James Stewart and 4,149 Novi votes for Spreen.

Incumbent Republicans carried the six other county races in Novi and throughout Oakland County.

County executive Daniel Murphy received 5,433 votes in Novi. His opponent Tom Lewand took 2,969 ballots. Prosecuting Attorney L. Brooks Patterson netted 6,409 votes in Novi, there were 2,187 for hopeful Martin Krohner. County Clerk Lynn Allen was returned with 5,629 local votes, compared to 2,303 votes for challenger Albert Keenan. Treasurer Hugh Dohoney took 5,541 Novi votes, while his opponent Robert Rosman earned 2,414 votes. Drain Commissioner George Kuhn received a 5,410 vote mandate in Novi and Daniel Barry netted 2,566 votes.

In the race for the Oakland County 24th District Commission Seat Dennis Murphy was returned to office with 5,787 votes from Novi and 2,360 votes for opponent William Brinker.

Altogether, approximately 69 percent of the 13,900 voters registered in Novi voted in the November 4 General Election. Some 9,645 voters cast ballots - 1,306 of them absentee ballots.

Drive aids Historical Society

The Novi News in conjunction with the Novi Historical Society has launched a subscription drive in an attempt to raise funds to assist the group in its efforts to preserve the city's heritage.

Telephone solicitors will be contacting area residents over the next month to sell subscriptions to The Novi News.

The News will then donate a portion of each subscription to the historical society to help fund its efforts for historical preservation.

A similar subscription drive through The Milford Times in Milford recently raised approximately \$1,400 for the American Cancer Society.

The Novi Historical Society was formed this year by a group of citizens interested in preserving the city's heritage. One of the first goals of the group is to assist Oakland Community College in developing a master plan for the Tollgate Farm on Twelve Mile at Meadowbrook Road.

Master plan meeting set

Novi's Planning Board will resume its consideration of a proposed revision to the Master Plan for Land Use Development at their meeting tonight (Wednesday) in the Novi Public Library at 7:30 p.m.

Consideration of the master plan is the last item on the agenda.

Specifically, planners are scheduled to review citizen input received at a October 22 public hearing on the proposed revision of the master plan.

The planning board will consider changes to the master plan based on input from the hearing. Board Chairman Donald Gleason has said the public hearing portion of the process has been

completed and no further testimony will be heard regarding the master plan at tonight's session.

Gleason also noted that the planners may or may not move to adopt the master plan tonight. The decision is contingent on the extent of changes to the proposed revision.

Citizens expressed strong opposition to the proposed locations of convenience commercial centers at the October 22 public hearing. A proposed center on Eight Mile near the Country Place Condominiums drew particularly strong opposition. A rezoning request that would have paved the way for construction of the Eight Mile center has since been withdrawn by the applicant.

Thief steals \$3,000 in jewelry

In Novi
A breaking and entry of a home on the 1000 block of East Lake Drive last week was the second attack on the home within 10 days.
In both break-ins, thieves made off with approximately \$3,000 worth of goods.
In the first incident six rings, some of which contained precious stones, were stolen. Thieves also took \$50 in change in the first break-in.
Four more rings were taken during the second incident.
The owner of the home told police the door on the south side of the home which was locked at 8 a.m. was found open at 1 p.m. that day. It appeared the thieves had entered the home after tampering with a window screen.
The rings were taken from a jewelry case in the

front bedroom of the home, police reported.
A basement window was the point of entry for the perpetrator of a break-in in the 4500 block of Nine Mile.
The thief made off with \$200 in jewelry from the home.
Police said the thief gained entry by cutting a screen on a basement window and using a board to break the window.
Stolen was a jewelry box containing a string of cultured pearls, a gold ring with blue sapphires and various pieces of costume jewelry.
A truck owned by Grandview Orchard which had been stolen was recovered after a police chase which ended at West Road and Penhill Drive.
According to reports, three youths broke into a restroom of the Grandview Orchard building and took one dozen eggs, two gallons of cider, pennies from the cash register and three boxes of candy. They reportedly then left the scene in a truck owned by Grandview Orchard.
Officers first noticed the truck traveling west-bound on Thirteen Mile near Decker Road. The truck did not stop when it struck a construction barricade.

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Paving removes Thirteen Mile
Extending Decker Road will require that a portion of Thirteen Mile be torn out, Novi City Council members learned recently.
Approximately 350 feet of Thirteen Mile must be removed so that a safe intersection with Decker Road can be constructed. The portion of Thirteen Mile being torn out was constructed in 1978.
City Engineer Harry Mosher told the council that the destruction of that portion of Thirteen Mile was unavoidable.
"We did look into the possibility of altering the road to accommodate the future intersection just prior to awarding the contract for the construction of Thirteen Mile," Mosher explained. "But it was impossible. We didn't have the necessary right-of-way and we just didn't know where the intersection would be."
Mosher explained the location of the intersection required the lowering of roadway elevation in order to improve the sight distance for motorists.
The asphalt used to pave Thirteen Mile is being broken up and used to stabilize Decker Road, he said.
Despite the fact that part of a two-year old road is being destroyed, Mosher said the city will come out even in the end since Thirteen Mile was a very expensive road but constructing Decker Road will be very inexpensive.
Decker Road is being constructed by the J. D. Armstrong Landscaping Company of Fraser. The company was awarded the project based on its low bid of \$177,393. The bid was approximately 20 percent below original estimates that the project would cost \$600,000.
Extending Decker Road from Fourteen to Thirteen Mile will be funded primarily through federal Community Development Block Grant funds which the city has put aside since 1977.
The remainder of the project cost will be funded through revenues from the one-mile special voted road fund.
City officials hope that the extension will relieve the amount of traffic now using East Lake Drive, allowing that street to revert to primarily a residential use.

Wixom motel awaits financing
Plans for the construction of a motel-restaurant-bar complex in Wixom are still on "go" according to one of the developers of the proposed project.
Ray Petty, who is developing the motel along with Forrest Hubbell, told The News last week they still plan to proceed with the facility even though the construction timetable has been pushed back considerably by economic conditions.
"We're still trying to line up our financing," reported Petty.
"Anyone who has been attempting to get financing for construction projects will tell you that money is pretty scarce right now. Financing operations would begin in the fall of 1979 so that construction could begin in the spring of 1980. Under that original timetable, the proposed motel could have been completed and ready for occupancy this year.
Some land balancing operations have been completed, but the unavailability of financing has made it impossible to proceed with construction.
The facility is proposed to incorporate some 4,850 square feet on a 1.85 acre parcel. The motel will have some 72 rooms, and also will include a restaurant and a lounge with entertainment.

Township vote stays with GOP
Commerce Township voters rejected three advisory proposals and retained its incumbent Board of Trustees in last Tuesday's general election.
Township electors defeated three questions that would have increased their millage rate by two mills and provided for split collection of school taxes.
An advisory question which asked residents if they would approve an increase of one-quarter mill for financing the installation of a civil defense system (tornado sirens) came the closest to passage. The proposal was defeated by a margin of 4,526 to 3,989.
The proposal to establish a special assessment district to fund additional police protection also fell short by a 3,869 to 3,907 difference.
Walled Lake Consolidated Schools' request for the split tax collection received the worst treatment from Commerce voters, being soundly defeated 4,710 to 2,595.
Precinct 7 failed to record votes in this race, but even if all of its ballots had favored the proposal, the final results would not have changed.
Republicans scored heavily in the township's trustee race.
Richard Higginbottom was the top vote-getter in the race for four trustee vacancies receiving 5,382 votes. Bruce Enfield finished second with 5,378 votes, while Paul Colom was named on 5,248 ballots and Edward Holmes received 5,228 votes.
Two Democratic candidates finished far behind the four Republican incumbents, whose terms will run four years.
Kenneth Butler could only muster 2,891 votes in the trustee race, while Kenneth Hausauer, a former board member, totalled 2,868 ballots in defeat.
The remaining three seats on the board were retained by Supervisor Robert Long, Clerk Robert McGee and Treasurer Patrick Dohany, who were unopposed for re-election to four-year terms.
Long, McGee and Dohany also were unopposed in the 1978 election.
G. William Caddell retained his 55th District seat on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners. Caddell, an incumbent Republican from Wolverine Lake Village, ran without opposition.
Township officials reported a heavy turnout in last Tuesday's general election with approximately 70 percent of Commerce's registered voters casting ballots.

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Union Lake rezoning request goes back to planners

A split decision between Commerce Township planners and Oakland County's coordinating committee has led the Commerce Township Board to return the Union Lake rezoning request back to the planning level.

Township planners voted unanimously to recommend denial September 29. Supervisor Robert Long noted that it was the board's general practice to return such requests to the planning commission when the coordinating committee and planners were not in agreement.

Conrad and Jane Beger, owners of the property in question, assured the planners that if granted approval, the site would be developed into an office for exclusive daytime use. The property owners also contended that because of economic feasibility, the development of office space was more reasonable.

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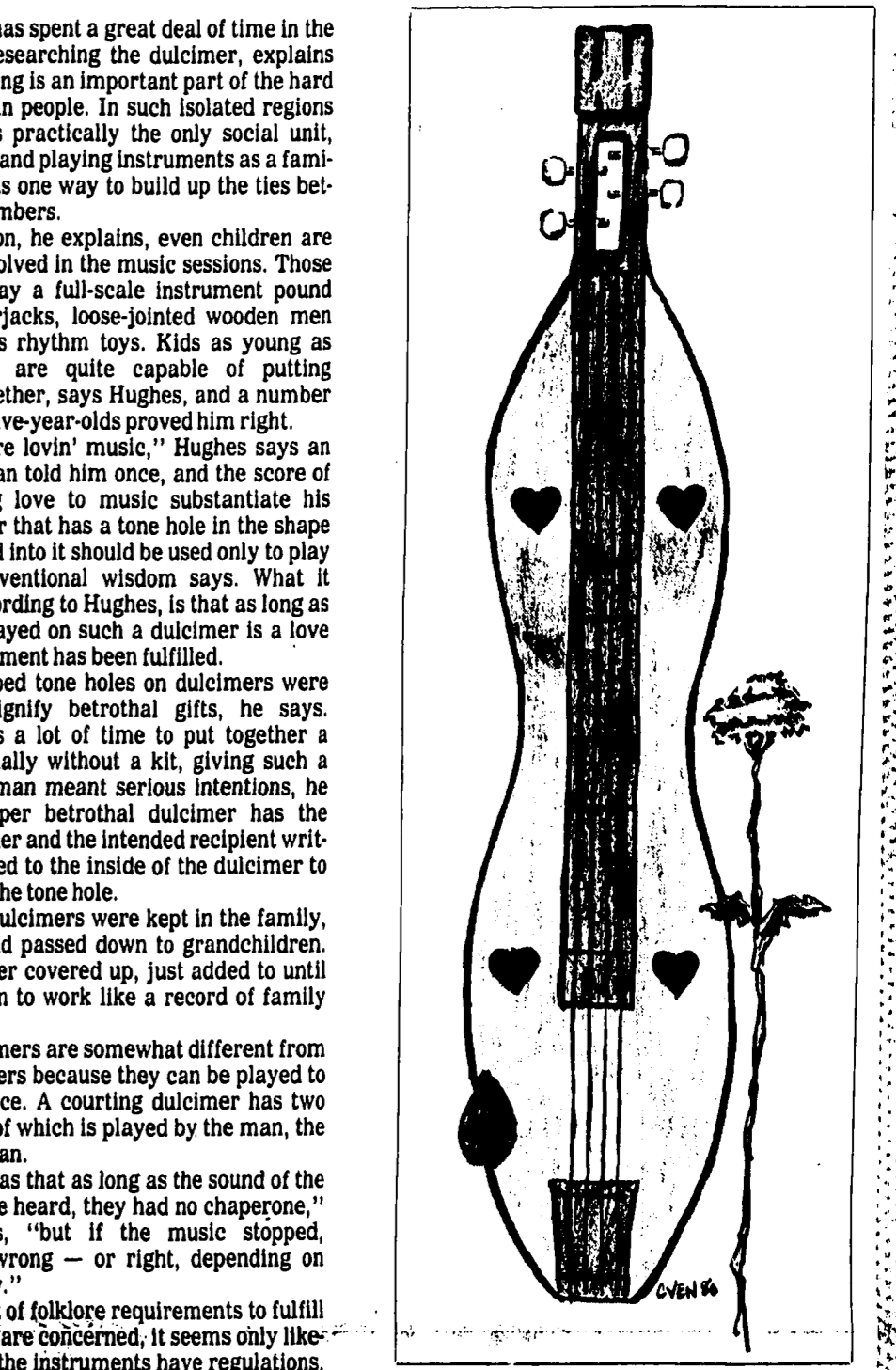


Dulcimers

Hypnosis of witnesses—new tool for police

For centuries, myths and mysteries have shrouded the dark art of hypnosis. For many people, the very word 'hypnosis' conjurs up images of magicians in dimly-lit music halls drawing power from some strange force to change men into fools or unsuspecting pin cushions.

But more recently, the use, and indeed the image, of hypnosis has been revolutionized. On the psychological front, experts have recognized that it is really a myth that human beings can be forced to do act against their will under hypnosis. However, hypnosis' use in behavior modification programs is thought to be instrumental in their success.

But despite the success of the 'hypnotic revolution' in psychology, a battle rages over the use of this technique by criminal investigators. Police, FBI and other investigators have been hypnotizing witnesses who consent to have their memory 'refreshed' in an attempt to dig up 'buried' or 'suppressed' information relating to a crime.

In the face of objections from civil rights lawyers and defense attorneys as to the validity of testimony given under hypnosis, the technique has been used to gather information in over 300 cases in Michigan alone in the last five years, according to Lieutenant Ronald Beauchine of the Michigan State Police.

The Oakland County, Livingston County and Washtenaw County Sheriff's departments have all used this investigative technique in a variety of cases ranging from child murders to rape or arson, according to detectives from all of those departments.

For the police, there are certain ground rules as to who may be hypnotized, how they may be hypnotized and how they may be treated once under hypnosis, Beauchine said.

Witnesses are the only candidates for hypnosis, and each person must be scrupulously screened to make sure that they have no mental or emotional problems which could be triggered by hypnosis, said Beauchine.

The questions to be asked during the session have to be pre-formulated since leading questions like "Do you see the blue, shiny gun?" instead of "Do you see a weapon?" are likely to provoke a biased response, Beauchine said.

However, Dr. Martin T. Orne, national expert on the use of hypnosis from the University of Pennsylvania, stresses that although the police may not intend to ask leading questions, they often do so unintentionally just because of their position as the prosecution.

In addition, Orne points out that hypnotized subjects will do their utmost to give information, whatever the caliber, just to please the hypnotist. Hypnotized people are also very prone to suggestion and are likely to want to confirm what they sense is expected of them, who testified against the use of hypnosis on witnesses in the Ann Arbor VA hospital murders case in 1977, insists that witness can "create memories" and events under hypnosis.

And Mike Moran, Ann Arbor civil rights attorney who acted as the defense counsel for the two Filipino nurses accused of the VA murders, claims the police often try to make the witness' memory comply with their own memory or knowledge of the crime.

Whatever the objections from the defense, Beauchine insists that the police hypnotist is only told the bare facts about a case so that he or she is not influenced in helping to form the questions or in asking them.

In addition to the rigorous screening methods and carefully picked questions used by the police, Beauchine noted that a tape recording is always made of hypnosis sessions and later made available to the defense attorney who can scrutinize it to make sure that the session was conducted properly and ethically.

In the VA murder case and in the People vs. Scott Weise, in which Weise was accused of killing the caretaker of his father's church, Orne viewed the video tapes of the hypnotized witnesses.

In the VA case, Orne said that leading questions had been asked, while in the Weise trial he testified that, based on certain medical criteria, the witness had never really been hypnotized. It was Orne's refutations of the hypnosis testimony in both these cases that helped acquit the accused parties of the killings, Moran said.

However, Beauchine said that as long as the correct procedures have been followed, many courts accept information given under hypnosis as valid evidence. However, for the most part, Beauchine pointed out that the police only use hypnosis to gain pivotal leads which will provide them with other, perhaps more conclusive evidence.

For example, this kind of short-cutting was used in the landmark Chowchilla case in California in 1977. Here, a bus-full of children were kidnapped, taken to the desert and buried in the sand. Fortunately, they were able to dig their way out, but afterwards bus driver Ed Ray, who had been knocked unconscious could remember little.

The Svengali Squad (SQ), Los Angeles' hypnosis squad which spearheaded the use of hypnosis in criminal investigation in this country, hypnotized Ray who recalled all but one digit of the license plate of the kidnapers' white van. On locating the van, the police found other evidence that led to the conviction of the kidnapers.

Dr. Martin Reiser, head of the SQ, recently announced that hypnosis produced new information in nearly 80 percent of the 350 cases in which it was used by the squad from mid-1973 through 1978. Reiser further calculated that 66.4 percent of the information was considered valuable.

Likewise, Beauchine said that the technique's use in this state has been very successful leading to new information in at least 60 percent of the cases and to convictions in 10 percent of the cases. Beauchine added that hypnosis has proven successful for investigative departments in Israel, Hong Kong and Canada.

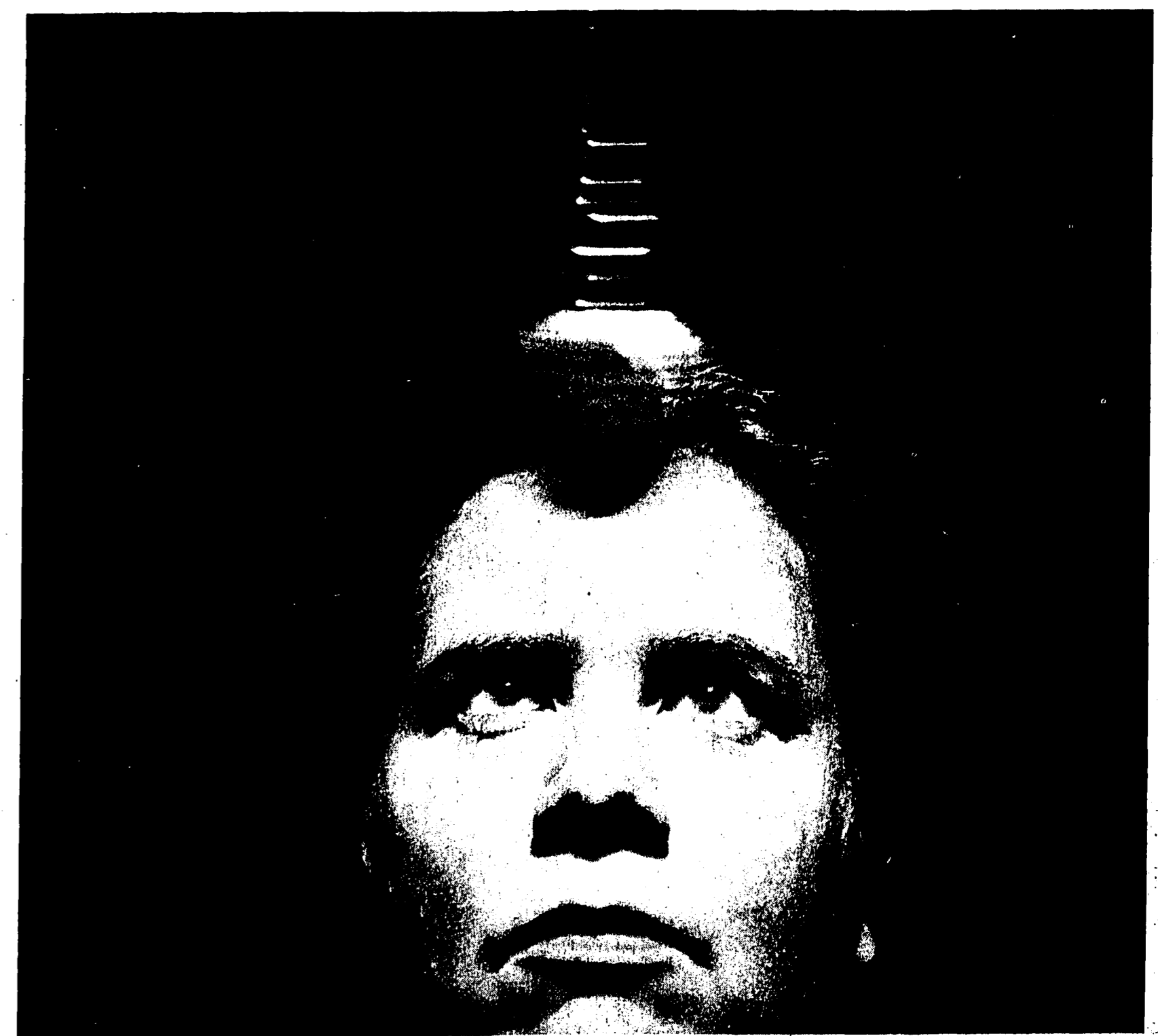

With the development of the International Society of Hypnosis (ISH) and the Michigan Society of Hypnosis (MSH), Beauchine said that police departments all over the state are trying to establish ground rules and ethical practices for the use of hypnosis in criminal investigation so that the information recalled will be more acceptable to the courts and to defense attorneys.

"The ISH has been formed since 1977, and the MSH is currently in the making," Beauchine said. "We'll be adopting by-laws and forming committees which will establish a code of ethics and training standards."

Police hypnotists will also have to take refresher courses to keep their hypnotic skills sharp, Beauchine said. Many of the detectives from the 300 police departments using hypnosis in

the United States travel to Los Angeles to receive their training from Reiser at the Los Angeles Law Enforcement Institute (L.A.L.E.I.), a school separate from the city's police department.

Beauchine noted that although Dr. Donald Rosse, clinical psychologist for the state police, is trained in the use of hypnosis, both he and Lieutenant Gary Powell have attended the L.A.L.E.I. for training.

Like many other officers across the country, Beauchine said that he and Powell attended four and five day training sessions during which time they learned how to place a subject under hypnosis. "First we learned the law as far as the use of hypnosis is concerned," said Beauchine. "We were also warned about the pitfalls of interviewing a hypnotized subject. After this, we were taught how to actually place a per-

son under hypnosis—it isn't very hard to do this."

The most common method for hypnotizing a witness, according to Commander Charles Anderson of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, is called 'voice induction'. Here, the subject is coaxed into an extremely relaxed state by a soft persuasive voice and the removal of external distracting stimuli such as bright lights and noisy fans.

Some subjects are taken back on a 'time train'. In such cases, the witnesses 'board' an imaginary 'train' in time, and 'travel' back to one week, one day, one hour, one minute, one second before the crime actually occurred. They are then told that the 'train' is coming to a halt and that the image they have before their eyes is to be frozen and described in detail, said

Anderson.

Descriptions given by the witness can then be used to locate the suspect. Usually, if the suspect is found, the police look for other evidence to add more substance to the prosecution's case in court. At the present time, the courts have made no specific judgment on the use of investigative hypnosis, side-stepping the issue until a really demonstrative, clear-cut case comes before them.

For example, in the People vs. Tait, 1977, Mason County, the court of appeals reversed a circuit court decision because the police used hypnosis on the principal prosecution witness without telling the court, according to defense attorney Tom Carlson. Carlson said that the court was more concerned with

CHARLIE GINSTER, WALLED LAKE CENTRAL — The Vikings turned it around from a ho-hum 1979 campaign to finish 4-1 in the Inter-Lakes Conference, and this determined talkback was the major offensive factor. Ginster scurried to an 89-yard rushing season that included 13 touchdowns.

The 5-10, 170-pounder tallied four 100-yard rushing games, helping him earn all-Inter Lakes Conference first team honors.

Mike Morgan, South Lyon — One can only wonder how many yards this 5-10, 180-pound senior would have accumulated if he'd have played an entire season. Morgan ran for 323 yards in just seven games, earning him Kensington Valley Conference first team honors.

Morgan also was a KVC second team choice last autumn and a first-teamer on the SHN squad.

Offensive linemen (5): RAY HUNERT, WALLED LAKE CENTRAL — A 6-0, 170-pounder, Hunert was a model of consistency in snapping the pigskin this season. He also was a mainstay in an offensive line that led the blocking for ace runners Charlie Ginster and Bob Goins, earning first team Inter-Lakes Conference plaudits.

One of only two juniors on this year's SHN first offensive team, he'll return to help pave the way for other runners in 1981.

John Ackley, Northville — This 6-1, 205-pound senior was a chief blocker on the Mustangs' offensive line, earning him all-Western Six Conference first

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Perennial champ Lions are '80's top area team

After winning its fourth consecutive league championship and compiling an 8-1 overall record, the South Lyon High varsity football team has been named the 1980 Team-of-the-Year by Sliger Home Newspapers.

The Lions won their second consecutive Kensington Valley Conference (KVC) championship in 1980 with a perfect 5-0 league mark. In 1977 and 1978, South Lyon captured the Southeastern Conference crown.

South Lyon, under the direction of coach Dan Skatzka, has not lost a KVC contest since coming to the league in 1979. And Skatzka is four-for-four, coaching his team to four consecutive league championships in his four seasons with the Lions.

Defense is the name of the game for South Lyon. Spearheaded by a tough defensive front four and aggressive linebackers and defensive backs, the Lion defense stifled their opponents' scoring efforts to a tiny average of 5.2 points per game.

The defense consistently set up the offense for scores by providing good field position and nabbing a season total of 14 interceptions.

Skatzka likes to point out a statistic that makes his team look very good. In third quarter play during the season, the Lion defense gave up no points while the offense put a total of 55 points on the score board. Play like that practically eliminates a second half comeback by opposing football squads.

And the Lion offense could put the points on the board. Averaging 21 points per game, South Lyon's powerful running game maintained ball possession while grinding out the clock and opposing defenses. South Lyon ball carriers rambled for 2,339 yards to its opponents 1,447.

South Lyon's only loss came on September 12 when Clawson kicked by the Lions, 3-0, in a tough defensive battle.

But South Lyon came back after the loss and won its remaining seven games.

Neville finally ousted

Gregory, though, has hope that the team can improve again in 1981 like it did this year.

"We started a freshman and three sophomores this year," the veteran coach observed, "and they'll all be more experienced next season. It looks pretty good."

Aside from the Detroit-Minnesota game, relatively few contestants had difficulty with the pro games last week. It was the college contests that did them in.

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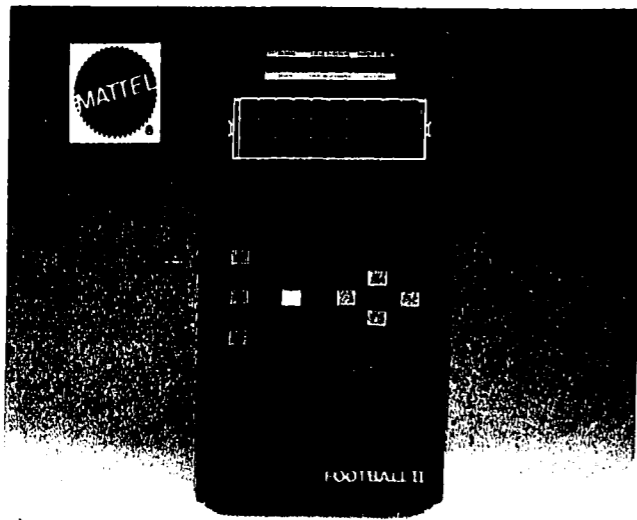
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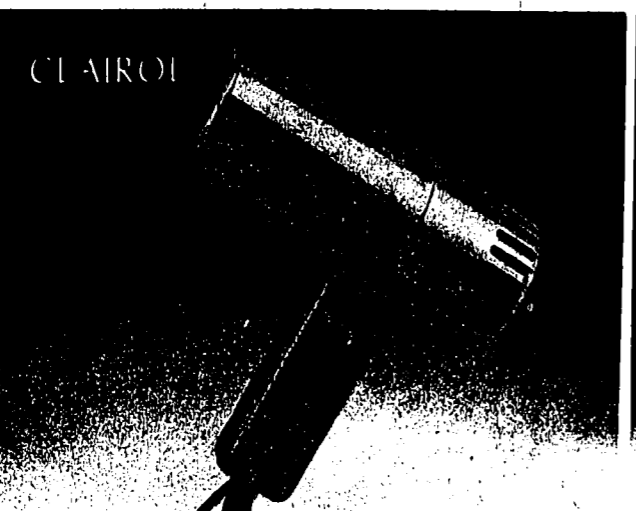
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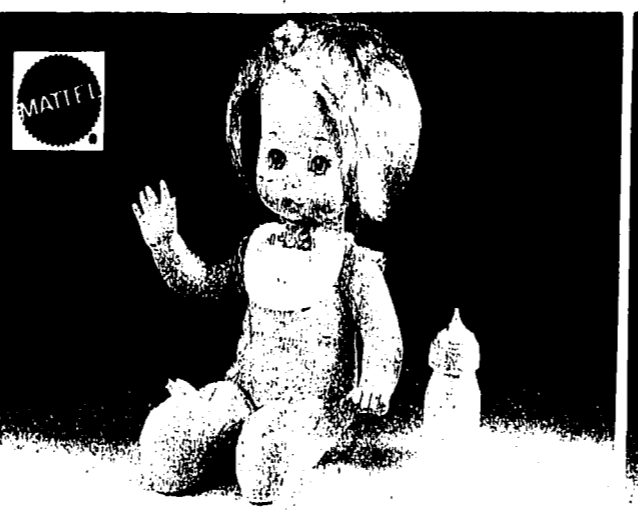
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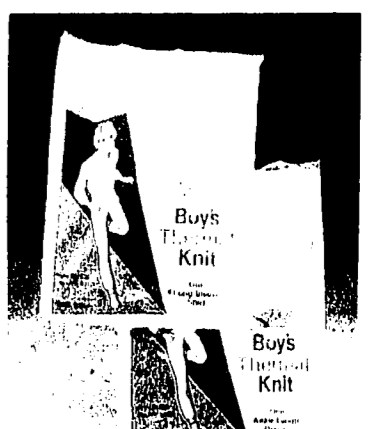
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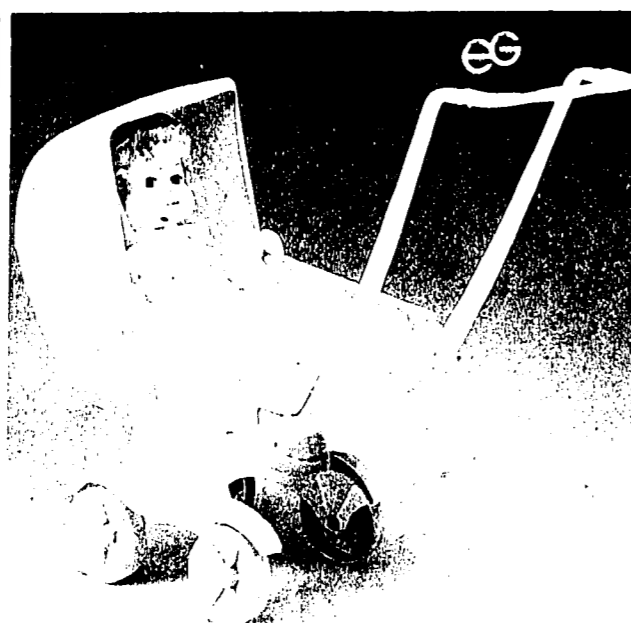
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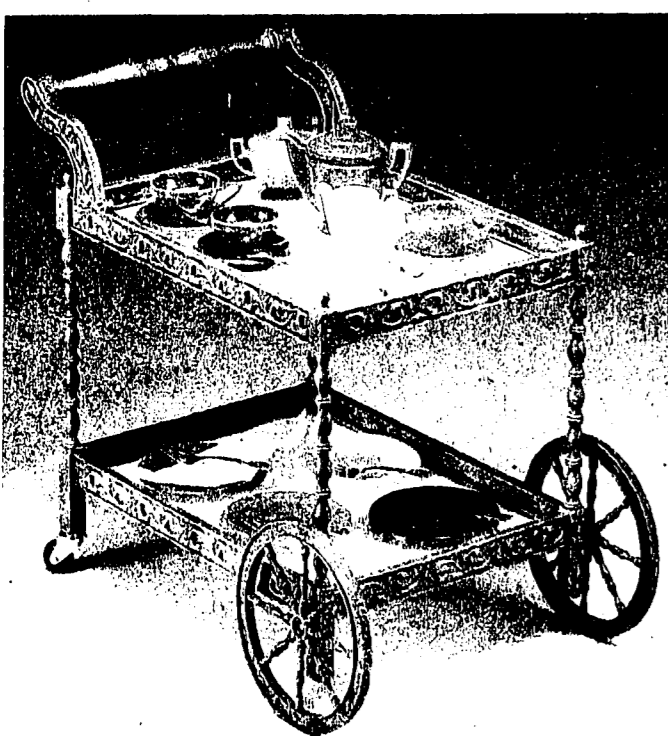
