

West Oaks II: **Debut tonight**

Site plans for West Oaks II, a shopping center containing 335,780 square feet of retail floor space (an area slightly bigger than eight football fields) will make their official debut tonight (Wednesday). The proposed shopping center is to be located at the Twelve Mile/Novi Road intersection.

The plans are scheduled to be presented tonight to the Novi Planning Board, which will decide whether to grant developers the green light for the project's prelminary plans.

If the plans advance through the final stages with no snags in the approval process, Ramco-Gershenson Inc., the firm that put together West Oaks, will begin construction work on West Oaks II this winter.

Almost three-quarters of the total square footage in West Oaks II will be spread among five main stores, designated in the site plan as Builders Square, Main Street, Marshall's, Kids-R-Us and Toys-R-Us. The remaining space will be distributed among perhaps as many

as 35 other stores, according to Ramco-Gershenson co-owner Michael Ward.

Ward already has said he hopes to break ground on the project by February 15. If the planning board and city council promptly follow the favorable recommendations of the city planning consultant and engineering consultant, Ward's schedule should be right on target.

City Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers' report to the board noted that developers had met all the required design standards with the one exception: a provision for off-street loading in an exterior side yard which violates a city ordinance.

Rogers recommended the preliminary plans be approved contingent on a Zoning Board of Appeals variance on the conflict.

"I feel the proposed building facades, depressed/screened loading/unloading areas and the perimeter landscaped berm will create a suitable development," Rogers maintained. He further



For a weatherbeaten, 74-year-old building that hasn't been used for years, the old Novi Town Hall has shown a lot of spirit.

Parts of it are still in pretty good shape. Although its location on Novi Road just south of Grand River is close to the heart of the city's commercial district and planned Town Center, it hasn't been mowed down to make room for a parking lot.

And now it looks like its perseverance is about to pay off.

In a project shelved years ago and newly revived, members of the Novi Historical Society now are confident the Novi Town Hall will be relocated to the Novi Library site as soon as next spring and restored for use as a historical museum for the communi-

Recent negotiations with the Novi Library Board have been encouraging, according to historical society president Lawrence Maki. "We have a verbal agreement, but we have to

Maki identified two potential problems that need to be overcome for the planned move to take place. First, the library site at Ten Mile

and Taft Road contains a limited amount of space for library and museum parking. City engineering consultants JCK and Associates are studying the site for a possible solution.

According to Maki, the spot which most likely will be used for the historical museum would be close to the southwest corner of the site, not far from the barns located west of Novi High School.

The second potential problem is liability for accidents resulting from traffic to and from the museum.

"The insurance is something we're trying to negotiate," explained Paul Black, president of the library board. "If we can work it out," he added, "it

Subdivision may start in spring

Novi's first new subdivision since 1980 may get under way this spring if Vincenti Land Development's Yorkshire Place project gets approvals as expected this winter.

"It's good news to have someone coming in and platting a subdivision," said Mayor Patricia Karevich Monday, just before city council gave tentative approval of Vincenti's preliminary plat (planned arrangement of subdivision streets and lot divisions) for a 175-unit subdivision located on the northwest corner of Ten Mile and Taft Road, south of Novi Woods Elementary School.

City officials - and residents as well - lately have been concerned of a growing proportion of apartment developments in the city. When

Vincenti this year revived a modified version of a 172-unit subdivision plat originally approved in 1982 but never started, officials were happy to see the rebirth of single-family development.

There were no complaints about the new homes' price tags, either. According to developers, the new homes would be priced in the \$100,000 to 130,000 range.

But city council members emphasized they would not give additional approvals to Vincenti's plat without significant changes from the preliminary plat presented Monday night.

While developers obtained council's tentative approval of their preliminary plat on Monday, they still must receive final approval of their preliminary plat and subsequent approval of their final plat before obtaining a building permit.


Council's tentative approval Monday night con-

stituted only a general approval of the basic developmental approach. Council members firmly served notice they would demand more detail and fewer shortcomings when they conduct their final review to Vincent's preliminary plat.

At the recommendation of City Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers, the council identified two deficiencies Vincenti must rectify for final approval of the firm's preliminary plat: 1) Adjustment of two too-small lots; and 2) Lack of a tree survey at the north end of the subdivision where trees up to 12 inches in diameter now grow.

Council members also informed Vincenti representatives they would insist the firm's proposed blke path be built at the same time as the four-phase development instead of being added later.

Late-night oil spill baffles authorities Novi firefighters and DPW workers scrambled until earlymorning hours last Wednesday trying to clean up a mysterious fuel oil spill on South Lake Drive before it could contaminate water along the shore of Walled Lake.

According to a Department of Natural Resources authorities, a small amount of the oil reached the lake, but groundwater and lake water impact appears to be "minimal.

A report of an "unusual odor" at 9:48 p.m. Tuesday, November 26 brought firefighters to the scene at 727 South Lake, where they discovered a 300-foot trail of fuel oil and no visible source.

An estimated 75-100 gallons, most of it atop the surface of the road, was spreading toward the lake, according to Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan.

"A lot of the oil was laying on the surface of the road in three different areas. Weather conditions were wet anyway," noted Lenaghan. "It was a definite hazard to drivers."

On November 18, just eight days

before the spill, a car accident on South Lake Drive had claimed the life of a 16-year-old Farmington Hills youth.

Department of Public Works personnel rushed four loads of sand to the site to absorb the oil while fire officials built dikes to keep the runoff from spreading toward the lake. It took firefighters until 1:38 a.m. to complete their work controlling the spill.

Department of Natural Resources officials authorized spending emergency funds to control the oil

spill, which is still unexplained. "We don't know how it got there," Lenaghan said. "We turned the mat-ter over to the DNR and the Michigan State Police fire marshall to investigate."

According to Timothy Jaski, a DNR water quality specialist, the spill appeared to be some type of kerosene or home heating oil apparently dumped. If the individual or individuals responsible for the dumping can be found, Jaski said, the DNR not only would seek damages but would prosecute.

The Goodfellows are back

There have been a lot of changes in the Novi Goodfellows during the past year.

The entire organization, which was started more than 30 years ago, has been re-structured with a new set of bylaws and a new group of officers.

But the one thing that hasn't been changed is the Goodfellows' basic purpose - to make certain that every family in Novi has a happy Christmas.

The Goodfellows will be taking to the streets this Friday and Saturday, "selling" special complimentary editions of The Novi News to raise funds for their annual effort.

"We'll be at all the major intersections," reported Arthur Lenaghan, chief of the Novi Fire Department and president of the Novi Goodfellows.

"You'll be able to spot the volunteers from the fire department because they'll be all decked out in their regular gear; plus all Goodfellow salesmen will be wearing Goodfellow paper bags over their shoulders."

The Novi Goodfellows have been around approximately 30 years. The organization was founded during the 1950s and was spearheaded for many years by Leon Dochot and Eugenie Choquet.

But Dochot and Choquet are no longer around, and the responsibility for heading up the Goodfellows drive fell on a small group of people.

"They asked us (the volunteer fire department) to help about five years ago," noted Lenaghan. "And last year they said it was just too much for a small group of people to run and asked us to play a larger role."

Lenaghan said the Goodfellows was re-organized earlier this year with a new set of by-laws and a new set of officers. In addition to Lenaghan, officers are Louis Bugbee, vice president; Janice Davenport, secretary; and Steven Poyhonen, treasurer. Viola Cherry and Patricia Caswell serve on the board of directors.


Lenaghan emphasized the importance of the paper sale this Friday and Saturday, noting that it is the Goodfellows' only source of income other than donations. "All the proceeds from the paper drive go directly back to needy people in Novi," he said.

Every family receives enough food from the Goodfellows for a Christmas dinner with all the trimmings. In addition, the Goodfellows fit the Christmas baskets to the individual needs of the family.

"If they need clothing or boots, we get the appropriate sizes and try to find them clothing and boots. We also provide toys for families with children that might not otherwise have anything to open up under the Christmas tree on Christmas day," he added.

New I-696 ramps a long way off

The outlook continues to lool bleak that a new exit ramp off the I-696 expressway will be constructed somewhere in Novi or Farmington Hills during the next five years.

While preliminary results of a recent Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) study of the 1-696 corridor between Beck Road and Telegraph Road outlined the proposed "wheres" of future highway ramp construction, the "when" timetable is not likely to please local commuters.

"We're looking at as many as five years down the line before adding any new access ramps," said Robert Kirkbride of the MDOT. Kirkbride said the department would report specific findings and recommendations of the study to the West I-696 Access Study Policy Committee later this month. The

submit the study to the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments Policy Committee for study. If SEMCOG approves the plan, officials then must obtain federal approval, perhaps the most difficult task of all. Federal transportation officials will insist on engineering, environmental impact and "people" impact studies before approving financing for the project.

"It's a very long, time-consuming process," said Kirkbride. "But these are very necessary steps in obtaining approval." Cautioning that study results should be con-

sidered "preliminary" until their submittal to the policy committee, Kirkbride did provide the follow-

Bullard studies tax laws

LANSING - State Representative Willis "Bill" Bullard, Jr. (R-Highland) has returned from a two-day meeting of the Midwestern Legislative Conference Taxation Task Force in Washington

Bullard, whose 60th State House District includes Novi, was appointed chairman of the Council of State Governments task force in July. The meeting in Washington on November 14-15 was the first at which he has presided.

"The Midwestern Legislative Conference Taxation Task Force is taking an in-depth look at simplifying our complex tax system, and much of the meeting in Washington was devoted to the impact that federal tax reform would have on individual states," he reported.

Many prominent tax reformers were on the program, including Congressman Richard Gephardt, co-author

of the Bradley-Gephardt tax proposal. Bullard said the 12-state Midwestern Legislative Conference would be affected most by major tax reform on the federal level because nearly all Midwest states have state income taxes, and many of the tax reform plans being discussed by Congress deal with eliminating federal tax deductions for state income taxes.

"As state legislators, it is our responsibility to study the impact that federal tax changes will have on our states, and this initial meeting of the Taxation Task Force was dedicated to just that," said Bullard.







Haggerty use changes rejected

NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP - In a move with potential repercussions on development along the Haggerty Road corridor in Novi, the Northville Township planning commission last week rejected on a 5-3 vote proposed amendments to the master plan for the Haggerty Road corridor. Commissioners' statements prior to the

November 26 vote suggested a 6-2 tally in favor of the revisions, which would have allowed more intensive development of property fronting on Haggerty. the township's eastern boundary. Last-minute reservations led several commissioners to back away from the proposal they had argued in favor of

adopting only minutes before. The proposed amendments have been under study for more than eight months. The commission itself initiated the study in response to an increase in rezoning requests from potential developers and to re-examine local planning in light of changes taking place in adjacent communities. It seemed to have fine-tuned a final proposal in October.

During post-vote discussions, commissioners said they still believe changes are required in the master plan for Haggerty, but several said they have reservations about the intensity of development that might occur under the proposal on the table. 'Nobody here voted for 'no change,' " chairman

Richard Duwel summarized after a round-table discussion late in the meeting The commission scheduled a study session last Tuesday) to re-evaluate the proposals. The meeting was to take place after this week's edition

of The News went to press. While commissioners Ted Martin and Jerry Chisnell made clear early in the November 26 meeting that they intended to vote against the proposed amendments, the other six commissioners attending the session spoke in favor of the plan's predominant feature - a large-office district occupying virtually all the land on the west side of Haggerty between Six Mile and the Meijer store at Eight Mile. A series of straw votes before discussion was

opened to audience members resulted in tallies of 8-0, 6-2 and 6-2 in favor of the amendments proposed for the sections between Five and Six Mile, Six and Seven Mile, and Seven and Eight Mile respectively. When it came time for a real vote, however, commissioners Kitty Rhoades, Richard Allen (the ownship board of trustees liaison member) and Charles DeLand joined Martin and Chisnell in voting against adoption, despite earlier statements

of support. Commission chairman Duwel, vice chairman Pat Wright and commissioner Larry Sheehan voted in lavor of the amendments. Commissioner Marvin Gans was unable to attend. Prior to the meeting, Gans reported to Duwel that he favors the amend-

The vote was seen as a victory for members of the Meadowbrook Estates Association, a homeowners group from the subdivision north of Seven Mile and directly west of the proposed office district. Officers and members of the association attended the meeting, and their arguments opposing the proposal were presented by an attorney hired to represent the group's interests. According to association president Bob Johnson.

a majority of the subdivision homeowners are opposed to any change in the master plan for the stretch of Haggerty between Seven and Eight Mile Roads. Attorney Glen Valentine argued that the proposed amendments would contradict the preamble to the township master plan which calls for office and commercial districts sufficient only to serve the needs of township residents.

"We've heard the community and the community is vehemently opposed," to the proposed amendments, commissioner Ted Martin said, referrring to earlier discussions of the issue. "The only support we've heard for this (proposal) is from those idents who are large-property owners."

Citing fellow commissioners' arguments that the township could lose control of Haggerty zoning if developers were to sue for more intensive uses, Martin noted that residents were also prepared to sue if the present master plan is altered. "You talk about potential litigation, what we have

heard is the promise of litigation from the residents," Martin said. Addressing the proposed large-office district, Martin noted that no such zoning category exists today in the township and urged that the ordinance be fined before the master plan is changed.

He said the new zoning district should be put up for a referendum vote. "Let the community decide if they'd like to see this new zoning district," Martin He made a motion early in the meeting to i

the proposed amendments. The motion died for lack support from another commissione DeLand, a resident of Meadowbrook Estates. countered the opposition from his neighbors by suggesting the large office district would help "insulate the subdivision" by requiring sizable greenbelts and extensive setback requirements. Under the present two-story office zoning, buildings can be as near as 20 feet to a residential lot line. while one version of the proposed large office zoning would put a 100-foot greenbelt and a 200-foot setback require-

ment in place for such a building. The proposed zoning restrictions, explained b planning consultant Claude Coates, would be based on a formula that makes setbacks larger for taller buildings. Examples shown included a 50-foot tall structure (the maximum to be allowed) that would have to be more than 500 feet from the residential

During audience discussion, which was limited to 30 minutes, the only area resident to speak in favor of the proposal was Thomas Handyside, who agreed with DeLand that the large office district proposed would better insulate the subdivision against outside intrusions than is likely under the current zon

"There is no written or substantiated evidence that shows (property) value will be degraded,' Handyside said of the proposal. He described hi

neighbors' insistence that adjoining properties re main residential as "putting your head in the sand." Bernard Baldwin, a resident of the subdivision and a former planning commissioner, argued that the proposal has wide-ranging implications beyond

"You are on the verge of making the largest change in the history of Northville Township,' Baldwin said, citing the potential for large office zoning in similar circumstances along Five Mile and the departure from the planning philosophy stated in the preamble to the 1979 master plan. Baldwin helped draft that plan and was the first to raise the issue in discussion of the proposed revisions several months ago.

When Duwel asked commissioners to explain their opposition votes, Martin said the plan calls for "way too much office" between Six and Eight Mile and Chisnell echoed that argument. DeLand noted that the roll-call vote was 4-2 when it got to him "and I didn't think it would be right to adopt such a drastic change on a split vote.'

Rhoades, who voted first and noted she "did not have the same luxury" DeLand had, said she remained uncertain in the face of the arguments against the proposal. "There are as many legitimate arguments on

both sides," she said. "I still have too many ques-Allen, who had stated earlier that his support was

weak, said he "could have been mulling this over for days" before he would be ready to vote for such a dramatic change. Duwel said he believes a renewed discussion of

the Haggerty corridor should begin with an examination of the master plan preamble and its implications. "We've got to address that philosophy," he said.

Will rezoning affect land values?

The push to rezone many areas of the city to conform to existing uses or to the city's Master Plan has generated as much criticism from people who argue rezonings will raise property values as from people who claim rezonings will cause property values to decline.

Several residents living on residentialagricultural zoned property earmarked for rezoning to industrial use have complained their tax bills would likely increase now that their property would be worth more to industrial-commercial developers

"The rezoning shouldn't change the value of their roperty," said Ernest Aruffo, chairman of the Novi Planning Board. "The assessments change as

improvements to the property are made. Actually, some residents are sitting on a bonanza." But according to City Assessor John Merrifield, a

property's zoning can affect its assessment rate. "Business-zoned property is always more expensive than residential," Merrifield pointed out. "We assess according to where the property is located and what it is used for. If a property can be sold for more money (with a new zoning), then it can be assessed for more, too."

But, Merrifield noted, any rezonings of property now used for residential purposes - whether zoned for it or not -- would have little or no effect on small residential parcels which pre-dated existing business or commercial zones.

'If there isn't enough room to build a business on the property, then we can't assess it at a business ' Merrifield explained. "So even though their rate.' tax rates may be low, they still have the right to sell their property in conjunction with a neighbor at a high market rate for business use." NOVI SCHOOL EMPLOYEES have donated nearly \$8,900 to this year's United Foundation Torch Drive campaign. The 61 hourly employees and 147 salaried employees donating to this year's campaign increased their contributions by nearly \$1,000 over last year with 24 more employees participating. The United Foundation Torch Drive raises funds for 135 agencies in the field of Health, Research and Social Sciences.

What's the price of bad laws? Well now, we've been saved. The



crash program to enforce the 55 mph speed limit on Michigan interstates pushed the number of people violating the law just below 50 percent, saving the state some \$10 million in threatened federal highway funds. Don't you feel safer on the highways now? Don't you feel rich? Don't you expect the deteriorating highways will soon start looking spiffy thanks to the \$10 million that was "saved?"

threatened funding represents just 10 percent of what the state expects to get from the Feds for highways. Also little noted is that it is impossible to make any connection between speed limit enforcement and the reduction of highway accidents, injuries or fatalities.


Supporters base their arguments on figures that don't add up and the obvious assertion that you are more likely to be hurt or killed if you hit something at 70 mph than if you were going slower. I've addressed most of this before, but it bears repeating that the logical extension of their arguments is an even lower speed limit that would soon have us back to the days when cars could only travel behind a man on foot carrying a red flag. What I want to speak to today is my own growing perception that the 55 mph speed limit, like all bad laws, does nothing more than foster disrespect for law in general. More particularly, I think drivers accustomed to disregarding the highway speed limit are beginning to take other traffic laws with a grain of salt as well.

I'm not trying to occupy the moral high ground on this one: my wholly unscientific and unverifiable evidence (of the same quality as most supporting arguments) includes my own drivng habits. For instance, there is near my home an intersection posted "No Right Turn on Red/7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday-Friday." I have occasion to turn right at this corner during the posted times and can't for the life of me figure out why the restriction is there. Sight lines and distances are good, traffic volume is low between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., and the posting generally doesn't make sense. So I blow it off, scan the area for cops and make my turn when the sparse traffic clears.

Friends and family have always known me to be scrupulous about signalling lane changes, but noted recently that I'm more selective, choosing to signal before I move over only if, in my own judgement, there's a car close enough that the driver "needs to know." I'm also "pushing" yellow traffic lights much more than I used to, frequently catching a glimpse of red as I go under the signal.

Given that example, do we expect them to take other laws seriously?

There are a lot question marks in this piece, but they all belong to only one major public policy issue: Is keeping a bad law worth the price of devaluating the good ones?

If your after-the-holiday blues are compounded as you drag the Christmas tree. one of the main symbols of the season's delights, to the curb for garbage pick-up, you might want to consider a living tree. It's not a decision to be taken lightly, however, since it may involve some changes in your family's tree traditions.

Area Christmas tree experts were happy to share their knowledge to help make your decision more informed. Carl Joerin at Highland Tree Farm

grows all the living Christmas trees he sells. He takes special precautions to increase their chance of survival when they are planted in the yard after their stint of alory in the house. Though his trees are all sold in the

summer to purchasers who pick them out in the field and collect them just before the holidays, it would be good to check that any tree you buy has received the same preparation He enjoys about a 95 percent success

rate and sells about 300 a year. All his trees are root pruned earlier in the year. This means that, while the

trees are still growing, the roots are trimmed within a certain distance of the trunk to force the tree to put out hundreds of small feeder roots close to the trunk. These will be included in the root ball

when the tree is dug out so there will be a strong healthy root system close to the

"We dig them out of the ground the beginning of September to be sure the shock is over by Christmas," Joerin ex-

His smaller trees up to four feet high are put into fiber pots and the larger ones are balled and burlaped.

If you did not pick out a living tree in the summer and would like to try one this year, your best chance is to find a nursery that remains open through the winter, and buy a regular ornamental tree in one of the usual Christmas tree

Tony Raney of Raney's Nursery in South Lyon said that living trees account for about two percent of his Christmas tree sales. He usually has some potted up ready and some balled in burlap.

Though the above experts have received positive feedback from customers regarding the survival of the trees, forester Rich Cassidy of Mountain Top/-Green Ridge Tree Service Co. is skeptical about the chances of a tree's survival once it has been brought into the warmth of the home.







manufacturing company. Specifically, the restaurant is located in a building that once was the home of the Markham Air Rifle Company which manufactured bb guns prior to the time that the well-known Daisy Air Rifle Company was started in Plymouth in the late

Except for the size of the building, you'd never guess that the Plymouth Landing was once the site of a manufacturing operation. Owner Sam Panzica has done an fine job of renovating the old factory and transforming it into a rather prestigious office building in addition to the restaurant.

Don't be surprised, for example, if you find yourself seated next to an account executive from the investment firm located on the same floor as the restaurant. The Landing itself is nicely appointed

natural brick walls, apparently left over from the air rifle company; heavy, dark-wood beams and plenty of stained glass — stained glass windows and large stained glass murals along the walls. In short, the whole decor creates a warm, secure, comfortable feeling which is particularly relaxing on cold winter nights when the wind is

howling outside. As for the food, the Landing features a menu which can fairly be described as "extensive" with a total of 34 entrees ranging in price from the breast of chicken in champagne sauce at \$6.95 to Alaskan king crab legs and lobster tails, both at \$20.95.

If the Plymouth Landing has a specialty, it's difficult to tell exactly what it is.

On the one hand, the Landing features a nice selection of eight different veal dishes. There's Veal a la Tosca, Veal Piccante, Veal Scallopini and Veal Parmesana - all at \$9.95, as well as Veal a la Oscar, Veal Cordon Bleu, Veal Angela, and Veal Florentina - all at \$10.95. Particularly interesting selections are the Veal a la Oscar (veal

sauted in butter and topped with asparagus spears and king crab glaze with bernaise sauce) and the Veal Angela (thin slices of veal served with zucchini and water chestnuts, topped with a light French Napoleon Brandy sauce). Despite its selection of veal dishes, the Lan-

ling's specialty might also be its selection of fresh fish - filet of sole, broiled Boston scrod, pickerel, lake perch, white fish and rainbow trout at prices ranging from \$7.95 to \$10.95. Also available are 10 seafood dishes, prime rib,

filet mignon, pork chops, sirloin, chicken and calves' liver Dinners are served with a choice of two soups

(we recommend the mushroom barley), salad, rolls and broiled red-skin potatoes. There's also a nice selection of appetizers, in-

cluding Oysters Rockefeller, Shrimp a la Rafael and Escargot. On our most recent visit, we selected mushroom caps stuffed with crab meat ala dante and found it a most pleasant prelude to the rest of the meal.

The rolls, incidentally, are made fresh daily at the Baker's Rack in Plymouth, which also is owned by Panzica. The bakery also provides pastries for dessert which include cheesecake, large Napoleons and, a personal favorite, apple strudel topped with a warm brandy sauce.





"We lost nearly 30 points in scoring with Tully and Steve gone, so we'll have a hard time making it up," Cichelli said. "But I do think we have the capability to fill it (the basket)

The job of filling the void left by Tully's departure goes to his younger brother Brett Gillick, who started at forward last season. At 6-3 and 190 pounds, Brett has the body and the athletic ability to push a few people around close to the basket - just as he did as an All-League football

"Brett is a very aggressive basketball player, and we look tp him to be

Cicchelli: 'We have a lot of allaround athletes, it's just a matter of them knowing their roles, having the right chemistry and coming through for us on 'he court. We're bigger than usual — I'd say this is the tallest team we've had here in six or seven seasons.





From 1976 to 1983, only 11 persons annually became quadriplegics from football injuries, and in 1984, only five became paraplegics, Hodgon said. "Fatal head injuries have been reduced about 65 percent and neck injuries have been at least cut in half.'



'Numbers game' crucial in high school athletics

High schools across the United States are assigned letters or numbers to designate size. The purpose is to avoid the "David versus Goliath" syndrome in athletic competition.

With the system, schools with huge enrollments generally compete against other teams with a similar number of students. After all, it wouldn't be fair to expect a tiny school of 200 to be able to field a competitive team against others

with enrollments of 1,200, would it? In Michigan, high school rankings use a simple letter system. The largest schools being Class A, the smallest Class D. In this neck of the woods, Novi High School with an enrollment of 1.175 is an example of a Class A school, while


Novi Christian School with just 58 students is a Class D school. While this type of system is used and accepted nationwide, there is an inherent problem with it.

According to the Michigan High School Athletic Association, once a school reaches an enrollment of 1,150 on the fourth Friday of the fall semester, it is designated as Class A for the following calender year. The problem: since A is the highest class, any school over the 1,150 mark - no matter how much

over — will be designated as Class A. It means that Novi High School never competes with Novi Christian High School in MHSAA-sanctioned competition (i.e. state tournament play) because of the large enrollment differences. Nevertheless, the Wildcats

are still expected to keep pace with the larger schools like Kensington Valley Conference foes Howell and Brighton. With 1,842 students, Howell has over 700 more potential athletes to choose from than Novi. Although it's not
