Police expect arrest in heist

Novi police believe they are close to making an arrest in conjunction with the theft of almost \$275,000 worth of diamonds from the J.L. Hudsons store at Twelve Oaks Mall.

Novi Police Detective Jack Grubb said he anticipates an arrest shortly in the case pending receipt of additional investigative information from the Federal Bureau of In-

Grubb also reported that \$245,000 worth of the stolen diamonds have been recovered.

The theft occurred on Oct. 20, 1987, when a shipment of 57 loose diamonds and 27 gold mountings was received via Federal Express at the shipping dock at Twelve Oaks

Grubh noted that such shipments are unusual and that the package has been mislabeled. He said valuable shipments are usually delivered directly to the mail

security office.

As a result of being mislabeled, the package was delivered to the wrong department at J.L. Hudsons. Store officials noted that the package was missing almost im-

mediately.
Grubb said police subsequently launched an extensive search of the J.L. Hudson's store and interviewed everyone who might have been involved with the disappearance of the diamonds

On Oct. 27, seven days after the diamonds had turned up missing, Hudson's received a package through the mail containing 47 of the original 57 loose diamonds and 12 of the 27 gold mountings. The recovered property was valued at \$245,000, leaving almost \$28,000 worth of diamonds still missing.

Working in conjunction with the

FBI, Grubb said several prime suspects have been identified. He said the recovered diamonds are currently in the possession of the FBI crime lab for analysis of finger prints. Federal authorities also are analyzing the handwriting on the package in which the diamonds were mailed back to the store,

Novi officials weigh options for park funds

Some clear favorites are emerging in the wake of the Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment report, unveiled last week in coun-cil chambers.

Mayor Matthew Quinn has already endorsed a funding alternative, while several city council members this week hinted that they have preliminary personal

favorites.
The Needs Assessment report detailed four possible funding alternatives designed at raising approximately \$2.4 million for parks and recreation program improvement and land acquisition.

They are: Increasing the millage rate for parks and recreation by a half-mill to one full mill. A millage increase would have to be approved by C A bond issue of \$3-4 million, which would also require voter ap-

□ Increasing general fund transfers to parks and recreation.

Earmarking state mid-decade

revenue sharing monies to parks and recreation expansion. The council could opt for one of

Quinn, in an interview Friday, said he favored the half-mill millage increase

"Out of the altnernatives they gave us, I would be in favor of in-creasing the Parks and Recreation Department millage from the pre-sent one-half mill to one mill," Quinn said in an interview with the Novi News. "That, of course, takes a vote. I am going to try and get that organized to the extent of get-ting it on the November ballot.

Planners okay CIP proposals

Improvements to Eight Mile and implementation of a Sidewalk Linkaga Program will be priority fleins if the recommendations of the Novi Plaining Commission are approved by the city council.

City planners settled on a revised draft of Novi's first six-year Capital Improvements Program, which will now go to the council for ap-

proval.

The planning commission is required by state law to prepare annually a Capital Improvements
Program (CIP), which amounts to
a six-year forecast of priority
recommendation for the use of the

city administration. The revision represents the final draft of the 1987-88 CIP after December 1988.

Novi officials use the CIP as a guide along with the city master plan to avoid duplication of effort, allow phased projects in an orderly sequence and coordinate capital

needs between departments. Debate among commissioners during last week's special session concerned whether or not the CIP was in effect a "wish list" of pro-jects to be done in the six years or, as suggested by Planning Commis sion Chairperson Charles Kureth, a

"fiscally responsible document."

Kureth charged that the CIP should contain only projects the city could feasibly complete in that time period. "For it to be of value, it has to be reasonably expected."

One addition the commissioners made before approval was inclu-sion of the Eight Mile upgrading. Commissioner Kathy McLallen was the project's biggest advocate.

"We can not wait to think about (adding) it. We have to work on our border roads . . . statistics show that is our worst road," she said, explaining that if commissioners had waited to add the project to the next CIP, the city would have to wait a full year before putting in a request to Oakland County for mat-







Suspect arrested for area break-ins

Police believe they have solved a series of break-ins in Novi, Northville and other suburban communities with the arrest of a Novi man. Daniel Kulvelis, 32, of 21710 Rathlone subdivision was arraigned on charges in the 52nd District Court

Kulvelis is charged with three counts of stealing and retaining without consent a financial transaction device, twoi counts of receiving and concealing stolen property in ex-cess of \$100 and one count of possession of stolen property less than \$100. ment and a "not guilty" plea was entered on his behalf. A preliminary examination date was scheduled for Jan. 6, but has been postponed at the request of the defendant's attorney and has not been rescheduled.

Park needs report raises tough issue

Details of the Novi Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Committee report are still washing out. but a couple of points are clear at this

For one, this committee appears to have done a pretty responsible, Recreation thorough job of studying the issue. They've come back with some funding options that have been well thought-out and carefully

The options will make for some tough choices for the city council and, potentially, the citizenry of Novi, but that's to be expected with a study of

The study was completed over the course of approximately 11 months, with the group taking testimony from residents and embarking on an expansive survey of perceived needs.



Woman injured in crash

A Lyon Township woman was seriously injured Friday when her car was broadsided by a car driven by a Pinckney man, police said.

The accident occured on the Novi side of the Nine Mile/Napier Road intersection in the city's rural west end. It is the fourth accident to occur at the intersection of the two gravel roads in under a year.

Jeana Reynolds, 19, sustained head injuries when the car she was driving was hit broadside by a car driven by Rodney James Strunk, 19, of Pinckney just after 2 p.m. Friday.

Police said the accident occurred when Strunk either didn't stop or failed to yield as he traveled eastbound on Nine Mile. The Reynolds automobile was hit on the driver's side as it traveled northbound on

Reynolds and Jeanne Marie Roy, 19 Mile/Napier intersection.

were not injured.

Reynolds received numerous cuts to the face and head and will require some plastic surgery, according to her mother.

"She is extremely lucky to be alive today," said Sharon Reynolds. "If it wasn't for (Jeanne Roy's) quick thinking, she would have been dead

right now."

Roy stopped the car after the collision, turned off the engine and im-mediately began applying direct pressure to a major wound on the side of Jeana Reynolds' head. Emergency personnel arrived several minutes later. They transported the injured driver to Pro-vidence Hospital of Novi, and she was later transferred to the main hospital in Southfield.

Residents said they are concerned about the corner.

A review of state laws is necessary for any such political body, said Kara, because as members of the board of education they "tend to sit as judge and jury," like when review-ing a teacher's tenure or a student's expulsion. State statutes 380 and 1282 were

reviewed including the definitions of malfeasance, misfeasance and nonfeasance — official terms that are sometime used to "recall" board members from their posts. Malfeasance — the misconduct or wrongdoing by a public official — is typically the most damaging of the three, said Mr. Funk.

Though Michigan law gives state school boards a lot of leeway when it comes to making policy, he added, it also allows citizens to invoke a recall procedure fairly easily compared to other states. "In Michigan, it (recall) can be for anything."

Concerning policies and guidelines

for student saftey, Mr. Funk said that well-defined safety policies will be a must in the not-too distant future instead of the loosely-worded policies which some schools now have. "You'll have to have the policies and

procedures in place in order to get in-surance for the board and avoid As far as running more effective meetings, the consultants suggested the board adopt a consent agenda for-mat, whereby a list of items may be approved all in one motion.

Funeral directors urge pre-funding

The death of a loved one can be one of the most difficult times in a perof the most difficult times in a per-son's life. Not only does that in-dividual have to work through grief, but he or she also must make the necessary funeral arrangements.

A funeral home's purpose is to relieve the burden of these arrangements from the family and help minimize a painful situation as much as possible

Lynch & Sons Funeral Directors have fulfilled this need and have taken it one step further.

Their funeral homes in Milford. Walled Lake and Clawson introduced the Guardian Plan program two months ago. The program provides for a way for people to pre-fund their funerals, said Tom Lynch, president of Lynch & Sons in Milford.

Until two years ago, most funeral homes in Michigan had problems guaranteeing the price of funerals due to state pre-need laws, he said.

It is illegal for funeral homes to be paid for services not yet performed. Therefore, while people could pre-

arrange funeral details, any prefunding had to be treated as an in-dividual account rather than several

people pooling into a trust.

The interest on the principal generated in the individual accounts didn't cover inflationary costs and more money had to be paid after the funeral, defeating its purpose, Lynch

The pre-need law in 1987 allowed funds to be pooled together in the programs such s the Guardian Plan, a subsidiary of Services Inc., Interna-

tional, a New York-based company.

The plan guarantees that money paid will cover funeral costs no mat-ter how far down the road death may

The monies are placed in insurance

Inc monies are placed in insurance funds or trust accounts, where interest rates are higher, thereby countering the effects of spiraling funeral costs.

According to Lynch, people can enter a funeral home, discuss with a representative what arrangements they wish, and establish a payment plan that fits their needs.



On the morning of February 18, 1986, a 40-year old Dearborn man became annoyed at the barking of his sister's 9-year old German Shepherd, Toro. So annoyed, in fact, the man fashioned a spear out of an 8-inch knife taped to a 5-foot length of pipe and stabbed the dog repeatedly until he dropped to the floor. The stabbing was so severe, Toro later had to be destroyed.

But the cruelty didn't end there.

Just 10 months later, the same man approached a 56-year old Dearborn woman outside a local shopping center. Throwing her to the ground, he attempted to gouge her eyes out and choke her. He proceeded to stab a responding Dearborn police officer and had to be shot twice before being apprehended.

Coincidental? No.

A recent study by Dr. Alan R. Felthous, M.D. of the University of Texas and Stephen R. Kellert, Ph.D. of Yale University concludes "a pattern of substantial animal abuse may conceivably be associated with a pattern of recurrent violence against people. Granted, every case of animal abuse doesn't lead to human abuse. But too often, evidence shows that those who commit crimes against another human being have

abused an animal in the past. One such example is a 10-year old Boston youth who took perverse pleasure in trapping puppies and kittens in orange crates and shooting arrows into the box. The young man's name? Albert DeSalvo, later known as "The Boston Strangler."

Unfortunately, such animal abuse is usually unreported or ignored until it

The problem is that violence inflicted upon an animal, especially at the hands of a child, isn't always considered a problem. It's dismissed as a childish prank or rationalized as an error in judgment.

At the Michigan Humane Society, we do consider it a problem. Because animal abusers all too often grow into human abusers. That's why the MHS, as the only defense against animal abuse, is the first line of defense against human abuse.

That's why we continue to battle for stronger legislation, vigorous prosecution, tougher punishments and mandatory counseling of offenders.

The fact is, normal people don't abuse animals. Such actions are an early sign of deviant behavior. Recognized, it can be corrected. Ignored, it gets worse.

Keep the area attractive, fresh and refilled. Don't let guests drive drunk. If stopped by police and a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) level is 10 percent or above, they are legally drunk and can be taken to jail. The penalties are severe and expensive, not to mention degrading

Generally, it take about four drinks in one hour for a 150-pound person to reach a BAC of .10 per-cent. However, driving can be greatly impaired before the BAC reaches this level.

If a guest is intoxicated, don't let him drive. Arrange a way home with another guest or call a taxi. Offer the person a place to sleep. Take the car keys away. If necessary, ask others for

The easiest thing to do is to avoid problems through prevention. Do some planning ahead of time and let your guests know you really care about their safety and the safety of others.

Laser videodiscs offer quality

By NEIL GEOGHEGAN staff writer

Very few consumers know that the predecessor to the compact disc -the laser videodisc - is the ultimate

Laserdiscs have been around since the late '70s, but for several reasons they never garnered as much attention from the public as VHS or Beta video tapes. Ironically, laserdiscs run rings around either in picture, sound reproduction and versatility. Laserdiscs (also called CDVs) are

12-inch circular discs that look an overgrown compact discs. A lowpower laser scans a rotating disc encoded with images and sound, picks up the reflection, 'reads' them as electromagnetic impulses, and converts them to pictures and sounds. Compact discs were actually an offshoot of the technology developed for

The format is very popular in Japan (over 14 million units sold) but is also taking off in the U.S. — finally. "Goldmine Magazine" reports that there are nearly a million laserplayers in America, making it the fastest-growing video medium in

the country.
One of the reasons it took over a decade for this system to really catch on is people mistakingly equated videodiscs with the old RCA Selec tavision Discs. Three years after the videodisc was introduced, RCA spent millions to promote a competitive system that was made of vinyl, was played by a needle, had poor picture

reproduction and mono sound.
"The whole Selectavision system was really a backward step." said Robin Ward, an employee at LaserLand in Novi. "They were made of vinyl and very fragile, and the picture quality was no better than VHS. The replacement needle was \$70 and eventually, the whole thing

"But because of its high visibility, people made the assumption that all video discs died — and that wasn't

Throughout the whole RCA fiasco, Pioneer Electronics kept the laser-disc format alive when almost all other companies were sinking their money and efforts into VHS and Beta video tapes — and that was good

news for audiophiles. The laserdisc system has many advantages. Because there is no physical contact between the playback mechanism and the laserdisc, there is no wear. A laserdisc looks and sounds as good on the 1,000 time you play it as it does the first—which is something a video tape can't

"It definitely had a big advantage over friction formats," Ward said. "Like a compact disc, it was designed to be the best possible signal source and it cannot become ob-

Another perceived drawback with laserdiscs is that unlike video tapes, you can't record onto them - but, ac cording to Ward, it is not a very valid complaint.

"That's kind of silly because you can't record onto video tapes you rent or buy either," he said. "Ac-cording to surveys done by the Eleceight percent of all people who own

VCRs tape shows anyway.
"People who buy CDs don't com-plain that they can't tape onto them." There are currently over 3,000 dif-ferent titles (movies, music videos, concerts, documentaries, etc.) available on laserdiscs — everything from classics like "Citizen Kane" to recent releases like "Beetlejuice."
Prices are comparable — and in many instances — cheaper than video tapes. New videodiscs range in price from \$19 to \$49 with an average of about \$29. LaserLand currently offers about 1,200 rental discs and 1,500

"If you don't count all the "B"



But depth problems always seemed to hold the team back - until this season. An impressive group of underclassmen and a solid group of veleran returnees have provided Wildcat Swim Coach Larry Teahan with unprecedented depth, turning Novi from just a good team to a squad ranked among the top 10 in


the state.
Novi showed quality depth as well as strength in the top of the line-up on Jan. 12 en route to a 109-63 thrashing of host Chelsea — a team the 'Cats usually struggle against.

"We felt pretty good about the way it went," said Teahan's assis-tant Rick Anderson. "Heading in, we really didn't have any concerns about beating (Chelsea), so we swam the kids in a lot of different events. It was a chance for us to get ready for some tough meets we have coming up.

The unbeaten Wildcats (5-0 overall) notched wins in nine of 11 events and added a multitude of seconds, third and fourths against the Buildogs — which helped Novi build points toward a 43-point triumph.







Young girls should avoid diets

How young is too young to diet? Most health professionals admit

there are occasions when overweight need to follow a weightreduction program. However, they also agree that the concept of 'dicting' can get out of hand when undertaken by a youngster, par-ticularly a girl who wants to shed pounds for no other reasons than to look or remain svelte-like.

Dicting is not only not recommended by most in-the-know, but is seen as down right dangerous in some in-stances. Tales of anorexia and bulimia are too rampant for anyone to doubt the seriousness of the pro-

Not only does society's - including the media's - image of the slender model-type exacerbate the problem, but peer pressure is a factor too, according to Pediatrician Dr. Henry Marcus

Marcus deals with the teen and dieting issues from his Livonia practice routinely. He said some teens just look at their classmates and "decide they want to be as skinny as them." Then they end up neglecting their bodies to achieve the unhealthy goal, he added. He discourages that type of "dieting" at all costs.

With children who actually could benefit from losing weight, he said behavior management is the key. "We don't like to refer to it as a diet. It involves a change in their at-titude," he said, explaining that nutrition, exercise and counseling are part of the package he offers for

seen similar situations with her students. "In the past I've had girls come into the foods and nutrition classroom and tell me they couldn't eat the food we were preparing because they were on a diet."

Olgren says she hasn't heard those comments much lately, but admits it is a concern. "I tell my students that now is the time their bodies are developing. Now is the time their bodies are growing, and now is the time their bodies need lots of different kinds of food."


Olgren discounts remarks from "self-proclaimed experts" on nutri tion, who say individuals don't need certain food products and that the basic four food groups is passe. "I don't believe that."

Mostly, said Olgren, she has en-countered a positive approach to food among her students. For instance, upon preparing food dishes for class, "We very seldom have any food left over," she said.

"I'm talking about preparations such as carrots, broccoli, muffins, granola and fruit salad," Oigren added, dispelling the myth that all teens want to eat is "junk food" or sweets.

She also tells students that a treat now and then is okay, she said, explaining that pizza — a highly popular food with youngsters — isn't a bad food choice. Only when someone eats pizza several times a week does it cause a problem, she explained, because that causes important foods to be left out of their diets.

"When mother talked about three square meals a day, she meant three meals planned from the basic four.'

"People say they want to be happy, yet real happiness seems like the impossible dream. Everyone reaches for it so desperately, but for many of us, it never seems to come any

What are we doing wrong? Is it the times we live in? Do we expect too much? Do we want the wrong things?"

The preceding excerpt from How to be Your Own Best Friend (Newman & Berkowitz, 1971) points out some valid questons. Think about them for a little while, but don't let them get

There are many people who are happy with their lives. You have promet people who radiate a cerenergy and you may have wondered what their secret is. Happiness, that is the answer; too many of us have not mastered the art

of being truly happy.
Often we pursue "things" which we

could be where we get sidetracked. Once these things are reached or attained, we expect happiness to just happen to us. And maybe, for a short while, it will. But eventually we realize we've been looking for happiness in the wrong place. True happiness is not outside us; it has to come from within.

What is this really saying to you? It means we hold the key to our own happiness, to fulfill our potentials, our dreams. We are responsible for we live our lives. We control the switch to the choices we make and whether we have a good time. But, remember, if you are angry or upset, you have a right to feel this way.

You need to go through certain emotions, both good and bad; yet there is no need for negative thoughts to take over your life. If you decide to help yourself, you can choose to do those things which make you feel good about yourself. It's time to stop putting yourself down. Be kind to yourself, look at your achievements, find the things you like about yourself, and continually remind yourself of them.

Believe in yourself, praise yourself and visualize yourself being truly happy while striving for your goals.

Affirmations are one way to change the negative "tapes" your subconscious plays continually. You know the ones I'm talking about: they tell you how rotten, unworthy, unlovable and stupid you are. Affirmations are always positive and, eventually, they all come true.


