Novi motorists were stranded by flood roads

Three-day rainfall floods city

Novi residents experienced substantial flooding last week as heavy rainfall pounded west Oakland County for three straight

Portions of the middle branch of the Rouge River, which runs through the city, went over its banks and onto area streets and across subdvisions. And several stormwater detention basins also became overloaded or failed, flooding streets, homes and

The total amount of rainfall over the three-day period was about four inches, according to Department of Public Services Director Lenora

"In these kinds of downpours, everything just floods out," she said. "By the time the big storm hit Wednesday, everything was already saturated."

Dozens of intersections in the city were snarled with rush hour traffic Wednesday (June 21) as waters the crested, then began to slowly recede. Many area homeowners

sustained damage — mostly flooded basements and destroyed landscap-

Streets and a park in the Meadowbrook Lake subdivision were severely flooded, although few homes actually sustained damage. A park that runs near Ennishore Drive was totally flooded, as water rose over and around the Meadowbrook Lake dam and flow-

ed south towards the Rouge River. The dam was rebuilt in 1985 and Meadowbrook Lake was dredged to help curb a serious flooding pro-blem in the area. City officials said it was simply hit with too much water to be effective in last week's

The flooding blocked both en trances to the Meadowbrook Lake subdivision, leading many residents to be shuttled in by boat, or simply roll up their pants and hike through.

Walter lawsuit amended

Attorneys for developer Lee Walter said Monday that they plan to file an amendment to their lawsuit soon, alleging that the city broke the law by rezoning property at the northeast corner of Ten Mile and Beck Road.

Detroit Attorney Norman Hyman said they will file an immediate appeal of a June 2 decision by Circuit Judge Francis X. O'Brien.
O'Brien's decision, days before a scheduled special election, allowe a referendum over zoning at the

corner to take place.

While the appeal is being heard,
Hyman said they will file in
Oakland County Circuit Court,
alleging that the rezoning was il-

.Currently, the case is delayed because both sides — Hyman and City Attorney David Fried — haven't been able to meet and agree on language for a court order that O'Brien could sign. When that is completed, an appeal will be entered to the state Court of Appeals, and the amended zoning suit will be filed in Circuit Court, Hyman said.
"It should happen very soon," he

Walter's plans for a grocery store and commercial center at the nor-theast corner of Ten Mile and Beck Road were put on hold earlier this month when voters approved a zon ing referendum by 1,969 to 1,164 tal-ly. That vote repealed a city council decision that gave Walter the Bzoning he needed to develop the pro-

The vote came only days after O'Brien ruled that the referendum

Walter first received the zoning ssary to do his project — Briar wood Plaza — in October.

The group Citizens for Responsi-ble Development (CRD) twice petitioned to stop the zoning, using a little-known section of the city charter that allows referendums to repeal a council decision. The second petition drive netted the June 6 special election and also had the effect of freezing the zoning at the corner until the election was decided, since they submitted petitions within 30 days of the council's rezoning decision.

Quinn appointment questioned

The appointment of former Parks and Recreation Director Thomas O'Branovic to the Novi Planning Commission has raised the ire of several city officials.

Councilwoman Nancy Covert and Planning Commission Vice-Chairperson Judith Johnson both said this week they opposed the appointment, since O'Branovic submitted his application about a month late, besides having obvious political ties to Mayor Matthew Quinn.

O'Branovic was a strong Quinn supporter in the 1987 campaign and a member of the mayor's election committee.

The former parks director (1980-86) was appointed to the planning commission June 19 in a 5-2 vote. Covert and Councilman Joseph Toth voted against the nomination.

According to the city clerk's office, O'Branovic didn't submit an application until a full month after a published deadline. He submitted the application June 12, and was interviewed that night in council chambers. The application deadline was

In an interview with The News on Friday,

Johnson said the application process should have been re-opened to all citizens if there weren't enough qualified applicants before the May 12 deadline. She also questioned the move, calling it part of an "old boy" network, since O'Branovic was an active Quinn supporter in the 1987 mayoral

"I think there are a lot of people who weren't happy with the way it was handled," Johnson said. deadline isn't a deadline, then you ought to open it up to everyone else in the community to ap-

Johnson said several residents did not apply for post because they thought application deadlines had already passed.

Covert, who opposed Quinn in the 1987 mayoral race, also questioned the apppointment.

"I think it raised a very important issue . . . the issue around policy for deadlines for a position opening," she said. "We realize that there is a kind of unspoken policy . . . that the deadline actually goes up to the date we interview people.

"Well, some people know and some people don't know... but I think it lends an air of credibility if

we spell it out," Covert said.

Quinn, in an interview this week, said O'Branovic was a "clear" choice for the planning commission and also dismissed the "old boy network" allegations.

"I don't see that there is anything wrong with the appointment," Quinn said. "He was by far the most qualified candidate for the commission. "It's unfortunate that people see it as a problem

if these involved people shouldn't get a seat on a committee because they happen to know someone on the city council, then that would be terri-

Quinn said even though he didn't recruit O'Branovic, he would recruit a member if there weren't enough qualified applicants. "If it's a person who I know and has an interest

in applying, I would certainly do that," Quinn The mayor said no resident was denied an opportunity to leave an application at city hall, even if they were applying late.

Early morning blaze ravages **Novi company**

An early morning fire Wednesday gutted the Novi American plastic plant at 40200 Grand River, causing

about \$4-5 million in damage.

The plant, which manufactures, The piant, which manufactures, bathtubs, skylights and tub enclosures, sustained severe damage to a manufacturing and warehousing area, and smoke damage in business offices located at the front of the 67,000 square foot feelitt.

Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan sald the cause of the blaze is being investigated, but there were strong hints that it may have started in wooden pallets stored against an outside wall of the building.

The fire department put out a minor pallet fire at Novi American two days ago, Lenaghan said. "It looks like it started in the

wooden pallets ... this time there must have been a window open or something and it got into the building," Lenaghan said. "But it'll be investigated."

Lenaghan said the State Police Fire Marshal has been called in to help with the investigation. A Fire Marshal photographer was on the

scene Wednesday.

Fire fighters got the call at about 3:15 a.m. Fire companies from Walled Lake and the City of Northyfile also responded. About 35 fire fighters fought the blaze.

Within an hour of the alarm, the roof caved in and the west roof caved in and the west cinderblock wall of the building collapsed, exposing piles of melted, burning plastics. Fire crews were the scene much of the day Wednesday, attempting to expose and extinguish the burning layers of

"I hate these kinds of fires," said Walled Lake Fire Chief Billy Friar. "These are the worst. You've got to dig and dig, and it takes all day to

get to it." There were no apparent injuries by late Wednesday morning.

Lenaghan reported difficulty get-

ting fire crews close enough to the burning building when they first arrived on th scene. They used the Red Timbers restaurant parking lot next door and brought fire lines in

City of Novi Water Department officials were also concerned that a water line serving Novi American and several buildings to the rear of it may be contaminated because of the fire. The Water Department crews couldn't get close enough to the fire to determine if any tamination may have taken place, or if water service was disrupted.

Novi American owner Phillip Daniels said the company will re main in business, since it has other manufacturing facilities outstate and a warehouse to the rear of the

Grand River facility.

"Business will continue, probably at a reduction of about 20 percent he said. "It'll be tough, but we'll

manage." Daniels said most current orders

should be filled on schedule. The \$4-5 million figure, which was Daniels' estimate, is believed to be the biggest dollar loss in Novi fire

Council must study fire response times

The City of Novi has a problem with its fire department. There isn't any question about that.

For much of the year, Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan has wrestled privately with a worrisome, albeit unique situation in the north end of the city: A fire alarm goes off and no fire fighters respond. This sometimes occurs on weekends, sometimes after 5 p.m. on weekdays, or in the wee hours of the morning

It has occurred at least eight times since Jan. 1. And fire reponse times have generally been lagging in the north end of the city for several months, due to a shortage of paid-oncall fire fighters.

There really isn't any solid data yet available on response times for the other parts of the city.

The public safety and health threat from this is immediately apparent. One can only imagine what could occur to a victim of a serious accident or a fire victim who watches hopes and dreams go up in smoke, while no fire fighters respond, or the department scrambles to muster fire fighters from a different station in the

It's unthinkable. It's shocking that this can happen in a supposedly "modern, progressive" suburban community like Novi.

Currently, the Novi full-time fire fighters work 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Paidon-call staff cover the city during the other times. That was recommended in the 1986 Police-Fire Needs Assess-

But there currently is no longrange staffing plan for the department, other than the last of the hirings specified for next year in that Needs Assessment Report, which culminated in the passage of a millage question in 1987.

We believe it's time for a frank evaluation of the current level of service offered by the fire department. That includes examination of any and all types of strategies that can offer 24-hour coverage to the citizens of this community, an evaulation of the command structure of the department, city hall

and an evaluation of the department's current recruiting ability, inleuding the ability of Chief Lenaghan to recruit and train new paid-on-call fire

This editorial doesn't advocate full-time staffing, but we hope it does behoove city officials to put such a plan in place for this city's full development. And we hope it behooves them to get the thinking caps on and pool some innovative ideas for dealing with these "no response" and late response situa-

The city council should immediately appoint a task force to examine these issues - a task force that will leave its political hats at the door, if that's possible. This is a serious

And any task force put together to study the department should depend heavily on an outside, independent advice, if such an expert is available.

After all, this is a city that thinks nothing of dropping \$15,000 or \$20,000 on a planning, or engineering study, or hiring a "personnel technician" for the city manager's office.

Frankly, this is a community that is quite well staffed, for a 28,000 peson population, and a city budget in the

On balance, it also supplies above

But the Novi City Council and Novi administration can no longer afford to look the other way on this question. They must come to grips with this problem now, before someone is seriously injured, or worse.

It shouldn't take a tragedy to get the city council or the city manager to begin reordering some priorities at

Raising questions

Some legitimate questions are be- knowledgeable citizens. ing asked about the appointment of Thomas O'Branovic to the Novi Planning Commission

O'Branovic, a former director of the Novi Parks and Recreation Department, was appointed to the position on a 5-2 vote of the city council on June 19. He replaces Commissioner Thomas Kavanagh who did not seek re-appointment

Two primary questions surround the appointment. One, O'Branovic was permitted to apply and interview for the appointment even though he submitted his application a full month after the application deadline. And, two. O'Branovic was actively involved in Mayor Matthew Quinn's election campaign in 1987, leading to the suggestion that his appointment to the commission was an act of political favoritism.

The first question concerns us more than the suggestion of political favoritism as it relates to O'Branovic's involvement in the mayoral election. People who work in elections can generally be assumed to be more involved and interested in the community than those who are not If citizens who work for one candidate or another are prevented from being appointed to various commissions and committees on that basis alone, the city runs the risk of excluding its most involved and

Questions about disregarding deadlines for appointments is a more serious concern, however. In terms of the recent vacancies on the planning commission, the deadline for applica tions was May 12. O'Branovic did not submit his application until June 12 one full month after the deadline and the very day the city council was scheduled to interview applicants.

One council member - Nancy Covert - said application deadlines have not been adhered to rigidly in the past and that it has been something of an unspoken policy that applications will be accepted up to the time that interviews of the candidates


Covert acknowledges further, however, that it would be preferable if the rules were spelled out. She has hit the nail on the head.

We see nothing wrong with the appointment of O'Branovic to the planning commission. And we see nothing wrong with appointing people who have been politically active in the city, as long as the appointment is based on qualifications and a diversity of opinions is obtained.

What needs to be done, however, is to establish guidelines and stick by them. The rules need to be spelled out so they can be applied equally to


Now is it bad? Is this roadway a bad thing? Nope, the darn connector road is probably needed. Let's just start being honest here.

SEMCOG argues spending plan

Leaders of the Southeast Michiga Council of Governments (SEMCOG) are nervously trying to smooth out a simmering disagreement between the Big Four political leaders and the

rest of the seven-county region.
"There is controversy," John
Amberger, SEMCOG executive director, admitted at the planning agency's annual meeting, adding, "All hell broke loose."

The Big Four want state policies resisting "urban sprawl," preserving farmland and developing industry in older urban areas that already have an infrastructure of roads, bridges

and sewers.

The Big Four are Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara, Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy and Macomb County Board chairman Mark Steenburgh.

The perimeter counties of Liv-ingston, St. Clair, Washtenaw and

Monroe — along with many of Murphy's fellow Republicans in Oakland - are suspicious. Among the unhap py ones are Commissioners Richard Skarritt of Milford, Marilynn Gosling Bloomfield Hills and chairman Roy Rewold of Rochester Hills.

"The perimeter counties fear all the (state and federal) money will go to the inner three counties. Oakland commissioners are afraid they're not being involved," said Amberger.

The tensions - it can't be called an open battle — began when the Big Four approached SEMCOG for a statement saying that their economic growth policies are consistent with SEMCOG's. The statement would satisfy the state Commerce Department, in particular, that coordinated planning was going on.

What bothered the perimeter counties weren't the philosophical goals of the Big Four but the "strategies"—the specific spending plans to reach the specific specific spending plans to reach the specific specific spending plans to reach the specific specif them. These include the regional

issue, and road improvement plans.

SEMCOG's executive committee, an inner circle of about 30 members which meets monthly, last month postponed discussion of the resolu-

tion until Aug. 18, Amberger said. Amberger said his recommenda-tions are: "Manage growth but don't restrict it. It would be imprudent to encourage growth there there is infrastructure in place.
"Stay tuned," he said.

In related business, SEMCOG's General Assembly last week scaled down population projections for the

Five years ago SEMCOG projected the region's 2005 population at 5.23 million. Last week it projected 4.99 million for the year 2010 — some 240,000 fewer the earlier forecast. The region's 1980 population was 4.68 million.

It estimated the number of households in 2010 at 2.1 million, 79,000 fewer than the projection five

And it placed employment at 2.55 million, a hefty 286,000 more jobs in 2010 than its 1984 estimate.

What does it mean to people and planners? Gail Kaess, Grosse Pointe Farms councilmember who chairs. SEMCOG's DataCenter Advisory

Council, explained: "We have a maturing population that will use more health care, have more leisure and more housing op-

"Households are forecast to grow faster than the growth in population with a continued decline in persons per household. There will be more condos and retirement centers convenient to recreation and entertain

"The labor force is is aging. There will be a greater need for child care and for training of younger workers."

Downsizing of the population forecast was blamed on the recession of 1979-83 and a heavy out-migration.



Old Ballpark reports plans for franchises

Leahy feels the Old Ball Park has

Keep roses healthy

By Patricia Denton

Roses are highly prized in the home garden for the sheer loveliness of the blooms and their sweet, nostalgic

Modern varieties offer also a very long season from continuous flowering from early summer through late

autumn, and into early winter in mild areas.

To enjoy the very best that your rose plants have to offer, keep the soil around their roots uniformly dampened but not soggy. Roses, like most other plants, cannot thrive well in wet soil. But a deeply and evenly dampened root area will help to ensure healthy foliage and an abundance

of long-lasting flowers of fine substance and color.
Watering at ground level with soaker hoses or an emitter system is ideal for roses, but if an overhead sprinkler is used, water in the morning so that the foliage will be dry by evening. Leaves sent wet into the night make ideal sites

for the spread of fungus disease.

Mildew, in particular, spreads quickly in conditions of cool, damp nights and warm days. That's why this disease often becomes such a severe problem in roses (and begonias) as the nights become cool toward summer's end. Inconsistent watering or allowing the plant to go dry at the roots also seems to help set these plants up for the spreading of mildew.

If you fertilized your rose plants late in the winter or in early spring, you could sprinkle a light scattering of balanced, general purpose fertilizer over the root areas again this month. Or purchase a product especially designed for roses. Whatever you decide to use, scratch the granules lightly into the soil surface, or cover them with a mulch layer to eliminate the loss of some of the

nutrients through volatile action into the air.

Fertilize in a similar fashion again in mid to late July, but not after that. It's best to send rose plants a little lean and mean into winter. In August or September, however, a dressing of bone meal, and wood ash if you have some, will strengthen the roots and help to harden the plants for

Watch for diseased foliage this month and through the summer, and take steps to control any problem before it spreads. Black spot is an unfortunately common fungus disease of roses. It usually starts with leaves on the lower portions of the plants as the spores over-winter on the ground as well as on the canes.

Pick off any spotted leaves as soon as you notice them. Burn or trash the leaves and give the affected plant a follow-up spray with a fungicide. I use the mildest effective one—Safer's Natural Garden Fungicide with sulfur.

Pick up and destroy any fallen foliage too. After you do this ground cleanup, it's an ideal time to lay a soil-enriching, moisture-retaining mulch layer over the soil around the plants. Her compact to a province the soil around the plants. Use compost or processed manure, alone or mixed with damp peat. This layer will serve as a disease prevention measure, making it difficult for any disease spores left on the soil surface to germinate and release into the air.


Deal with powdery mildew, which appears as a fine grayish-white film on leaf surfaces, in much the same fashion, removing affected foliage and spraying at the

first sign of the problem.

Maintaining a bug watch can prevent a lot of garden grief, too. Aphids are easily spotted clustered around young, succulent shoot tips, which will become twisted and curled with the aphids' feeding unless the pests are dealt

of all the aphid controls I've used, blasting them off the plants with a jet of water from the hose has proved the most effective in my garden. Then I'll sometimes spray after that with Safer's Insecticidal Soap to catch any mal-

Prune rose bushes for continued bloom production as you gather flowers for the house. Do this by cutting the flower-bearing stems back to a five-segment leaf stem. The first few leaf stems below the flower will often bear three-part leaves. But it's the growth bud nestled in the joints between parent stem and five-leaflet stems that will elongate into the best flowering growth.



Have a professional inspect that home you want to buy

If you are buying a home, co-op or condominium, plan to have it properly inspected by an experienced, compe-

tent home inspector.
"A home inspection should be an automatic step in the home buying pro-' advises Donald McKeon, president of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors. "Knowing what to expect — both inside and out — will help you make an informed decision about the value of the home and the future upkeep," he said.

A comprehensive home inspection includes a visual examination of the structure from top to bottom, including the heating and air conditioning systems (weather permitting), the interior plumbing and electric systems, the roof and visible insulation, walls, ceiling, floors, windows and doors, the foundation, basement and visible structure.

Following the examination, most inspectors will provide a report which not only points possible defects for areas of concern, but also the positive aspects of the structure as well as the type of maintenance that will be necessary to keep it in good shape.

"Home buyers who consider doing the inspection themselves should be aware that even the most experienced homeowners lack the knowledge and expertise of a professional home inspection firm which may have inspected hundreds or thousands of homes," McKeon said.

For example, watermarks in the basement may indicate a chronic seepage problem, or simply may be the result of a single incident. A professional assessment will provide complete information about the condition of the property you are considering, prises after the sale. In addition, a home inspector can remain totally objective, while you, as the prospective homebuyer, may be emotionally involved.

The inspection fee for a typical single-family house will vary depending upon the geographic area, as do home prices. The particular features of the home such as size, age and special structures will be taken into

consideration as well.

"The cost, however, should not be a factor in your decision to have a home inspected," said McKeon. "You might save many times the cost of the inspected." tion if you are able to renegotiate the purchase price based on significant problems revealed by the inspector." Consult your real estate agent or lawyer for advice.

A home inspection which does reveal major problems does not necessarily mean you should not buy the house. The inspector can advise you of effective solutions and project the costs in-

If an inspection report indicates that there are not major defects, you can complete the purchase with peace of mind about the home systems and property. In addition, you will have learned a great deal about the home in the inspector's report, which should be kept for future reference.

When selecting a home inspector, your real estate agent may be able to

supply you with a listing of local inspection firms. You may wish to avoid, however, firms affiliated with realty or construction firms. When interviewing a potential home inspection firm, carefully inquire about the specifics of their work and company. The following list of questions will assist you in the in-

residential inspection business? □ What type of insurance do you

Do you have a published list of the items you inspect?

☐ Do you have a published list, and can you give me the names of customer references?

Do you give accurate cost

estimates for any major defects

discovered during the inspection?

in the house? ☐ How much do you charge, and on what do you base your fees?

The answers to these quesitons should provide you with enough information to make a sound choice in selecting the firm to inspect your property. Base your decision on the answers to all the questions, but give special weight to the qualifications of the inspector, the type of report issued and the items inspected.


Professional inspection companies will be happy to answer all your questions. Avoid firms which issue only a verbal report. The report should be in a narrative form, not just a checklist of items inspected. Avoid, also, firms which indicate that they are de the inwhich indicate that they can do the inspection in a relatively short amount of time — thorough inspection takes several hours. The inspection time, however, will vary with the house.

It is important that the company you choose maintain a high standard of ethics. The inspector should neither offer to perform work nor recommend contractors to you. The company you choose should meet or exceed the stan-dards established by the American Society of Home Inspectors, a national association of professional home in-

Property inspection work is not limited to residential properties or prospective homebuyers. Many inspectors help homeowners with analysis and solutions to specific problems such as energy conservation, wet basements and/or cracked foundations. Inspectors also can inspect work upon completion to ensure that a contract has been properly fulfilled.



In the case of a conventional home loan, a lending institution loans hard dollars to the buyer. With seller financing, the seller loans his equity

In either case, the loan is normally repaid in stipulated monthly payments, including principle and interest. The interest rate is usually about the same with either type of financing-sometimes a bit higher with seller financing.

If the home purchase is totally financed by the seller, the transaction can be simple, fast and inexpen sive. There are no long delays or still closing costs and "points" charged ov an institutional lender

All terms in the seller financing note are negotiable between the buyer and seller. The broker (or brokers) involved in the transaction can usually work out terms that are fair for both parties.







Refinishing that antique bathtub

Q: Some time ago your column con-tained advice regarding the dingy and dirty-looking.

I have tried various commercia refinishing of old bathtubs.
Unfortunately, I did not keep a badly. Would it be possible to repeat this information?—M.G.

A: We have had several recent reand restoring older bathtubs and sinks. So, we are happy to repeat the information The process that will give your tub

or sink a new permanent surface ving the fixtures from the hathroom is relatively new It is a synthetic porcelain glaze developed for use on porcelain, fiberglass, ceramic tile, china and Formica finishes.

This is not a do-it-yourself process. ly the new finish accurately. Some refinishers won't do the work on a tub or sink made of china, since the china surface cannot be prepared for refinishing as well as steel and castiron with original porcelain finishes.

Check with firms that specialize i repairing and refinishing bathtubs and sinks. They might also be listed as specialists in porcelain tractors for price estimates and inprovided. You also might want to

recommendations on their work. The refinishing process requires that the entire surface be cleaned, sanded and chemically etched. Rust is chemically removed. Cracks, chips and pits are filled and sanded smooth. Several coats of a special primer are applied and the final finish coat is sprayed on. The new coating is available in several colors

Another, less permanent, method of refinishing your tub is to apply a new finish in epoxy enamel. Several s available in kits at most paint durable as the professional refinishing described above. However, it can be effective.

Here are two brands you can look for: Nybco, made by New York Bronze Powder Co., Elizabeth, NJ 07210; and Klenk's, made by Zynolite Products Inc., Compton, CA 90221 carefully

Just push the electric starter, hang onto the handlebars and you're off — a refreshing spray splashes and shoots over your legs as you sit comfortably on a padded seat and tear full-throttle across the waves.

Welcome to the wettest - and wildest personal watercraft ride of your life!

Environmentally-safe, jet-powered per-sonal watercraft first emerged in 1974 when Kawasaki rolled all the aspects of a motorcycle, snowmobile and water vehicle into the

"Riding a Jet Ski is like waterskiing without the physical stress of hanging onto a rope," said Jon Glassel, owner of Howell Cycle on West Grand River in Howell. "But there is a definite balance factor involved."

While the Jet Ski is fundamentally a oneperson vehicle designed to be driven standing up, a wide variety of personal watercraft have popped up like umbrellas in a rainstorm throughout the past three years.

"Because the newer 'rider-friendly' watercraft are so stable, it's now possible to ride one fully-dressed without getting wet," noted Bill Piggins, owner and president of C & C Sports on West Grand River in Brighton.

Currently Kawasaki, Yamaha and Bombardier reign as personal watercraft royalty and each have different vehicles on the market aimed to please non-experienced leisure-seekers as well as advanced wave-

Rider-friendly watercraft include, among other brands, the Bombardier Sea-Doo, Yamaha WaveRunner and WaveJammer and Kawasaki Jet Ski X-2.

Riders of all skill and fitness levels can board such watercraft as the Yamaha Wave-

Jammer and roar away with confidence on the first run. This stable minijet, intended for a solo rider, accelerates up to 35 mph and is easy to control. With one quick turn of the padded steering column and throttle all-out, even the novice can safely enjoy fast splashing spinouts.

Water-riders may also set their own pace and chart their own course on Yamaha's WaveRunner. While it isn't the fastest, the WaveRunner comfortably seats two and pro-

vides plenty of high-performance power.
"Riding double is more fun for the driver," Piggins admitted with a grin. "Nobody wants to just sit there when they could be 'behind the wheels.' Driving is exhibarating."

Even more exhilarating is operating one of Kawasaki's swiftly swerving Jet Skis,

"My typical Jet Ski buyer has no interest in stable water crafts," Glassel said.

He explained that the Jet Ski has a higher performance motor compared to the riderfriendly water vehicles and is even more maneuverable. However, this craft also requires more skill.

"Riders have to lean into their turns on a Jet Ski in addition to turning the bars," Glassel said. "The more you lean, the more throttle you apply and the more you veer the steering bars, the sharper your turn will be."

Experienced riders are attracted to the Jet Ski's amazing agility, which enables them to spin complete doughnuts, carve corners and whip into high-speed power slides. In fact, the wide appeal of this sport resulted in the for-mation of the International Jet Ski Associa-

Kawasaki has introduced a variety of Jet Skis, each designed for a different skill level One example is the all-new 1989 Jet Ski Tandem Sport. It features comfortable ac-commodations for two, easy-access controls

and delivers over 51 horsepower - power that's easy to direct because of the new hull's

extra stability.
Additional versions include the Jet Ski

300SX, X-2 and 650SX. "All of the models feature an automatic idle." Glassel added, "In case the captain

goes overboard, the Jet Ski will automatically slow to an idle and circle back to the rider. Of course, going overboard — or having other accidents — isn't the main objective when riding any of the personal watercraft.

Piggins emphasized that because the watercraft are so new and easy to get caught on with riders often forget that there are other boaters on the water and boaters are rarely knowledgeable about their speedy and

smaller counterparts. "The biggest safety tip I can offer is to be aware of the other boaters," he said. "It's easy to forget that you're not the only one out

Boaters, too, need to be educated, Piggins added. Personal watercraft, which are classified as "Class A" inboard boats, don't travel in straight lines; they can turn abruptly and are quite capable of cutting off other

water recreationalists. "That's what we're all striving for right ow — rider safety," he said. "The waternow craft are designed to be safe. Riding responsibly keeps them safe."

Despite subtle brand differences in design and horsepower, all of the personal water vehicles feature a number of safety and recreational advantages.

The watercraft, which range in dry weight from 250 to 375 pounds, are easy to transport and store. Piggins noted that vehicles such as the Yamaha Waverunner can also be loaded onto another boat.

In addition to convenience, shielded waterjet propulsion systems replace propellers, sturdy bumper rails protect the craft and bumper rails protect the craft and sealed flotation cells make these water rides virtually unsinkable.

"Riding one of these watercraft is an exhilarating experience," Piggins concluded.
"Everybody should try it at least once in their

Safety Tips

Personal watercraft are high performance "Class A" inboard power boats. The Personal Watercraft Industry Association advises recreationists to follow these guidelines for their own safety, their friends' safety and the safety of other water enthusiasts.

Attend a boating safety course before riding the vehicle.
 Be fully acquainted with local regulations — buoys, signs, lights — to be fully informed about the

marine environment.

Respect the rights of other marine recreationists. Avoid swimmers and steer clear of

swimmers and steel clear of fishing boats.

• Always look over your shoulder before turning. It's easy to forget that you're not the only boater out

Never travel farther from shore than you can swim and never travel after dark. Personal watercraft have no lighting equipment. Do not ride under the influence

of drugs or alcohol. Guard against hypothermia (abnormally low body temperature) in cold water with a wet suit or dry

Remember that without applying the throttle, you cannot steer. Both driver and passenger must be experienced solo riders on a Jet



There's not much question about what the Red Timbers restaurant is all about. Located on Grand River, west of Haggerty
Road, in Novi, the Red Timbers does a thriving trade by catering primarily to the businessmen and women who populate the numerous office and industrial parks which surround the area. Upon entering the restaurant, it's easy to see why it's particularly popular with the business

Dark panelling on the walls are accented with decorative brick and dark shades of red, creating the type of atmo

where you would expect businessmen to be discussing deals while eating A long bar occupies virtually the entire length of the restaurant and is a

particularly busy place during the "happy hour" immediately after working hours and for several hours thereafter. As for the dining area itself, it is marked with a brick fireplace at one of the room which adds further to the relaxing "club-like" atmosphere of the

As you might expect of a restaurant which places a heavy emphasis on attracting the business crowd, the menu tends to be rather traditional with a heavy emphasis on fish and meat, particularly beef. It should also be said, however, that the menu is extensive, providing a

wide variety of choices.

The selection of appetizers, for example, runs the gamut from breaded mozzarella sticks and fresh fruit cup to Oysters Rockefeller, escargot and blue points on the half shell.

The seven choices of salads include a shrimp salad, tuna salad plate, Grecian and Maurice salads, and pasta seafood primavera.

There also are seven "overstuffed sandwiches" for the luncheon trade, including the prime rib of beef sandwich, stacked corn beef, a gulf shrimp and carbynast conducts and the country salads. and crabmeat sandwich, and the ever-popular reubens and ground-rounds.

But on to dinner where the diner has a choice of 10 fish ("lakes and seas") selections and 17 meat ("oven, skillet and broiler") entrees.

After being seated, guests are given a basket of rather mundane crackers to munch on over their drinks. The disappointment associated with the cellophane-wrapped, commercially-made crackers is alleviated when the waitperson delivers the "bread basket" of fresh rolls, which, she reports, are baked in the Red Timbers' own kitchen.

The selections of meat range from Breast of Chicken Cordon Bleu and sauteed calves liver to Rack of Lamb Pariselle and Chateaubriand. Also available are lamb chops, pork chops, prime rib and tournedces of beef tenderloin, and — happily — several veal dishes, including Provimi Veal Oscar and Provimi Veal San Francisco.

Despite the rather traditional — albeit extensive — nature of the menu, it should also be noted that the chef does provide some creativity in the preparation of the dishes. The Tournedoes of Beef, for example, are served in cognac with artichoke hearts and bernaise sauce, while the Breast of Chicken Marguarite includes green peppers, mushrooms and sour cream with a side of angel hair pasta.

Dessert fare is rather standard, featuring cheese cake, apple and cherry

ple, and tortes. The dessert selections are usually displayed on a dessert tray, although a recent visit to the Red Timbers was marred when the waitperson reported that the tray was not available that particular even-

Despite the fact that it tends to appeal to the business trade, the Red Timbers does not approach the style of Chez Raphael's or even the Crystal Swan at the Novi Hilton. And despite its extensive menu, the restaurant makes few pretenses. It is what it is . . . and that has proven to be a suc-
