

## **Board buys 4** buses rather than waiting

Third time is indeed a charm. The Novi schools Board of Education approved the purchase of four new buses for the district April 1 - turning down the proposal twice that evening, but approving it on the next vote.

Everyone on the board seemed to agree that they felt that the district needed the vehicles. Some, however, questioned whether now was the best time to spend the money for them, given the week's events in Lansing.

The state legislature approved a newschool finance/property tax relief plan on Wednesday. That plan is now a ballot proposal, and voters across Michigan will decide if it becomes law when they go to the polls June 2.

Board Vice-President Stephen Hitchcock said that the board should wait on the purchase "and take this up in our budget hearings (in June), when we've got a better

Other board members said that the bus purchases were a necessary expense, both because of the need to replace old buses and the need to increase the district's fleet as student enrollment has grown. Waiting on the purchase could mean not having them in time for

"I think that given our growth." Board President Raymond Byers said, "we need more buses. We're right on the edge now (of falling below the district's needs)."

Board members said that ballot proposal made their choice a difficult one: vote to buy the buses now. before the plan's financial effects on the district were fully understood: or hold off and risk not having them for the start of the 1993-94 school


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## Board adjusts harassment policy

The Novi Community School District is very close to adopting a new

sexual harassment policy. The Board of Education reviewed the second draft of the proposed policy at its April 1 meeting. Members then asked Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources John Swallow to make a number of minor

changes in it. The policy governs sexual harassment between district students and between students and district employees or volunteers. The board adopted a similar policy early this year that covers harassment among district employees.

The policy defines sexual harassment and details the procedure school officials will use to investigate allegations of such conduct. Board members expressed satisfaction with the document's language, and thanked Swallow for his efforts in coordinating the policy's development. They offered several

improvements to it, however. This was the board's second look at the policy, following its first examination at its March 18 meeting. The policy has been changed since then, including:

■ Adding the following statement: "information and direction from law enforcement officials will be solicited (when a complaint is made) to help determine initially if there is

potential for criminal sexual conduct charges:"

■ Including district volunteers in the policy;

■ Modifying the original policy's language in the case of parental notification. The first draft said that the building principal (in the case of a student-student complaint) or Swallow (employee-student) "will determine the most appropriate point during the investigation to contact the student complaint's parent(s)." The modified policy states that school officials "will contact the student complaint's parents as

soon as appropriate." Trustee Michael Meyer asked Swallow to further study the wording on when officials will contact law enforcement agencies on a harassment complaint.

"I just want to ensure that we're giving proper protection to those who might be accused of sexual harassment." Meyer said. "That's a very serious charge, and it says we will consult with the police in any case. I wonder if that's the best

course." Meyer said that someone falsely accused of harassment could suffer unnecessarily if the matter escalated in that fashion. He suggested the board consider changing the language to give school officials some leeway in the event that a charge was found to be without



### Deal drafts feds into city's park land buy

Novi will have its park land, seller Peter Stanaj will have his money, and Novi Youth Baseball will have its playing fields. The city won't have to pay anything more to get the land, but Stanaj has managed to work things out so that in the end he'll come out further ahead financially.

How can this be? How can such a deal be arranged so that it appears everyone is coming out ahead?

Simple, set up the paperwork so that it says only a part of the land was purchased for the same price. Then the tion. As a donation, the seller can claim it \$272,000 value of the land. as a deduction against his federal taxes.

Council Member Robert Schmid at first called this an attempt to "defraud" the federal government, then he retracted his statement. But he did stick by his guns when he criticized the deal claiming that in accepting it the city would be "contributing to tax evasion."

At a very minimum, the deal represents a decision by the city to commit the federal government to participate unwittingly in the purchase of the city's land. However you want to phrase it, it will be up to taxpayers (that's you and me, folks) to bear the burden.

It is nonetheless difficult to criticize Novi City Council. The city had offered \$25.000 to get an option on the 105-acre parcel, that would have set the price at \$745,000. But the seller never signed and since voters approved the \$9.9 mil-

We're adamant about the public's right to know and we think we've proved our willingness to do battle with the government when necessary to uncover information agreed. we believe should be made public. But we are also sensitive to the need for secrecy in real estate dealings. This is by no means the first time that letting it be known too early that the government was interested in buying a particular parcel made the deal difficult to close or affected the price. We were later critical of the city's handling of the deal, but we delayed printing the information about the location of the land for some time. In a spirit of cooperation with the city, we withheld that information until members of the public were actually showing up at council meetings and talking about the parcel publicly. > But while Fried is on the topic of executive sessions and what council members should do with the information that comes from them, we'd like to see Fried address the overall issue of when and for what reasons council can go into a closed meeting in the first place. We'd also like to see him give the city guidance on just what the requirements are about how council should describe the topics it will be discussing and give members some idea about how they can publicly object when they disagree with the council's decision to go private.

> Novi council spends a great deal of time in executive session, calling a closed meeting at the start or tail end of nearly every weekly council meeting. That is not necessarily wrong, and we have found only one violation of the Open Meetings Act in the council's actions so far. Last February, one member claimed the council strayed across the line and, in the end, the city attorney

> To a large degree, both the press and the public have to rely on one of the members blowing the whistle on council when one of these closed door meetings violates the OMA. The question of how can they do that without actually letting out the information other council members have decided should be kept private is a tough question indeed.

And because of the frequency with which council goes behind closed doors and the importance of doing the public's business as openly as possible, we think Fried's review should be an overall review of what the rules are and an assessment of how the council has been doing at following them.



Trustee Robert Schram said that the policy should clearly define under what circumstances the district was responsible for dealing with harassment complaints. He said that the current language didn't specify that the district would deal with activity that allegedly took place on school property during school hours or at schoolsponsored functions.

"What I want to avoid is a student coming into school Monday monring and saying John Doe did this to me at the mall on a date Saturday night," "Schram explained. "That's a matter most appropriate for the police to handle at that point."

Schram also asked for a more precise definition in the policy. The policy says that sexual harassment occurs when submission to various at Novi Woods Elementary.

### Fire budget gets a close trimming

cal year 1993-94 was \$1.734 million, but after complying with a request for a six percent cut from City Manager Edward Kriewall, this sum was whittled down by \$4,000 set aside for items such as supplies and consultants.

To further meet the cutback request, Lenaghan proposed to reduce the hours and level of service in the part-time auxiliary firefighter program for a savings of \$28,000; reduce the paid-on-call firefighters wages by \$26,000 by eliminating the Monday through Friday sleep-in program; and close the fire prevention division. laying off one employee to lower the budget by \$47,000.

But the city administration agreed to keep this total of \$101,000 in the department's budget. The final decision is up to the city council.

Lenaghan pointed out a memo to council that the funds requested are what the department needs to "remain operational."

The administration has asked the city council to approve raising the police and fire millage levied over the Truth In Taxation benchmark of 1.3786 to 1.5037.

This increase would cost the owner of a \$100,000 home \$6.25 per year. The fire department's share of that would go towards building a reserve fund for heavy equipment, following a 17-year schedule set up in 1988, when voters approved the police and fire miliage, Finance Director Les Gibson said.

Last year, the fire department's total budget was \$1.831 million but may come in at \$10,000 less.

The voter-approved police and fire miliage provides 53 percent of the fire department budget, while the rest comes from the city's general fund. The department has drawn on a six to seven percent share of the general fund for the past 15 years, Lenaghan

A\$210,000 pumper-tanker with a 1,000 gallon water capacity was approved by the city council and has not yet arrived - delivery can take up to two years - so Lenaghan kept it in the new budget. The fire chief has taken a series of

measures to save money since the word came that Novi will have to refund \$300,000 due to successful appeals by property-owners, primarily of businesses, at the Michigan Tax Among the money-saving tactics

employed by Lenaghan was installing pay phones for personal calls in the fire stations. Some firefighting shifts include spending the night at the station.

"This was not a popular change. It's a little tough if you're there for 12 hours," he admitted.

"It doesn't take a quarter to get into the restroom yet, does it? Kriewall asked Lenaghan.

"Not yet," the chief answered.

Other cost-savings measures included the remodeling and painting of Fire Station No. 3 by a fireman, Gordon Poyhonen, bringing the price

for the work down to \$5,000. For year - will be needed to meet the \$1,200, department staff also re-paid-on-call payroll. painted Fire Station No. 4 and installed kitchen for \$1,200.

The in-house vehicle maintenance program costs \$12 per hour, rather than contracting out the service rate of \$42 per hour, Lenaghan said.

A team of full-time and paid-on call firefighters determined that changing the uniform from a regulation overcoat to a lined jacket would save \$90 per coat.

The chief has asked the council to approve \$20,000 for building improvements; \$43,000 for personal protective equipment; and a \$13,000 communications upgrade, including \$9,000 for pagers.

With the addition of 19 paid-oncall firefighters to the department, bringing the roster up to 61, Lenaghan anticipates that a budget of \$341,000 — up \$37,000 over last

The department has 18 full-time staff members, 15 of them paid through the special millage. No request for new staff was made, although Lenaghan notes in this budget memo that should the funding become available, he will ask for more employees.

Last year was a busier year than ever for the department in terms of incident responses, he said, with items which Lenaghan has re-1,775 calls, 60 percent of them for emergency medical services. Fire emergencies are down, Lenaghan said, although 17 buildings in the city did have fire damage exceeding \$10,000. He attributes the reduction in fire losses to more inspections and public education.

The chief said his goal is fire protection and an increased public awareness, rather than just fire supression.

'We're trying to be more proactive. It's always a criticism, the fire department is reactive. We wait until something happens and then send a truck out," he added.


In 1992, the department conducted 1,755 fire inspections and wrote 2,292 violations.

Unlike the police department, which requested an ordinance and a fine for false alarms, Lengahan said the fire department takes a different approach.

"We're attempting to work with local businesses to correct the problem," he explained.

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

### **Culinary arts** schools offer great treats

How many times have you heard the old expression - "Let's do lunch" - only to have the commitment sade away because burgers in a box was too cheap and too fast, and a table for two at a swanky suburban restaurant costs the same as last month's phone bill?

Never fear, because if you're looking for food - great food, well-prepared food, food with style, and consistent quality at below-market prices - check out the local school scene and find out what student chefs are cooking up.

Delicious lunches North, east, south or west, the culinary arts programs featured at our learning institutions are by far the best. Lunch specialties include homemade soups, the kind momma used to make, mostly made from scratch, and entrees have the students learning as much about ethnic cuisine as Vice President Al Gore on a Middle Eastern fact finding trip.

The desserts brim with the likes of fresh cream and shaved chocolate and have crusts so light and flaky they must have been made by little old ladies who still wear curlers and babushkas. Hardly.

Today's culinary arts student is being introduced to the high-tech art of culinary trends and happenings. They're also learning about kitchen management, personnel, public relations, purchasing and everything else that has to do with running a restaurant in today's 'let's dine out" society.

Learning by doing

Now this isn't to say that all good chefs graduate from classy colleges. Anticipating the trend toward vocational education, and allowing high school students a chance to see what the real working world is all about, most local school districts are offering a commercial foods course that gives teenagers an in-depth look at running a restaurant from the front of the house (dining room) all the way down to the ment where supplies are stored.

Gourmet entrees Enough of the background; let's get down to what these programs do best - food. Recent visits to student-run restaurants had me sampling the wares of junior chefs with such exemplary fare like Poached Eggs Blackstone, a minestrone soup that would have brought Pavarotti to his knees, even a table-side preparation of fiaming Steak Diane.

If you are worried that your taste buds would never appreciate the likes of Shrimps Provencal, all of the programs offer outrageous sandwiches like hot ham and cheese on grilled sourdough, homemade fries, and a not-so-basic plate called "Beth's Tuna Supreme" — pita bread stuffed with the freshest tuna salad, lettuce and tomatoes. At a buck fifty yet. Can you believe it?

Add to those goodies the fact that all of these culinary institutions do catering in one form or another, and put out some of the buffets money can buy. Many schools offer a small bakery where students can bake you anywhere from one to 200 dozen cookies, special cakes, tortes

Before you go to lunch at a student-run restaurant, it's best to call ahead, not necessarily to make reservations, but just to make sure of the hours. Prices vary and alcohol is a no-no. except for the chef adding a pinch to the stroganoff or whatever.

These restaurants are the best kept secrets of the staff that work in the buildings. You will not be disappointed, and furthermore, you will be helping the student chefs by supporting their

## Bread

### Baking bread from scratch sure to rouse your family

There's nothing better than the smell of fresh-baked bread waiting through your home. Watch your family's reaction the next time you make bread. They'll walk in the door as usual, then suddenly stop, sniffing the air and inhaling that delicious odor deep into their lungs. Then they'll relax, smile and make a dash for the

The varieties of bread are endless, but none are as soothing to make, or provide such a fragrant aroma, as made-from-scratch yeast breads.

It's true that these breads take time, often four to five hours in all to allow the dough to rise as well as for the bread to bake. But most of that time the bread requires very little of your attention, other than to put it in the

It does seem rather magical when a lump of dough turns into a loaf of delicious bread. Yeast is the source of the magic. A simple one-celled plant, yeast expands and makes the dough increase in volume. Yeast comes in two basic forms: active dry or compressed cake.

The following recipes all call for active dry yeast, which can be found in the refrigerated section of any grocery store. Bread is brought to life as the yeast is thoroughly distributed by kneading the dough, working it with your hands until it becomes smooth and silky.

If you've ever played with Play-Doh, the rhythm is very similar. Roll out the dough, fold it toward you, then push it away again with the heels of your hand in a rocking motion. Make a quarter turn and repeat the motion until the dough is ready.

Most yeast breads include the same basic ingredients: some type of flour; a liquid (usually water or milk); sweeteners, such as sugar or molasses, which "feed" the yeast and enhance the flavor; salt, which helps to control the growth of the yeast; fats, such as oil, for d to keep the dot the pan; and, of course, yeast.

Kitchen towels seem to work better than paper towels to cover the dough as it rises.

Be sure to check the temperature of your liquids when making yeast breads. Higher temperatures will kill the yeast and produce a sticky dough, while lower temperatures will retard the growth of the dough.

English Muffin Bread

- 6 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 2 packages active dry yeast 1 tablespoon sugar
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- % cup water 2 cups milk
- Cornmeal Yields 2 loaves.

Combine 3 cups (half) flour with yeast, sugar, salt and baking soda. Heat water and milk until very warm (around 120 F to 130 F). Add liquids to dry mixture; beat well. Stir in rest of flour to make stiff batter.

Spoon into two 8% x4% -inch pans that have been greased and sprinkled with commeal. Cover; let rise in warm place for 45 minutes.

Bake at 400 F for 25 minutes. Remove from pans immediately and cool.


To serve, slice and toast.

It's hard to get all the ingredients together for this black bread, but it's worth the extra effort. Punching down the dough releases large air bubbles, producing a finer texture in the bread.

Russian Black Bread

4 cups rve flour 2 cups whole-bran cereal

3½ to 4 cups all-purpose flour

Add molasses mixture to flour mixture in mixer bowl. Beat with electric mixer for

3 additional minutes at high speed. Stir in remaining 3 cups of rye flour and as much of remaining all-purpose flour as you can mix in with a spoon. Turn mixture out onto lightly floured surface. Knead in enough of the remaining all-purpose flour to

make moderately stiff dough that is smooth and elastic

30 seconds on low speed, scraping bowl as you mix. Beat

(about 6 to 8 minutes total). Dough may be slightly stic

because of rye flour. Shape into ball. Place in lightly greased bowl; turn once to grease surface. Cover and let rise in warm place until ball has nearly doubled (about 1% to 1% hours).

Punch down, then divide mixture in half. Shape each ' half into ball. Place on greased baking sheets. Flatten slightly with palm of hand to 6- to 7-inch diameter. Cover and let rise until nearly double (about 30 to 45 minutes). Bake in 375 F over for 50 to 60 minutes, or until well-

browned and bread sounds hollow when tapped. Remove from baking sheets and cool loaves on wire rack. Meanwhile, combine 1/2 cup cold water and cornstarch in small saucepan. Cook and stir until thickened

and bubbly, cook 1 minute more. Brush over hot bread.

This recipe won the blue ribbon for French bread at the 1989 Illinois State Fair. It uses ice cubes on the oven floor to create steam for a thicker crust. To cook baguette loaves, use curved black steel French bread pans, or cook them free-form by placing baguette loaves on a coo-



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
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
