# New city rule would target gang graffiti

If Novi city officials find graffiti on your home or business, you may be required under a new anti-graffiti ordinance to pay to have it removed or be subject to a city-imposed fee if the city has to do it for you.

A first reading of the ordinance passed by the Novi City Council last week, but the initiative will need a second hearing to become law in Novi.

The ordinance was drafted by the city attorneys at the request of the Novi Police Department. It comes on the heels of a marked increase in gang-related graffiti police have discovered in town in recent months.

Novi Police Chief Douglas Shaeffer initiated the ordinance as a means of deterring gangs from marking their turf and deteriorating the city.

We want to be very cooperative in doing it with property owners, Shaeffer said. "But we want to make sure we get it removed as soon as possible because we don't want them to be able to spread their messages.

"We want to keep the community clean so we don't have the decay and deterioration to the community and to life in it."

The ordinance seeks to strengthen and amend existing ordinance by making it specifically unlawful to deface any property in the city. Graffiti is defined in the ordinance as drawings, inscriptions, designs, scribblings, mottos, pictures, pictographs, and or other markings.

When it does occur, however, the ordinance puts the burden of removing it or painting over it on the backs of the property owner. Property owners have 15 days to comply with the city's request to remove the graffiti. If it isn't removed, the ordinance dictates that city employees can walk onto the property remove or paint over the graffiti and charge the property owner the cost of clean-up plus a 10 percent administrative

The fee will cover the city expense of administering the work performed, overhead, and other contingent expenses, the ordinance states.

# Council says it won't reopen police pact

Novi Police Officers were apparently unable to convince members of the Novi City Council to reopen their contract.

Assistant City Manager Craig Klaver Tuesday issued a press release after the council discussed the issue of reopening the contract in executive session last week and decided the arbitrator's decision will stand. Officers had shown up at a city council meeting asking that it take a second look at the decision reached in binding arbitration.

"We did meet in executive session and our labor attorney explained the arbitration process," Klaver said. "Council recognizes that the arbitrator's decision is binding."

And so the new contract minus 12-hour shifts - takes effect July 1.

"The city will be attempting to implement this decision with a minimum of disruption to the department and its employees," Klaver stated in his press release.

Officers will revert back to eight-hour shifts and work 104 hours less per year than they did on 12-hour shifts. They will receive three percent pay increas-

es each year of the contract and retroactive pay for the first two vears of the contract during which they worked 12-hour

"The city was concerned with the cost of the 12-hour shift system and the lack of flexibility of the resulting schedule." Klaver

That's the same gripe Novi Police Chief Douglas Shaeffer had about the 12-hour plan. He said under the 12-hour shift, an equal number of officers were scheduled to work each day regardless of the demand for service which is typically higher on the weekends.

Eight-hour shifts will allow the department to staff its manpower when it needs it the most and afford supplemental shifts as

needed, Shaeffer said. Twelve-hour shifts were the biggest external issue in the contract negotiations but not the largest issue on the table, Klaver

The key issue between the two parties was implementing a detective "on-call" policy which guarantees a detective be available at all times for emergency calls. In the past the department had a system in place but in recent



Ceremony marks court opening By JAN JEFFRES May 1 is a day loaded with meaning. In rural England, it's a time to gather flowers

and dance around the Maypole. In the world's few remaining Communist countries, it's a chance to roll out the tanks and red flags and watch the workers on

Here in the U.S., it's Law Day, which commemorates the role of the legal system in our government. And the occasion was celebrated in Novi by the official opening ceremonies of the 52-1 District Court.

Not that the court hasn't been up and running since March 19, but the formal welcome was a time for local township, city and county officials - some of them once on opposing sides in the four-year-long tug-of-war over the facility - to celebrate a truce, sample chocolate-dipped strawberries, tour the new build-

ing and mingle amicably. Just a few months ago, the same court was operating out of a Walled Lake remodeled car dealership. Certainly it was technically outdated. It's now one of the most technicallyadvanced courts," Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson said.

The issue of the placement of the court was "one of the major problems" the Oakland County Board of Commissioners had to deal with in recent years, he added.

"Of course politics came into play, in an area with several representatives and several commissioners. We were able to strike a compromise which was a win-win for everybody," Patterson said.

The compromise was that the court moved from Walled Lake to Novi and Oakland County is now rebuilding the former Maple Road court building into a county service complex

# City seeks road grant

Novi's hoping to bridge the gap between two segments of the Town Center's northwest ring road.

The city has applied to the Oakland County Road Commission for a \$775,405 Surface Transportation Fund Grant, which would require a \$93,800 match from the municipal coffers and a \$100,000 match from Novi Expo Center to construct the \$969,200 bridge over the Rouge River.

Money disbursed by the road commission comes from the federal government. All this work is expected to ease

congestion along that stretch of Novi Road and Grand River. The bridge would complete this segment of Crescent Boulevard,

past the Novi Expo Center. It's part the right-of-way. of the ring road system proposed

southeast component of the ring. The Expo Center would pay its share for the bridge through a 10-

year, \$10,000 per year, special assessment district. In 1992, the first phase of the northwest ring road was completed with the assistance of a federal grant. That section travels from

Novi Road west to the Expo Center. Phase two, financed in part by a \$1.1 million state grant, will stretch from Grand River Avenue past Novi Industries/Progressive Tool and General Filters, stopping at the Rouge River. It will intersect Grand River east of the CSX

Novi matched that grant with \$384,000 of city money, while Progressive Tool paid out \$200,000 finally linking Novi Road and and General Filters and the Novi Grand River Avenue and curving Expo Center donated portions of







The Northville and Novi communíties began an ambitious fundraising campaign back in January to help pay for the some \$160,000 it will cost for the procedure. Karney's insurance carrier Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan is not planning to cover the procedure, which is deemed experimental for breast cancer patients by the compar

The fund raising efforts have included such events as a rock concert in downtown Northville raffles, a silent auction and dinner events. Up until recently, contributions have remained at mostly the local level.

But now, after a recent article in 'Solidarity," a national magazine for the United Auto Workers union highlighting the Karney family's situation, checks have been rolling in from around the country. Kathy's husband Vic is an employce of General Motors Corp.

"It's amazing," said Lynda Baca, Karney's neighbor who has helped organize fund-raising efforts. Donations have come in from such states as California, Texas, Florida, New York and West Virginia. Karney even received a \$100 donation from an 82-year-old woman who was expecting to have hip surgery soon So far, the efforts of friends,

family and coworkers have man-

aged to raise \$67,000. Donations, which are tax deductible, are going through a non-profit organization out of Birmingham called My Friends Care. The group helps cancer patients in situations like Karney's. If at some point she no longer needs the money that has been raised, the funds will help





Nonetheless, redistricting ought not be viewed as a magic bullet for the district's space problems. It is an interim solution at best. And to get a sense of how and why, the entire survey has to be kept in mind. For instance, when respondents were questioned about the class sizes they would find appropriate, the majority clearly indicated that 25 students is about the maximum for the elementary grades and 30 is the maximum for high school.

# Taking a lesson the easy way



made in my life. Fortunately, they let me learn a needed lesson the easy way. In case you didn't read it in

The Northville Record, editor Lee Snider, a good friend of mine, was recently arrested for drunk driving. He's been completely straightforward both in public and private about it, including how this whole episode has affected

It's affected me, too. I finally got the message, the one that advocacy groups like Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) have been shouting to us for years: drinking and driving has got to stop. It's a message that I've ignored on a few occasions in the past when I've driven drunk. There's no excuse for me or Lee or any of the tens

of millions of Americans – some of whom are part of this community - who've ever driven drunk. It's time for all of us to say "no more. Drunk driving is like speeding: a lot of people

don't think it's really all that bad. "You shouldn't do it," the thinking goes, "but hey, a lot of people do.

No, big deal. People die because of drunk drivers, real people with real families and friends who

confront a dumb choice I've — sometimes gray. This isn't one of those sometimes. It's a basic, brutal equation, as simple as life and death: driving drunk or saving "no more."

You can kill or hurt yourself, your family and friends as well as those of other people. You could sentence your loved ones or somebody else's to a lifetime of loss. Ask yourself if you can live with that the next time you're tempted to say "just this once." Ask yourself if you can live with the other possible consequences, too, like being written up in the local paper, cracking up your car and skyrocketing your

insurance premiums.

Let's not forget being arrested, either. If you've never been through it here are the highlights: pat down, handcuffs, squad car, booking, photographs, fingerprints, body search, cell and a phone call to a friend for bail from your one-bunk Hilton. Then there's court: charges, judges, prosecutors, paperwork, conviction and fines. Don't forget prison, either, as in bars, guards, guns, electric fences, bad food, fights, drugs and gangs.

We as individuals and members of society have to say that it's not OK, it's never OK, to drive drunk. If you're going to drink do what you have to do so you don't have to drive. "No more" has to outrank inconventence on the priority scale.

Then we have the "renewal" to deal with. In the "renewal," we look at a new contract for cable services. Many have asked, "Why don't we just bring in a new company?" The Cable Act of 1992 puts many restrictions on this. You can deny a renewal to a cable operator if it fails to meet one of four requirements listed in the act. Fortunately, MetroVision has performed at a level above those stipulations. In addition to those benefits we now enjoy in the

present contract, we want to include provisions for

technology and services for each of our three cities

Our contract with MetroVision expires in Mav. 1997, but we've already begun the process of hiring a consultant, CTIC Associates, affiliated with the Cable Television Information Center. And they've already prepared a financial and technical audit of MetroVision. In January, we hosted city council members from Novi, Farmington and Farmington Hills here at our SWOCC/INFO TV-12 studio. Our consultant, Harold Horn, was on hand to give everyone an overview of the renewal and transfer process and to present his firm's initial findings. This is important since city councils will eventually vote on this renewal contract and ordinance.

We hope this process won't take too long. The commission is moving right along with all the information gathering, so we could possibly begin negotiations this summer.

Sounds complicated, right? Well, there is a lot of information to pull together and we do want your input, so keep an eye on the bulletin board in our SWOCC/INFO TV-12 office or your local newspaper for public meeting notices.

In summary, the "transfer" should be completed before the "renewal." It's pure coincidence that they are happening simultaneously. However, it does save time and money doing both at the same time.

# Plans are almost ready for Fuerst farm

Continued from 1 through the Fuerst property, as well as structural engineer George Ehlert of the Southfield-based firm

The Fuerst home is a bungalow, so the group brought in Rob Schweitzer, who teaches historical architecture and preservation at Eastern Michigan University, to tromp through the residence. Schweitzer is a board member of The American Bungalow Magazine and a columnist for Victorian Home Magazine.

"He loved it. He said it was definitely not your typical, middle-class bungalow. This is definitely upper-middle class in quality and construction," Mutch said.

"It was so exciting when we were in the basement. The doors that are down there are probably the doors of the original 1830s house. It was like the joy an archaeologist must have in making discoveries."

Schweitzer was also the guy crawling through the bathroom.

In September 1992, the Novi resident decided to attend a free screening for prostate cancer, even though he had no symptoms.

Three weeks later, he was advised to contact his personal physician for additional tests. "The results came back questionable,"

Schwartz said, "which means additional tests were needed." Schwartz called the doctor who did the screening to make an appointment for additional tests. One of the first questions he was asked was regarding his medical insurance. When Schwartz

told him he didn't have any because he was laid off from his job, he heard a click at the other end of the line. He was also turned down by two local hospitals because even though he had worked small jobs. neither included health insurance benefits.

Not knowing where to turn, he called the American Cancer Society. Explaining his dilemma. they asked him if he had ever been in the armed services.

He had been in the Marine Corps for eight years, on active duty from 1955 to 1958. During the first one and a half years he was a drill instructor at Camp LeJuene in North Carolina. His next assignment was as the diplomatic courier for the joint chiefs of staff, the first enlisted man to be assigned to this position. The remain-

ing five years were spent in the reserves. They told me that I had health benefits for life and to check into any VA hospital," Schwartz said, who immediately contacted the VA Hospital

in Ann Arbor. The VA Hospital did the second screening and again the results were questionable which neces sitated a biopsy. Of the six core samples taken during the biopsy from various parts of the prostate, all six were malignant

Schwartz had the life-saving surgery on Dec. His experience has led to a crusade for the

education of the importance of the early detection and treatment of prostate cancer.

His ordeal led him to write a 33-page book which includes information on treatment options. stages of the disease, support groups, suggested reading material, anatomy diagrams and a glossary of medical terms. The book was published in June 1994. Patient Care Services underwrote the cost of the printing of 1,000 copies. The reference guide and manual was in such demand that the supply was exhausted in only three months. Schwartz has recently revised his book, which

now has approximately 70 pages but has been unable to find a sponsor who is willing to underwrite the book while letting him retain his copyright. Other requirements Schwartz has are that the book be given away free, all education and support groups be given free copies, the book, its title, content and format not be changed except for accuracy. Some organizations he has approached were willing to finance the book, but did not want to meet his requirements.

Orders for the second printing already total 6,500 copies from 20 organizations and people around the country. The book costs about \$1 to print and \$2 to mail.

Schwartz often speaks on behalf of the American Cancer Society and is instrumental in getting new support groups off the ground.






The normal prostate doesn't interfere

# Fraser is active in the movement for equality

Equal billing - not necessarily center stage - is what the AAUW (American Association of University Women) is pushing for, and Winifred Fraser, president of the Northville-Novi branch, is leading the effort here.

She's been talking to any interested groups who want to hear her story about equity for women. It goes back to 1776 when Abigail Adams wrote to her husband, John Adams, pleading that the writing of the new independence movement include more humane treatment for wives.

As part of a community project, Fraser and the AAUW are asking for donations of money towards placing books about women's history in our school libraries. The cost for each book is \$25.


