■ Fatoosh owners settle, closes its doors for good

A settlement reached between the owners of Fatoosh Mediterranean Cuisine and their landlord will send e restaurant packing by the end the month, leaving another

vacancy in Novi's downtown.

A settlement was reached between the owners of Fatoosh and

their landlord closing the restau-rant and resolving any back pay issues, sald 52-1 District Court Judge Brian MacKenzie.

MacKenzle said the June 7 settlement between Fatoosh and Luna Properties involved an agreement by Luna to wave any back money owed in return for Fatoosh's prom-

ise to move out by June 23.

Nabil and Rana Matar, the owners of the restaurant, may stay

until the end of June, but MacKenzie said it will cost them \$3,500.

The court-room dispute began in April when Luna Properties filed a complaint of non-payment of rent against Fatoosh.

Attorney James Oegema, who was hired to represent Luna Properties, stated in court docu-ments that restaurant owners did not pay their March rent of \$4,000 along with an additional \$3,422 in

other fees.
The Matar's in turn filed a count-

er-suit stating they felt their rental contract had been broken listing a "breach of covenant of enjoyment" as the official reason

According to court documents, the accused breach occurred when the east access to the restaurant was closed after Vic's World Class Market went out of business in February.

Documents prepared by Matthew Brown, Fatoosh's attorney, also state since Vic's closed, the eatery lost business and suffered damage

### 388 NHS seniors receive diplomas to hearty applause

Applause rang down from the heights of Compuware Arena in Plymouth on June 8, as par-ents, siblings and other gathered family members gave the Novi High School class of 2002 a standing ovation when the graduating seniors strolled onto the main floor for the opening of the 34th Novi High School Commencement. The processional of students — clad in green

and white caps and gowns — were led by the Novi High School Symphony Band playing "Pomp and Circumstance," arranged by James D. Ployhar. The band was directed by Novi High School band director James Sheckler and assistant band director Matt Ownby.

Novi remembers Vietnam War era through film lecture

The staff of the Novi District Library extends an invitation to all fascinated by the Vietnam War era to come and take a different look at a compelling time redefining America.

The look will be through the

lens of a movie camera, and the tour will be guided by Eliot Wilhelm, curator of The Detroit Institute of Arts Detroit Film

Theatre.

The Tuesday, June 18 event titled "What Films Teach Us About Us" will offer attendees an interactive opportunity to discuss how films of the 60s and 70s represented society's view on the war with a film professional.

Along with his curator posi-tion. Wilhelm's credentials include director of the weekend film series at The Detroit Film Theatre since 1974, hosting the Friday night Detroit Public Television Film Festival and authoring one of the Video Hounds World Cinema books - a compendium of non-American films featured as part of the

Video Hound series.
"The primary thing we're going to talk about are films from the 60s and 70s and what those films were about and more importantly what they weren't about." Wilhelm said. "For the most part American films in that era were very, very

### Two bodies found dead, Novi Police believe both are suicides

Two bodies found dead in Novi last week are being treated as sul-cides, said representatives from the
