# Video store robbed

The Novi Police Department is looking for information on an unknown knife-wielding man who robbed a local video store last

Police said the only one in the store, a 30-year-old female employ-ee, was not injured.

The male suspect entered Home Video in the 30000 block of Beck Road on Friday, June 14 at about 12:35 p.m. and stole about \$300 before cutting the store's phone lines and fleeing through the back

lines and fleeing through the back of the plaza.

According to police reports, the employee said the suspect was ioticing inside the store for more than 10 minutes before placing an entire display of videos on the floor. The report stated the suspect then asked the victim to come over

and fix the display which was at the back of the store.

The employee told police she believes when he realized she was not going to leave the counter, he came up to the front of the store and looked at her while holding his arm behind his back fooling with his belt and waste area."

He then demanded she give him the store's cash.

After the man had the money, he cut the phone line with a 6-inch blade knife and told her not to call

the authorities, police said.

The suspect was described by the employee as an Asian or possible part Mexican male about 22 to 26 years old.
She said he is about 5'7" with

medium lengih dark hair and dark black eyes.
According to police reports, the

suspect was wearing jean cargo shorts at the time of the robbery. Anyone with information on the case is asked to call the Novi Police Department at (248) 348-7100.

# Research and development companies look to Novi

Colliers International, a fullservice commercial real estate firm in Bingham Farms, recently closed a string of multi-year leases that will bring research and develop-ment firms to Novi.

Araco America Inc., an automo-tive interior parts manufacturer, closed a 5-year lease for a 18,523 square-floor research and development building at 41180 Bridge St. in Novi. The multi-year lease, which was closed on April 21, is valued at \$1.5 million.

TRI Technical Center USA agreed TRI Technical Center USA agreed to a 20-year lease in Novi on April 25. TRI, a manufacturer of anti-vibration rubber products, will move into a 18,000 square-foot research and development buffding at 25825 Meadowbrook Rd. in May 2003. The lease is valued at \$4.4 million

Both deals are for 5-year leases valued at about \$300,000.

**Your money matters** 

My neighbors down the street are moving. Before I saw the 'For Sale' sign, I knew something was up because they spent a signifi-cant amount of time sprucing up their home's exterior as well as the yard. They repainted the trim, added window planters full of flowers, fertilized the entire lawn trimmed the hedges. They are normally good about main-taining their home but this time they went the extra mile.

As my husband and I have never sold a home. I was interestin knowing my neighbors' strategy.

They learned from their agent on at selling a home is just like marketing any other product: The better the marketing effort, the better the outcome in terms of activity and offers.

They willingly shared with me that selling their house involved a number of steps and that they were presently working toward the goal of "curb appeal." This intangible, subjective quality sup-

posedly makes the buyers want the house so much from the time they drive up in front that they are willing to look inside and even

come up in price to get it.

According to their agent, curb appeal is the buyers' first impression of a home for sale. The exterior sets the tone and influences them to either drive past or go inside for a more thorough look. Usually if the buyers fall in love with the exterior, they will look more favorably upon what they

"National Association of Realtors' studies show that over half the homes on the market are sold before the buyer even gets out of the car," said Carlo Gobba, Realtor with Century 21 Associates in Royal Oak. This is a fact most people don't realize."

He said getting a home in show condition is the first step disarming buyers to start thinking emotionally instead of practically. This tactic of building desire within the bovers to our desire within the buyers to own and live the lifestyle the exterior their home appears to advertise helps sway their decision to go

The obvious thing my neigh-bors soon realized in the home selling process is that sellers and buyers are opposite. One wants to sell the house for as much as possible while the other wants to buy for as little as possible. The key is

for both to meet in the middle. Another aspect about home selling is the importance of prepa-ration and competition on the part of the sellers in getting their

house ready.

entation. They began with a thor-ough cleaning and de-cluttering. "Not only is cleaning a house common sense but it also makes the home look more inviting and well cared for," said Gobba. He added that removing clutter

should be a noticeable part of the cleaning process and that extra items in the home which can't be thrown or given away should be placed in temporary storage for

safekeeping.
"Eliminating clutter benefits
the seller two-fold: the rooms seem larger and the buyers can better imagine themselves as the new owners of your home," said Gobba. "For example, sellers should remove half of the contents of the home's closets so buyers can see how large they

are - or appear to be.
"Putting family photos away or appear to be." also helps buyers see your home as their home because there's less of the seilers' presence.

Gobba further advises sellers to consider the outlays of time,

money and energy they could choose to afford or put forth in their approach and execution. Consider first the return on investment before expending too much time and expense, Home repairs are another

important factor in preparing a home for sale as they eradicate



Spring and summer are the prime home selling seasons and their agent worked with them to set their home apart from the others on the market. While part of this would be his job in advertising and showing it to other agents my neighbors worked hard to do what they could, hence their increased activity and improvements to their yard and home's

"Sellers should consult with their agent to determine what the home needs to stand out," said Gobba. "Aim for tasteful pizzazz when possible because it may make all the difference."

Every article that is clipped out and saved is a small part of me that made it from my thoughts







It wasn't the way the Warriors were looking to end their season




