Aluminum firm picks Novi

Alcan Inc. to open new plant, headquarters

By Pam Fleming

Alcan Inc., the second largest aluminum company in the world. announced plans Tuesday to later this year open a new manufactur-ing plant and North American automotive headquarters in Novi

Construction has already begun on the 52,000-square-foot building at 46555 Magellan Drive north of 12 Mile off West Park Drive. Workers in the faciliwill manufacture advanced aluminum bumpers for the firm's automotive customers in North America.

Company officials anticipate to start production in arly 2004.

We hope to move the first week in October and have a formal groundbreaking in March or April 2004," said Michael Kelly, vice president and Global am director, notive. Program Alcan

The firm will lease the building and may expand the new head-

quarters in the future.

future growth in North America. We hope this will be the first of more plants in North America,"

The Novi facility will have the capability to produce more than one million aluminum bumpers a year. Initially, the building will provide jobs for more than 60 hourly and salaried employees, with about 45 new jobs being cre-

Alcan executives considered

"I think it's fascinating we're

doing this in the heart of the auto-motive market," Wolfensberger said.

The new facility is part of a

planned expansion of Alcan's North American automotive operations, which includes the establishment of a new structural

Those working in this group will engineer and market aluminum bumper systems and other structural subsystems.

"Alcan already is North America's leading supplier of aluminum sheet," Wolfensberger said, "These new developments mark the company's emergence here as a supplier of lightweight structural assemblies as well." Initial bumper contracts include two vehicles with major

European auto manufacturers in 2004 and two vehicles with major North American auto companies

In 2003, Alcan will provide one or more body panels of alu-minum sheet for more than four million new vehicles. In fact, the new Jaguar XJ rep-

resents the first rivet-bonded aluminum monocoque structure made by Alcan.

A monocoque structure is a metal structure, like an aircraft, in which the skin absorbs all or most of the stresses on the body This structure makes the new Jaguar up to 440 pounds lighter with 60 percent more torsional stiffness

Wolfensberger noted that "Alcan has also developed significant expertise in the application of aluminum for crash manage ment systems, which is especially relevant for North America."

Alcan produces lightweight

products and technologies for reduced mass and improved vehi-cle performance. About 30 per-cent of the western world con-sumption of aluminum is for transportation.

The value of aluminum for the automotive industry is that it's lighter, provides better fuel economy, improved performance and less emissions. It is also 100 per-cent recyclable and offers

The Novi Community School District's Board of Education has hired Nancy Davis as Dr. Rita Traynor's successor as assistant superintendent of Academic Services starting on July 1, Traynor announced her retirement earlier in the year.

Davis, who has been working with public education for 29 years, will be earning \$115,000 per year. She worked in the Michigan Department of Education for 13 years and was in

the school improvement office when it was created back in 1987. "I think this job is going to be a wonderful culmination of a lot of

background. I think it's really going to come together nicely here in Novi. and Albion school districts are. One impressive fact that Davis can boast is that in her current position of executive director of the Michigan Virtual High School, she took charge of developing, from scratch, the first virtual high school in the state of Michigan. It is now regarded as the second largest virtual high school nationally, serving about 70,000 students in a variety of courses in the state in a vari and online text tools

"I have had a pretty good experience in recent years in technology integration," she said. "My back-ground is secondary education. 1 started out as a high school teacher in Midland, Michigan and have done a lot of work in the elementary and middle school level as well. I worked for the State Department of

Education in doing school improvement, Title I, reading and math programs for the elementary schools and I have been a chair of numerous North Central Accreditation Teams across the state.

Davis considers herself a pret-

ty seasoned veteran of public school education. "My husband is a superintendent, so we have a lot of things to talk about and share and I have learned a lot from him," she said. "I'm very impressed with Novi and I have always regarded Novi very highly. I have even visited Novi dur-ing my career to work in different aspects of the program here. I am be chosen to try to fill Dr. Rita Traynor's shoes, which is going to be a pretty hard act to follow."

In addition to being subject to civil penalties, violators could be guilty of a misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of one year in prison and/or a \$10,000 fine. Repeat violators could be found guilty of a felony carrying a maximum four-year prison sentence and/or \$25,000 fine. Each e-mail is considered a sep-

Special treatment heralds industry trouble

Here's a pretty good rule of thumb that an industry is in trouble. It rushes off to the government pleading — on whatever grounds seem most expedient and politically attractive — for

the 19th century the titan of the American econ the 19th century the titan of the American economy. But as years passed, the industry lost sight of the fact that it was in the service business, its practice of arrogantly administering rates to a market it presumed to be captive led inevitably to the rise of more efficient, cheaper competitors: trucks, airplanes, automobiles.

And so the railmost industry.

And so the railroad industry leaned on the Congress time and again to pass special protective pieces of legislation, stimutable unleading to

ultimately winding up in a wholesale bailout through which the government took over the assets and liabilities (mostly the latter) of the industry. The taxpayers are still paying the tab for all this and the railroad industry is

A recent example has to do with the airline industry, whose big players for years made up for their very high cost structure by gouging their best customers — business people who have to make last minute reservations and get in and out

make fast manute reservations and get in and out of their out-of-town meetings in one day.

When air traffic dropped to a trickle after 9/11, that strange noise you heard in the background was the corps of airline industry lobby-ists sushing to ask Congress for a multi-billion dollar bailout. With air traffic remaining stagnant and low-cost competitors making money, the big airlines are now threatening to declare harkungte, a powermental protection analysis. bankruptcy (a governmental protection against





Are they fruit, or are they a veg-

If we are going to be technical, tomatoes, eggplant, and peppers are fruits. So says the botanist. But as cooks we treat them as

plant to remove bitter bitter. This juices. This step is only necessary if you have tasted the eggplant and deem it necessary. I feel it is an extra step and have never been disappointed by omitting it.

Eggplant is also known for absorbing large amounts of fat when sautéed or fried. I have eliminated the frying step, opting to broil slices (eyen breaded) and

then proceed with the recipe from that point. The results are excel-lent – no calories from fat and no cooking, unless it is very tough. greasy taste. Nutrients and color are lost with peeling. Many people salt their egg-plant to

Sweet peppers are members of the capsicum family. The most familiar being the bell pepper, known for its shape and grown in shades of green, red, yellow, orange, and purple. All bell pep-pers are green before they are ripe, and naturally, become sweet-

er as they ripen. The American Anaheim, the Yellow Banana Pepper and the Mexican Poblano are mild chili peppers, and are used fresh as vegetables. All can be used in place of sweet peppers. The fiery hot Jalapeno is to be treated with respect. Use sparingly and wear gloves when handling. Peppers
