With the announcement by Lake Ori-on Schools that they will be conducting school elections in November of even-numbered years during regularly scheduled general elections. Oakand County school districts are now 100 percent on board with election consolidation that will save taxpayers around \$500,000 per year, Oakland County Clerk Bill Bullard Jr. said.

Stand-alone May school

"I am proud that our local school systems have seen the wisdom of both say ing taxpayers' money and encouraging participation in the democratic pro " Bullard said. "I congratulate them for doing the responsible thing."

Recently, Bullard testified in Lansing in favor of a bill that would require all school systems in the state to take the action that Lake Orion took voluntarily At that time, he testified for a bi-par tisan effort along with Macomb County Clerk Carmella Sabaugh, a Democrat, before the Senate Committee considering the bill.

"November school elections save taxpayers' dollars and increase voter participation," said Bullard, "Oakland County has lead the way in schools voluntarily moving their elections to Novembers. This legislation has the potential to put millions of dollars state vide back into the classrooms. With politics so divisive now, I am grateful that I could join in this bi-partisan effort with Clerks Sabaugh and (Wayne County Clerk Cathy | Garrett.'

TOYOTA GEARS UP WITH CAMRY FOR GREAT 4TH QUARTER

Toyota posted 18-percent lower sales in September. But company executives vowed that, finally, October and the rest of the fourth quarter would represent a true sales turnaround for Toyota in the

United States, as it benefits from the return of fullvolume production of

vehicles destined for this market, a slew of new and updated products including the Camry sedan, and the release of pent-up demand

for its products in particular as well as by American car buyers in general. "We're saying 'down sales' one last time for September," said Bob Carter, general

manager of the Toyota division.

"For the first time [since March],

all of the Toyota plants in Japan and North America are back to normal production levels, a couple of months earlier than originally expected. Our flow of vehicles is rapidly increasing, and so are our inventories. We expect the Toyota division to exceed year-ago sales levels beginning in October and to continue to do so every month throughout the fourth quarter and beyond. The increases are being driven by improved availability and an influx of new products.' In fact, Carter said that he

and his colleagues have "a spring in our step" these days because they're so confident of a turnaround in Toyota's shortterm sales trend, "Our production is back to 100 percent just in time to be launching our largest barrage of new products in more than 25 years," he said.



The 2012 Camry is a huge reason for Toyota's optimism about the rest of 2011.

Model by model, results for Toyota, Scion and Lexus continued to be disappointing in Sentember. Corolla sales were i down 23 percent for the month and remained 11 percent behind for the year. Prius sales were

 All but two of Toyota's fleet of non-car vehicles nosted sales declines for the month compared with the year earlier, most by double digits. And Camry, America's best-selling car for the last many years, sold 19 percent fewer in September compared with a year ago, and about 9 percent fewer units for

the vear to date.

Yet, the way Carter tells it, Camry is the very locus of shortterm optimism for Toyota. The company has begun producing a substantially improved 2012 version of Camry and finally got some shipped to its U.S. dealers last month, a couple of weeks ahead of schedule.

"They arrived ... and dealers began selling them as soon as they came off the trucks," he said. October marks the real kickoff of sales of the new model, "We'll ship about 35,000 Camrys in October, and [sales] will become a flood."

Buyers are attracted to an MSRP that Edmunds.com has called the lowest in the Camry's 22-year history as a nameplate, Carter said; at the same time, initial orders are seeing high selling rates for top-trim versions, including Toyota's new Entune infotainment system.



There simply are a substantial number of Americans who have een waiting for the new Camry to become available, and now is their day, Carter said, Camry advertising just started in mid-October, he said, and already Toyota is "ecstatic about the initial reaction" to the new Camry, "And it is an understatement to say, and we're quite confident, that Camry will hold on to the title of America's best-selling car" for

At the same time, he said, Prius finally will be more broadly available than at any time in the last year. Carter said. And availability of Toyota's pickup trucks once again will allow the brand to "take a good hard run" at the segment in the fourth quarter.

Carter also reiterated Toyota's plans for significant product enhancements in the next few weeks: a new Yaris that goes on sale later this month: a justintroduced 2012 Tacoma light pickup truck; and the wholesaling of the new PriusV by the end of October. "That is four all-new or significantly upgraded models in the span of ust 30 days, and they will be followed a new Scion iQ by the end of the year," he said.
