City looks for new name for Landings Park

Select voters in Novi will be casting their ballots in new locations come August after the Novi City Council approved the addi-tion of two new polling locations on Monday night. Residents who vote at pre-

cinct 2 will be moving to Good Shepherd Evangelical Lutheran Church, while those who voted at precinct 16 will head to the Novi Public Library.

City Clerk Maryanne Cornelius said the additional locations were needed due to an increased city population and voters.

Meadowbrook Congregational Church will still welcome voters for precinct 1 and the Novi Civic Center will continue to host pre-

cincts 17 and 18.

"If you have ever been here on voting day on a presidential election or even with the August primary, you know it's busy," Cornelius said of the civic center.

Nothing will change for voters who plan on voting in the Feb. 28 presidential primary election, but those who will be changing should expect to receive a new voter ID card in the spring

"If you get a new voter ID card next sprint please don't throw it away and say I already have one

of these," Cornelius said. There is no charge to the taxpayers for the additional polling locations, and no disruption to

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

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

These nanomaterials will be capable of detecting the capsid of the norovirus on the lettuce. Police to target drunk drivers during holidays

Motorists who don't want to observe the hol-idays from inside a jail cell need to designate a sober driver during this festive time of year ment agencies are putting extra officers ou on the road to look for and arrest drunk drivers

through Jan. 2. Law enforcement of ficers in 26 counties, including Oakland and Livingston, will be conducting drunk driving enforcement paid for through federal traffic safety funds administered by the Office of Highway Safety Planning.

During last year's holiday periods, 11 people died in traffic crash es. Four of those deaths were alcohol-related. In

2010, there were 283 alcohol-related traffic deaths, a decrease of 5 percent from 2009. However, alco-hol-related fatalities still remain one-third of all traffic fatalities.

In Michigan, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol content of .08 or greater, although motorists can be arrested at any BAC level if an officer believes they are impaired. Motorists face enhanced nenal-BAC or higher.

Michigan State Police plan increased enforcement along the area's expressways on Dec. 17. 23, 24 and 25 starting at 11 p.m. The Oakland County Sheriff's Office will increase enforce ment throughout the county on Dec. 23.

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



The Michigan Senate recently distinguished itself by passing sweeping Anti-Bullying legisla tion (SB 137). My first thought as I glanced through the recent news article was that it was about time that our elected officials formalized such a law Any and all kids deserve the basic right to feel safe and unthreatened when they walk though their school doors every morning.

Reading further into the article, I was surprised to discover that SB 137 didn't pass through the state Senate unanimously the bill was passed along party lines — 26 Republican state senators supported the bill and 11 Democratic senators opposed it. How could anyone oppose this common-sense legislation that would protect our kids from

such a destructive act? Upon further research, turns out Democrats aren't pro-bullying, they were opposed to a

Republican-supported section of the bill which states:

"This section does not prohibit a statement of a sincerely held religious belief or moral conviction of a school employee, school volunteer, pupil or a pupil and parent or guardian."

Apparently 26 of our Republican state senators (including my own representative) feel that bullying is OK (and legal) if the bully really, sincerely believes that his/her taunts and verbal humiliation are religiously or morally based. 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
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The short answer is yes -- but not in very many fields. We looked for six-figure salaries that don't require a four-year degree. While we found some that pay an annual mean salary

these positions require you to be in the top 10 percent of earners. It's not impossible, but it will definitely take a lot of hard work.

And it goes without saying that all of these positions require some degree of skill and experience. You can't become fashion designer if you have no fashion sense, for example, and it's not likely that you'll walk away from high school graduation and into a firehouse as the fire chief.

If you're looking to earn those big bucks, but don't have a college degree, here are a few

1. Air traffic controller

75th percentile income: \$142,430 Median annual salary: \$109,850

You can become an air traffic controller a couple of different ways without a degree. The first is to have experience through the Federal Aviation Administration or the Defense Department, as a civilian or veteran. The second is to complete an FAA-approved education program.

2. Chief executives Median annual salary: \$160,720 If you've worked your way up to become the CEO, you may be earning \$160,000 a year, It's difficult to get to this stage of your career without a college education, but it can be done Just look at Bill Gates and

were college dropouts.

3. Fashion designer 90th percentile income: \$130,900 75th percentile income: \$90.020 Median annual salary: \$64,260

This is one career where you've either got it or you don't. About 25 percent of fashion designers are self-employed. If you're a real creative genius, you might be able to get by with only a high school education. But if you're smart, you'll at least get an associate degree. It also hehooves you to get training in color, textiles, pattern making and computer-aided design.

90th percentile income: \$109,750 75th percentile income: \$87,190 Median annual salary: \$68,250

Most firefighters have a high school diploma. In some cases. community college courses or an associate degree might be a better option for you. Once you're accepted into a fire department, you'll train at the department's academy, where you'll obtain classroom and practical training. To get to fire chief status, you'll definitely have to work your way through

5. Network systems and data communications analysts 90th percentile income: \$116,120 75th percentile income: \$55,900 Median annual salary: \$73,250

network systems and data communications analysts vary bachelor's degree, but often an associate degree, professional certification and work

experience can do the trick

6. Police and detective supervisor

> \$116,340 75th percentile income: \$94,560 Median annual salary: \$76,500

It's not likely you'll join your local police squad as the supervisor unless you have a few years of experience under your belt. A few squads may require a year or two of college-level course work, but in most places you just need a high school education plus experience. Much of this career is learned on the job or in a training academy

7. Radiation therapists \$107,230 75th percentile income: \$90,650 Median annual salary: \$74,170

At the very least, an associate degree or certificate in radiation therapy is required for this position. Many states also equire radiation therapists to be licensed. There is also the option of completing an associate degree in radiological imaging and then finishing a 12-month certificate program in radiation therapy.
