### Civilian pistol safety class on Saturday

The Novi Police Department will be offering a Civilian Pistol Safety Class from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, July 21 at the Novi Police Department Training Center (45125 W. 10 Mile Road). After lunch, participants will move to the Novi Firearms Training Center to complete the course.

The course fulfills both the classroom and shooting requirements to obtain a Michigan Concealed Pistol License. Participants must be 21 years old and do not have to be a Novi resident to attend.

Registration forms are available at the Novi Police Department, or online at cityofnovi.org. The \$200 course fee may be paid by cash or money order. Class size is limited.

Students must bring their own equipment, including a personal handgun, 100 rounds of ammunition, safety glasses, and shooter's earmuffs or ear plugs to participate in the course.

# Vandalism on the rise in Chase Farms

Novi resident Bridgett Yankee knew things were bad in her neighborhood as far as vandals and destruction of property were concerned, but now it's gone "above and beyond."

We are disgusted and frightened," Yankee said after the July 8 incident that left her husband's truck badly burned from what they believe were fireworks. "This has crossed the line from vandalism to arson."

Their concerns started early that Sunday, when the Yankee family was first awakened by some voices. However, after a check through the windows, they didn't see anything or anyone.


They later learned their neighbors had called police about a smoke bomb being set inside their storm door that had rolled into their home after they opened the door because someone had rung the

door bell. It was around 5:30 a.m. when the vandals struck again. This time the Yankees were roused by some explosion noises outside. Yankee's son called out, saying the truck in the driveway was on fire. They believe someone threw fireworks into the truck's bed liner, causing it to

catch fire. It burned so badly that it may be beyond recovery, she said. The gas tank had melted onto the driveway. Even the driveway, trees near the truck and another vehicle were burned slightly.

"This neighborhood is being victimized, and what makes it so scary is that it's so random yet consistent," Yankee said. "I'm wondering if parents know where their kids are at night and if there is any action to catch these individuals. I know it's tricky, but something needs to be done."

According to Novi Police Chief David Molloy, something is being done. He

said police have stepped up patrols in the Chase Farms neighborhood, which is where the Yankee family lives, because there has been a string of vandalism reports along Hempshire Street

and Picadilly Circle. According to CrimeMapping.com, since June 1 there have been at least eight incidents of vandalism in the Novi

community. "We take these cases very seriously," Molloy said of the Yankees's truck.
"An incident like this could have set the house on fire considering how close the

truck was to it." He said the truck fire is currently under investigation and no specific cause has been determined. However, he said there were reports of fireworks being set off that night, so they are under the assumption that could have been the cause.

Topouzian recently learned he received a Kresge Artist Fellowship, from Kresge Arts of Detroit, a program of the Kresge Foundation.


"That seems to be the million dollar question," the Farmington Hills resident said when asked about spending the fellowship money. He'll use it to advance

Country singer/songwriter Anita Cochran to perform New Hudson show

In just the last month country music singer/ songwriter Anita Cochran has toured all over the globe. Performing with country star Terri Clark. Cochran's musical talents have been on display in Norway, Germany and Italy, before coming back to North America for a small tour in Canada this week. She says she has loved all of the shows, but she is really looking forward to one very special performance at the end of this month — at James Atchison Memorial Park in New Hudson.

Cochran, who moved to Nashville in 1994 to kick start her musical career. grew up in Lyon Township, just a few miles from the park where she will perform on July 21 at 7 p.m. In fact, it will be the first time she has performed in her hometown since leaving for Nashville.

"I'm very excited. It's always nice to come back and play in Michigan. especially five minutes from where I grew up. said Cochran, best known for her hit duet with Steve Wariner, "What If I Said", which climbed to number one on the country charts in 1998.

range," she said. This class included drawing on Monday, with Wednesday sculpting. The students gave the



# Excellence in education

# Northville, Novi districts aim high and hit the mark

The Baseline rivalry between the Northville and Novi school districts is a friendly one, but there is one thing both districts are united and serious about: excelling in education.

The recently released 2012 (MME) results confirm that the Mustangs (Northville) and Wildcats (Novi) are some of the smartest students in the state.

It can be confusing trying to keep up with all of the education system's acronyms. The MME stands for Michigan Merit Exam, which also includes the ACT. The standardized test (created in 1959 as American College Testing and shortened to ACT in 1996) "was established as a way to impartially assess a student's potential for success in college, help students gauge their abilities in the core subjects taught in high school, and to assist colleges in admission by providing a standardized measurement of a student's ability from different schools across the world," according to the non-profit organization.

The MME replaced the MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) for high schoolers six years ago (although the MEAP is still given to elementary and middle school students). The MME assesses students in grade 11 and eligible students in grade 12 based on Michigan high school standards. It is administered each March, and consists of three components:

ACT Plus Writing college entrance exami-

• WorkKeys job skills assessments in reading, mathematics, and "locating information" · Michigan-developed assessments in mathematics, science, and social studies

The combined assessments measure student learning under the Michigan high school standards, benchmarks and core content expectations used to evaluate whether or not high schools achieve AYP (Adequate Yearly Progress) required by the federal NCLB (No Child Left Behind) Act.

Students in both districts have once again achieved levels that are much higher than the state averages in reading, writing, math, science and social studies, and among the top performing districts in Oakland and Wayne counties. Northville's percentages improved in the first four categories compared to 2011 results and were steady in social studies while Novi students have shown improvement in all five areas.

What makes this even more impressive is the fact that in September 2011, the Michigan Department of Education implemented higher proficiency cut scores for both the MME and the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP). This was done so rankings would show student performance aligned with college and career readiness as opposed to the work-readiness of the previous lower

These remarkable percentages show that both Novi and Northville are graduating stu-dents who have handled a very challenging high school curriculum and are prepared for the next chapter of their lives.

And administrators in both districts know that the key to success is a unified vision that includes teachers, students, parents ... and the community as a whole. All four are on board with the same focus.

These latest results are impressive, but we have no doubt that both districts will use the data to improve. That's the way they've become the best, and that's way they'll continue to be two of the top performing districts in Michigan.

From the school boards and administrators of Northville and Novi (Northville Superintendent Mary Kay Gallagher and Novi Superintendent Steve Matthews, respectively) to the classroom teachers and the pupils, congratulations on setting the bar high and hitting it.

"I thought it was the best with family and my wife's position at the hospital," Wilson said. "I wouldn't change the last six or seven months for anything. I'm sad to leave. I have mixed emotions because I really enjoyed my stay at Novi. At the same time, I'm looking forward to being able to be with my wife and kids full time.

Wilson took over the AD position Nov. 28, 2011, after Curt Ellis left the position Sept. 15 for a job with Saline Area Schools, the district he grew up in and currently resides in. 




