Liquid spill closes 10 Mile, Beck intersection



A liquid spill from a commercial truck closed the intersection of 10 Mile and Beck Roads on Monday afternoon for over nearly four hours.

According to Novi's Assistant Police Chief Jerrod Hart, at approximately 11:30 a.m. on Nov. 26 a commercial rolloff truck driving through the intersection of 10 Mile and Beck roads spilled about 100 gallons of its liquid cargo onto the roadway.

Hart said the truck's driver failed to secure the top of the container the liquid was in. When the driver went to

1979 Wildcats rally for fallen classmate

Former classmates of Andy Hyde are rallying to raise funds for the late Wildcat's (Class of 1979) children and the Gift of Life Michigan-Organ & Tissue Donation Program with a Dec. 1 event at 10 North in Novi.



"Our class was really tight," said Cathy Reilly, one of the organizers. "We really reconnect-ed with Andy at our 30-year reunion. He was a great guy, a nice guy.'

Hyde was diabetic and in need of a liver transplant, but succumbed in

September before he could get one.
"He still lived in Novi. We had a mini reunion in August. He didn't look well, like something was wrong. Then three weeks later, he was gone. When it happened, we all really wanted to do something for his family," Reilly said, noting Hyde was divorced with two daughters and piling medical expenses.

Donations are also being taken for the Gift of Life program. Reilly recalled a friend whose father is in a Cleveland clinic right now awaiting a lung transplant. He never smoked a day in his life, but asbestos got to him.

This donor thing is huge, but people won't do it," Reilly said. "So many people need organs to survive. I knew a guy who was 39 and got killed in a car accident. He

Staff Writer A new mutual aid agreement between the fire departments of Novi and Wixom will mean faster arrival times and help avoid the possibility of one of the communities being unable to respond to a simultaneous emergency.

The Automatic Mutual Aid agreement between Novi and Wixom is new for the former,

but the latter already has sim-

ilar arrangements with Com-

merce and Walled Lake to decrease arrival time when a

Novi and Wixom fire departments

mutual aid request is made. Both Novi's and Wixom's fire departments said mutual aid has always been an option upon request, but with this agreement resources are automatically provided at no cost.

Automatic aid is defined as the automatic response by the responding city of the closest available resources via emergency dispatch to a request for response by the requesting city.

Neither city will seek compensation from the other for AMA services rendered under this agreement. Each will remain responsible to its own employees for the payment of wages and other compensation.

According to Novi Fire Operations Director Jeff Johnson, the AMA agreement provides for an engine or ladder from Wixom and sends it automatically to any con-



Novi City Manager Clay Fearson said this will take both departments to the next level of service and added these types of agreements are becoming more popular among municipalities working to share services.

by for these calls. Pearson said he would report back to council on the number of calls and other data regarding this agreement in six months. The term of the agreement is indefinite, but is subject to termination by 90-day written notice by either party. The terms provide for

Novi and Wixom to provide automatic emergency response to the other party by providing at least an engine or ladder company with two personnel when requested to confirmed structure fires to particular sections of each city. A confirmed structure

fire is identified by a

first person caller, police

officer or firefighter on

scene, or multiple calls to dispatch. Wixom City Manag er Mike Dornan and Fire Chief Jeff Roberts both agree this is beneficial to both parties. Roberts said this will eliminate any delay.

"No single entity can afford to purchase, hire or maintain all the personnel, equipment and other resources that would be necessary to respond to every possigency," Dornan said. "It is for these reasons that most communities have agreed to provide mutual aid to one another when emergencies occur."

Dornan said what makes AMA better is that it includes a faster arrival time and elimination of the risk that an event could deplete a community's personnel and equipment so that it would be unable to respond to another simultaneous emergen-

Novi's hard work to keep the community beautiful has been officially recognized.

The Novi community has received four Keep Michigan Beautiful awards, which honor projects throughout the state that involve environmental cleanup, historical preservation. site beautification and restoration, and environmental education programs for children

and adults. The awards were presented on Nov. 13 at the City Council meeting by Bob Ramsey, president of KMB, an organization n service since 1962 and in partnership with Keep America Beauti-

'This past October we had our annual award ceremony and the City of Novi (and some residents) were awarded four of our 39 awards. Ramsey said.

The President's Plaque, the highest given by KMB, was presented to the City of Novi for the Nine Mile Road pathway and the Baseline Historical Marker. Michigan Plaques for second place were given to Tollgate Garden, located in Novi, and Novi High School student Raj Raina.







Goal of review to show Novi students are learning



attended my first lance at Monroe Junior High when I was in the ninth grade Bobby Box of KQEO Radio was the guest DJ. As the evening was winding down, he invit ed everyone to the dance floor to partici-

pate in a dance contest. He explained that he would start a song and then stop it. Everyone who moved after he stopped the song would be eliminated The contest had nothing to do with your dancing ability. It had everything to do with your ability to stop dancing.

As a result, I knew I had a chance. Finally it came down to one other couple and us. Bobby Box started and stopped the song. My date and I had won! The key to my success - don't move much when the music was play ing! It is a lot easier to stop when you

are hardly moving to begin with. Success and public recognition are tricky things. From Dec. 9-12, our district will host an accreditation team. This team, comprised of experienced educators from around the state and nation, will be here to judge us. My hope is that they will be able to clearly and accurately identify what we do well and where we need to improve.

This external review team will visit classrooms, talk with over 300 people, and, in the end, give a report to our Board of Education that will identify our strengths and our weaknesses. This visit could be similar to my dance competition experience. My hope is that it is much more than that.

Ultimately, it is about whether or not we educate the students in our care. Sometimes we get focused on making sure we look good to the outside world I am not that interesting in just looking good. I want to make sure that we are actually doing good. Doing good, in the particular case of school improvement, means being able to show that our stua lot of questions, talk to a lot of people and visit a lot of classrooms. They will look at our governance structure, our policies and our procedures.

All of those things are important. But, in the end, the most important thing we do every day is help students learn! In order to educate our students, we need good systems and processes. We need high quality facilities and lots of supplies and materials. We need procedures that help us provide consistent service to every constituent group in our dis-

But, in the end, everything is for naught if we do not help our students learn. If we cannot show that the students who come to our classrooms everyday learn and grow, then we will have failed.

When our External Review team visits our district in December, we could have a strategy that ensures that we will "win" the contest and

receive our reward. Or we could adopt a strategy that focuses on the central question: Do the students in our care learn?

I believe it is much more important to be able to dance and not just win the dance contest. In our district it is much more important to be able to show that students learn and much less important to get a good rating.

The truth is I hope for both. I hope that we can demonstrate that our students are learning and that we can show our processes, procedures, approaches and structures are built to support student learning.

Winning the "dance" contest is not nearly as important as actually being able to dance. In our case, getting a good review is not nearly as important as actually ensuring that everyday students learn in our schools.

If so, the Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) invites you to its 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan public input meeting from 3-6 p.m. Dec. 5 in the first floor meeting room of the Southfield Public Library (26300 Evergreen Road). Anyone interested can offer input at any time during the meeting; you don't need to be present the entire time.

At the meeting, RCOC staff members will explain the longrange transportation-planning process, which is mandated by state and federal laws, and receive public input. There will not be a for-

Security good idea at meetings

By Robert Meisner

O: I am a member of our homeowner association and I am worried about one vocal and, sometimes, violent resident who attends the meetings. Should they have security at the meeting? I have asked the board for it.

A: I am deluged with emails from fellow community association



who can perpetrated at meetings of the

association and/or on directors. One story have heard was about the treasurer of his condominium association being at a meeting where one of the owners in a community called the board president "as queer as a three dollar hill." whereupon chairs were thrown at various individuals sending the rest of the board members under the table. The individuals involved were all over the age of 70, so age has no bearing upor udgment or conduct. To say the least, where there is any potential threat. adequate security should be provided if for no other reason than to enhance the participation by the members of the association

Q: Has the Michigan legislature enacted a statute that prohibits nrecourse mortgages and

deficiency judgments?
A: No. However, the Michigan legislature did enact the Nonrecourse Mortgage Loan Act, 2012 PA 67, MCL 445.1591 et seq., which retroactively prohibits a postclosing loan from being used as a carve-out or basis for a deficiency judgment against a borrower or guarantor. The Act does not apply to loans that are initially classified as recourse loans and the Act specifically states that it does not

Q: What is a deficiency judgment in a mortgage, and does my mortgage company have the ability to pursue one?

A: When a borrower cannot repay their mortgage and the lender pursues foreclosure, the ider may or may not be able to sue the borrower to collect the shortfall commonly known as a deficiency. In Michigan, the key is whether or not the note, not the mortgage, is classified as a recourse or nonrecourse loan. If the note is classified as a recourse loan, the lender can pursue a deficiency judgment on the covenants contained in the note. Generally speaking, conventional residential notes do have recourse provisions. However, in order for you to determine if you may be subject to a deficiency judgment, you may need to contact a real estate attorney to review your specific situation.

Factors to Consider Before Accepting a Job Offer

Searching for a job is hard work. Scanning help-wanted listings, researching companies, sending out customized cover letters and résumés and attending interviews can be tiring and time-consuming. If you're like most job seekers, you're excited — or at least relieved -- when your efforts result in an

employment offer. In some cases, a pressing need for a paycheck may outweigh any potential drawbacks to a new role, especially given the uncertain economy and rising prices for gas and food. But if you are in a position to be selective, you must consider every angle before rushing to accept a prospective employer's offer. After all, a new full-time job usually isn't a short-term affair. Following are some guidelines to help you determine whether to accept a job offer or wait for a better opportunity:

Scrutinize the job description

Carefully reviewing the job requirements, key tasks and responsibilities, as well as whom you will report to, may be the single most important step in assessing an offer from a potential employer. Ask yourself these questions:

 Will you enjoy the day-to-day duties of the position?

Will you be challenged?

· Is the level of responsibility appropriate considering your experience?

If the answer to any of these questions is no, accepting the position might not be in your best interest. While some negative factors can be overlooked - a slightly lower starting salary than you prefer, for instance fundamental problems with the job itself are a definite deal-breaker.

Evaluate the company

The work environment affects how you feel on a daily basis, so make sure it's one you feel comfortable in. If, for example, you strongly prefer a conservative corporate culture with set hours and established processes, you probably won't be happy in an informal atmosphere with "fly-by-the-seat-of-yourpants" business approach.

Also consider the work styles of your future boss and co-workers. If you sense that you and your potential colleagues have conflicting styles or personalities, tread carefully. While differences in character and opinion can result in better group dynamics, frequent disagreements often lead to unproductive and unhappy work teams.

How does the salary compare to what you made in your last position or what others in your specialty and with the same skills earn? Take a look at the benefits package, too. How generous are the perks? Keep in mind that attractive benefits can sometimes outweigh subpar compensation.

Or perhaps you're offered a job that requires you to work long hours but offers the option to telecommute. Being able to work from home several days a week may give you the time you need to attend to personal obligations and compensate for the rigid work schedule. Additionally, if an offer meets most of your requirements but doesn't include a benefit that's

important to you — such as tuition reimbursement for a pro-— it doesn't hurt to ask if that perk can be included in your employment agreement.

Ask about opportunities for growth

There's nothing worse for your career than getting stuck in a dead-end job. While a so-so role may be fine in the short term, holding a position that does not allow for advancement for an extended period of time can take a toll on your health

Try to get a realistic idea of the growth opportunities available within the company. For example, have people who held the job before you moved up with the firm? Where did your prospective manager start out? If the answers to such questions don't seem to support a policy of promoting from within, you may want to continue your job

Careful consideration of the issues discussed above will help you decide whether to accept, reject or negotiate a better offer. If, after evaluating each of these points, you are still unsure which way to swing, go with your gut. If your intuition tells you that something is a little off, conduct some additional research or ask more questions of the hiring manager before making your decision. Moving into a new role is a big step, and you want to enter the arrangement knowing all the facts. With a thoughtful analysis of the pros and cons, you'll be able to make the best decision






