



Wayne State professor looks at mind-body influence, pain

Clinical psychologist Mark A. Lumley is a professor and director of Clinical Training in the psychology department at Wayne State University. The 50-year-old Novi resident is doing research on the role of stress and emotions in

chronic pain disorders. "I started paying attention to how people's bodies respond to emotional experiences," he recalled of a grade school experience of getting sick to his stomach after seeing a dialysis film.

Lumley earned his Ph.D. and master's in clinical psychology from the University of Florida. He studied biology and psychology at graduate. The Detroit native studied two years at Detroit Redford High School and two years at Temple Christian High School in Redford.

He's married to Sherry, a Novi schools staffer. and the couple has four and a son, 18. Lumley's been on the faculty at Wayne State since 1991





will give liquor licenses ... it's a function that belongs with the city," said Gatt. Mayor Pro Tem Dave Staudt voted yes on the first motion, but no on the second because a special land use permit may be too much added regulation. He said the LCC's interpretation of

move forward. "I believe we should wait the process out and not add

additional ordinances for this specific purpose," said Road Why the change?

City Manager Clay Pear-son said the basis for the possible amendments is that the LCC has announced new procedures for the processing at the state level of transfers of liquor licenses. He said this will impact local communities and is an apparent effort to make the LCC's operations more "efficient".

"For years it was stan-

dard procedure for the City

of Novi to be part of the process for any proposed transfer of a liquor license within its boundaries," he said. He said the LCC has reinterpreted existing state statutes as not requiring prior local legislative approval of transfers of liquor licenses. The change would include transfers from one person to another, but might also apply to transfers of licenses into Novi from other communi-

The recommendation for special land use regulations will be reviewed by the Planning Commission in their upcoming meetings and then sent back to City Council for a final decision.





Kolar pointed out that after the last round of Strategic Planning meetings in 2011, RCOC calculated the cost of addressing the current and projected needs identified by the communities on county roads alone. The total came to just over \$2 billion worth of road needs expected between 2011 and 2021. Kolar expects this figure to have increased since then.

Also, at the meetings, the RCOC administrators share with local officials important developments at the Road Commission, such as new technology initiatives, and convey financial news.

The Strategic Planning meetings will take place through May. Once they are completed, RCOC will compile a report summarizing the information gathered at the



Act now, RCOC Intersection too dangerous to wait

The Road Commission for Oakland County is estimating the total cost of projects to be under construction this year at

Unfortunately, none of that money is going toward making the high-speed, low-visibility intersection of 10 Mile and Napier roads any

The speed limit on 10 Mile is 50 miles per

hour. And when you're eastbound on that hill approaching Napier, you better be ready for vehicles on Napier pulling out onto 10 Mile or crossing it. Or, be prepared for vehicles westbound on 10 Mile turning south onto Napier. Likewise, those drivers on Napier have to make a very quick decision to pull out on to 10 Mile, especially when the setting

can't do anything about it. For many of the higher-volume/speed roadways, the City of Novi does not own or control the roadway, according to Clay Pearson, city manager, so Novi can only work with the Road Commission for Oakland County or

Statistics can be boring, but they prove a point. At the risk of overwhelming readers with numbers:

 A SEMCOG (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments) report shows daily traffic on 10 Mile at 6,070 eastbound west of Napier, and 4,930 westbound east of Napier.

• There were 20 accidents reported at the intersection from 2006-10, but the casualty ratio is the highest in the city at .550.

Paving of Napier from 10 Mile north to Grand River was accomplished a few years ago, and paving from 10 Mile south to Eight Mile will, hopefully, happen in 2016.

That's an improvement, but it still doesn't address the safety issues at the intersection of Napier and 10 Mile where another personal-injury accident occurred just last

In the RCOC's Strategic Planning Process for the past three years, one of its long-term measures includes improving the intersection. But, as the Novi News reported last month, residents in the area are begging for action now by asking the RCOC to make this part of its short-term solution.

Pearson said Novi is "ready and encouraging moving on design, budgeting and construction for improvements to Napier Road up to and including the intersection with 10 Mile Road."

Lannie Young, Lyon Township's supervisor, said the project (traffic signal, turn lanes, bypass lanes, etc.) is estimated at \$3.5 million. The good news is that federal funds are available to help cover 80 percent of the cost with the county contributing 10 percent and Novi and Lyon Township both adding 5 per-

The bad news? Those federal funds won't be available until 2016 at the earliest. For the folks who have to deal with that intersection daily, three years is too

Taking on challenges of next two years in U.S. Senate

Encouraging news emerges on home permit front

Based on single-family new home permit data compiled by the Home Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan in its Southeastern Michigan Residential Building Activity Report, a total of 250 single-family home permits were issued in Macomb. Oakland. St. Clair and Wayne counties in January 2013.

From a year-over-year perspective, permit activity in January was nearly 84 percentage points higher than January 2012 (136). This year's January total is also the fastest to start a year since 2007, Finally, from a trailing 12-month perspective. southeastern Michigan reached a total of 3,758 permits which is 46 percent higher than January 2012 (2,569) and the highest level since September 2007 (3.849).

Michael Stoskopf, CEO of the Home Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan, said, 'We've off to a great start," following an improving 2012. "In January, we're off to our best start since 2007.

"Existing home inventories are very low. That has a definite positive effect on new home construction."





In Demand: Lincoln Looks Beyond Shortages of MKZ



ter—Lincoln dealers and many customers remain eager to get their hands on the short-ofsupply MKZ as quickly

as they can. Still, there's the intriguing possibility that the current shortages of the first of the completely new line of Lincoln vehicles will end up enhancing Lincoln's brand equity, at least in the long run.

For now, Lincoln and MKZ clearly remain in a fix. After a months-long brandrepositioning effort that began last fall and has involved everything from Abraham Lincoln in TV commercials to dredging up of the old Lincoln Motor Company name for the division, Lincoln made a big and successful splash last month with a couple of Super Bowl commercials.

Lincoln has followed that up with its buzz-worthy "Sound and Vision" project with Beck, re-imagining David Bowie in a sound-immersive concert facilitated

with state-of-the art technology. The car clearly is a cut above Lincolns of old, with a distinctive design that also has established a style language for future Lincolns. Prices for MKZ start at \$35,925 for a front-wheel-drive model with a 240-horsepower 2.0-liter turbocharged, four-cylinder engine. They can range up to around \$50,000 for a well-equipped, all-wheel-drive model, the same price segment as competitors Acura TL, Audi A4, BMW 328i, Cadillac CTS and Mercedes-Benz C-Class.

MKZ offers six-speed or continuously empty or half-full for variable automatic transmissions. Mileage comes in at 22 mpg city/31 highway/25 combined for the all-wheel-drive versions, better than most of its market segment competitors.

Amenities include standard adaptive LED headlamps and taillights, 10-way power driver and front passenger seats; sync and MyLincoln Touch; and driver'sseat memory, as well as options such as lane-departure warning and prevention, inflatable rear seat belts, adaptive cruise control and heated and cooled seats in

Ford has successfully whetted a great deal of interest among the younger demographic that Lincoln now is seeking for its reimagined brand, even though so far there's only one of the four new products available that are envisioned for the line over the next few years. In fact, Lincoln is attracting many consumers who probably never had thought of the brand in its crustier incarnation, which lasted until about two months ago.

"About 90 percent of our online shopping of the brand represents first-time

So it's too bad, then, that Lincoln hasn't even come able to supply the demand for the forthe brand.

new MKZ that it has been creating so effectively. Sales of the new MKZ in February were merely 945 units, about 62 percent below sales a year earlier of the old version of the vehicle.

The reason is a bottleneck in the inspection process of MKZs coming off the line at the Hermosillo, Mexico, plant where the vehicle is made. Ford has gotten its plant in Flat Rock involved to attempt to expedite some inspections.

Lincoln expects dealers to have normal stocking levels by early April but has been steadfast about not shortcutting

the inspection process-ensuring that the cars display top-notch quality once they do reach eager purchasers. "You need to get the first new chance at these buyers right," Kowaleski said.

But is there something to be said for the possibility that the cachet of the recast Lincoln brand, and of the MKZ itself, could be enhanced by its current scarcity? After all, many an auto executive has said that they'd

rather produce one unit too few of a new car than one unit too many. Many luxury brands ranging from Audi to Ferrari deliberately work a little paucity of supply into their calculations to generate yearnings for their vehicles that boost brand equity and dealer and corporate profits.

No-this isn't a deliberate scenario for Lincoln. The company would much rather have enough MKZs on hand already -moving crisply off dealer lots every day, getting into the national car "park" and creating favorable impressions -- than making everyone wait.

There's simply too much goodwill to be earned and re-earned in the early days of the brand's overhaul for any kind of scarcity of MKZ to be of benefit. But there is much to be gained simply by ensuring that each car is flawless, especially given some of the launch recalls that Ford has sustained lately.

In short, maybe down the road, after the brand has been clearly re-established, there could be a new Lincoln model where output is deliberately curtailed, but Lincoln isn't there yet.


