### **Novi detective shoots** scam suspect in Detroit

Joint operation to bust fraudulent auto parts scheme

A Novi police detective fired his gun and wounded a 37-year-old man during a joint operation March 21 with the United States Secret Service that was aimed at apprehending that man along with another involved in a scam to defraud local auto dealers of auto

parts.
The 37-year-old man was attempting to flee police when he drove his vehicle at the Novi officer, and that's when shots were fired. The man was wounded while in the car and is currently in a Detroit hospital being treated

No other injuries were reported during the

According to David Molloy, Novi's director of public safety/chief of police, for the last several weeks, investigators from the Novi Police Department have been working on a joint investigation with the U.S. Secret Service regarding the fraudulent purchase of several thousand dollars of auto parts from metro Detroit car dealerships.





### Novi voters could be

### asked to update city charter soon

Novi voters will most likely see ballot questions relating to changes in the city's charter in the coming year.

City Council on March 11 approved putting together a committee to look at updating some specific areas in the 36year-old charter. Changes could come with things like a new penalty structure for delinquent taxes as well as the city's financial practices.

Pearson said the charter is best described as the "local constitution" for the city, so the process for changing it is intentionally careful. He emphasized this will not be a charter revision, but rather just some amendments.

"A revision contemplates a fundamental or 'wholesale' re-examination of the entire charter document so that it can be re-enacted or recreated without having to maintain the general form, scheme and structure of the former charter," he said. "An amendment on the other hand, is a narrower concept that implies that the general plan and scope of the charter and city will be maintained, but with corrections that relate to details, rather than fundamen-

According to Pearson, there is no legal or formal limit on the number of ballot questions that can be submitted at any one election, but usually the length of the ballot itself limits the number to no more than six questions

"I believe that group represents a good mix of expertise, experience, and perspective that can review different options and prioritize them back to us. Gatt said in his recommendation.

The committee will also review any outdated language. Wording around millage rates will probably be updated to reflect current specifics. Gatt said the rates have changed over the year so the reference in the charter could change accordingly. This does not

mean rates will go up. In his recommendation, Gatt also referenced City Council compensation. He stated the fixed rates for elected officials from 1969 are not commensurate with the duties and responsibilities today and can be adjusted while still keeping the essentially-volunteer community service.

Council member Terry Margolis said she would like to see the council's pay stay at its current rate. She sees their duties as a volunteer board. The mayor receives \$20 per meeting and council members get \$15 a meeting.



### Novi-based Lotus Bank executives bashed Indians, lawsuit says

Executives at Lotus Bank in Novi are accused of berating two Indian customers and exchang ing e-mails calling Indi ans by derogatory names, according to a lawsuit filed in Oakland County

Circuit Court. The lawsuit, naming bank president Neal Searle and executive vice presidents Richard Bauer and John Westerheide, says the bank violat ed the civil rights of Jasit Takhar and Anil Gupta by creating a hostile busi-

Lotus, with a branch in incorporated in 2007 to serve metro Detroit's growing Indian commu nity. Fourteen of its 17 board members are of Indian ethnicity, as are about 30% of its custom-

The lawsuit stems from a dispute over a \$1.4-million mortgage that Takhar and Gupta obtained from Lotus in 2008 to buy a Travelodge in Jackson.

According to the lawsuit, the men told the bank in the spring of 2010 that business was down, and they likely would have trouble mak ing timely payments. A oan officer told them they could remain up to 90 days behind and not

face foreclosure. A few months later, according to the lawsuit Searle threatened foreclosure and said, "I don't care what your Indian buddies told you. I make the decisions. Do you understand English?'

Takhar and Gupta allege the bank continued to threaten foreclosure, even after they became current in their

He said there are three dealerships in Novi that have been defrauded in this scheme, includ ing Marty Feldman Chevrolet and Kia. The dealership was called by the two men on March 20, reportedly in the attempt to pull another scam. The dealership had informed the investigators of the call and order, which led to the

Molloy said at 9 a.m. on Thurs day morning, investigators participated in a coordinated operation involving the delivery of auto parts to the suspects in the vicinity of Warren Road and Grandville Street in northwest Detroit. Once the transaction was com-

pleted and officers announced their presence and intent to arrest, one of the suspects, a 40year-old man, surrendered immediately and was taken into custo dy. Molloy said the second suspect, the 37-year-old man, entered his vehicle and attempted to run over the Novi detective who was on an adjacent sidewalk abutting

Molloy said police attempted to box the man in but he swerved to get through. The suspect driver had an opportunity to go down a clear street, but instead pointed his vehicle in the direction of the Novi officer, who has not

been named vet. "In fear for his life, the detective discharged his duty weapon to stop the threat," Molloy

After the shooting, the 37year-old suspect remained in the vehicle, fled the scene. and was pursued by assisting marked patrol units from the Michigan State Police. The suspect ultimately crashed his vehicle in the area of Piedmon Street and Plymouth Road, He then fled on foot, but was eventually apprehended by the Michigan State Police troopers According to Molloy, the scam

reportedly involved the two suspects calling local auto dealers to order \$3,000-\$5,000 in parts at a time. They would ask that the parts be delivered to a predetermined location. They paid for the parts with fraudu

#### **TECHNOLOGY USED TO IDENTIFY SUSPECT**

The suspect who was shot while trying to run down a Novi police office in Detroit March 21 was identified at the hospital using leading-edge law enforcement technology called CLEMIS Blue Check. It is a portable fingerprint scanner and identifiration device that ties into the fingerprint and electronic criminal records managed by Courts and Lav Enforcement Management Informa

tion System (CLEMIS). CLEMIS Blue Check is about the size of a mobile phone. It uses Bluetooth technology to connect with the Mobile Data Computer (MDC) in a nearby police car. A police officer places the suspect's thumb on the CLEMIS Blue Check screen: it scans the thumborint electronically: then relays the information to the MDC which is tied into CLEMIS' fingerprint and criminal records database. If it gets a hit, the suspect's information appears on the MDC screen within seconds

There are approximately 150 CLEMIS Blue Check devices deployed in the field among CLEMIS agencies in southeast Michigan.

### Education creates lessons to last a lifetime

s I sat around the kitchen table A trying to decide what to take in ninth grade, my dad suggesttrying to decide what to take in ed wood shop. Why, I will never know. Looking back, I think he suggested that I take the class because he thought it might help me. I think he wanted me to get better using tools, know how to

be productive. I think he also understood that part of life is knowing how to create something for others. He thought wood shop might help I remember two things

about wood shop. First, I

was initially very uncom-

fortable in that class.

My father was a han-Steve Matthews dy man, but I wasn't. I did not know tools and there seemed to be a lot of students in that class who did. They got started right away on projects that I won-

dered if I would ever learn how to do. The other thing I remember about wood shop is making wooden bowls on the lathe. The first block of wood that I tried to make into a bowl flew off the lathe when I was working on it. I had not used enough glue or pressure to attach the wood to the wheel of the lathe. The wood survived, although the student on the lathe next to me was sure surprised when

the wood clattered to the floor at his feet. By the time that class was over I had made three wooden bowls. I carved them on the lathe, sanded them smooth, and used a good lacquer to seal them. They were not identical. Each had its own shape. They were really the first things I had made by myself in my fourteen years of life. I was proud of them. My parents

In the end the bowls were donated to our small church to be used to collect the offering. I thought that was a good use for them. They had a purpose. I was allowed to collect the offering each Sunday and it felt good to see the bowls that I had made

being used. As I have visited my parents over the years those bowls are still being used at church. I made those bowls 40 years ago. The wood has been smoothed over time by thousands of hands. They have some nicks here and there from being dropped, but overall they are in great shape. I think of those bowls every now and then. A memory gets sparked and I can see the classroom, the teacher, and the lathe. I can't remember the teacher's name but I can see him helping me figure

out how to make those bowls. That teacher had thousands of students pass through his class. Many of them were like me. We did not know anything. We were almost dangerous. He took us from knowing nothing to creating something. Not only have those bowls lasted, they have had a purpose; they have meant something.

That class really was not the most important class in my life. It did not push me to become a woodworker. I do not own a lathe today. Yet, I can still see that teacher taking the time to teach me some thing that to him was very important.

Sure, it was his job. He made a good living working with 13-, 14- and 15-year-old junior high school students, but he took pride in his work. He did not have any preconceived notions that he would turn us into master craftsmen. But he was able to pass along, to me at least, the idea that creating something for others is a


good thing.

And that was one thing my parents wanted me to learn. I doubt that they knew my wood shop teacher. What they had was confidence that this teacher would help me learn lessons that they were trying to teach me. They had the belief that the school system was a partner with them in helping a gangly, awk-ward, and shy 14-year-old turn into some one who would have the ability to think of and help others.

And I hope that's what the parents and community members in our district think. I hope that you consider us partners in helping teach lessons that you try to teach your children, grandchildren and

Sure it is our job to be in school every day. Yet, I hope that you believe, and that you see, that we take our jobs seriyour child is important to us and that we are going to take the time and make the effort to help that child learn lessons that

#### **Guns and families**

The most recent young man's suicide is another horrifying example of easy access to a loaded gun resulting in tragedy. According to the Detroit Free Press, by all accounts he was a normal 13-year-old with all of the emotions of that age group. Also consider Mrs. Layne, who was just convicted of killing her grandson with a firearm. Her gun didn't protect her, her husband or her grandson

A few years ago, the Rochester and Troy communities were devastated by a brother killing his sister, followed by a high school junior who killed herself with a shotgun right before Thanksgiving. I asked a family member, who was a high school teacher in Rochester at the time, what made these kids different from the other kids he sees every day. His response? "They have guns

in their homes." There were 19,392 suicides by firearm in 2010. Recent studies show that the risk of suicide by firearm is 17 times greater if you keep a weapon in your home. It is 22 times more likely that a firearm will be used in suicide, accidental shooting or criminal assault than it will be used to protect you in self-defense. Just because you can keep a firearm in your home, doesn't mean it's a good decision to do so.

In fact, some students from Mumford High School in Detroit (an EAA school) say they're afraid to come to school and describe Mumford as a "hostile environment." "We are getting half an education in a complete correctional facility," one student said. It's interesting, but not surprising, that Ms. Posthumus ncluded a section effectively exempting her local Grand

Rapids School District from this EAA program. If our legislators were actually interested in "improving schools" they would address the real reasons kids fail — poverty. If we think our local suburban schools are immune to this takeover, don't be so sure. That's where the tax money is and Wall Street investors want it. Their first step is the continued undermining of public schools. Public schools are not failing.

The state Senate will be voting on this bill after spring break. Please contact your state senator and ask them to oppose this EAA expansion, as Gov. Snyder will sign it if it gets to him.







## In-law suites, storage space among abode buyers' top picks

tant life decision, and many factors can influence the home choices buyers make.

The National Association of Realtors 2013 Profile of Buyers' Home Feature Preferences exam ines the features buyers prefer when it comes to purchasing a home, as well as the differences in preferences when it comes to factors such as region, demographics and household composition. The survey captures buyers who purchased a home between 2010 and

"Deciding where to live comes with a lot of options, but buyers quickly realize that some features are more important than others when it comes to choosing the right house for them." said NAR President Gary Thomas, broker owner of Evergreen Realty, in Villa Park, Calif, "Buyers need to have a clear idea of what features are important to them and know where they are willing to compromise; in this respect, Realtors can bring buyers home. Realtors visit hundreds of homes with buyers each vear, and have a unique understanding of what buyers value in their local markets."

Geography and demography strongly influence what buyers value in a home. The typical recently purchased home was 1,860 square feet and was built in 1996. Repeat buyers, buyers of new homes, married couples and families with children typically purchased larger homes. First ime buyers and single women tended to buy older homes. The typical buyer purchased a hom with three bedrooms and two full bathrooms. Slightly over half of the homes purchased were on a

Southerners tend to buy newer homes; they were more likely to want a home less than five years old and in a wooded lot with trees when compared to other regions. Not surprisingly, buyers in the South also placed a higher importance on central air conditioning

While more than three-fourths -78 percent - of all buyers pur chased a home with a garage. garages were more popular among new-home buyers, Mid-

Forty-one percent of homes pur chased had a basement, but this feature was more popular among buyers in the Midwest and Northeast. Northeastern buyers also valne hardwood floors more than people in other regions. Southerners typically bought the largest home at 2,000 square feet. Those in the Northeast followed closely behind with a typical home purchase of

Among buyers 55 and older, 42 percent considered finding a single-level home very important compared to just 11 percent of buyers under age 35. Single wom-en also placed higher importance on single-level homes, while single men wanted finished basements. Both single men and married couples placed higher importance on new kitchen appliances.

Among all 33 home features in the survey, central air conditioning was the most important to the most buyers; 65 percent of buyers considered this feature very important. The next most impor tant feature was a walk-in closet in the master bedroom; 39 percent of buyers considered this feature very important. Closely behind was having a home that was cable-, satellite TV-, and/or Internet ready, as well as an en-suite master bath-

When it came to actually buying a home, among buyers who consid ered central AC and cable-, satellite TV-, and/or Internet ready very or somewhat important, 94 percent bought a home with these features. The next most common feature was an eat-in kitchen; 89 percent of buyers who thought this was important purchased a home with an eat-in kitchen.

The features on which buyers placed the highest dollar value were waterfront properties and homes that were less than five vears old. Thirty-two percent of buyers would be willing to pay a median of \$5,420 more for a home on the waterfront, and 40 percent of buyers would be willing to pay a median of \$5,020 more for a home that was less than five vears old.

The rooms that buyers were willing to pay the most for were a basement and an in-law suite. Thirty-three percent of buyers an of \$3,200 more for a home with a basement, and 20 percent of buyers would be willing to pay a median of \$2,920 more for a home with an in-law suite.

When it came to rooms that buyers want in a home, 55 percent of buyers thought it was very portant to have a living room, although buyers in the Northeast placed more importance on a home with a dining room. Buyers aged 55 and older placed more importance on a bedroom on the main level of the house. Buyers aged 35 to 54 placed more importance on a laundry room, while those with children placed more importance on a family room.

The two most common rooms buyers were willing to spend more for were a laundry room and a den/study/home office/ library. Sixty-three percent of buyers who did not purchase a home with a laundry room would be willing to pay \$1,590 more for a home with this room. The decision went bevond considering whether a combined murder/suicide should be disclosed. essentially holding no need to be disclosed because thev are not state law. It has also been argued that this court's opinion could apply to such diverse circumstances as a past rape on the offender living next door, or even a high neighborhood. In any event, caution being the better part of valor, you may want to consider discussing t with your lawyer before issuing a disclosure statement





#### Car Report Chevy Volt needs ads that are as advanced as the car



Chevy advertising the end of its relationship with Goodby Silverstein, not long after the brand shucked the ineffective slogan con-

ceived by the agency — the next move by McCann should be this: a fresh, significant new campaign for Volt.

And that may be just what Chevy's new chief marketing officer, Tim Mahoney, orders up upon taking the reins of his new job after a highly regarded two-year stint as CMO of Volkswagen of America.

Sales-wise, Volt has continued tacking to and fro depending on how many of the car GM is manufacturing and, especially, how well the company is doing in meeting the strong demand for a Californiaspecific, car-pool-lane-eligible version of the plug-in hybrid that was introduced last year.

In February, for example, Volt sales were 43 percent ahead of January, but that was mainly because GM was short of stock for a while, not because of a huge surge in underlying demand for the car.

GM plans to build as many as 36,000 Volts and other plug-in hybrids (including the start of production of the sibling new Cadillac ELR) this year, or about 1,500 to 3,000 a month, according to Bloomberg, while it sold about 30,000 Volts and similar Opel Ampera models last year.

That would represent an output increase of as much as 20 percent, but in a U.S. market where electrified vehicles

Now that the other acceptability challenge, don't expect the other Chevy shoe has dropped for demand for Volt genuinely to mushroom anytime soon, no matter how good its advertising might become.

> And yet, Volt's inconsistent sales performance masks the much more formidable reality of the car itself. Plug-in hybrids remain the type of

electrified vehicle that makes the most sense because they release the driver from dependence only on a battery-fed

And while competing makes have been introducing their own plug-ins, Chevrolet Volt remains not only the pioneer for this technology but also very much the face of it. Just as Toyota's Prius brand still dominates conventional hybrids, there's no reason Volt shouldn't continue to be the best-selling plug-in hybrid by far.

But from the very launch of Volt three years ago, GM arguably has done a poor overall job of communicating that identity and has failed to mainstream the vehicle perceptually among American consumers so that Volt would have a shot at joining the mainstream of U.S. auto sales.

One of GM's first mistakes was assigning Volt a status not very much unlike all

models under the "Chevy Runs Deep" tag line and

positioning. Clearly, the idea was for the acknowledged cutting-edge technology of Volt to provide a halo to the rest of the Chevy lineup.

brand re-dressing conceived by then-GM Chief Marketing Officer Joel Ewanick didn't do much for the entire Chevrolet lineup, it did a particular disservice to Volt. This was a car that Chevy should have set apart unequivocalfrom the rest of its brand, right out of the chute, instead of largely subsuming Volt's unique identity into a re-branding of the entire marque that unfortunately went very awry.

Chevy's more recent Volt-only TV-ad campaign featuring testimonials about the car from real owners was more effective and got closer to communicating the passion that many Volt owners feel for their plug-in.
