



# **Just One of Those Days**


Condominium living has its advantages, but it can cause problems for dog lovers in more ways than one, as a flustered matron claimed recently.

# **THOUGHTS**

The key to satisfying relationships with other people, including other family members, is learning how to love. The person who knows how to love cannot help but be considered loveable by other people. The problem in the whole love process lies in faulty perception and inadequate definition of the term.

Love is an emotion, and everyone thinks they know what it means, based on their "feelings." That gives rise to all kinds of misconceptions, and young people are usually thoroughly confused about the fact that there are, supposedly, many different kinds of love. Actually, there is only one - but behind the word "love" lie many motives

The earliest feelings of love are all involved with the self. Small children learn to copy the expressions of caring from other humans, because they realize very early in life that those expressions get good results. Self-preservation is very important, and learning cause and effect is absolutely necessary when one is small and

When the child expresses love, it is not love for another in the same sense we adults may know it. The child is necessarily completely self-centered, and the expression of love is a thank-you for treating the loved object (the self) in a manner which makes the self more comfortable and secure. When that treatment wavers, as is necessary for disciplining the toddler, and the parent must say "no," the child feels less secure and comfortable, and the self is frustrated, so the child fires back, "You bad," or "I hate you." It seems that you have withdrawn your positive support of the child's every wish and whim, and retaliation is the immediate

As the child grows older, it is possible to explain that loving someone does not mean giving into their immediate desires, when greater safety or security in the long haul is at stake. That is the beginning of the child's education about time, and concern for another. Children can understand that "giving in" to immediate desire may be easier and more pleasant for a parent, but that if they really love the child, they have to say "no" when giving in is not good for the child.

Unfortunately, this is the first stage of parent-child

problems, if the parent has never grown out of the self-love stage. The parent who thinks only of loving the self will see the child as a servant who will provide love for the parent, and it then becomes a tug-of-war of two "children." With no adult to referee, or set a good example, the relationship will be off to a bad start.

If the parent will only love the child when the child is showering the parent with positive responses, expressions of love, total worship and agreement, and is being a credit to the parent, the child will "catch on" that love must be bought. When the child exhibits independence, the parent will revert to the "you bad," or "I hate you" behavior that belongs to childhood. Worse than that, however, is the fact that the immature parent will then add insult to injury by making the child feel guilty about his or her own individuality.

Love should never be confused with possessiveness or jealousy. A parent who controls or stifles another life does not "love" but is rather immature, and bent on self-love or personal security. The child is held tight to the parent because the parent needs someone to lean on. Self-love demands that the child be sacrificed for the parent.

When that happens, and the parent has been successful, development of the child is restricted, and the parent and child become as one. Mutual hatred is usually the outcome, and the two are bound tightly in a love-hate-guilt-blame relationship, and everyone

Parents lose their adult children unless there is friendship and respect, as well as love in the relationship. The adult who is secure and appreciates the individual self does not become a slave to the child, and does not expect the child to be a slave to the parent. The child can then freely love the adult with no fear of the "strings" that might be attached to the relationship.

We all want someone to love us enough, that they



want what is right for us, and best for us, regardless of how it affects them. Unless we are capable of loving someone that unselfishly, however, we cannot believe that another person is capable of loving us in that manner. That is one of the great difficulties of love. It is also one of the great difficulties of parenthood! When we try to do the right thing for a loved one, we often must hear the accusation, "You don't love me (or you would let me have it my way)."

That, in fact, is where young people often get confused about love. If they have not learned that true love means doing what you think is best for the loved one, in spite of your own wishes and wants, they often become victims of selfish and self-centered people who claim to love them. It often happens to adults that don't really know what love is either. When it is confused with desire or possessiveness, it is even harder to keep the meaning straight.

A girl who knows what love really means, will not take a chance on "trapping" someone she loves, into marriage or parenthood, when it means the end of educational or career opportunities for that person. That is selfish love directed inward, not outward.

By the same token, a man who talks a girl into "proving" her love, when the result will be regret and/or disallusionment, or other unhappiness, does not "love" the girl, but only the self.

On a more adult level, the woman or man who deliberately sets out too woo away someone else's husband or wife does not love the target of attention, but only the self. That type of person is a poor bet for a "love" affair, or a second spouse, and there are a lot of "sadder but wiser" adults in our society who will attest

People do sometimes "fall out of love" as a result of loving unwisely. They do on occasion meet someone worthy of love, who is in the same position. True love is not a matter of possession, however, between parent and child, or two adults. Love can exist without ownership. There is a great deal of satisfaction in finding someone who is truly loveable. It is not absolutely necessary to create destruction because of it. "I love, and therefore, I must have" is strictly selfish and a sign of immature love. It is still the cry of the baby demanding instant, personal satisfaction.







# Is Vandalism on the Rise in Independence?

Are the residents of Independence Township facing an increase in the incidents of vandalism?

Both Bob Wark, of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, and Charles Kimbel, acting chief of the Independence Township Police Services, feel that the amount of vandalism is up. Neither man could substantiate their feelings, as neither had their records right in front of them, but Kimbel stated that, "There isn't a day that goes by without some type of vandalism reported.'

The malicious type of vandalism, as opposed to that which causes costly property damage, is the type seen most frequently by the police officers in the township. Mailboxes have been a target for vandals most recently, with firecrackers exploded inside of the closed mailbox, or the box being torn from the ground and run over by a

The younger kids are the ones mostly involved in destroying or doing damage to property. Usually, the kids are out trying to have a good time, and don't really know how, or where, to properly direct their energies so as not to cause any problems for anyone.

Those doing the damage aren't normally apprehended. Usually, a noise from outside is heard, and possibly a car driving away is seen, but not enough can be seen to give police a description to work from.

Parents are also a problem, according to Wark. If their children are caught damaging someone's property, the parents often don't pay for that damage.

"A lot of parents don't care. They've abdicated their responsibility as parents, and given it to teachers and police officers. They really don't care what damage their kids do, as long as you don't bother them. A phrase we hear a lot is 'I just don't know what to do with him (or

The one thing that both officers agree causes, or influences, a lot of vandalism is the ability of teenagers to drink, legally, at a younger age. They would both like to see the drinking age raised to 21 again, and can't really see why it was lowered in the first place. Very often, young kids, maybe 13 or 14, will pay an older person to buy beer or wine for them, proceed to drink it, and maliciously destroy someone's property.

Mobility also causes some trouble. Kids now have their own cars very frequently, or at least have access to the family car, so they can do damage in a larger area.

Kimbel feels that the Pine Knob concerts, or more correctly, some of the people attending the concerts, cause a lot of problems. Of the 6 to 12 thousand people at a concert, only a few make trouble, but those are the ones seen by the police. These few have no respect for private property, and after drinking, they go tearing around subdivisions doing a lot of damage.

# Fire Department Has Truck **Stolen During Emergency**

The Fourth of July was not entirely a day of celebration for the Independence Township Fire Department. While responding to a personal injury accident at Waldon and Sashabaw Roads between 11:30 p.m. and midnight, the red pickup truck with a camper top used by Captain Dale Bailey was stolen.

The municipal vehicle, used to store the department's equipment, was numbered but not lettered leading Chief Frank Ronk to speculate that perhaps the thief or thieves did not realize it was an official vehicle at first. It had been parked some 100 feet down Waldon to alert approaching traffic that an accident was ahead.

When the emergency situation was over, Bailey's truck was gone. But, as Ronk explained, who would have thought to watch a truck when people were injured and in need of assistance?

The vehicle was found vesterday in a field in the Rochester area, stuck in the mud and stripped of most of its equipment. It is now in the custody of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, who are checking it out for any possible clues.


Ronk could not give any damage estimate other than to describe it as "extensive." He has not seen the vehicle himself and could not give any idea of when it would be returned.

The incident has caused him to consider taking extra personnel along on calls now just to keep an eye on the equipment while the others handle the emergency.





The government has been giving federally pensioned veterans and their survivors assistance with one hand and taking it away with the other. This practice, however, will finally stop if the recent House-passed veterans bill becomes law, reports Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-19th Dist.).

receive both a veterans' pension and social security find themselves penalized when they receive a cost-of-living adjustment in their social security benefits. Because of an income ceiling for veterans pensioners that is very low, the veterans' pensions are reduced to keep them at the legal ceiling when they receive an increase from social security.

Presently, veterans who

"Veterans, like everyone else, are victimized by the ravages of inflation. When the Veterans Administration cuts a veteran's benefit because he received a social security cost-of-living increase, that veteran may still have the same dollar amount of income, but actually loses ground to inflation.

"The injustice in the present procedure is magnified when you consider how many times it is played out around the country. Of the nearly 5,470,000 people receiving veterans' pensions, about 80 percent receive social security as well. Many of these people rely on these two benefits as their sole means of support.

Under present law, the income ceiling for veterans who are single is \$2,770 a year, and \$5,070 if there is a dependent. To be eligible, besides meeting the income limitations, the vet must be permanently and totally disabled, or 65 years or older.

The House-passed bill, Broomfield explained, raises the income ceiling to \$4,000 for single pensioners, and \$5,200 if there is a dependent. The income ceiling has also been tied to the Consumer Price Index to provide for inflation-combating cost-of-living increases.

"While the income ceilings are not grandiose by any stretch of the imagination, the new levels do put our veterans above the poverty line, and with the cost-of-living increase provision, they are able to stay there despite inflation," Broomfield said.

The income ceiling adjustment provisions are part of a major revision of the veterans pension laws. This bill, which the House of Representatives passed by an overwhelming vote of 398 to 5, must now be taken up by the Senate, Broomfield explained.

# Springfield May Lease Property for Future Fire Hall

In an abbreviated forty minute session the Springfield Township Board met Wednesday, July 5 at the township

Due to minor procedural changes two items approved last month were re-approved this month, final plat approval for Springfield Acres and the liquor license transfer for The Springfield.

Board members agreed to sign a contract with planning consultant Tod Kilroy of Community Planning for the sum of \$400 per month.

In response to a letter, permission was given to put a banner up in downtown Davisburg and to close off Broadway for a short time for a parade during Springfield Summerfest scheduled for July 29.

Under new business, Dr. Herbert Swanson was reappointed to the planning commission and a seventh position created to be filled by Michael Barron, a local contractor. The additional position was created, according to Supervisor Collin Walls, to spread out representation both geographically and professionally and to prevent a possible tie vote. Springfield may have a planning commission of up to nine members.

A petition presented to the board resulted in the setting of a special meeting for July 25 at the township hall for the purpose of discussing the leasing of one acre

of property located on Dixie Highway and Rattalee Lake Na Road to be used as a site for a future fire hall. The property is owned by the Oakland County Road Commission and available for \$6,000 on a 40-year lease with a 59-year renewal option for \$1. The \$6,000 includes a survey and a fence provided by the OCRC.

Walls himself had circulated the petition because an 1857 law requires that property acquisition be voted on at the annual meeting or at a special meeting of the electors. Walls felt such a long-term lease was in the same category as acquisition.

The board passed a resolution stating social security would not be withheld from seasonal or parttime employees. It is not necessary for less than 600 hours of work per year and not required for seasonal or parttime employees. Walls stated the hours of such employees

A parade will feature 4-H groups, local groups, antique cars and various floats. Events will be held at the arena at the fairgrounds featuring local horse


groups. Craft booths will be set up at the Youth Activities Center with a dance held there that evening from 8 p.m.-1 a.m.





# ~ Know-it-All **Grow-it-All**

This common palm is also known as butterfly, golden butterfly, golden feather, cane, areca or Madagsacar palm. As one would suspect by the many common names, this is a very popular plant. And the reason it has earned such popularity is by being very durable and relatively easy to grow. The areca grows in clumps and has very graceful feathery fronds that are composed of slender leaflets. The fronds very often grow 3 feet or more on a 5-foot plant.


A 6 to 10 inch rate of growth in a year's time is not unusual. As the plant matures, it becomes ringed with bambox-like scars where there was once leaves. Because the palm cannot be pruned (if the main leader is damaged growth ceases and the plant dies), and they will eventually outgrow their space, they will have to be given to someone who has a high ceiling or placed outside in a frost-free climate.

The butterfly palm does best in bright indirect or curtain filtered light. If grown in artificial light, 400 foot candles for 12 hours a day is required. The soil must be moist (not soggy) at all times. If allowed to dry out too much or kept too moist, the tips will turn brown.

Spider mites can sometimes be a problem with palms. Webbing or white flecks on the leaves denotes mites and their damage. I have had much success with palms with mites by placing the entire plant in a garbage bag with a no-pest strip and leaving it, out of direct sun, for ten days. The strip will not kill the eggs themselves but it will kill the mites as they hatch.

Palms can be fed on a monthly basis from early spring to late fall with an all-purpose houseplant fertilizer. Any re-potting that needs to be done should wait until spring using a general all purpose packaged potting soil.


Propagation can be done by division of the older plants, although seeds are the most common means. Because the young plants are usually unattractive, most people prefer to purchase plants that are already established.



If everything is in perfect balance - the light, water, fertilizer and the general health of the palm, you may be surprised with tiny yellow flowers.

## How to Refreeze Meat

You can refreeze meat IF...and there are several if's involved. If the meat has been thawed properly...(which means in the refrigerator; rather than on the counter at room temperature)...and if the meat is still fresh and good...and if the meat is still cold and/or still has some ice crystals left in it, then you can safely refreeze meat. You do need to recognize, though, that each time a cut of meat is frozen and thawed, you DO loose some of the goodness you paid for to begin with. There's a drying tendency, due to loss of juices, in the process of thawing and refreezing, and quality may change some...but it is possible to refreeze meat. The better method though, is to keep the thawed meat in the refrigerator and cook it as to keep the thawed meat in the refrigerator and cook it as soon as possible. If you still can't use it quickly, then freeze the cooked meat. Know that it will keep for a shorter time period, though.

# WHAT'S HAPPENING

One of my favorite authors is Irving Wallace. His novels, such as "The Seven Minutes" and "The Prize" Ad his non-fiction, like "The People's Almanac" and "The Book of Lists" are fascinating. So is his newest work, "The Two," written with his daughter, Amy Wallace.

"The Two" is a biography of the original Siamese Twins, Chang and Eng. It traces their unusual life from birth in Siam (naturally) in 1811 to their almost simultaneous death in 1874.

♣The subject of these remarkable boys' lives is very interesting. How they lived and operated as one, yet two distinct individuals is well-told by Wallace.

Chang and Eng were born connected by a band of flesh that attached them by their chests. They learned very young to walk, run, swim, and exist in complete compatibility.

Surgeons world-wide claimed they could not be sparated. Thus, they became one of the greatest attractions the world had ever seen.

The twins married sisters from America and together sired 21 children. "They built their own house, opened a store, became wealthy gentlemen farmers, skilled horsebreakers, and when necessary, defended themselves with their fists."

Wallace weaves an intriging tale about Chang and ing and the most intriging is that it is true! Wallace's facts are well substantiated by letters and news articles of the period which he includes in his book.

One interesting bit of trivia I picked up while reading "The Two" is that Chang and Eng were born on May 11, in 1811 - the numerals eleven sort of symbolizes their lives - two ones, side by side to make another completely different number 11 - "The Two!"





# Green Slime and Chocolate Pudding

Jim and Mary Flemming are just two of the property owners around the upper Mill Pond who are concerned about the long-range effects of a recent dumping of dirty water into the lake.

Two weeks ago, a subcontractor was working on the sewer project on North Holcomb Road which will ultimately serve the Deer Lake Farms development. In an apparent attempt to rid the area of "loose" water interefering with his work, the foreman ran a pipe into the lake and pumped unfiltered water through it.

Although both the township and the county stopped the operation as soon as angry complaints came in from the residents. Flemming believes the damage had already been done. He declines to blame the foreman whom he says was probably just doing his job the quickest, easiest and cheapest way possible.


In spite of the halt to the pumping and the dismantling of the pipe, for days afterward the water looked like "chocolate pudding" in Flemming's words, rather disheartening to someone who had recently paid his share of \$60,000 to have the lake cleaned out.

Some of his neighbors have been fishing since then. he said, and report the fish still alive, but Flemming sees sprouting weeds and green slime on the surface of th. water. That spells pollution to him, even though the water seems to be clearing.

He says the surface will have to be skimmed and the weeds taken out somehow. His desire is to keep the "chain" clean. Water flows from the upper Mill Pond to the lower under Miller Road, through the Village Park and on into Cemetery, Greens and Maceday Lakes.

"I don't think it (the Mill Pond) can recover the way is...It's not going to clean itself up." Flemming said "That slime gets more acidic as it stays on the surface...This is just a touch, just the beginning Repercussions may take time."

What will ultimately be done about the condition of the Mill Pond's waters is not known at this time. Neither the contractor nor the subcontractor seem to be liable for the damage, but Flemming would like to make surincidents of this sort do not happen again. He would like to see future contracts with the township contain certain restrictions to prevent recurrence of pollution violations.




