Give children a double bag or container with a handle so they don't drop their treats in the highway and stop to collect them


Last but not least, inspect loose candy and check all apples before youngsters start nibbling. Report any suspicious items immediately to Police.



Parapsychology-Natural or Supernatural

Halloween is the time of "scary" things. What has been called "strange" and "supernatural," along with thoughts that are kept hidden the rest of the year, are suddenly stressed. Just as perfectly ordinary people get dressed up in scary costumes, to provide others of us with extraordinary chills and frights, so are some subjects of interest costumed for the same affect. For that reason, this seems to be a good opportunity to unmask some terms and abilities that have been weirdly costumed in the past.

The main subject of study in Parapsychology, though it can be broken down into many areas of mental and emotional ability. No more strange than musical, mathematical, or artistic genius, or any other achievement which we call talent, psychic ability alone, has been singled out as false, mystical, somehow "crooked" or imaginary.

Those who possess it try to hideit. Those who come into contact with one who has developed it, deny it, and claim it is trickery, and a great percentage of the members of society who tend to believe in it, wage an ongoing war against receptiveness.

Why is it more frightening than television? Isn't it strange that we can turn a little plastic knob in our living-room, and see and hear people that are thousands of miles away? How can we honestly believe in the telephone? How many of us can explain how an airplane, full of people, can lift off the ground and fly through the air? This is strange phenomena indeed, but we never question it, because it is so commonly experienced. We can prove it externally, and we have been taught to believe in what we can prove externally. That hardly proves that other energy forces do not exist, but we are content to remain ignorant of that which we cannot see, hear, or feel. So content, in fact, that society fought the concept of germs so small that they could not be seen by the human eye. It was only when the microscope was invented, and we had proof that could be seen, that most people accepted bacteria.

The humans that studied the affects of bacteria, and accepted the fact that there was something at work that could not be seen or heard or felt, were dealing with the "supernatural." The problem they faced was one of education and persuasion, but they were finally able to convince enough people of the logic of their investigation, and the benefits of their findings, that "germs" were accepted. Improved health for all people was the outcome. Improved mental and emotional health should be the outcome of the study of parapsychology. The affects of psychic energy have been under study for some time now. It only remains to determine the how, why, when, where, and who, and varying degrees of ability, before all shreds of weird "costuming" are torn away for good.



THOUGHTS `N THINGS

In this week's paper is included an interview that I had with a psychic who lives in Clarkston, and also some additional material on the subject of para-psychology. Much of it is a summary of material I have studied over the last few years. I feel that I should explain in this

- column, some of the reasons I have had, for my growing interest in the subject. I have no intention of annoying those who reject the concept of "extra-senses," nor do I feel called upon to defend my acknowledgement of the subject as a legitimate one for study and for discussion. I simply intend to state the facts -- the reader can choose to read or ignore at will.
- On my desk I keep a book called "The Mind In The Making." It was written in 1921, and it belonged to my father when he was a student at the University of Michigan, in 1923. I have read it, and laughed, because the world has made so much progress since then, and the book is not a classic. It is probably on a par with a medical book written at the same time. However, it's author was searching for answers, and organizing what was known at the time, and my father built on his
- knowledge, and applied it to his life and encouraged his children to have "open minds."

There was only one direction that my father appeared to be closed-minded. That was about a single radio program that we children loved -- but which we were forbidden to listen to, because it was even too far-fetched for father's open mind. That program was Buck Rogers, and it was about rockets that could go to

the moon. It was absolutely ridiculous. Needless to say, I thought of his refusal to even try to imagine such foolishness, and marveled many years later, when we watched a man walking on the moon on our television set. It taught me to keep an open mind on every subject! During my childhood, I had a girlfriend whose parents had come to this country from Holland. They were "different" from us, and though I felt sorry for my friend because her family was more formal than ours, I grew to like her parents very much. As a result, I was invited to take a trip with them, and I went.

While my friend was gone on a short trip with her father, I stayed with her mother, and she told me t' at she could tell I was a "sensitive." She said that I would understand some day, and related several psychic forum

experiences that she had had.

A couple of years later, I was in the audience when a man whose reputation was of the highest, related an experience that he and some friends had had. He was not trying to "sell" anyone anything, as my friend's mother had not had any reason to force me to believe "stories." These people simply related experiences they had had. I was fascinated at the possibility of such wonders, but simply filed them away for future study.

It was many years later that I realized that I had had a psychic experience. I have a sister who is sixteen years younger than I am. I, of course, missed her when I went away to college, and so was extremely upset when I had a "nightmare" that concerned her. I had fallen asleep in my dorm room in the middle of the afternoon, and woke up crying from a dream (though I had never had the experience before, nor have I had a similar one since.) In the dream, my four year old sister was drowning in a pool of muddy water, and I was unable to get to her. I called home, terribly distressed, and made my mother promise to watch her carefully. There never was an incident when she was in such a situation after that, and yet the dream would come back and bother me. I simply could not forget it - until many years later, when my own first-born was four, and almost drowned in a muddy sewer in which she had fallen. The dream that had "haunted me" ceased to bother me after that. The thing I had feared had happened, and it had passed, though the circumstances by which she was saved were complicated, and involved a number of coincidences. I was willing to accept the fact that there could be other energy forces besides electricity in the atmosphere, that could conduct pictures and voices. After all, I remember the first television sets and what miracles they seemed to be! On the other hand, I became busy with my family and other subjects, and forgot about psychic phenomena for years at a time. Recently, however, I was interested in all the new books that were appearing, and a number of magazine articles, and began reading a great deal more on the subject. As the same time, I had learned a lot about a number of other things, and didn't regard ESP, etc. as anything especially unusual. Naturally, I was pleased to think that I would have an opportunity to interview a real person' with psychic ability, instead of depending completely on what I could read in


DRIVE SLOWER AND DON'T BREAK THE LAW by Sharon Springborn

Eight of the ten persons who stated an opinion said that the law needs to be enforced more vigorously, while 1 person gave a 'no' answer and another one gave an answer in between a yes and no.

But, though Joseph Stadler would like to see the law more vigorously enforced, he also sees exceptions. For instance he "doesn't mean that you should slap somebody in jail for going over the speed limit, but the limit should be enforced more than it is now. The way I look at it, the faster you're going when you hit something, the more damage you'll do."


Helpful Information?

Clarkston Choral to Present "Sound Off to Music"





Clarkston Weaver Interprets Nature Through Tapestry



Beginning November 2 for ten days, Barbara Kiger of Clarkston will participate in a show and sale called Five Weavers at the Somerset Mall. The other four are from Rochester, Birmingham, Oak Park and Southfield.


Kiger has been a year in preparing for this show consisting mainly of pillows, wall hangings, throws and toys--a wide range of items. Each weaver in the show she says has a different style while Kiger herself specializes in tapestry weaving using fine threads and silk. She uses the traditional methods but adds her own contemporary interpretation.

She calls the results of her weaving "entrapments" because they are either framed under glass or encased in two pieces of lucite making the back visible also.

Most of the ideas Kiger interprets in her tapestries are taken from nature. One spectacular piece had autumn leaves as its inspiration. From a distance one would never know it was hand woven so intricate and graphic is

its design.

Still another piece, this one framed, was inspired by sea coral, one of three in varying color combinations Kiger has done. In it some of the warp threads have been woven into the back of the work while others fan out around it in an undulating fashion suggesting the movement of underwater current.

Kiger has been weaving for the past ten years but only recently made the commitment to be a full-time weaver

with a focus on tapestry and double woven sculpted forms and toys. She said its much easier now that she has limited her scope somewhat.

Once she has selected a photograph she likes, whether it be of autumn leaves, desert sands or rock formations, Kiger draws a design or "cartoon" of her interpretation of that photograph. That small cartoon then becomes one the size of the piece she will weave. The large

cartoon also includes bits of yarn glued where they will occur in the weaving. That gives her an idea of the finished effect.

Kiger has three looms, a full-size Cranbrook and a 20 inch Dorsett, both floor looms, and another small portable loom. Her yarns come from a number of sources with a stock having been built up over the years. She is

acutely aware of the rising prices of yarn saying weaving is not a "cheap hobby."

Practicality drives her to weave an occasional wall hanging and plant hangers to sell. She says they're quick work because they use coarser yarn than what is used for her tapestries.

A former interior designer, Kiger says she had some useful contacts when she started and has been

commissioned to do work for a number of companies including Fruehauf for whom she did a triptych, a three-part landscape in shades of cream and gold.

Interspersed with the time-consuming and intricate tapestries, Kiger's imagination takes flights of fancy as she uses a double-woven technique to create animals and dolls. Double-weaving creates a tube and eliminates some seams in the toys. She has created purple horses,

wooly magenta sheep, golden giraffes, and other fanciful creatures in addition to unique little pillows. Kiger says her production isn't great because weaving has not become number one in her life. Her husband Bill, a lawyer, and their three children, twins Kris and Ken, and Amy, all in elementary school, come first,

The family moved to Clarkston a couple of years ago buying a house well-suited for displaying her weaving

6 projects. A two-story foyer and an upstairs loft, shared with her children, give Kiger an ideal workspace and showcase.



Interview with a Psychic

The opportunity to interview a psychic was definitely something I had looked forward to. I had done enough background reading on the subject of "extra" senses that I didn't expect the experience to be strange, but still wasn't prepared for the absolute normality of my visit with Shirley Lynch. It was as if she was an old friend who knew my family and me, and was only commenting on what had gone on during our lifetimes, and the probability of what would happen to all of us in the future.

Anyone looking for a "scary" or "mystical" experience, would have been disappointed in the lack of fortune-teller "trappings" and paraphanalia in the Lynch household. The intelligence of the hostess, and her calm acceptance of her extra-sensory abilities, however, are notable.

Shirley Lynch has been married for twenty-seven years, and is the mother of three daughters and two sons. She has lived in Clarkston for twenty-two years, and some people have been acquainted with her ability through her predictions that appeared in a column entitled, "The Third Eye," or have been fortunate enough to watch her demonstrate some of her ability at one time or another. Still others have been so impressed with her, that they have returned to ask for help in developing their own psychic ability, or simply to get advice.

It was a cold day when my daughter and I arrived at her house, and she had a fire going, which added to the coziness of the room. It was a family-type house, and my usual curiosity took over as I observed the living room. It was not an assortment of ordinary furniture that I saw, but a collection of interesting pieces that I wanted to ask about-but didn't-because I was supposed to be concentrating on an interview. I soon realized, however, that the interesting house was the result of the personal


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freedom of choice of the occupants. I felt at home, and that the house and furnishings had life to them. It was the same feeling I had when I was a child, and read books where dolls could talk, and anything else was possible. I wondered if a scene had been deliberately "set", or an atmosphere deliberately created.

I don't generally begin an interview with any sort of suspicion or concern that things might be different than they seem, but I knew that this might be a difficult interview to deal with in writing. My hostess was well aware of the difficulties. As a matter of fact, she raised the question of disbelief amost immediately.

"I don't care whether anyone accepts psychic ability or not," she said. "I don't thing anyone should just accept it, but I don't think anyone should reject it either." Mothers, she feels, get away with a lot of psychic ability in regard to their children, in the name of "intuition." They have a "feeling" that the child is into something. "But, the minute you put a label 'oh, she's psychic' and all of a sudden., it's not acceptable. It's always a question of debate. Now, I don't feel that you can debate it, but I don't want everybody to accept everything you hear, but they shouldn't totally reject it either. They should just hold it in abeyance, and if it feels good, and it works out, and holds water, then they can accept it, but don't keep beating it to death!-Chewing it up!-Spitting it out!--Trying to find

proof not to believe it."

Mrs. Lynch continued, "You have to have an open mind. I believe that everyone has psychic ability to some degree or another. You're born with it. I firmly believe in a past life and a future life, so it makes sense that you're going to come into this world with an ability that you're going to need to live this life to the fullest, to have your opportunity. I firmly believe that in a life you have two

roads. Positive--and if you choose not to go on a positive road, then there's the alternative. You never go on one straight road-you go back and forth. I don't feel that it's a now or never kind of thing, (and I'm not upset about one certain thing--it's the total value,) because these are learning experiences.

I do believe that you are born, and that you see a blueprint of your life, and you say, 'this is the vehicle that I need.

You come back with the group that you have associated with before. Not every life with the same group, but there's always an association in some form. You see your blueprint, and your opportunities. You

have this thing laid out, and these are the things you are going to do, but you have the free will of how you are

going to do them. Either you make it very good, or you make it rough on yourself. It is as if you have the home, but you can choose to decorate it yourself. I think this is about the amount of free will you have. The more I meditate, though, the more I'm getting into it, the more I find that the free will is narrowing down.

So, you come in, and everybody dreams. Some people deny it, they blank it out. This a kind of psychic ability. You can say it comes from God, or it is from your inner self, but it is not from your conscious mind. It is something that is beyond, and not exclusive with one person.

Everything you think and do radiates into a different type of vibrational energy and that can be picked up by anybody that is intuitive to that particular type of vibrational energy. That's why we get so many people that can pick up and see an airplane crash all over the world. They can pick up that particular vibration.

Now, the other psychics will not pick that up, because they are not tuned to that particular vibration. It's not that they aren't that good!'

She went on to explain that she has never known anyone who never had a psychic adventure, but doesn't think that it is strange that many people prefer to blank such experiences out, or reject them.

"If people dwelt on such experiences, they would have to deal with them, and reevaluate right down the line, and it's a little scary. They would have to question everything that they have learned from their parents, their teachers, their ministers, and even the government."



"Mind-Reach" for the "Non-Believer"

For those who are interested in learning more about parapsychology, a book called "Mind-Reach" should be available at bookstores and the library, along with a number of other good books on the subject. "Mind-Reach" is a good one for the "non-believer" as it has been written by two physicists who have been studying parapsychology through controlled experiments. The results of their tests and experiments have made them believers, though they admit that keeping an open mind is the most difficult problem they run into in their studies.

Psychic phenomena is not scary or something to ignore out of fear of the unknown. It is not a matter of looking into darkness, but looking toward the light of reason, and expanded awareness of man's potential for understanding himself, and the life experience. Refusing to think about something does not make it "go away." Truth is truth, and understanding truth is no more "scary" than clinging to untruths. Knowing the truth, in fact, allows us to deal with it intelligently, and in a practical manner. Trying to deal with untruths only leaves us wandering in circles, and completely frustrated by our limitations. Nothing will "prove out" or make sense if it is not based on truth, so we should not fear to test it.

"Mind-Reach" deals with that which is commonly referred to as ESP. Most of the tests cited by the authors have been done under well controlled circumstances. One subject sits quietly, concentrating on another person or group of persons, and draws pictures of a scene that comes to mind. In test after test, the drawing coincides with the same scene as that which is observed by the person or persons that the subject has concentrated on.

I experimented with two of our daughters, by having them study a picture chosen at random, in a magazine which I had not read. In both cases, the lines and shapes I drew were very similar to the pictures that they studied, and in one case, I was able to name the colors of the background. I simply closed my eyes and thought of a blackboard in each instance. There was no "magic" involved. I simply believed I could do it, which seems to be one of the prerequisites of success.

I think that my reasons for believing that I could do it make sense, though I was once known as a "doubter", that refused to believe anything I couldn't see or feel, taste, smell, or hear. Though I haven't always believed that I could "read" anyone's mind, I had certainly been aware that my children, when small, could read mine, and that the family pets shared their ability. It seemed to me that if a dog, cat, or child could do it, that I could do it too!


Now, there is a reason that animals and children do display a greater ability at ESP than most adults do.


Just One of **Those Days**

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

Know-It-All Grow-It-All

DIEFFENBACHIA

by Bonnie Hale

The dieffenbachia, or as it is more commonly known, dumbcane, is a South American plant that is noted for its large green leaves that are either speckled or striped in green, white and yellow.

Dieffenbachia was nicknamed dumbcane because the leaves and stems are poisonous; they contain calcium oxalate, which produces swelling and irritation of the mouth and tongue. Death can result if the swelling at the base of the tongue is sufficient to block the throat air passage.

Plants eventually become 4 to 5 feet tall, but they usually need to be cut back before they reach this height



because as the plant grows larger, the lower leaves gradually wither and fall off leaving quite a bit of bare stem.

Dieffenbachias do best in bright indirect or curtain-filtered light. An east or west window is ideal. The soil should become moderately dry between thorough soakings. All purpose fertilizer can be applied every two to three months.

The dieffenbachia, which has been around for more than 150 years, has become a very popular plant because of the adverse conditions it can withstand.

To stimulate new growth on the bare stem, cut the plant back to within $\overline{4}$ to 6 inches of the rim of the pot. This will cause the plant to branch out and new leaves to form. If necessary this cutting back can be done every spring. The dieffenbachia is also a very easy plant to air layer as it roots readily. Pieces of the main stem can also be placed horizontally in moist vermiculite, perlite or sand to produce more plants.

Some recommended varities to try are: The Bause which is a hybrid that has 6 to 18 inch greenish yellow leaves with green edges and green and white spots. The

Underwood said. "I knew they were looking for nice homes in nice areas like this one."

But when construction began in March, Underwood said, there was no agreement the house would be for use by handicapped people. The cost of the architectural requirements was just too high. After it was built, however, the group came back still interested in the house and the location if Underwood would make certain

 modifications such as wider doors, special bathroom fixtures, and ramps.

A lease was signed the end of August after appearing before the Springfield Township Board on July 5 to inform them of their plans and to get their approval. There were no objections from anyone at that time, not even the landowners, according to Underwood. He stressed that appearance was merely a formality

because there is nothing in township zoning regulating foster care facilities. Underwood's brother Glenn, a township trustee, abstained from any vote or comment at that time.

During an interview with the two brothers, Glen and Chuck, last week, one important fact was brought out that had never been touched upon before. They have a twenty-four year old Mongoloid brother who lives with their mother and attends the North Oakland

Rehabilitation Center.



Programs of this type, Underwood explained, are usually begun in subdivisions that are vacant rather than completely developed. "We were also sensitive to other people's feelings and investments."

Glenn replied, "These people are not affecting property values at all...those are beautiful sites with beautiful views in a fine community. These people are an asset to the community." He spoke as an area realtor who should have some concept of real estate values.




