

editor's note

Poverty Isn't Just a City Problem

People have the impression that this area is affluent. Big new homes worth hundreds of thousands of dollars are commonplace. Developments like Pine Knob, Deerwood, and Deer Lake help foster this impression.

But not everyone in this area is wealthy. Most families would be classified middle class, and even though we may not want to think about it, there are a smattering of poor families in the area.

Reminder reporter Sharon Springborn has been closely following the saga of one poor family. Here is part of their story:

Mrs. X. her husband and 3 children live in a house that was purchased 10 years ago very reasonably. Since that time, their house payments, along with their utility bills, have crept relentlessly upward, until the house payments and bill payments take all but \$5 of the husband's paycheck. The husband works in a place where no raises were given, so his paycheck has remained equal to what it was a few years ago, and prices have escalated alarmingly.

Every week, Mrs. X. goes to the Thrifty Bakery Store and purchases 10 loaves of bread. She also buys some milk and dried beans for her family to live on for a week.

To add to her husband's income, Mrs. X. babysits and everyone in the family picks up pop or beer cans for which a deposit has been paid to turn in for the deposit money.

The children are on the poverty lunch program at school, where children from families that meet certain

criteria are given their lunch for free or for a reduced amount of money. According to Mrs. X., this is the only square, hot meal that the kids get all day, because they have no 'snacks' waiting for them when they get home from school, except for bread.

In the Reminder some weeks ago, Hamady's ran an ad for Campbell's Tomato Soup, which they were selling for 10 cents per can with the coupon published in the paper. Mrs. X. gathered together some newspapers, clipped out the coupons, and gave them to her children, along with 30 cents to go and buy 3 cans of soup. The kids thought that they were really getting a treat, as long as the soup held out.

Mrs. X's youngest was asked by his teacher to draw a picture of what he had for breakfast during the past week. He drew a square to represent a slice of bread-and a cup-to represent a cup of milk. The teacher, in alarm and/or confusion, sent a note home with the child to see if she could find out what was meant by the drawing.

The note was never answered, because Mrs. X was too embarrassed to let the teacher know what desparate straights the family is in.

Shocking isn't it! Although larger cities may have many families that may fit the same criteria, Mrs. X and her family are by no means an isolated case in this area. It's a shame that anyone should have to go hungry and live in poverty. It's even more shameful, when it happens in your own back yard.

Clarkston Hires Planner to Get Historical Designation

The highly-touted, especially historic village of Clarkston may soon become officially historic as the village council has engaged Betty-lee Francis of Preservation Planning, her own architectural firm, to do the research and paper work necessary to have the village declared an historic district.

Francis will research about 20 homes in the village which are geographically rather than architecturally representitive of the proposed historic district and document them for state and national recognition. Her fee will be paid with Community Development Act funds; one use for such funds is saving older neighborhoods from deterioration.

Many of the village's older homes have already been researched such as those on Main and Buffalo Streets. Francis will be concentrating on South Holcomb, East Washington and East Church.

Francis said historic districts in communities are "not an uncommon thing" these days although Franklin Village is usually the only one that comes readily to mind. Such districts exist in Birmingham, Farmington,



Detroit, Northville, Romeo, Grand Rapids and Menominee, Francis said, naming just a few.

Basically what an historic district means to a community is psychological, she went on. It's saying "This is part of our past." She feels it lends pride to a community and acts as a cohesive force. It becomes a vehicle for grants, low interest loans, and tax incentives. It increases the value of homes.

Councilwoman Roth Basinger, who is also past president of the Clarkston Community Historical Society, echoes those thoughts. "The historic character of the village gives it its identity," she said. She added she would like to see this effort expanded to the whole township but felt the village's needs were more immediate as it had been most threatened by 'progress.'

Basinger anticipates use of additional CDA funds for an architectural review of the village business section. Another of Francis' more immediate tasks is to make recommendations for signs in that section, something more in character with the village atmosphere, and designs for its landscaping and general appearance.

Achieving historic designation does not require citizen input, Basinger explained, the village must simply qualify and make proper application. That is Francis' job. Once historic district designation has been granted, the next step is usually to draft a local ordinance and establish an historic commission, some 7-9 people who would review cases and work with the planning commission and the building department. That's where citizen input through public hearings would come in, Basinger said.

She added that historic designation does not require a local ordinance but that one would protect the area from "any alteration to the village which would affect the district such as highway widening or real estate development...anything that would destroy the historic character of the area.'

Francis and village representatives will be using ordinances from other communities as a basis for formulating one for Clarkston. "We want to make it as easy as possible," said Village President Fontie ApMadoc. "Everyone is involved and interested on the council but it is primarily a function of the planning

When the satisfaction of those needs depends on one's ability to beat out others who are in competition for limited quantities and opportunities, the fighting can get rough. Such competition usually results in a "no holds barred" rivalry between all candidates for the prizes that are offered. Then it is human against human (or dog against dog, etc.) and the sex of the animal makes not one whit of difference.







Glass Recycling in Oakland County --The Statistics Are Impressive

Independence Delivers 8-10 Tons a Month

The Oakland County Recycling Center, staffed entirely by volunteers, is open every Saturday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Located on "Old Telegraph Road", near Orchard Lake Road, all turn-offs are well-marked by green and white signs for those traveling south on the newer portion of Telegraph.

The Center receives glass, aluminum, and newspapers (no magazines) from residents of seventeen Oakland County communities, as welll as purchasing glass from the "Bottles for Building" Recycling Center in Independence Township.

Carolyn Place, Director of the Oakland County Recycling Center, says studies show that the average family of four people has ten to fifteen pounds of glass to dispose of per week. This includes such items as mayonnaise, jelly and pickle jars, as well as--in some cases--whiskey or wine bottles not covered by legislation on returnables.

The "Bottles for Building" Recycling Center in Independence Township, alone, delivers eight to ten tons of glass per month to the larger center in Pontiac.

Mrs. Place has some interesting statistics on the history of glass recycling in Independence Township. She says, "Since we started, we have shipped 1600 tons of glass. At 2000 pounds of glass per ton, that equals 3,200,000 pounds of glass.'

Another way of looking at it is, using the estimated figure "one pound of glass equals 1.5 bottles, the equation shows we have shipped 48 million bottles.'

"Owens-Illinois Company" --- final destination of the glass---"is the only glass plant in Michigan," she





Clarkston Unveils Plans for New Junior High

After months of study and planning, Clarkston Community Schools has unveiled tentative plans for a proposed junior high school designed to alleviate overcrowding. Also in the works are plans to expand the library facilities at the senior high school and to make that building barrier-free.

Nearly two years ago, the Reminder published an extensive survey of real estate development in Independence and Springfield townships. By now many of those houses which only existed on paper are a reality.

Still others have progressed from mere porposals to approved plats, while some not imagined at that time now exist on paper, and the process continues.

Later that same year, faced with a population that had grown and classroom space that had shrunk, the Clarkston School Board empaneled a Citizens Advisory Committee to study three areas: enrollment, facilities and finance. The school district had previously failed to gain voter approval of a new elementary school and multi-purpose room additions to the existing ones.

During the six-month tenure of the citizens'

committee, much time was spent gathering statistical data on predicted population growth and patterns. The sub-committee even hired a professor from Michigan State University to make further projections. Every member of the committee toured nearly every building in the district, some returning several times. Endless research went into construction costs and the school system's financial situation.

In June of 1978 their report, representing a consensus opinion and not a unanimous one, was presented to the school board. It was the committee's recommendation that a new junior high school be built, the present Clarkston Junior High be used to temporarily house elementary students to relieve crowded conditions, and that the high school library (media center) be expanded and the building itself made barrier-free to better accomodate the handicapped.

Those recommendations have now progressed to the point where a site has been selected and tentative plans drawn up for the new building.

Sites considered included all property owned by the school district. Geographic location was one determining factor, road conditions and general accessibility were others with the Clarkston Road site between the administration and the Independence Township Library ultimatley chosen. Primary reasons for its selection included paved roads and sewers eliminating the need for a separate sewage treatment facility.

The architectural firm of Charles Sherman and Associates was engaged to design a facility for that site. Although the plans are by no means absolute, the building as proposed is slightly larger in square footage than Sashabaw Junior High, which itself is 35-40 percent larger than the present Clarkston Junior High.

The building as proposed has 20 classrooms, expanded science facilities, art rooms, language labs, an industrial arts section, and another section containing a gymnasium and cafeteria separated by a stage accessible to either.

Sherman was in Lansing last week to file a pre-qualification application for approval of the plans with the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Once approval of the basic plan is granted, Sherman, his associates, the administration and board members will sit down and work out the final details.

The facility as proposed, plus the work to be done at the high school, will cost an estimated \$8.8 million, slightly under the figure estimated by the advisory

There are no presentation drawings as yet for the high school expansion work but library floor space will be increased to accomodate more students and more books at the very least. Although the school population has grown and the building has been expanded through the years, the library is still its original size.

Much of the cost of the school's renovation is tied up in making it barrier-free. Basically state law requires that any structural work done on a public building must include making it accessible to the Handicapped, a law only recently enacted.



It Should Be a "Boom Year" for Real Estate

It has been reported in many different publications, as well as being broadcast over the air waves, that 1979 will bring with it a downturn in real estate sales and prices.

In order to confirm or deny these reports on the condition of the home market, salespeople from McAnnally Realty, Carter, MacIntosh, Breeding and Wright, Century 21 Realty, and Barry Young were asked a few questions about the future of the real estate market in this area and no pessimism was expressed. In fact, they all told this reporter things such as "The phone's been ringing off the hook" or "I think this will be a good year. We're beginning to get real busy right now"

At the present time, people who are-or are considering-moving to this particular area are now becoming concerned with the number of miles that they'll have to drive to work, according to salespeople. The buyers also want a home located near, or within traveling distance, of an expressway, so that they'll be able to get to work and a house located close to I-75 appreciates in value.

An important feature to today's home buyer which didn't really concern the buyer of yesterday is the

amount of insulation which a home has. If a house has extra insulation-that is, 6" of insulation in the walls, 12" in the ceiling, a wood, backed by styrofoam, exterior or Thermo-pane windows--it will sell even more quickly than the house that has only an average amount of insulation. Also of concern to many people is the amount of money that it will cost to heat a home, and by which method--fuel oil, propane or electricity--the home is heated. There *are* a few homes in the area that are located close enough to a gas hook-up to be run by gas, but the number isn't even great enough to even include in this mini-survey.

If there is anything such as the 'perfect' house, it would incorporate all of these features--a fireplace, 3 bedrooms (although the 2 bedroom home is becoming more popular as people have fewer children or have grown-up children), a full basement, 1½ baths, at least 1600 sq. ft., enough room in which to entertain, a deck and a garage. This 'average' house would cost the buyer between \$55,000 and \$80,000, which is more than the same house would have cost last year.


Each salesperson said that the majority of those buying land plan to build within 1 or 2 years. According to Dick MacIntosh of Carter, MacIntosh, Breeding and Wright, most people who purchase land do intend to build on it, and novices shouldn't get into the land speculation business because there are primary aspects of land purchasing to take into consideration, such as taxes, land's increasing value, etc. But even so, the consensus of realtors seems to be that 'real estate is better than having money in the bank!'

The setting of the house in question is also a very important consideration. If a lot is wooded and rolling, the price of the land skyrockets. Another thing that many people are looking for is a secluded piece of property-one on which they don't have to worry about pleasing or offending their neighbors, who live within 100 feet of their house.


Many folks are concerned with a house being in a 'nice' neighborhood where they can bring up their kids. Since the kids of today are into things such as tennis, skiing, etc., parents want to re-locate within at least 10-15 miles of where these activities take place even though being within walking distance of a school doesn't seem as important out here, since most of the children ride a bus to school, anyway.

In the opinion of Lee Steinhoff, Barry Young, the Continued on Page 23










Holly Hotel Rising Again

The Holly Hotel is rising rom its ashes much as the legendary phoenix and soon will grace historic Battle Alley as it did when first built in 1891. Then, however, it was the Hirst House.

Owners Dr. Leslie Sher and his wife Sydelle and Jim and Ellen Hilty are working closely with general contractor Frank Walker of Swanson & Walker Bildors and architect Betty-lee Francis of Preservation Planning to restore the old building to its former grandeur despite a devastating fire in January of 1978.

Prior to that time the old hotel had survived yet another fire in 1913, a hatched-wielding visit from Carry Nation and Prohibition in addition to the brawls which gave Battle Alley both its name and its reputation.

Despite the time involved in removing tons of debris before rebuilding could begin, work has progressed quite steadily since last October. Walker would like to see the first floor and the basement completed by June.

The main floor will be all restaurant facilities as in the past with the original tin ceiling, still intact after the fire, put back and the original mosaic tile floor salvaged. The decor throughout will be Victorian as it once was.

Plans for the basement are not definite but its five entrances from the street level create great possibilities for shops, Hilty speculated during a tour of the hotel. At one time, apparently, traveling salesmen would set up their wares there and have the townpeople come to them.

Eventually the second floor will be sleeping rooms as it once was. The owners have received a two-year extension of the barrier-free requirements to explore ways of avoiding installation of an elevator. Most likely some sleeping accomodations will be made availagle on the first floor. The third story, complete with a 14-foot ceiling and picturesque tower room, may become a ballroom.



amount of recreational land available in this area is of primary importance when the purchase of some land or a house is being considered. He feels that the Independence-Springfield-Brandon area offers some of the nicest land in all of Oakland County and Larry Nawrocki, Century 21, said that when he informs people of the taxes out here, they are most often quite pleased because this represents a reduction in taxes for them.

The housing situation in this area is one in which the houses will keep increasing in value, because there are more people who want to purchase land or a house in this area than there is real estate available. Few people, although they may own some property, are moving to the south and even though the demand for new houses is great, the resale value of a previously owned home continues to increase. Not many people are moving back to Royal Oak, Warren, or Sterling Heights, either, though many people have jobs in those areas.

I asked these salespeople about the marketability of a home that needed some fixing up and/or repairs and these were the responses that I received:

Betty Hecker, McAnnally, "It all depends on the area being considered and how much the couple needs a house, whether or not they would consider a house that needs some fixing up.'

Larry Nawrocki, Century 21: "What sells is a nice. clean home. But I've noticed a very strong do-it-yourself

Lee Steinhoff, Barry Young: "A lot of people like to take part in the building of their home, such as staining, painting, putting up trim, etc.'

Jean Brisdon, Swanson and Associates: "People might think that they want a house to repair or fix-up, but when we list a house as a 'handyman's special', even though we get a lot of calls on it, it takes a long time to sell. So I think that even though people think they want a place to fix up, they don't really want one."

All of these realtors agreed that the people who are in the market for the less expensive home are more likely to buy a house that needs repairs than those willing to buy a more expensive house. In general, the latter group would rather purchase a complete home, that maybe needs a fresh coat of paint, where they can just put down their furniture and relax.

Dick MacIntosh, who has more to do with new homes than previously owned homes, said that many people

SOIL COMPOSITION

by Bonnie Hale

Soil is one of the least important factors which most people think of when they think of house plants, and it should be the most important. Without the proper type of soil, most houseplants will eventually end up in the garbage.

The roots not only take up water and fertilizer but also oxygen. In saturated soil there is little or no oxygen. As the soil begins to dry, oxygen begins to fill in the spaces left by the water. Therefore it is extremely important that the soil be porous enough to allow for the free passage of both water and oxygen.

A good quality potting soil contains equal parts of soil (sandy loam), shredded peat moss, and vermiculite and or perlite. The soil must be loose enough to allow for easy root penetration. Also when water is applied, it should run freely through the soil.

If the water "sits" on top of the soil for several minutes, and then "drips" through the drainage holes, or if it takes more than a week for the soil to dry out, you don't have a properly mixed soil.

Don't be deceived by the bags of soil that are a rich black color; they lack porosity. Used alone the plant will suffocate from lack of oxygen. But if you add peatmoss, vermiculite and/or perlite, you will have a good quality potting soil.

If you have a good, rich soil outside you can start there for your base, but it must be sterilized first. Garden soil contains billions of both harmful and harmless organisms along with lots of different insects. To sterilize, moisten the soil and spread it out on a cookie sheet and bake at 180 degrees for 30 minutes.

STANDARD FORMULA

1 part shreaded peat moss

1 part pre-packaged soil or sterilized garden soil 1 part perlite or ½ part perlite and ½ pert vermiculite

CACTI AND SUCCULENT FORMULA

1 part peatmoss 2 parts vermiculte 2 parts perlite

1 part sand (available at building supply centers) With the properly mixed soil, you've got half the battle licked with overwatering. The above soil mixes are very porouse and it will take a lot of effort to drown plants that are planted in these types of soil.

Emergency Salt Stockpile Big as Football Field

Workers and an automobile are dwarfed by the 5,000-ton emergency stockpile of road de-icing salt at the Oakland County Road Commission's Pontiac yard. The workers are completing a sprayed-on covering of poly-urethane, which in combination with plastic sheeting, provides protection for the salt and prevents leeching into the environment. Under the 22-foot high pile is an asphalt pad about the size of a football field. The pad and covering cost \$44,000, which is about one-seventh the cost of a building.

Road Commission Vice Chairman John R. Gnau, Jr. said, "Salt from this pile will be used only when the 10,800 tons of salt in buildings at our facilities around

the county are depleted. The pile increases our storage capacity from one-fifth to one-third of our annual need of 48,000 tons of salt, and thus decreases our reliance on replenishment by salt companies during winter months." The salt in the pile cost about \$66,000-or ab out one-tenth of the Road Commission's annual outlay








Michigan is a Winter Wonderland



Marie Comment Township of Springfield AMENDMENT TO ORDIN-ANCE NO. 27 - "SUBDIVI-SION ORDINANCE"

Ordinance No. 27 is hereby amended to delete, substitute, and add Subsections as hereinafter set forth:

THE TOWNSHIP OF **SPRINGFIELD ORDAINS:** Amendments to the Township of Springfield Ordinance

No. 27 are as follows: 1. Section 200, subsection 17-D: Revise to read as fol-

lows: Marginal Access Street - A local public street located adiacent and parallel to a major thoroughfare which provides direct access to abutting private property and protection from through traffic.

2. Article III: Revise the first paragraph as follows:

Prior to the preparation of any subdivision plat, the proprietor may request an informational meeting with the Township Planning Commission to discuss procedures and policies of the Township relative to land subdivision.

3. Section 400. Filing, #1: Revise the first sentence to read as follows:

The proprietor shall submit twelve (12) copies of the tentative preliminary plat and other required data concerning the proposed development together with proof of ownership to the Township Clerk at least one week, seven (7) calendar days, prior to a meeting of the Planning Commission. (Retain remaining sentence.)

Section 400, #3: Revise the second sentence to read "The Planning Commission shall act on the preliminary plat within 45 days after the first meeting of the Planning Commission after the proposed Preliminary Plat has been deposited with the Township.

Section 400. Filing, #4: Revise as follows:

The proposed plat and other data shall be checked for completeness of the application. Should any of the date etc: then substitute the word Township Clerk and/or his Designee and retain the remainder of this paragraph.

Section 400. Filing, #5: Revise as follows:

The proprietor shall deposit Revise as follows: the required fee as stipulated by the Township Consolidated Fee Ordinance #40 to cover the cost of reviewing all plans, specifications and information related to the subdivision development at the time of submission of said plat to the Township Clerk.

4. Section 401, subsection 4: Revise as follows:

5. Section 402: Revise as follows:

7. Section 404, #4: Revise as follows:

Amend the last sentence in this paragraph to read: The Planning Commission shall act

SAY YOU SAW IT IN THE REMINDER on the preliminary plat as provided in Section 404.6 unless a time extension has been requested in writing by the proprietor. Not more than two time extensions shall be granted by the Planning Commission prior to their recommen-

dation to the Township Board. Section 404, #5: Add subsection E. as follows:

Adequacy of surface drainage, location and extent of flood plains and wetlands; and stability of soil conditions. Reference may be made to USGS topographic maps and/ or U.S. Soil Conservation Service Soil Survey data of the Township or any other maps adopted by the Township showing environmentally delicate areas

8. Section 405, #1: Revise to read as follows:

The Township Board will not review the preliminary plat prior to compliance with Section 404 and shall review the proposed plat in reference to the standards listed in Section 404.5 taking appropriate action within ninety (90) days of the date of accepting for initial filing with the Township Clerk as defined in Section 400.4. The time period resulting from proprietor requested extension will be added to and extend the ninety (90) day period within which the Township Board must act.

Section 405, #3: Revise the first sentence to read as fol-

The approval of the Tentative Preliminary Plat by the Township Board is effective for a period of one (1) year. (Remainder of paragraph is retained.)

9. Section 500 - Filing, #1: Revise the first sentence to read as follows:

The proprietor shall submit to the Township Clerk and/or his Designee twelve (12) copies of the final preliminary plat and all other data concerning the proposed development after the time the proprietor files copies with the authorities and receives replies as required in Sections 113 to 119 of the State Subdivision Control Act. (Remainder of paragraph is retained.)

Section 500 - Filing, #2:

The proprietor shall deposit the required fee as stipulated by the Township Consolidated Fee Ordinance #40 to cover the cost of reviewing all plans, specifications, and information related to the subdivision development at the time of submission of said plat to the Township Clerk.

Section 500 - Filing, #3:

10. Section 503-Proposed Conditions, #7: Revise as follows:

Engineering plans for the subdivision shall be submitted and approved by the Township Engineer prior to the proprietor submitting the Final Plat for consideration by the Township.

12. Section 601-#6: Add the following:

In the event other public agencies require such deposits, the proprietor may furnish the Township with evidence of such deposit thereby reducing the amount of deposit to the Township by a like amount.

Section 601-Final Plat Review: Add a new subsection 9:

Should the proprietor seek final plat approval of a portion of the preliminary plat, all improvements necessary to service the entire area approved for final preliminary plat shall be constructed as if the entire plat were being developed at one time. This requirement shall apply to such items as streets, storm sewers, retention basins, any off-site improvements. sanitary sewer system, water system, park areas, natural open space areas, common areas. and/or similar types of improvements. The requirement for such complete installation may be modified by recommendation of the Planning Commission and approval of the Township Board.

13. Section 700, subsection 1 D: Revise as follows:

Should a proposed subdivision border on or contain an existing or proposed major thoroughfare, the Township Planning Commission may recommend and the Township Board may require marginal access streets, reverse frontage, or such other treatment regarding acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes as may be necessary for adequate protection of properties and to afford separation and reduction of traffic hazards.

Section 700, subsection 1. E: Revise as follows:

Should a proposed subdivision border on or contain a railroad, expressway or other limited access highway rightof-way, the Township Planning Commission may recommend and the Township Board may require the location of a street approximately parallel to and on each side of such right-of-way at a distance suitable for the development of an appropriate use of the intervening land such as for parks in residential districts. Such distances shall be determined with due consideration of the minimum distance required for approach grades to future grade separation.

Section 700, subsection 2

Maximum length for culsde-sac streets shall be 600'. This requirement may be exceeded subject to a recommendation by the Planning Commission and approval by the Township Board.

Section 700, subsection 3: Add a new G:

Drainage, Flood Plain and Wetland Areas using USGS topographic maps and/or U.S. Soil Conservation Service Soil Survey data of the Township or any other maps adopted by the Township showing environmentally delicate areas.

14. Section 701 - Blocks, subsection 1: Revise as fol-

Blocks within subdivision should conform to the following standards except where, in the opinion of the Planning

may justify a variation: A. Blocks containing lots of 100 feet to 200 feet in width. Maximum Block Length (in feet) measured between Right-

of-way Lines, 1.800'. B. Blocks containing lots of 200 feet or more in width. Maximum Block Length (in feet) measured between Rightof-way Lines, 3,000'.

In no event may blocks be created so as to cause the width to depth ratio of any lot to exceed 4 to 1.

C. Maximum length for blocks shall not exceed 3,000 feet in length, except where conditions such as topography, limited access highway, watercourses and drainage ways may justify a greater distance.

2. Public Walkways: A. Location of public sidewalks, crosswalks, and bikepaths may be recommended by the Planning Commission and required by the Township Board to obtain satisfactory pedestrian access to public or private facilities such as, but not limited to, schools and parks.

B. Widths of public walkways or crosswalks shall be at least five (5) feet and shall be in the nature of an easement for this purpose, and shall be improved for the full width in concrete and/or asphalt. Widths of public bikepaths shall be at least eight (8) feet and shall be in the nature of an easement for this purpose, and shall be improved for the full width in concrete and/or as-

C. Any subdivision which contains such walkway, crosswalk, and/or bikepath improvements shall have the maintenance for said improvement provided for in the recorded Subdivision Restriction Agreement. Such a provision shall provide for said maintenance to be shared among all lot owners within the subdivision.

Section 701, subsection 3: Revise the first sentence as follows:

B. Recommendations on the proposed layout of all necessary utility easements shall be sought from all utility companies planning to provide service to the site.

Add to subsection B - Such recommendations for easements shall be obtained and shown on the final preliminary plat drawing and shall be ubject to approval by the l'ownship Planning Commission and Township Board.

15. Section 702 - Lots, subsection 2 - F: Revise as follows:

F. Lands subject to flooding or otherwise deemed by the Planning Commission and the Township Board to be uninhabitable shall not be platted for residential purposes, or for uses that may in the judgment of the Planning Commission and the Township Board increase the danger to health, life, or property or increase the flood hazard. Such land within a subdivision shall be set aside for other uses, such as parks or other open space.

16. Section 703 - Public Reservations and Dedications: Revise as follows:

Where a proposed subdivision consists of ten (10) acres or more in area, the proprietor shall allocate areas suitably located and of adequate size for playgrounds, school sites, parks and recreation facilities,





About 800 GMC employees will be located in the 200,000 square foot building which is expected to be one of four keystones of the city's downtown revitalization program.

Truxell said construction is planned to start after final approvals are obtained for the three other major structures in the development program--a tiered parking facility and plaza, a major hotel, and a second large office building.

'All of these structures are essential to the success of the downtown revitalization program," he said.

GMC plans to lease the office building from the Downtown Pontiac Development Co., prime developer for the Pontiac Plan to be constructed on 27-acres of vacant downtown property.


