# Center Celebrates **Grand Opening** This Saturday

Independence citizens who attend the Senior Citizen Center Open House October 27 will see a completely remodeled home with library, fireplace, large kitchen and splendid work area, just begging to be used by area senior citizens.

And if you believe new Senior Citizen Coordinator Rina Chemin (she's held the job for six months) it won't be long before the center will have a constant flow of people traffic. It is Ms. Chemin's major goal to seek out more seniors and to see that they have the opportunity to share in the Center and its activities.

"Basically, I'd like to build the program both people wise and program-wise," said Ms. Chemin. A special target are senior citizen shut-ins who have no method of transportation. "I think there are quite a few of the shut-ins in the area.

Another target are the handicapped. "I hope to have a special hour for people who are blind or handicapped where they can come into the Center and talk," said Ms. Chemin.

A third program that will be expanded to the daily lunch program. Currently there are 50-75 regulars that partake in a lunch at the Center occasionally. Ms. Chemin hopes to at least double that figure.

The total membership for the center runs around 175. Membership allows use of the center and the right to receive an occasional newsletter.

Coordinator Chemin comes to the center with an exceptional background in volunteer work. She holds a recreation degree from Wayne State University where she gained experience working with the Boys Club, YWCA and with senior citizens.

She's been surprised at the support she's received from the community at large. Volunteers have come forth to help with programs and to donate furnishings for the new center.

There's always somebody there that's willing to help us," Ms. Chemin added.

The center is open 9 - 5, weekdays. It is located at the entrance of Clintonwood Park on Clarkston Road.







# ZBA to Settle Zoning Map Election Over Now What Happens?

Votes cast against the questions of hotel use and building height and for the park millage ranged from 71-74 percent of the total number cast in the October 16 election in Independence Township. A slightly higher percentage, however, opposed the height increase from the present 35' to 200' than opposed the hotel use in a recreational district.

Of the township's 11,304 registered, as of October 1978, 4,487 or 40 percent, went to the polls in this special election. That number compares with 2,600 in the last school election, 6,500 in the 1978 general election, and 7,100 in the 1976 presidential election, according to township clerk Chris Rose.

Although the election is over, the issues are by no means settled.

Township attorney Richard Campbell said he will advise the Zoning Board of Appeals to meet as planned on October 24 to settle the question of the zoning map.

He said the matter should be resolved. But, he added, mistake or not, the map was adopted and the ZBA shouldn't be "too casual about moving lines." There is a difference between the township's zoning map and the one Pine Knob has making part of the area they wanted for a hotel zoned multiple instead of recreation.

Campbell said he could see no need for former township planner Larry Burkhart to attend the meeting. ZBA members had wanted to consult with him about the new zoning map drawn up in 1975 when the new ordinance went into effect.

As far as the proposed Pine Knob hotel is concerned, Campbell continued, "The use is lost in my cpinion. There is no point in the ZBA answering the question now. Hotels are no longer a conditional use in a recreation district."

Although Pine Knob still maintains they have the use, the attorney doesn't agree. Things done in the early 70s do not, he stated, give them the right to have a hotel now. Even the rooms above the ski lodge do not give them the right to build a bigger one.

Other than having the ZBA "clarify" the map, Campbell said the next move is up to Pine Knob.

Bob and his prize portrait

For the owner of a small photography studio in downtown Ortonville, Bob Flath has some pretty impressive credentials. His photography has spanned the length of the United States, where in the process he has photographed the late Hubert Humphrey, Bart Starr, Arthur Godfrey, the Detroit riots, and did all the restoration work on the photos hanging in the Pontiac State Bank in downtown Clarkston.

Flath has been awarded the prestigious Michigan Professional Photographers Award of Excellence twice and has consistently placed in the top ten for several years.

His wife, Barb, who also comes from a photography background, (her mother owns Sayles Studio in Drayton Plains) is currently holder of the Color Artist of the Year Award for 1979.

But their biggest achievement didn't happen until this year when Bob was able to photograph Governor William Milliken in a studio setting. The portrait hangs proudly in a prominent display in the reception area of their business, The Village Photographer.

The Flaths began the business three years ago when many of the area's leaders felt a photography studio had no chance to survive in Ortonville. Well, Flath has proved not only can a studio survive--but it can thrive.

Just recently they completed decorating an addition that provides a semi-private room in which clients and the Flaths can discuss business away from the hustle and bustle of the reception area.

The full service studio provides a number of services including passbook photos, portraits, weddings, publicity photos, commercial photography, portrait and custom framing, animal photos and restorations.

Senior pictures are a big part of the studio's business. Not only do they have seniors from Goodrich and Ortonville, but Holly, West Bloomfield and Grand Blanc students have been known to arrange an appointment for their Senior photos.

Flath's formula for success is simple. "The main thing we can attribute our success to is we give the customer what they want."

Pleasing the customer might take more time than usual--but that doesn't phase the Flaths, in fact they encourage it.

"We take a lot of time with every setting," said Mrs. Flath. "That's what makes us different from everyone

She further explained that hour setting appointments were normal and a lot of time was spent just relaxing the customer. We've even sent people home because they couldn't relax and told them to come back the next day said Flath.

When Flath isn't busy with customers, he still manages to latch onto some pretty exciting assignments. Just a couple of weeks ago he was asked to do a series of portraits of the founder of Serta Mattresses. He hopes to be named a photographer for the Republican National Convention next year, also.

In the meantime his equally talented wife continues to perform her color artistry--bringing old, rundown photographs to a new, colorful life.






Dear Single,

They attended the Badgerette Pom-Pom Camp in Grand Rapids last summer. There they won two first place awards, three seconds and a plaque.





The Clarkston Wolves have another victory in the record books. They beat the Milford Redskins, 21-14.




