

Reflections of Independence Board Meeting

To the Editor:

On the night of November 6, I attended the Independence Township Board Meeting. The main subject of the meeting was the Police Question before the Board and the people of the Township. The one question that arose above all others was, why has the board for so long ignored the recommendations of the Police Commission. All five men were very capable and had an authentic capacity to give real and honest recommendations to the members of the township board. In fact in that Police Commission, there exists an approximate total of eighty years in active police work. Their advise and council was apparently ignored as it has been in the past.

Then there was this fine gentleman from the Baptist effort. I was able to understand his implied needs by comparing it with that famous Southern Baptist brother Billy Carter. Brother Billy became famous for his capacity to find an answer, even though confronted with a brick wall.

Then there was the gentleman from the local effort of pedogogy and he was with a fine looking, very white haired quite elderly looking gentleman. This pedagogical individual spoke with great capacity. Plaudits in a laudatory manner were cast into the atmosphere of the meeting. His entire effort was hypercatalectic to say the least.

Somehow through it all they stressed the need for police within the Village of Clarkston. The village needed police for parades and other historical events. The police need was within the village. With regard to the school need, the ingress and the egress to the Clarkston Junior High, the Clarkston High and the Athletic Field, they are within the Village of Clarkston. The school crossing guards are also within the village. It appears that if the school has a problem they should negotiate with the village.

Under the statutes of Michigan the village has no voice in the township police ordinance. Therefore the village and its inhabitants should refrain from an attempt to obtain bargain rate police service from the township. Furthermore, I believe when Trustee Thayer votes on the police matter, he is out of order and is in conflict of interest because he is also on the village board.

Now in checking the Michigan State Statutes that control township police effort, I found the following: 5.46 Section 12 Township police force, power to establish, appoint, make rules, fix powers and duties. (Final sentence.) The township Board shall make all necessary

rules for the government of the township police force and its members and shall prescribe the powers and duties of the policeman and watchman, and may invest them with such authority as may be necessary for the preservation of quiet and order and the protection of persons and property within that part of the township not located within the corporate limits of the village. (CL '48, 42.12)

I believe it is time the township seeks its freedom from the Village of Clarkston.



If You Were President of the United States What Would You Do To Fight Current Inflationary Trends?

A year ago today people all over the nation were complaining about rapidly rising costs. President Jimmy Carter went on national television to announce a new inflation fighting plan and a new inflation fighter. Alfred E. Kahn.

The annual inflation rate was 8.5 percent, unleaded gas was just over 70%, home mortgages were at 10 percent and the prime lending rate was 9.5 percent. Gold also had hit an all time high, selling for \$233 an ounce.

A year later Alfred Kahn has offered his resignation (Carter convinced him to continue), the inflation rate is 13.2 percent, mortgages go for 14 percent and the prime lending rate seems to increase weekly with it currently at 15½ percent.

Unleaded gasoline is priced between \$1.10 and \$1.15 a gallon and gold soared to over \$425 an ounce before falling back to its current \$380 price.

Opinion polls indicate inflation and rising costs are the number one concerns of Americans today. President Carter and The Congress recognize the problem but as of yet have not found a method of stalling or reversing the inflationary trend.

Locally, where the automobile industry reigns, layoffs have been announced starting this week and we're only in the second month of the new model year.

In informal conversations with area car dealers, The Reminder learned that car sales locally, were in sad shape. Other high priced items like carpet and furniture hasn't been selling up to expectations.

To get a feel of what the public felt about current inflation and rising costs The Reminder called over fifty homes in the area and asked the following question:

If you were President of the United States what would you do to flight the current inflationary trends?

Surprisingly the number one answer was to reduce

government spending. Over ten percent of the people answering the poll said government spending, especially money going towards welfare programs, should be cut.

Mrs. John King of Laurelton, Clarkston, summed up that position by noting, If we weren't giving so much away, we would not have bankrupted ourselves.

Mr. and Mrs. William Maier of Langle, Clarkston agreed, saying the biggest problem is giant giveaway programs our government has. They also added they were tired of the middle class having to support these programs.

John Paalman, a Clarkston resident and general manager of Danny Paris TV and Appliance also pointed to government spending, but he added "that is very difficult...nobody wants to give anything up but somebody has to."

Mrs. Robert Day of Ortonville Road, Clarkston had a plain and simple answer, "Get these people on welfare working," she insisted.

The second most popular answers were to cut wages and do something about our current Washington leadership.

Carol Thompson of Waumegah, Clarkston was outspoken in her support of wage reductions. She said everyone should hold back on wages, but especially the auto industry. The seven percent Carter wage guidelines should be strictly enforced.

Walter Griffiths of Poplar Court, Clarkston echoed those sentiments saying, the damit high wages (all of them) are the cause of inflation.

Lee Hankins offered this bit of advice. Fire all the bureaucrats in Washington.

There was considerable sentiment, however, from people who didn't envy the position President Carter is in

Edward Eaglen of Bluegrass, Clarkston said he felt sorry for Carter because he is in a very tough spot.

Robert Kent of Broncho, Clarkston indicated the President had a three-headed dragon on his hands--the heads being inflation, unemployment and the fuel crisis.

Surprisingly, very few of the people polled mentioned the Middle East, the oil companies, or the lack of oil in their solutions. In fact about everything else but oil, was brought out.

Mrs. George Lawson of Clarkston Road said it was up to the people to cut down on everything for prices to come down.

And Mrs. Robert Filbert of Bluegrass said she was doing just that. She claimed she was doing everything she could to restrict traveling and all driving in general.

Mrs. Elwood Johnson of Eastlawn said gas rationing is the answer. She further stated we should quit buying oil from Iran. If we instituted rationing, people would be forced to curb their driving habits.

Bruce Stigall, Farm Bureau Insurance representative from this area, said the only way to stop inflation was to make price controls mandatory.

Of the opposite view, however, was Mrs. John Brown of Hubbard Road. She said, "We should try to have more of a free enterprise system with fewer government controls. The government controls have really hurt the auto companies."



Locricchio, president of Pine Knob Investment Company, owners of Pine Knob, offered the entire complex rather than a parcel of the operation, explaining that he hopes the entire facility would remain as one piece rather than broken up into various parcels.

On July 23, 1975, the Commission rejected an offer made by Indusco Corporation to purchase Pine Knob. However at that time, speculation that the Commission would some day acquire the complex continued following a recommendation by the Independence

Township Board that the county make such a purchase. The proposed package would include the golf course, ski area and facilities, and outdoor theater. The Nederlander family, who holds a long-term lease on the theater, would continue to operate that portion of Pine

Motion to Abandon Police Services, Tabled Until December

The two-year old controversy of county versus township police services found its way back into the



headlines as a proposal to dissolve the local department appeared on the agenda of last week's regular meeting of the Independence Township Board. The proposal came from Treasurer Fred Ritter.

In addition to board disagreement over Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) or the township Police Services or a combination of the two, as currently exists, was disagreement over Ritter's handling of the agenda item.

Ritter indicated he had given the item to Clerk Chris Rose just prior to the Friday noon deadline. It had taken that long, he said, to make his decision to put the matter out for consideration.

At Tuesday's meeting Supervisor Floyd Tower expresed "shock" over finding it on the agenda later that day and criticized Ritter's handling of the proposal.

Trustee Jerry Powell called Ritter's motion to dissolve the local department "ill-timed, irresponsible and downright disgusting." He further accused him of making a "blatant attempt to find four votes in the last 48 hours" and said no attempt was made to contact him, Tower or Trustee Mike Thayer.

Ritter admitted later he had not contacted Powell or Tower adding, "Why bother?" indicating he knew their minds were made up in favor of keeping the local department. He said, however, he had talked to Thayer.

Trustee Rudy Lozano said later it was not unusual for any of the three full-time officials to initiate action on key issues nor was it unusual for them to "poll" the rest of the board prior to the meeting.

Lozano was prepared to support Ritter's proposal because he had done some investigating on his own having contacted Billy Nolin at the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. He said a recent editorial on the subject had nothing whatsoever to do with his decision to go along with & tter.

Lozano said Nolin had indicated a willingness to concur with several items Lozano considered necessary, such as maintaining an office in the village, not at Colombiere, and to enter into a service agreement with the township more specific than the usual blanket contract.



Clerk Chris Rose, the third board member to advocate dissolution of the local department, said, "We all want what is best for the township...this system (dual protection) just isn't working. It's a good idea, but it doesn't work." He defended the action saying, "We've got to take the initiative."

He expressed the need to have the best police protection for the township for the dollars spent. As far as he was concerned, the county could provide just that.

Trustee Bill Vandermark, a mamber of the Policy Advisory Board (PAB) appointed to investigate all aspects of police services, said he felt the county was the "most cost efficient" but was not prepared to deal with Ritter's proposal that night. He favored community input not possible because so few people were aware this item was even on the agent.

Note: Attendance at Tuesday's meeting was pretty much limited to police personnel, both local and county, representatives of the Clarkston Community Schools, several PAB members, and families and neighbors of the enforcement officers.

Vandermark also questioned what would happen to school events, parades, and township ordinance enforcement, now all handled locally.

Trustee Mike Thayer, also a member of the Village Council, questioned the status of the village parking enforcement officer and the school crossing guard also handled locally.

Mel Vaara, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and a member of both the Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals, read a statement supported by a number of other school administrators advocating retention of the local department. He enumerated the services provided to the schools by them and encouraged the board to study other alternatives.

Village Trustee Jack Byers agreed asking for a postponement of the decision giving the Village Council time to meet and formulate opinions.

Charlie Whitlock, another PAB member, supported the local department as the "nucleus" of law enforcement in the township. He also said Ritter's recommendation of two additional deputies was not enough; the township needed ten, not six.

Charlie Kimbel, director of Independence Township Police Services, said he was "astounded" at Ritter's speed and action, calling it a "personal vendetta". He said this was not the time to take such drastic action.



Robert Nyovich, assured board members their services were there if wanted. Nyovich fold them one department was more efficient administratively but his department will work with any local department.

Defeated by a 4-3 vote. Ritter's motion would have repealed the Police Servies ordinance "in its entirety" effective January 5, 1980, left one animal control officer and a dispatcher, and increased the number of county deputies from four to six.

A second motion to table the question until December 4, allowing time off for hunting season for some board members, was approved with a public hearing scheduled for November 27 at 7:30 p.m. at the Township Hall. No official action will be taken at that hearing,

Support for dissolution of the local department appears to stem from the question of economics.

Ritter outlined the police budget in round numbers setting it at \$260,000 with \$116,000 going for four Oakland County deputies and all other services to be found in that department. The remaining \$144,000 provided a chief, two patrolmen, an animal control officer and two secretaries.

The county provides township coverage from 4 p.m. until 8 a.m. The local department works from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Both are now on a seven-day work week.

The one mill levied by the township for police protection brought in some \$165,000 this year. Additional income comes from the state, the Village of Clarkston, and Pine Knob. Ritter does not count the \$49,500 from the Pine Knob contract calling it "an in an out" account. The village pays five percent of the police budget plus the salaries of the parking enforcement oficer and a crossing guard.

For the past three years, Police Services has required \$60,000 extra from both the general fund and revenue sharing to stay afloat.

What were Ritter's motives in making this proposal? He said he had wanted to do this several months ago but had to wait until an official meeting with the PAB and then was sidetracked by the October 16 special

election. "Not everything I do is politically motivated," he said. "I'm not running for supervisor...just treasurer right now," indicating he had heard criticism along those lines.

His reason for his action was "strictly financial", the best service for the least amount of money.

Ritter said PAB members indicated to him they had never discussed the possibility of dissolving the local department; they had wanted to retain a public service office. He maintained that just won't work.

Ritter concluded that previous requests for additional police millage had failed because people just didn't know how and where that money was to be spent. Also he wondered where additional funds would be found for the local department next year when no general fund millage will be levied. "If the department is not functioning properly, it's because we don't have the money to make it function properly."

Surprised at Ritter Motion

Supervisor Says Police Personnel Dispute is **Settled For Now**

Last week's surprising iniative to abolish the Independence Township Police Services even caught township supervisor, Floyd (Whitey) Tower by surprise.

Tower, told The Reminder, he only knew about treasurer Fred Ritter's request to place the item on the agenda the day of the meeting. He rationalized his tiebreaking (the motion failed 4-3) vote to keep the department by insisting the board must have more time to study the township's current police protection and the consequences if police services were abolished.

In his opinion the current coverage, which utilizes both the Oakland County Sheriff's Department and Police Services is working well.

Although he cited problems with communication and the lack of cooperation Clarkston Schools had experienced with the Sheriff's Department, Tower claimed, "I've never pushed for totally our own department. That's like empire building.'

Tower said last Wednesday's blow-up at the police department when officer Tom Cavalier was relieved of duty and fellow patrolman Dirk Feneley quit in protest has been settled.

"They're both still there and it has been resolved for the time being," said Tower.

The patrolmen agreed to continue working until a hearing is held. Under the Veterans Act, Cavalier would have to be given a 15 day notice before he could be dismissed.

Consent Judgments Highlight Springfield Meeting

by Carol Balzarini

Discussion of two, possibly three, consent judgments highlighted the November meeting of the Springfield Township Board.

One involved a development on the south side of Waumegah Lake, referred to both as "unique" and a

"complicated legal mess" by Supervisor Collin Walls.
The development called "Sisseton" was denied by the appeals board because it includes a private road, not allowed in Springfield zoning, and would result in increased non-conformity. The overall concept is similar to Independence Township's Poquosin.

Property ownership is a problem because the old plat was never approved or recorded. Now one individual has acquired nearly all of the land in question.

Walls told board members the consent judgment

asked for approval of the concept. He himself favored it saying it was "good utilization of the property" and that conceptual approval was needed to proceed with engineering. Board members concurred.

Much of the area is low-lying and swampy. Homes and landscaping would be allowed on only a small portion of each lot leaving the majority of its natural state. Some areas would be designated as scenic easements and involve the Independence Land Conservancy.

The second consent judgment Walls termed an "amicable agreement". J.P. Burroughs (Holly Sand and Gravel) will be allowed to continue mining an area north of East Holly Road between Tindall and Oak Hill near the mobile home park. The zoning, however, will remain residential although Burroughs will follow the conditions of the present extractive ordinance and reclaim all of the property according to a submitted plan.

Springfield Township first went to court two years ago when Burroughs began mining the residentially-zoned property adjacent to industrial property already mined for many years. Burroughs maintained it was all right to

Walls said he thought the "trade-off was worth it." Mining will continue with some restrictions.

The third case has not gone to court but attorneys for both parties have met. Walls said the judge asked the board to consider certain conditions in an attempt to avoid litigation.

The case concerns a site plan approved five months ago with the builder now seeking to eliminate both the restroom and paved driveway.

The proposed cement contracting business would be located in Holly Greens Industrial Park #1. Board members felt any change in the requirements would set a precedent for others. Township attorney Gary Dovre also suggested testing the ordinance which the plaintiff called "bad".

Walls said later "defending" was a better word to use because "we think we're right."

Under the language of the ordinance, the plaintiff claims he's erecting a storage building (no rest rooms required) while the township contends it is a garage to be used during the day.







Avalanche Ski Course to be Taught at Independence Oaks

An avalanche rescue in November?

Well not quite yet, and not usually in Michigan, but that's one of the topics nordic skilers will be studying in a course being taught at Independence Oaks County Park near Clarkston November 17 and 18.

The avalanche course and basic ski mountaineering are being offered by the National Ski Patrol System (NSPS) in November and February to "train skiers to use the outdoors safely," says Lynda Parker, a certified

Mrs. Parker and her husband Ted, an NSPS advisor for the Eastern Michigan Region which encompasses the southeastern quarter of the lower peninsula, will teach

According to Mrs. Parker, they brought the courses to Independence Oaks because they are interested in teaching safety in an area where cross country skiing is

becoming increasingly popular. Relatives of the Parkers own 360 acres of land in Metamora where they live and do most of their skiing. The couple are veteran down hill and nordic skiers. Ted has been cross country touring in Michigan and Canada since the late 1940's.

The NSPS courses are designed primarily for patrollers but are sometimes conducted for the public. In the fall session, they cover theory - utilizing films, slides and demonstrations. Skiers learn about proper winter gear, long distance searches and how to survive overnight if trapped by snow.


The avalanche course will cover the reason for snow slides, how their danger can be recognized, what to do in an avalanche situation and how to search for and rescue an avalanche victim.

Ted Parker explains that while the occurrence of an avalanche in Michigan is remote, the training is good background for all ski patrol work.

The Nordic Ski Patrol established at Independence Oaks County Park last year has grown to some 25 members who will patrol the park's 16 kilometers of trails and provide assistance to skiers. It is believed to be the first patrol of its kind in Southeast Michigan.




FORECAST DAVIS

What a difference a month can make! After enjoying an abundance of sunshine in September, clouds became the dominant weather feature during October. Although measurable precipitation occurred at the eastern Clarkston station on 15 days during the month, precipitation was slightly below normal during October. Monthly rainfall totals for our 4-township and surrounding area ranged from 1.24 inches at Detroit Metropolitan Airport to 2.52 inches at Elizabeth Lake/Waterford Township. Locally, the northern Clarkston station recorded 1.99 inches and the eastern Clarkston station 2.12 inches of precipitation during October. Through the end of October, the rainfall for the 1979 calendar year is about 1 inch above normal. The Clarkston area experienced its first snow flurries of the season on the afternoon of the 10th, with no measurable snowfalls occurring during the month.

Temperatures averaged about 3 degrees below normal per day during October, with the eastern Clarkston station recording a mean temperature of 49.4 degrees. Clarkston temperatures in October ranged from a low of 21 degrees on the 27th to a high of 79 degrees on the 22nd. The gardening season ended with our first frost on the morning of the 11th, as the temperature dropped to a low of 27 degrees. The growing season for 1979 lasted only 141 days, which is about 2 weeks shorter than normal. Oddly enough, our first frost occurred exactly on the mean date for that event (there is a 50% chance of frost in our area by October 11).

Once again it is time to think about putting on those snow tires and winterizing your car. For those people interested in snowfall statistics, our chances for a 1" snow depth is 10% by November 6, 50% by November 25, and 90% by December 14. Chances for a 3-inch snow depth are 10% by November 14, 50% by December 10, and 90% by January 5. (The isohyetal map was prepared by Robert C.
