

Local Writer Succeeds with Bogart Spoot

This story is not about rising costs and inflationary. Nor does it expound upon the evils being perpetrated in

It's a story about a local man-a man who has made good in the rough and tumble world of theatre.

The man's name is Russell Harvey. He lives south of Ortonville, works in Clarkston, and writes in his spare

His latest writing project was bought by the Michigan based Theatre of the Arts and is currently playing with great success at Machus's Mr. Macs Stables in Dearborn.

The satirical musical is called "Oh Cashablanca" and is a spoof on some of Humphrey Bogart's better roles and movies

Its brilliance is neither in the dialogue nor in the plot. The dialogue is often too corny and the plot-well let's forget it. But the musical lyrics and score, all fifteen compositions, are exceptional. Harvey certainly is a gifted composer of musical comedy. The songs had the dinner theatre crowd in stitches for most of the night.

The play's characters include Sham Sovel (pronounced Shovel) the Private Ear Man; Mysha the Mystery Lady; Black Lily White; Pedro Lorry (Sham's Sidekick);

Maybelle Mawbellah; Shidney Shnodgreff; and Count Tuotuentie (Soldier of Mis-Fortune).

Mr. Mac's Stables offers a good dinner and comfortable atmosphere. The semi-professional players casually mix with the diners before showtime.

The dinner theatre concept, although widely accepted in many parts of the U.S., is just now becoming popular in the Detroit area. Mr. Macs offers the very first dinner theatre subscription series in the state and the producers thought enough of Harvey's production, to open the series with it.

Harvey has high hopes for the play. He expects to show it to the Nederlander family in January and hopes one day to make Broadway with it. Those are high dreams but then I never expected Harvey, when he first approached me with the completed script last summer, to sell to Theatre of Arts. Original dinner theatre is practically unheard of-especially from an unproven writer like Harvey.

But he surprised me, and probably a lot of other people. If you enjoy light comedy and a nice evening Harvey's "Cashablanca" ought to be considered. It's at Mr. Macs through January 29.

Soviet Union Challenges Basic Rights

In 1812, our nation fought a war with the British to affirm that citizens of the United States were precisely that citizens of our country and of no other; and that they would receive the full protection of the government as is their right.

Today, 167 years later, that principle is once again being challenged-this time by the Soviet Union.

The Congress has properly responded to this challenge by calling upon the President to warn the Soviet Union against taking any action, under its new citizenship law, that would be detrimental to the interests of the United States or to our citizens.

This past July, the Soviet Union promulgated a new and far-reaching change in Soviet law regarding that nation's claims of citizenship. Under this new Soviet law, the Soviet Government will not recognize the foreign citizenship of any of its current or former subjects.

The Soviet Government has declared that a Soviet citizen is anyone who was born in the Soviet Union, which they consider to include the captive nations of Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania; was once naturalized as a Soviet citizen; or who is the child of parents who were Soviet citizens at the time of the child's birth, regardless of the fact that the birth took place outside Soviet

territory

Such broad reaching claims of Soviet citizenship could affect millions of naturalized Americans who have fled the Soviet Union seeking freedom here as well as those who are native born Americans of Russian parents.

Since the Soviet Union will be hosting the 1980 Summer Olympics, this Soviet law takes on added significance. It poses a serious threat to both participants and spectators who may want to travel to the Olympic games. It also poses a threat to many tourists and businessmen, falling under the Soviet classifications, who go into Soviet territory, for under this law, they would be Soviet citizens with no claims of protection from other governments.

Today, we see Americans threatened and harrassed in many parts of the world. The appalling situation in Iran is only one example of the deteriorating safety of our records.

The new Soviet citizenship law is a travesty of decent international relations. Fundamental to our concept of citizenship is the principle that the naturalized citizen, the first generation American, and the descendant of the Pilgrims are treated no differently before our government, and that each is equal in rights and privileges to the other. Thus, we cannot turn the other cheek to this new Soviet challenge.

2 Many Kids Plus 2 Little Space Equals Busing 4 Andersonville

Andersonville Elementary's problems can be summed up in an equation such as this: too many kids plus too little space equals busing for the three sixth grade classes from their own neighborhood school to Clarkston Junior High School. Many of their parents don't like the situation and neither do school administrators, but so far no other solution has been forthcoming.

That may change, however, as a new effort is being made by some parents to have school officials take another hard look at the school population and come up with some alternative solutions to the present one.

Norma Fowell came to the November meeting of the Clarkston School Board and asked that something be done about the situation. That request has resulted in a meeting scheduled for Tuesday, December 11, at 7:30 p.m. at Andersonville School, Present at that meeting will be Schools Superintendent Milford Mason, Administrative Assistant for Elementary Education Bill Neff, Director of Transportation Bill Dennis, Principal Lynn Jervis, and Mrs. Fowell hopes, a large number of Andersonville parents.

Mrs. Fowell does not have a sixth grader, her son is in the second grade. "If I want something done, I have to start now," she reasoned.

Most of her information about the situation comes second hand from parents whose sixth graders are at the junior high school now or were in the past. Many of them do not like the situation, she said, particularly because it is only Andersonville students who are bused, none from any of the other elementaries. "Why us?" she asked, "We're taxpayers, too."

A general complaint from the parents seems to be that these younger children are exposed to too much, too soon by riding the bus with junior and senior high school students, such as bad language, smoking and less than desirable behavior. They fear the children will grow up

A talk with several mothers who have sixth graders now or who have had others at the junior high school in the past shows them to be reluctant to be too specific because of their children who are still in school and still on those buses.

One said her sixth grader only gets a seat on the bus coming home because an older sister saves one for her. Often, apparently, the older students will not let the younger ones sit down.

Parents who have complained to Bill Dennis about overcrowded buses were told nothing could be done; there is a difference between overcrowded and overloading. Overloading is going beyond the legal capacity of the bus. Overcrowding results from larger bodies in smaller spaces, they were told. Some buses seem to be more crowded than others.

Another objection to the busing is the earlier hours for the children in the morning. These sixth graders keep the same hours as the secondary students. They have to get up about 6 a.m. to catch the bus at 7 a.m. Some parents even wait with their children at the bus stop during the months of later sunrises.

Just being in the junior high school annoys some parents. The sixth graders are kept apart in three separate classrooms, eat their lunches apart from the other students, and have recess periods when the older students are not outside. Some parents object to the fact they have no playground facilities.

These hundred or so children are neither elementary nor secondary. They are just there, the parents say.

One parent admitted this year was an improvement over past years. The sixth graders took a field trip for the first time to the Detroit Institute of Arts. They are starting to do more as a sixth grade with the teachers getting them together for some "positive things" such as roller skating, she said.

Several mothers admitted attitudes improved after the first few weeks at school once the younger students became used to the situation although no one seemed to be reconciled to the bus rides to and from school with the older students.

One question was raised by the parents: why does it have to be Andersonville students? Why can't Clarkston Elementary sixth graders just walk across the road?

"We have the largest area in the whole district. There are a lot of kids, but we're (the parents) are not very organized," one mother said.

Another said, "It's not fair that we have to bear the brunt of the situation, i.e. overcrowding."

"They told us no one complained until Mary Jane (Chaustowich) was elected to the school board...they've either forgotten or choose to forget because there have been complaints," was another comment.

Another source of irritation seems to be that school board member Vince Luzi has taken his two children, one of them a sixth grader, out of Andersonville and placed them in Clarkston Elementary. One mother called that "a slap in the face to us out here!" Another mother said she had considered doing the same thing but changed her mind.

Luzi said he and his wife decided to send the children to another school because Mrs. Luzi is a teacher at Andersonville and tended to expect more of her own children and kept a closer watch on them. He said it was difficult for children to be in the same school as a parent.

Luzi said their situation was not unusual, parents had done it before. It is a school policy to allow parents to enroll their children in another attendance district as long as they transport them and the other school has room for them.

He said the decision was also a "matter of convenience" for them. The two children are in the same school keeping the same schedule as their mother affording them "proper supervision" at home. Different schedules would have given them too much time at home alone, Luzi said. He drops them off at Clarkston Elementary in the morning and their mother picks them up after school.

Mary Jane Chaustowich, the only member of the school board who represents the Andersonville area, said the policy allowing children to attend other schools only solved individual problems and a permanent solution was needed.

"I'm not looking for an immediate solution," she said.
"But it is a problem that must be dealt with...busing was always supposed to have been a temporary solution."

Years ago, she said, parents were told it was temporary. Other elementary students may have been bused in the past as school enrollment fluctuated but the Andersonville situation has continued longer than any other. Next year there is every indication that a fourth sixth grade class may be necessary because of increasing enrollment, Mrs. Chaustowich said.

She said she has long felt something should be done.

Her own children are now in the third and fifth grades. The older boy will only be 10 years old in September when he enters the sixth grade. She said her concern is not only personal but for all other children as well.

Bill Neff, head of elementary education for the school district, is one of the first to admit the situation isn't the best; these sixth graders seem to be neither elementary nor secondary. He agrees many of the parents objections are not unreasonable, but he points out some of the advantages.

The sixth graders may not have a playground, he said, but they are the only elementary students in the district with gym classes.

He assured the Andersonville students in the junior high school were no better or worse off than any others. They all have similar class sizes, similar facilities, the same textbooks and supplies. Neff said.

Leasing or rental of other facilities was not possible although it had been investigated. A proposed elementary school in the Bridge Lake/Holcomb area would have benefitted Andersonville but was rejected by the voters. A new junior high school would have left the old one for use as an elementary facility but that, too, was rejected by the voters just last spring.

Reshuffling students as the school population fluctuated has been done in the past, Neff explained. At one time Clarkston Elementary sixth graders went to Clarkston Junior High. The Bailey Lake sixth grade was bused to Sashabaw Junior High for a while. Andersonville students were put into North Sashabaw in the beginning because it was an elementary school with space for them, but too much time was lost in transporting them that far so they were transferred to Clarkston Junior High instead.

Neff declined to discuss possible solutions to the current problem saying he preferred to go into the December 11 meeting with an open mind and see what suggestions the parents had in mind.

Some possibilities, however, could be separate buses for the sixth graders or sending the sixth graders from Clarkston Elementary to the junior high school or adding more portable classrooms at Andersonville or reshuffling the entire population of the school district or a repeat of June's bond issue asking for a new junior high school.

Changes in Springfield Master Plan, With or Without M-275?

The Springfield Township Planning Commission has been working with Township Planner Tod Kilroy on changes in the township master plan drafted in 1973. The biggest question seems to be whether or not the on-again, off-again M-275 should be included in the updated version.

The new plan does not show it although Supervisor Collin Walls told commission members it was "easier to plan for something that won't happen than not plan for something that does happen."

Walls went on to say that a year ago 70 percent of the voters said they wanted some sort of major north-south highway along the lines originally proposed for M-275. "It's one of the few specific directions we've had from them (the voters)," he said.

The plans for the original route were scrapped some time ago by the State Highway Commission following opposition from several areas along the proposed route mainly Commerce Township. Recently, however, M-275 has been resurrected in a similar form with a number of alternatives including two affecting Independence Township and the Village of Clarkston.

Kilroy told commission members both Commerce and White Lake Townships had adopted new master plans which included highway plans.

Other road changes include the state's one-time plan to run an extension of M-275 from an intersection of Davisburg Road and I-75 northward as a Flint by-pass. This portion has definitely been scrapped.

The Oakland County Road Commission has also made changes in its Master Right-of-Way Plan deletin? Holly, Kier and Oak Hill Roads as part of a major thoroughfare across the county.

Also eliminated is the plan to expand White Lake Road to a boulevard and connect it with Maybee Road and stretch on across the county toward Lake Orion. That plan had local residents puzzled visualizing a bridge across Greens Lake to make the connection possible.

Kilroy said the new plan was a "redefinition" of residential areas as low, medium and high density, and had commercial areas grouped along the Dixie Highway and not strung out. "Extractive" areas are shown as only those currently being mined. Indian Springs is now shown as a recreational area as the land has been acquired by the Huron-Clinton Metropark system.

When a resident pointed out that the new map did not reflect current useage, Kilroy assured him it was only a guide, an idea of what the township would look like in the future.

Commission chairman Roger Horton told another resident who was concerned about progress coming to the township in the form of sewers and pavement that they were attempting to keep the township as rural as possible "to the best of our ability". They needed the protection of a master plan legally if for no other reason,

Herbert Swanson said fifteen years ago there was no plan. Without one the township couldn't stop multiples or mobile home parks or whatever. "We're trying to keep it rural...from being hacked up...we're making some effort to control growth..."

Walls asked commission members to defer any further changes until they could meet with the township parks commission to discuss their recently-completed master plan. The plan, he said, would not affect the proposed map but he was concerned that it may not be compatible with the text portion of the proposed township master

Commission members suggested further changes, additions and corrections in such areas as sewer and water plans, natural areas, population projections and possible inclusion of an R-1A zoning designation.

The Planning Commission will meet with the parks commission at their first meeting in December and wait for text changes before making any final decisions on adoption of a new master plan.

Because of the holidays affecting the time required for publication of notice of public hearings, a final public hearing will be put off until after the first of the year.

Bottle Law Works at Oakland Parks

With Michigan's Returnable Bottle Law nearing its first anniversary in December, Oakland County Parks are celebrating cleaner parks and more environmentallyconscientious park users.

Supervisors of all eight Oakland County park facilities, including campgrounds, golf courses, a wave action pool and nature interpretive park, say the parks look better

The supervisors report too, that they spend less time keeping the grounds clean allowing them more time for park maintenance.

"We're diverting our time used to pick up cans and bottles to other things," he adds.

The supervisors also see positive changes in the park users, thanks to the Bottle Law. At Groveland Oaks County Park in Holly, where overnight camping is a major attraction, "The biggest change seems to have occurred in the children," agree Clyde Herb and Bob





Snow in Roadways Could Cause Problems

"Motorists don't need the danger caused by snow that is pushed from driveways onto the roads and streets,' said John L. Grubba, Managing Director of the Oakland County Road Commission.

He said some private contractors and homeowners push driveway snow onto roadways, presenting a sudden change in road surface conditions for passing

Such motorists are best advised to let up on the accelerator and keep the front wheels of their vehicle straight while proceeding through the hazard, he said. Speeding up or braking in such situations only increases the possibility of a skid that will force a turning movement in the slick snow, which could lead to loss of

"Contractors and residents can help prevent the problem by pushing snow to the side of their driveway instead of into or across the roadway." said Grubba.

"It's best to pile the snow to the right of the driveway as you are facing the street. Any that is later in the path of snowplows will then be pushed away from your driveway, rather than back into the driveway," he said.

"It is not possible for our operators to lift the snowplows at the thousands of driveways they encounter, so some snow from the roadway itself may be pushed into your driveway. This is far less than the bulk represented by a pile of snow you've previously placed the left as you face the street, directly in the path between the plow and your driveway." said Grubba.


- 1 cup whipping cream

Drain cherries and save the juice. Dissolve gelatin in 1/2 cup of juice. Combine cherries, sugar, cornstarch and 1/2 cup of juice and cook until thickened. Stir in almond extract and dissolved gelatin. Add yogurt and sour cream and mix well. Cool. Blend in red food coloring to achieve desired color. Pour the filling into 10" pie shell and refrigerate until gelatin sets.

"Service with Love" A Cause For Thanksgiving

This week-in honor of Thanksgiving-Women's World features not just one woman active in the community but, rather, a whole "network" of caring, involved individuals. Preferring to remain anonymous for the most part, they have worked quietly-out of Independence Center and their own homes--to provide a unique "Service with Love." Each day for the past six years--365 days a year--a number of area senior citizens have had greater peace of mind and a link with the outside world by means of a daily phone call received from a "Service with Love" volunteer.

The "Service with Love" program originated at Pontiac General Hospital October 30, 1972. At that time, 22 calls were made daily to the elderly and shut-in. At present, volunteers calling from 60 homes in North Oakland County give 200 aged that "daily call of reassurance".

Independence Center became the first satellite for 'Service with Love' February 8, 1973; and "Pauline"

organization. The recognition pin she wears--from Pontiac General Hospital--indicates over 2000 hours of volunteer service. Most of this has been performed calling the elderly each Friday, Saturday, Sunday and all holidays from her home. Other volunteers placed calls the remaining days of the week. Schedules, hours and changes are coordinated through Pontiac General Volunteer Service.

Basically, the program trains volunteers to place a daily call of reassurance to the elderly or shut-in person whose name has been placed on the list by the hospital, visiting nurses, or relatives.

Volunteers receive background material on each of their "clients", including who to contact if the person cannot be reached. If a close neighbor or relative cannot be made aware of an unanswered call, volunteers are instructed to call PGH, which coordinates emergency help for the individual-calling police, ambulance, etc.

Those involved in the program a number of years have


lived alone fell and broke a hip. She survived her trauma without going into shock-lying helpless in the bathtub fully confident "Service with Love" would send help when she was unable to answer their call.

'Bless you, honey" and "I don't know what I would do without you" are heard over and over again by volunteer callers.

An interesting sidelight to the program is the fact that former "clients" often become "callers", some when they are no longer shut in--as well as others who, themselves, are bedridden.

The bonds of friendship forged result in benefits to both the callers and those they call, Services often go far beyond the daily call. Birthday and Valentine cards, hospital visits, and gifts of food are, also, given "with
