was leaving Miss Gabier's office, sighing with relief over some unknown incident, her friend meeting her at the office door and them both laughing and talking about how they had fooled the administration as they hurried down the hall.

I waited my turn to talk to Miss Gabier to ask her about getting a visitor's pass to see some of my favorite teachers, and she patiently explained to me that it would be best if I waited until either lunch or after class. So, to pass the time I talked to some other teachers and walked around the halis to see what had changed. The locker and wall graffiti was still there, only slightly different from what I'd remembered. Sayings

"Get stoned," and Let's get high," were some of the many I saw.

Walking into one of the restrooms, I noticed the usual "battle damage" caused by the vandals; sinks ripped from the wall, toilets gone, mirrors gone, and urinals cracked or broken. Nothing new, I'd seen it all before, but now it started to affect me differently. It wasn't "funny" like it used to be when I was a student.

When I left the restroom I stopped and talked to an old English teacher of mine as she was watching the hall, keeping it closed from unauthorized students during that class period.

As I stood there talking to her, 3 students walked by and tried to go down the hall even though they knew it was closed during class. She repeatedly told them to stop and was ignored completely by 2 of the 3. One of them did stop. When I asked her what she was going to do about the other 2 she replied, "I don't know them, but their friend will tell me who they are and then I'll turn them into the office.'

I don't know about when she was a student, but I know this, no one is going to tell on their friends no matter what the cost. In a sense, then, she did nothing. But then again, what else could she do. I bring to mind an incident that happened last year.

A female teacher attempted to tell a student not to do something and when he refused, she insisted further. The student, without any warning swung around and punched the teacher in the stomach, which was bad, but even worse because this teacher was 8 months pregnant at the time.

An isolated act of violence, but it could

to risk their necks to help students who really don't want to be helped?

You are probably thinking, "Goo'd Lord, he was a student just a year ago, and listen to him cut down the student now. He sure has changed."

I agree, I have changed. I've grown up a lot and I've realized that I've got a great deal of responsibilities to handle. But some things. haven't changed. Some things never change. An Inside Look at a Newspaper

A Message from the Publisher


Welcome to The Reminder Zone Two. All of us here are happy to be able to share this major step in our growth.

Our new offices on the Dixie Highway represent much more than a facility from which to publish our newspaper. With the addition of a typesetter, Compugraphic represents the completion of converting our Zone Two composing Ortonville from facilities Clarkston. It represents the opportunity for our reporters and other creative people to work in an environment conducive to good journalism. But most of all, it represents an accessibility and visibility that The Reminder has never had before in Clarkston and Davisburg.

With the help of a dedicated team of employees, and of course, you, our readers and advertisers, The Reminder Zone Two has changed significantly in the last three years. Our sales have grown 50 percent in the last year. We've also successfully branched out into other fields with our own advertising agency and printing service.

We expect to continue growing and expanding. Our new offices and equipment, and the organization that we now have will enable us to achieve that goal a lot sooner than we have every hoped possible.

We're proud of our new offices and equipment and ever prouder of the high caliber of personnel we now have working for us. At The Reminder, people make the difference.

No Magic, Just Hard Work

There's no magic involved in getting a story into The Reminder-just a lot of hard work by a lot of dedicated people. It's simple enough to do, really, but it takes a great deal of care and concern to see that what you read is as accurate a report of the news being reporhumanly ted as possible.

t starts with a

reporter going to an event or interviewing someone involved in newsmaking events. The reporter may later check back with the individuals involved to secure more facts and details and to check accuracy. Once all the information is gathered, the actual writing is done.

Our new electronic Compugraphic typesetter puts the story in finished type photographic paper which is developed in a paper processor. What emerges are "gallerys" of type, ready to be "pasted up," by using wax on cardboard "flats." These flats already have ads pasted to them and the editor fills the remaining space with stories. Room is then left for photos.

The editor then writes headlines for each story which are set on the electronic typesetter. These are developed the same way as the story paper, waxed and put in place above the appropriate stories.

Photos have to be separately photographed again. While the film is still in the camera used for this purpose, a sheet of acetate covered with

thousands of small dots--a halftone screen--is placed over the film and exposed to a special light.

By noon Monday, the paper is ready to be shipped to our printers, Webco Press in Lapeer.

There page negatives are done and stripped, then mated with another page. These negatives are placed on an

emulsion-covered aluminum sheet sensitive to ultraviolet light. The plate and negatives are put in a platemaker to be burned on to hold them flat, and ultraviolet light turned on to "burn" the negatives' images into the plate. The plate is then runthrough a machine which develops the image of the two pages.

The plates go to the press for printing on long rolls of newsprint. We use the offset lithography printing method, one of the most advanced and efficient, which produces clearl, crisp, highly readable images.

After all the pages are printed, the papers are bundled, loaded on a truck and dropped off at the post office and to our carriers who bring our copy to your door or box.





in this world. You know in fifty years: I've never heard Marge utter a cuss word. No matter if she does get mad once in awhile, but swear...? Never! The worst thing she has ever said is good grief." Dale described his wife as being the most easy-going person he has ever known.


Marge, laughing at this remark claimed their durable marriage is attributable to supporting each other through the rough times. "There were a lot of kids who married when we did, during the depression, and some of them did not last. Mutual support is what makes the difference."

The Wilders were married during the dark days of the Great Depression while Marge was attending Dearborn High School and working as a mother's helper. After being turned away by several dif-


ferent preachers who thought Marge's youthful age was too young to get married, their persistence paid off for them. They exchanged rings in Plymouth, Michigan, February 22, 1930. Marge's wedding band was the tirst and last item ever purchased on credit by the Wilders. "Fifty cents down and fifty cents a week thereafter," Dale recalled.


After their marriage and up until World War II, Dale held various jobs. He worked for the Ford Motor Com-



pany for awhile and then for the Post Office. Dale, determined to be his own boss, ventured into his own printing business in Detroit. During this period of time, money being scarce, many times they would swap their printing services for goods that they needed. In fact, still in the family is a beautiful bedroom set which was acquired in a trade.

Dale was drafted into the Army during World War II and sent overseas, forced by circumstances to close down, by this time, a successful printing business. Upon his return home, the Wilders then purchased forty-nine acres of land in Springfield Township along Dixie Highway.

Due to a large swimming hole in the shape of a bowl located just off the Dixie Highway, their original idea for the new land purchase was to develop it into an acrobatic swimming pool with slides, swings and all the rest. This concept may have been ideal in Florida or some other place with a long summer season, but not

workable in Michigan the Wilders decided. In realization of this, they started a venture, as Sir Thomas More said, "no more like than an apple to an oyster."

This change in plans gave rise to the widely known "Whoopee Bowl". The name originates from a combination of two things, according to Marge who actually did the naming. She recalls that while in the printing business, Dale had a number of different cuts he used and among them was one of an Indian raising a tomahawk explaining, "Whoopee!" They tied the Indian's whoopee in with the original bowl idea and came up with the Whoopee Bowl. The name and Indian logo has not been changed since.





unprecedented type of business and have faith that it would succeed? "In surplus you can buy very cheap and sell very cheap," replied Dale. "It's only natural that people will buy from you." Marge added, "Even to this day many people are just not able to go out and pay the high dollar for merchandise.'

August, 1965 brought a disaster to the Wilders when the Whoopee Bowl went up in flames leaving only the front portion of the building and the stairway that led to their upstairs apartment. Because they had no in-

surance (not by choice), they suffered a 95 percent loss. The biggest loss in that fire, according to the Wilders, was their long cherished collection of "They can never be photos. replaced."

The Wilders, having owned the Whoopee Bowl since its beginning. enjoy a great deal of satisfaction in providing people with merchandise at prices that are not exorbitant. "The business has been not only financially profitable, but personally gratifying as well, especially in regards to the young people we have been able to give training in merchandising."

Inevitably, the Wilders will one day discontinue forced to management of their business, yet

they've expressed hopes of keeping it in the family; possibly to their daughter and her family who presently reside in Holly. "We've worked thirty years at getting those dars to park out front," Dale said. "We would hate to give that up for any sem of money."


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Proposed School Boundary Change Arouses Parents

An administrative hearing was held last week by the Clarkston Community Schools for the proposed elementary school boundary changes affecting some 100 Andersonville School children primarily in the Foster Road/Dixie Highway area.

School administrators had thought the proposal was acceptable to the majority of the parents until the public hearing when Edward Fletcher of Foster Road presented Superintendent Milford Mason with an alternate plan and a survey conducted by some parents in his area.

Fletcher described his plan as a "less drastic, viable alternative" to Mason's and one that would save both gasoline and miles. Fletcher would take the children from the Cranberry Lake area out of Clarkston Elementary and put them into Pine Knob Elementary. An expanded number of students from the Dixie corridor would then attend Clarkston which would, in turn, send its sixth graders across the road to the junior high instead of the kindergarteners as Mason has proposed.

The survey, which contacted sixty percent


of the fifth and sixth grade parents plus those affected by the boundary change, indicated a majority of sixth graders experienced no problems but if they had it was in connection with the buses. Fifth grade parents did not favor having their children in the junior high but they did not favor Mason's solution either. Parents favoring the boundary change were those whose children would go to Clarkston Elementary. Opposition came from those whose children would be sent to Pine Knob.

The plan proposed by the administration would send about half of the 100 students from the Foster/Edgar Roads area to Pine Knob now experiencing enough of a decline in enrollment to accommodate them.

The other half of the students from the Dixie Highway corridor as far as Davisburg Road would be sent to Clarkston Elementary. Clarkston kindergarteners would then attend Clarkston Junior High making more space in the elementary for the fifty new students.

The proposed boundary change came as a result of attempts by some Andersonville parents to have the sixth graders now housed at Clarkston Junior High put back into the elementary school. Their objections stemed mainly from the early starting time for the students and riding to school with the older students. Andersonville is too crowded to accommodate these three classes.

Alternate proposals of more portable classrooms or more buses were considered but rejected by school administrators as being either too costly or impractical. A boundary change was seen as the solution to



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
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the problem.

In answer to the objections to the boundary change in general, Assistant Superintendent Mel Vaara said there had been such changes in the past brought about by the growing and/or shifting school population. Such changes, he emphasized, were for space reasons.

The last major change was about four years ago when children from the Sunny Beach area were shifted from Balley Lake to North and South Sashabaw. Bailey Lake was too crowded, the others had space.

Two years ago Birdland students were no longer given the option of either walking to Clarkston Junior High or taking the bus to Sashabaw Junior High. They had to attend

Sashabaw because Clarkston was crowded.

Another objection was to having kindergarteners in the junior high with the older students. George White, assistant principal of Sashabaw Junior High, said the SPICE program has been there for four years with no problems whatsoever. SPICE, Special Program In Childhood Education, is for children with special needs between the ages of $2\frac{1}{2}$ and 6.

Pat Loveless, one of the SPICE teachers. called the arrangement "very positive" and "mutually beneficial". Junior high students are often used as aides giving them experience with young children they might not otherwise have.

Another concern expressed by the parents was that their children would make friends at Pine Knob and then would be seperated from them after grade school when the Foster/Edgar children went to Clarkston Junior High while the other Pine Knob students would go on to Sashabaw Junior. However, Bailey Lake students have had that situation for some time as many of them go on to Sashabaw while the rest go to Clarkston.

Mason will evaluate the Fletcher plan with the final decision to be made by the School Board in April or May.

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
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
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Independence Electors Approve Seven and a Half Percent Pay Raises

The forty electors who attended the annual meeting approved seven and a half percent cost-of-living pay raises for the seven elected

officials of Independence Township.

Supervisor Floyd Tower's salary will rise from \$26,636 to \$28,633 while Clerk Chris Rose and Treasurer Fred Ritter will see their salaries increase from \$24,417 to \$26,248. The annual rate for the four trustees will go from \$3,000 to \$3,225.

Because this is an election year, there was no support for an additional two percent "merit" raise on top of the seven and a half as proposed by Trustee Bill Vandermark. All raises had been approved by a 2-1 margin.

With few comments and questions from those present, the 1980-81 proposed general fund budget of \$1,157,450, up nearly \$46,000 from the last fiscal year, was approved.

The electors expressed concern over the seeming inequities of the money budgeted for parks, recreation and senior citizens versus the money budgeted for road projects.

Over a quarter of a million dollars has been set aside for the latter while only about \$86,000 has been budgeted for the 56 odd miles of gravel roads in the township.

Trustee Jerry Powell became somewhat testy when one citizen asked how many board members lived on gravel roads. "What the hell does that have to do with it?" he

Trustee Bill Vandermark, the only one who does live on an unpaved road, explained the board was doing the best it could with what had to serve the needs of the community and

Ten Percent Pay Hike Gets Springfield Electors' Approval

The Annual Springfield Township meeting which presents the proposed budget for next year, took place on Saturday, March 29. All of the budget proposals for the coming year were passed with little opposition, including the increase in salaries of all five board members.

Collin Walls, Township Supervisor was awarded an increase in salary of 10 percent enlarging his pay from \$18,600 to \$20,500. There was a motion to expand his 10 percent to a hearty 15 percent, followed by a great deal of discussion among the 50 or so residents present. The "nays" outnumbered the "yeas" though, and Walls maintained the original 10 percent increase.

original 10 percent increase.

Springfield Township Clerk, J. Calvin Walters (17,599.92 to \$19,400.00), and Treasurer, Patricia Kramer (\$15,999.94 to \$17,600) also received a 10 percent increase in salary each. Trustees William Whitley and Glen Vermilye each gained \$600 per year wage increases. Along with this, both trustees received \$37.50 each for attending the township meetings. After Saturday, this amount has been changed to \$40 per meeting.

A 1980-81 budget proposal of \$323,820 was passed. That represents a \$59,256.00 increase over 1979-80.



Three's a crowd

Dear Three's,

All children need rules and limits. Your stepdaughter is no exception. Would you allow your own child to take over?

All adults need time to themselves. Daily time to talk and share is essential in keeping marriages strong and healthy. Set down firm but reasonable limits that allow you and vour husband private time to talk.

Allow time for your step-daughter. She needs to feel included, loved and accepted. Her feelings, I would guess, are a little low right now, judging from her acting out behavior:

suggested the Oakland County Road Commission be contacted instead.

Because of the possible reduction or cutoff of federal funds to the states, there was concern over the \$580,000 in state shared revenue included in the general fund budget. Board members have agreed to hold quarterly budget meetings to monitor the status of those funds.

Due to events, holidays and scheduled elections, meeting times for the township board for the next fiscal year has been altered somewhat from the standard first and third Tuesdays of the month.

April meetings will be on the 8th and the 15th, May meetings on the 6th and 27th, July meetings on the 1st, 15th, and 29th, and November 18th. All others will be on the first and third Tuesdays as usual.
