Concerned Dear Concerned,

There are volumes written on depression. however, a simplified definition of the cause would be unexpressed feelings, such as sorrow, loss, anger, sadness, and hurt. When a person holds in these feelings they act like poison in a person's system. That poison must come out in some way. Depression is one way.

One way to work dissolving toward depression is to learn to talk about what bothers you. If you could help your friend talk about what bothers her, that is, express ner thoughts and feelings, she may begin to experience some relief from her depression.

If she does open up and begins to express herself, I suggest you carefully, listen ask some maybe clarifying questions, and refrain from advice-giving.

### Rep. Trim Seeks Help in Getting Restitution Bill Passed

I have done extensive research in the area of restitution by criminals, and subsequently I introduced a package of bills dealing with that area. These bills have now been consolidated into one bill. This consolidated bill has now passed the House and will be taken up in the Senate Judiciary Committee, of which Senator Basil Brown is Chairman.

I would urge citizens to write letters to Mr. Brown with regard to the urgency of such a bill in order to help instill responsibility into our citizens, and especially our youth.

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### Independence August Ballot Loaded with Millage Requests

Independence Township voters will get the chance to approve five different millage requests on the August primary ballot.

At a meeting last week, the Independence Township Board approved the placing of a request for an additional mill for fire protection, an additional mill for police protection and a half a mill for safety paths on the August ballot. In addition, the Board will ask voters to renew the one mill currently being used for police millage.

Also on the same ballot will be a request

from the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission to renew a quarter of a mill for the parks system.

The additional mill for fire protection was heavily debated at the meeting before the board approved its placement on the ballot 5-2, with Clerk Chris Rose and Trustee William Vandermark dissenting.

According to Fire Chief Frank Ronk, "The one mill would get us into bringing our equipment up-to-date, get us into our building program and get us back into emergency medical service (EMS)."

It was EMS that board members were most concerned about. Ronk was attending the meeting to suggest EMS would have to be cut unless additional monies were found.

The fire department, said Ronk, was experiencing a cash flow problem. The fire fund currently owes the township's general fund \$145,000, after borrowing money last August to cover expenses through December. In January the loan was extended through May.

Now the department is expected to pay back \$100,000. But with the remaining \$45,000 outstanding debt and another \$35,000 in county delinquent taxes anticipated to arrive to the township by July, the fire fund should have sufficient monies until the August vote to continue EMS and other services.

Opposition to the fire millage was not against EMS, but rather the fact that with so many proposals on the ballot, voters may choose to ax the very critical police proposals.

"We've got to get that money renewed for police," said Rose. "If you load it (the ballot) up, you can stick six or seven mills on there...It's ridiculous."

Vandermark concurred, "I don't think this one mill for fire is as critical as police. My priorities indicate this is not a hot item."

Board members agreed earlier that two separate millage requests for police (1 mill renewal, 1 mill additional) should be placed on the ballot.

Trustee Jerry Powell summed up the Board's consensus opinion when he said, "I think it is imperative that we ask for an additional mill for police, and it is incumbent for the board to get out and get it approved."

The ½ mill for safety paths would provide the township with approximately \$110,000 each year for the next ten years. According to safety path committee member Joe Figa, that's enough to construct 4 miles of safety paths every year.



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

### Up, Up and Away in a Hot Air Balloon

We were floating a thousand feet in the sky -- over buildings, over lakes and over untouched forests. Suddenly we dipped down, brushing tree limbs, coming within a few feet of lake water.

No, we weren't in danger. Just goofing around in a hot air balloon!

The Reminder contacted Fly By Night Balloons, Inc. owners Phil Empey and Mark Treffehn, to see if editor Mike Wilcox could experience first hand what it was like to float

through the sky in a hot air balloon.

They consented and we planned our takeoff from M-15 at Oakwood Road in Ortonville. We had a choice at flying at dawn (6 a.m. in the morning) or at dusk (7 p.m. at

night). I chose the latter.

We arrived at the takeoff area at 6:15. The balloon was taken out of its 4'X4'X2' storage basket, and unraveled in the grass. Three propane tanks that are stored in the balloon during flight were also unpacked, as was the propane torch and accompanying fan that are used to inflate the balloon.

On this particular night, four men, Empey and myself were there to assist in takeoff and because of the shifting winds, everyone of us were put to work.

The propane was ignited and the fan blew it into the center of the 80' long nylon

balloon. For five minutes the fan blew. The heat emitted by the propane was scorching. The balloon began to inflate and rise — but not enough. We stopped, took a brief rest, and turned on the propane again. This time, success. Empey and I jumped into the passenger basket, the cords holding the balloon to the ground were cut, and within 10 seconds we were flying at an altitude of one thousand feet.

Empey said that because of the shifting winds, it was one of the roughest takeoffs he had been involved with for a long time.

Empey has been flying for seven years, long before the sport became fashionable and popular. His balloon, made by an English firm called Cameron, cost about \$8000 at today's prices, but according to Empey is well worth it, being much safer than any of the Americann balloons now available.

The balloon is powered by propane gas. Empey estimates he uses about \$25 of gas for every hour he's up in the air.

Propane is obviously expensive, but it can also be dangerous. Empey found that out the hard way when one day last summer while taking off he destroyed not only his balloon, but his truck also.

That was caused by a freakish mishap, however, and Empey sternly instructs his passengers on safety features and

regulations.

Back to the flight. From Oakwood we traveled southwest at about 10 MPH. We had very little control over which direction we could fly, obviously because the balloon follows the wind currents. But, we could go up or down from touching ground up to 10,000 feet in a matter of seconds.


Despite the fact that Empey has been flying in this area for several years, people still come out of their homes, stop their cars and holler and shout his name whenever he flies by. It's amazing, said Empey, to see their interest. And Empey enjoys it, waving and shouting "hi" to everyone in sight.


Flying over Lake Narrin in Groveland Township, we noticed two fishermen in a rowboat on the lake. Empey suggested we dip down and see how the fishing was. In seconds, we were skimming the lake, conversing with the fisherman. Just as quickly, we ascended again to a thousand feet to cruise over acres and acres of rural farmland.


Soon we were flying over Wildwood State Park. There a person was taking movies of our flight. Others had cameras, obviously enthralled with the big blue balloon.

Across Dixie Highway we went. People stopped their cars to get a glimpse of the

passing balloon. We were headed over a gravel pit -- a possibly good landing place (we had been in the air for over an hour). Empey touched the balloon down and I got out looking to see if the balloon's crew, which had been following us in a pick-up truck could get into the gravel pit. In the meantime, a man in a suit came running from a nearby wooded area. He claimed to be a reporter from the Oakland Press, and be napping pictures profusely.

le to reach I found that the crew v.as L the gravel pit, thus I jumped Jack into the balloon and we again ascended.

Soon we had passed 1-75 and were approaching another gravel pit. Men, working the late shift, stopped to converse with us, as we descended to make a landing at the far end of the pit.

The landing was smooth. As we touched



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

ground, Treffehn grabbed the basket and pulled us to a spot where we could easily fold-up and pack the now deflated balloon:

It was over -- and I-was sold. There's not a more peaceful feeling than floating through the skies in a balloon.

Phil Empey discovered that seven years ago. He flies 3 or 4 days a week, often taking one of his three kids with him.

He and Treffehn, who has been training with Empey for six months and soon hopes to become a certified pilot (by passing both flight and written tests) are now emarking on a new business venture.

They call themselves Fly By Night Balloons (627-4612), and are offering their balloon rides, promotions and flight instructions. Empey hopes to use the profits from this venture to buy a bigger and better balloon.

HOW A HOT AIR BALLOON OPERATES

Most people have the same basic concept of a balloon. Usually they think it has some kind of gas in it, like helium, and that it carries sandbags draped over the side of the wicker basket. Although some balloons still are like this, their numbers are few. Modern balloons -- called hot air balloons -- get their lift from heated air trapped inside the bag or envelope. The envelope is made of nylon which is tough, light and non-porous. Propane gas is used as the source of heat, which is a relatively inexpensive and convenient fuel. The basket is connected to the balloon by steel cables which have far more strength than can ever be used. Instruments are carried in the basket to measure altitude, the rate of ascent and descent and the temperature at the top of the balloon. This is important, since extreme heat can weaken the nylon fabric and cause possible air leaks.

The balloon operates as follows: When the air inside the nylon balloon is heated, it expands, becoming lighter or less dense than the ambient atmosphere. The air inside the balloon is heated by burning propane which is stored in a liquid state in 10 gallon tanks located in the balloon's basket. When the pilot operates the control throttle, the liquid propane passes through the hose that is connected to the burner system, passes through the coiled burner and quickly becomes a combustible vapor. The burning vapors have the capabilities of putting out approximately 100,000 BTU's. As the balloon ascends in flight, there is more pressure at the lower part of the balloon than at the up-

per part, causing it to continue to rise.

Although the pilot can control the rate of ascent or descent, he cannot "steer" the balloon. It travels at the same speed and in the same direction as the wind. However, the wind blows in different directions at different altitudes. So, if the pilot chooses the altitude where the wind is blowing in the direction he wants to go, he has a better than average

chance of getting there.

Mrs. Glenn said, "I favor new buildings and improvement of old, and millages, but I firmly believe that you cannot wait for utopla to deal with program, structurally attitudes toward and philosophy,

few years because I am convinced we need more space and better facilities for our kids. At the same time I can appreciate the concerns of taxpayers about their growing tax,



burden made even more difficult by skyrocketing inflation. I think we should continue to assess our facility needs, to inform the public of these needs, ask their support for improvements and respect the voice of the people when their decision is made. I support more involvement of the Board in the school budget review process to do more in representing their taxpaying constituents' interests.

Mrs. Townsend is a member of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, and is presently helping form a local chapter of that group.

Mrs. Townsend said, "I believe that physical fitness and learning go hand in hand. I'm very dismayed, as many parents in the district are, that our schools (elementary), are not equipped with gymnasiums. Our children need physical as well as intellectual education. I would like to see a formal physical education class for Kindergarten - 6 in each of our elementary schools, taught in reasonable sized gymnasiums.

"We need a whole new districting plan, taking into consideration the newly populated and potential growth areas. I want to see our elementary age children in schools nearest their homes, and not shuffled back and forth from school to school. I feel children, especially in Kindergarten-6th grade are still at the age where they seek the comfort and security of routine.

"Our school district is having monumental financial problems this election year, stemming partly from the legislatures misuse of the Headlee Amendment. However, I don't feel that by voting in another 3 mills is going to be the answer to our problems. I believe that we need to analyze the areas where we can cut the waste and misue (if any) of our tax dollars."
