

If you're traveling towards 1-75 on Main Street, the speed limit, according to posted signs is 40 MPH.


That's right! Not 25 MPH, Not 30 MPH, but 40 MPH. That's the same speed that is posted on parts of 4-lane Dixie Highway.

Ortonville Festival June 27-29



Seven-Year-Old Uses Machine to Talk

Like any other seven year old boy, Clarkston resident Christian Chambers loves to swim, fish, ride horseback and bicycles. Nothing phenomenal about this-except that, at age two, Christian's parents, Ralph and Doreen were told by doctors that Christian would never be able to walk. But Christian does walk ... and much, much more. The conclusion that he would never walk was drawn from the fact that when Christian turned ten months old, it was discovered that he suffered from cerebral palsy.

Unfortunately, the illness did affect Christian's speech center which incapacited, his ability to speak. Neither Christian nor his

family let this handicap stand in the way.

"He loves a challenge," says Mrs. Cham-bers. "He's motivated enough to try anything. Christian enjoys everything and loves going any place-just as long as he's going.

Christian attends the Herrington Orthopedic Unit, a school in Pontiac which specializes in teaching their students alternate means of communication. This school offers techniques to help him overcome his communication barrier.

One such aid is referred to as a "Bliss Board". It's a poster that Christian carries with him with symbols of often used words and phrases having the written word printed







under the symbol. By expressing himself with the Bliss Board, Christian is not only able to communicate, but learns the orthography (art of spelling) as well.

Another group involved in Christian's special learning process is the Oakland County Communication Center--Reading and Language Clinic. The director of the program is Dr. Nathaniel Peters and she is assisted by Communication Consultant, Ina Kirstein.

This group possesses advanced technological devices that are lent out to individuals like Christian. He presently utilizes a device called a "Handi Voice", which according to Kirstein is a "pre-programmed voice synthesizer that combines phonetics." Again, similar to, but much more complex than the Bliss Board the Handi Voice uses symbols for words but when pressed will actually speak the word or words. "It has the


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Lake Road, the Reading and Language Clinic's role is to work with each child individually and to evaluate their progress. They also see that the proper instruments are being used in learning to communicate.

Ms. Kirstein presently works with Christian on a one-to-one basis and is very pleased with his progress. "Christian is a very bright boy who has forged ahead remarkably," noted Kirstein.

These three categories have been subcontracted to local businesses who have spent time with " 3 students sharing the knowledge of their particular aspect of the construction trade.

Gary Stewart, sub-contractor for the electrical work maintains that the program is such a success he wishes it had been offered while he was attending high school. "I would bet at least half of the kids involved stay in the building trades and make it their career," Stewart added.

Moscovic says, "The amount of tough labor involved in building a house is unvelievable." One of his goals is to get the kids to look beyond the hard, manual work to the technical side of building. "Through the

May also had its share of severe weather



For the calendar year through the end of May, the eastern Clarkston station has recorded a total of 13.22" of precipitation, which is about 1½ inches above normal.

Temperatures in May were above normal for a change. The mean temperature for the Clarkston area was 58.5 degrees, which is about 1½ degrees above normal. Temperatures at the eastern Clarkston station ranged fromm a low of 30 degrees on the morning of the 8th to a high of 85 degrees on the 22nd and 28th. Daily high temperatures reached into the 80's on 8 different days during the month, with only 2 of those days experiencing precipitation. The last day on which frost was noted was May 10, which is only 1 day later than the average for this area.

During this past month, I had the opportunity to attend a lecture given by, Dr. T. Fujita, a well-known authority on toinados. Dr. Fujita presented some interesting statistics relating the observed frequency of tornado activity to cyclic peaks in sun-spot activity. Based on this theory, Dr. Fujita predicts that there will be a major outbreak of tornados in 1981 (next year). Now where is my home insurance policy...?







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A Word About Joint Ownership


There are several ways to own property with somebody else. However, what most people mean by "joint ownership" is something technically called "joint tenancy with right of survivorship." It's the most common shared-property arrangement for couples, although more than two owners can be involved.

Under joint tenancy, each person owns an equal share of the property. When one owner dies, his share passes immediately to the surviving owner or owners. No matter what a will or probate judge says, the property passes without interference. Convenience and family protection are prime motivations. Most married. couples put their homes in both names, for example, so that the family is assured of continued shelter when one spouse dies. Sometimes joint tenancy can protect the property from debtors' claims against the estate of the co-owner. Also, some people set up joint ownership of all property in an attempt to bypass the costs of probate.

Joint ownership is not a substitute for a will. Even if you want to put your property in both names to, avoid the costs of probate, there can be snags. Usually only a properly drawn will—a separate one for each of you—can ensure that the interests of your family will be managed as you would have liked. Also, without a will it's possible that your property won't get to the people you had intended. Say you've married for the second time, and you have children from your firstmarriage. You die and your spouse takes over all jointly owned property. What happens if your spouse remarries? You have no control over where that property goes next, even though you may have wanted the assets to be used for your children from the first marrlage. Other problems can arise with the simultaneous deaths of both owners. Speak to your lawyer about joint ownership to protect your property properly.

A Word About Closing Costs

Closing costs are all the fees and services you pay for at "settlement" time, when you close the deal and the title of your new home passes from the old owner to you. Some common closing costs you may face include loan origination fees, broker's commission, discount fees ("points") for the lender, appraisal fees, title charges, credit report fees, inspection fees, advance property taxes, recording charges, transfer taxes. See if your bank or savings and loan association will give you a copy of the booklet "Settlement Costs" prepared by the HUD. It explains your rights, the basic procedures, costs and steps you can take to protect your rights under the Real Estate Settlement Procedures Act. RESPA rules do not fix those closing costs; local laws and customs will set the price to a great deal. You can also write to the Superintendent of Documents. U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. The price is 45 cents, but there is a minimum charge of \$1 per order.
