

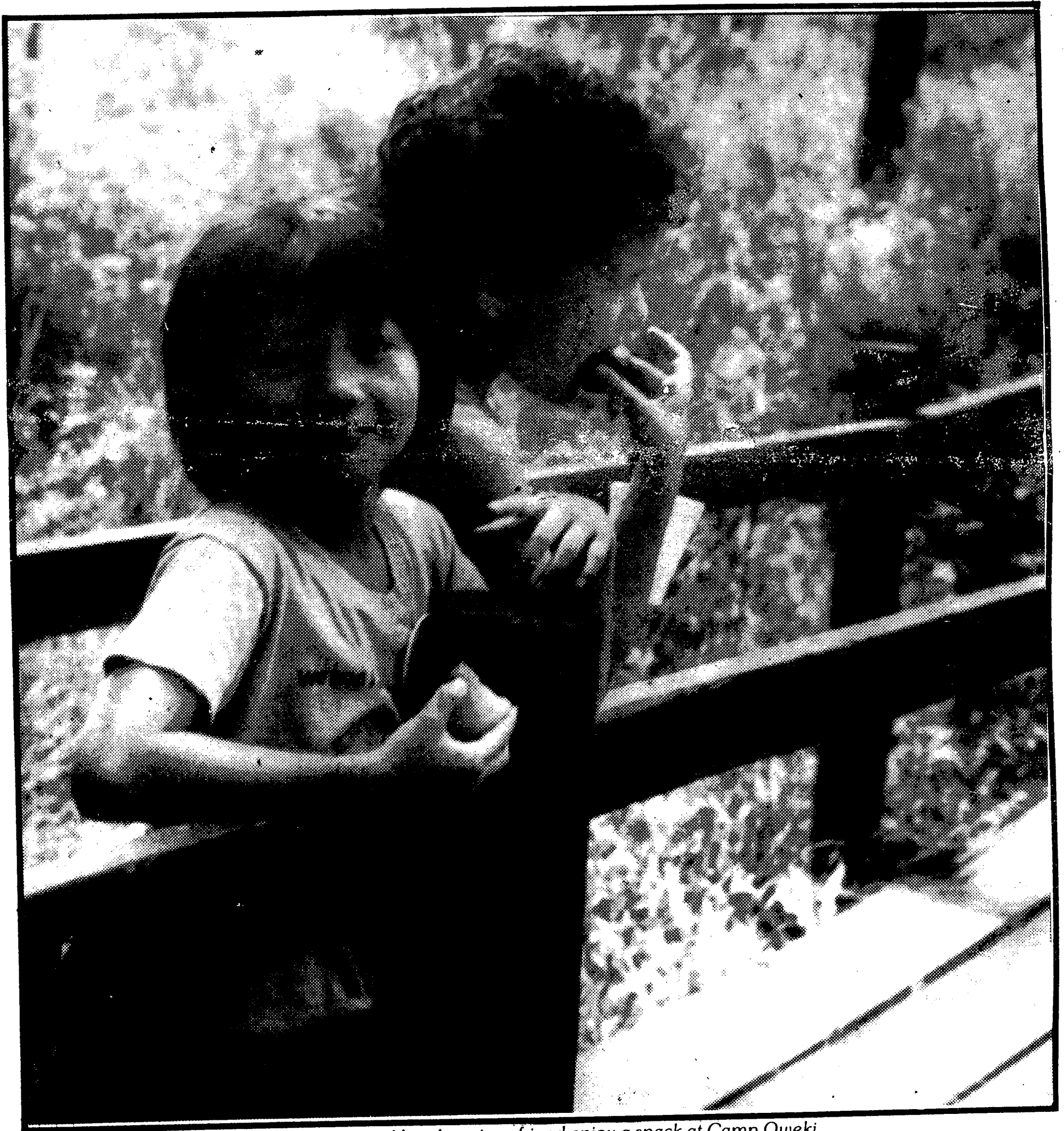

## editor's note

### An Intense Will to Survive and Succeed

This week's Reminder examines life in America, or how it is for sixteen young "boat people" who are attending summer camp at Clarkston's Camp Oweki.

Probably the most interesting aspect of the refugees is their intense desire to compete and succeed. Camp directors reported that although for the most part, Camp Fire campers and refugees intermingled well, when it came to games or competition the Americans shied away from the Asians, because the refugees were so intense in their will to win.

Another interesting aspect is that "will" to succeed or survive has "rubbed off" on those the refugees have come in contact with. If

they can overcome tremendous obstacles like starvation and constant war, why can't we, in the words of one of their teachers, Jo Davidson, scrape up enough money to pay the weekly grocery bill.

Far removed from the despotic jungle of Southeast Asia is Clarkston and its Catholic Church, St. Daniels. But its leader, who recently celebrated 25 years in the priesthood, Father Charles Cushing, has had "his will" rubbed off on just as many people, and probably more than the Asian refugees.

Father Cushing is the subject of a Reminder special interview. We found him to be quite candid and delightful in responding to a number of subjects. We think you'll like him too!

## Two Announce Trustee Candidacy

Larence R. Kozma, 31, of 5190 Woodcreek Trail, Clarkston, announces his candidacy for Independence Township Trustee on the Republican ticket.

Kozma earned a B.S. degree from Central Michigan University and a law degree from Detroit College of Law. He presently is an assistant prosecuting attorney for Oakland County.

Kozma is a member of the Michigan State Bar Association, the American Bar Association, National District Attorney's Association and Oakland County Law Enforcement Association.

"I believe the board must provide this township with the ascertive leadership to retain the character of our community. The

leadership in a representative government must be aware of the wishes and problems of the citizens it represents," said Kozma.

"My education and employment experience as well as my past involvement within the community provides me with the background to meet and handle the issues that will arise in the immediate future and that will continue to affect our township for many years."

"I am personally committed to Independence Township and want to insure that it remains the community that we are proud to live in," concluded Kozma.

Dale Stuart announced his candidacy for Independence Township Trustee. Stuart, 38, is running on the Republican ticket.

Stuart is a graduate of Avondale High School, Lawrence Institute of Technology and Detroit College of Law. He currently practices law as an associate with the law firm of Langs, Schatzberg, Patterson and Langs.

"The number one issue facing the township remains growth because no other issue confronts us so continuously," said Stuart.

"I support a good, well planned, master plan. I believe strongly in the right of a property owner to use his own land as he chooses as long as he remains within the law and does not overly burden his neighbors."

Stuart continued, "Another pressing issue is budgeting and income. 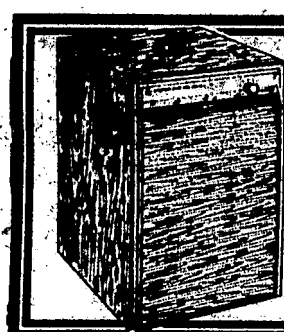

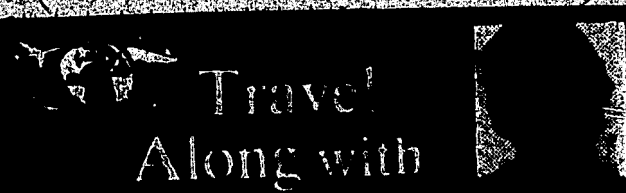

## An Interview with St. Daniels Father Charles Cushing Priest Reflects on 25 Years of Service

"I always seemed to have had the inclination to become a priest, starting about my third grade in school. I think what really clinched it is one day in the eighth grade a priest came in and gave us a talk." Having been thoroughly impressed with this address, Father Charles Cushing entered the Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit one year later and became a priest on June 4, 1955. He recently celebrated his 25th anniversary in the priesthood.

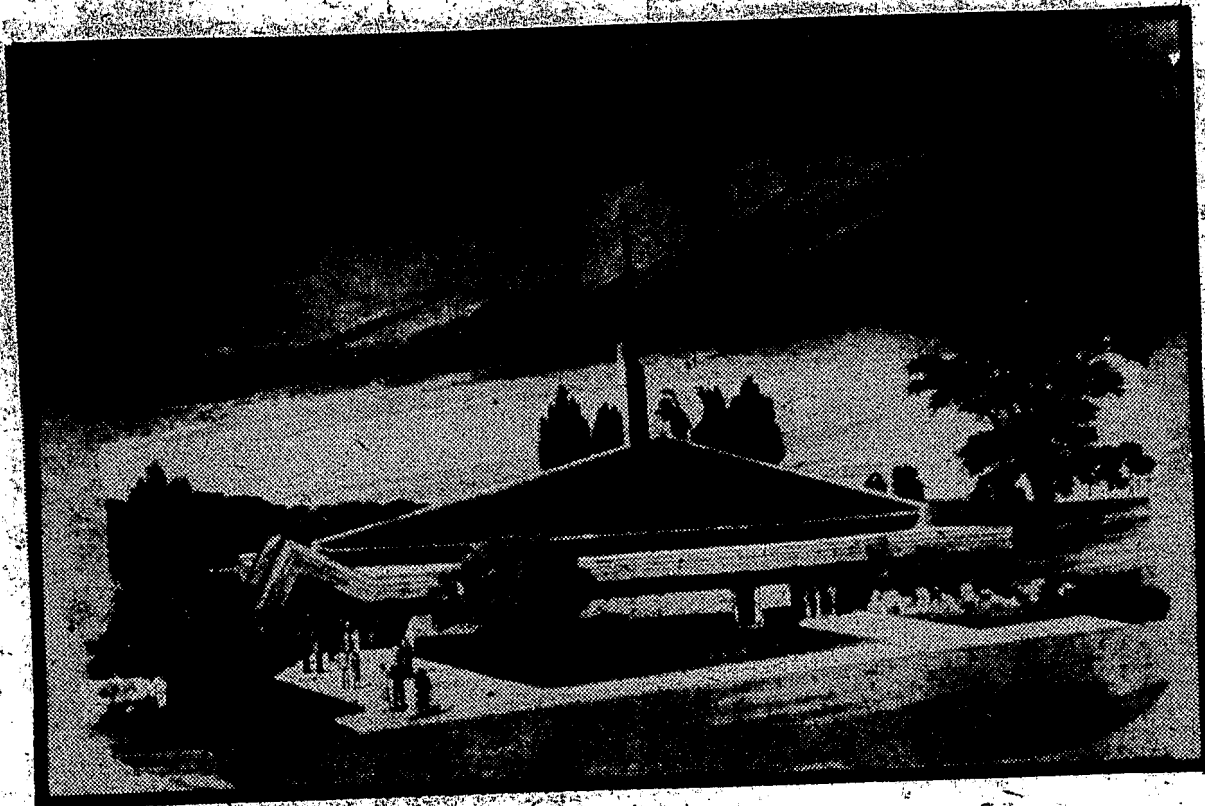
Father Cushing is currently assigned to the St. Daniel's Catholic Church in Clarkston. "This is a great place to be," said Father Cushing. "They never tell a priest the length of their assignment—maybe they'll just leave me here and forget about me."

"I'm very excited right now because of the increase in the number of registered church members in the parish. In two years we have almost doubled in size, due primarily to the population increase in this area." The expansion is not limited only to the membership size as there are plans for a new church. Groundbreaking will take place this September with completion scheduled one year later. The building presently used will be modified into classrooms and the part now used for church services will be converted into a hall.

The following questions were presented to Father Cushing by The Reminder for his response:

**The Reminder:** John Paul II is truly an attractive, dynamic, personable pope. Prior to his election there seemed to be a kind of crisis in the Catholic church—some of the membership challenging the leadership and policies of the church. Father Cushing, do you think his firm stance on issues will pull the church together to speak as one or push it apart?

**Father Cushing:** "It won't push the church apart by a long shot. I feel there are greater problems affecting the church than issues like that—like the general lack of spirituality. I think, too, the church is caught up in an overall lack of trust. Today there is a lack of trust in most institutions. You might find this to be history repeating itself, though. History books indicate this to be true. I think it's a question of the church showing itself to be concerned and interested in the ordinary person. I think Pope John Paul can do it. I wouldn't say Pope Paul VI was weak in

leadership. He braved a storm, you might say, as kind of an unwanted result of Vatican II. A lot of people do not understand Vatican II. There are many Catholics who think their faith has changed because of it. But the faith hasn't changed one iota. The liturgy has changed, the language has changed, and the sermons have changed somewhat, but faith, as such, has not changed. There's an awful lot of people whose faith is peripheral. If they hear the tinkle of the bell, the priest speaking Latin, and use rosary beads, they don't seem to go further than that. So there is unrest with some. I think it's gradually getting back to its state of equilibrium.

**The Reminder:** Do you feel there will be a lot more changes in the church or do you think Vatican II has been fulfilled?

**Father Cushing:** "The purposes of Vatican II, I don't think have been fulfilled. The renewal is constantly going on. You might say for the individual it happens everyday. I don't think you're going to see any kind of big changes, though, particularly from Pope John Paul II. The world has changed so very much lately I think people are very much afraid of change at this point."

**The Reminder:** Ecumenism (the promotion of fostering of Christian unity throughout the world) has been talked of very much lately in the Catholic church. What is ecumenism all about?

**Father Cushing:** "I think ecumenism, to try and sum it up, is placing emphasis on what I as a Catholic may have in common with let's say an Episcopalian, a Lutheran, or a Baptist rather than what I may have by way of differences. That's what ecumenism is really all about—to share those things we have in common."

**The Reminder:** What are your goals here, Father, at St. Daniel's Church?

**Father Cushing:** "First to provide adequate physical facilities for the liturgical, educational, social and general faith life of our people, and second that the people have a high degree of awareness that they are members of a parish family, to strive to have them possess a sense of faith in the church so to get the idea across to them that they are not just a bunch of sheep being herded together, but rather a genuine, caring family. That's what we would like to do here. Faith is a source of happiness. Basically, God wills that you be happy and that you realize the fact that the only way you're going to find happiness is through faith."

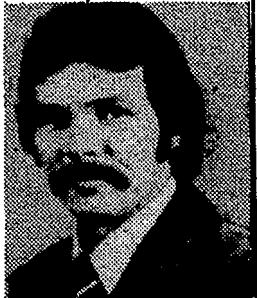

## Clarkston Recognized as National Historic District

The Clarkston Community Historical Society announced the inclusion of the Clarkston Village Historic District in the National Register of Historic Places. Clarkston now joins Williamsburg, Virginia, Boston's Old Town, and Charleston, South Carolina, among others, in being recognized as a district of great architectural and historical value.

In nominating Clarkston, the Michigan History Division relied on both architectural heritage and historical significance. Clarkston is a 19th century mill village which contains more than 100 historic structures creating intact neighborhoods.

The architectural styles of these struc-

tures span the development of the area, and are the reason the State Historic Preservation Review Board recommended this "district of outstanding historical and architectural significance."

Listing in the National Register makes owners who rehabilitate income-producing historic properties eligible for Federal tax benefits. In addition, private property owners become eligible for Federal grants-in-aid for preservation. Further, listed districts are granted limited protection from federally-assisted projects.

# Camp Oweki Hosts Asian Refugees

Refugee children from several countries in Asia are participating in summer activities at Camp Oweki in Clarkston.

It's all part of a program co-developed by the Whitmer Human Resource Center (WHRC) of Pontiac and the Camp Fire-North Oakland Council.

The program got its start when Jo Davidson, a first grade teacher at WHRC and also a Camp Fire leader decided she would take the two refugees she taught in her class to camp. The more she discussed the idea at WHRC, the more teachers and their refugee pupils became interested.

In the end, Ms. Davidson and a fellow WHRC teacher Mary Ann Rudelic accompanied sixteen refugee students to Camp Oweki last week, where they learned to make crafts, participate in games, swim and cook their own food.

The refugees came to the Pontiac area because of its relatively low housing costs. They are sponsored by churches and synagogues. All except two Koreans were forced to leave their country by boat. They come from Viet Nam, Cambodia, Laos and mainland China.

Besides the obvious Americanizing effects, the camp provides the refugees a chance to continue practicing their English.

"One of the problems they have is they only speak their native tongue at home," said Ms. Davidson. By attending camp in the summer, the teachers can review with the refugees what they learned during the school year.

Camp Fire spokesperson Sharon Kniffenn said that regular campers were getting along

and interacting well with the Asians. It's really like a cultural exchange, she said.

Attending Camp Oweki with the Asians are about fifty boys and girls belonging to the Camp Fire organization.

Although the American camp may be a new experience to the young refugees, living in the most disparaging conditions possible is not. The refugees tell their American teachers about hiding in jungles and being shot at. They talk about eating dogs, snakes and rats, of which one young girl explained, "you cut off tail, put on stake and then cook."

Another refugee upon entering Camp Oweki exclaimed, "I don't see no starving children. Did they all die?" She apparently thought all camps were like the refugee camps in Southeast Asia where she lost two young sisters to starvation.

Ms. Rudelic noted that the refugees have a vast knowledge of survival skills.

"Yesterday we tried to teach them how to build a fire," she said. In the end, they taught us. They rubbed their sticks together and within seconds had a good fire going.

Their will to survive has carried over into education also. Jimmie Randolph, principal at WHRC, a school that has one of the best bilingual programs in the country, said, "We don't have a (refugee) kid in the program who is not academically talented."

"They pick things up very quick," he added. "Within a year or year and a half they're excelling."
