

Budget Pinch May Force Fire Station Closing

At the Independence Board meeting Tuesday night Frank Ronk, Independence Township Fire Chief, requested the board's support in closing one station beginning July 7th. The department will be short the appropriate number of men to operate all stations due to vacations and budget cuts.

William Vandermark, trustee, said Ronk has the better judgment, and "the board shouldn't dictate what to do with your men and equipment." The board granted full support in Ronk's decision, which has not been made at this time.

A petition to close Waldon Road at Transparent for a July 13 block party was submitted and approved by all members. This will leave Church Street and Snowapple Drive as alternative exits.

A fireworks permit was granted to James Neaderlander of Pine Knob Music Theatre. The fireworks were displayed after the Jackson Browne concert July 4th.

SCAMP requested the use of Clintonville Park on July 26 and 27 for a two-day baseball tournament. There will be food and beer sold to raise money for the program. The request was granted.

Funding by the OLHSA (Oakland Livingston Human Services Authority) for Site Hostess was submitted for a 25-hour work week during a three month trial period. If participation at the nutrition site does not increase the program will be cancelled. The board approved the offer under the submitted terms.

A 7:30 July 8th meeting was set for the Quarterly Budget Review.





Holly to Get Phone Public Hearing

Dear Editor:

I thought this might be of interest to you... I have been urging that this hearing be held at the earliest possible time, for some time. I am pleased to see that it has, at last, been scheduled.

On May 2, 1980, the Michigan Public Service Commission, on its own issued motion. following minute action.

'In response to more than 100 complaints filed within the past two weeks by the citizens of Holly Exchange, the Commission hereby directs the Staff to investigate the reasonableness of establishing additional extended area service calling for the Holly Exchange, and conduct hearings to allow Bell Telep mpany and other interested parties to participate as is appropriate."

The complaints are generally of the nature that the radius of the Holly Exchange local service calling area is insufficient and that customers of that exchange cannot call in the same radius as people in other areas. Requests were made for extended area service to, but not necessarily inclusive of or to all of the following exchanges: Grand Blanc; Flint; Clarkston; Pontiac and Drayton Plains zones of the Pontiac District Exchange; Ortonville and Milford-White Lake; Goodrich; plus various other exchanges within a 30-mile toll rate distance.

The addition of exchanges to a local calling area, while increasing the number of stations that can be called without toll charges, will or may also increase monthly rates, change the availability to certain type of services being offered in the exchanges involved with increased monthly billing. may affect the present and rate future classification, or have a combined effect of all of the

If Extended Area Service for the Holly Exchange subscribers is increased to include the specifically above-mentioned changes and zones, all subscribers in the Holly Exchange who are presently in Michigan Bell's Rate Group B will be moved to Rate Group E. Based on present rates for basic local telephone service, that would mean an approximate increase of 15% for Holly residence subscribers. Business subscribers in Rate Group E exchanges also would have all local calls charged for at 6.7° per message. This does not include any CPI adjustment. The increase in monthly charges to subscribers of the Goodrich Exchange of Central Telephone Company cannot be approximated at this

The Michigan Public Service Commission may either increase or maintain the extended area service presently in effect, in whole

or in part, or grant a lesser or greater increase in rates and charges than indicated above.

Special hearings for the purpose of ' taking statements and testimony of the public desiring to be heard on this matter will be

held as follows: Holly - July 24, 1980 at 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. in the Auditorium of the Holly Senior High School, 920 East Baird.

Letters Continued Springfield Needs Tornado Warning System

Dear Senator Kammer and Editor:

I am sending you this note out of pure frustration. Because of the two businesses I own in Springfield Township, my wife and I moved into a mobile home in the township on a temporary basis 31/2 years ago and we are still there, for several reasons, two of which are the high rate of interest and we just plain like the life style and the people. It is a fine way to live, I feel, if you have no only children. The drawback to mobile home living is the possibility of a tornado, of which we have had plenty of this season,

rumbling through our park destroying everything and taking hundreds of unwarned and unprepared lives of the men, women and children that live there.

At 1:00 a.m. last week there was a definite possibility of a devastating twister coming our way, without warning, while all

slept. Groveland Township warned and evacuated to shelter all residents of ''Oakhill Estates'' while nearly 800 people in Estates'' "Springfield slept, very possibly to their

I understand that the leadership of Springfield Township turned down the

"Early Warning System" being used so successfully in the rest of the county, because there are "not enough people" living in the township to "warrant the expense"...

No matter what the reason, it is well worth "the expense" if one adult or child's life is spared through an "Early Warning System" in that one location, if no where else.

Most of the people that live in these parks, do so as they have no other choice. That does not mean that they should have to live in a constant fear without some Special protection. measures for a special situation are in order here. I feel that this is very very important, especially to those who live in this area as well as the rest of the community...

I plan on taking this problem to the streets, the newspapers, and even TV if possible, if in fact I cannot get satisfactory answers to this potentially grave problem. There are areas of more sparce population in this county that have this system. In Independence Township alone they have two units that are practically within shouting distance of each other, and in our township, we are left to fate. Look what happened in Nebraska and Kalamazoo and they had some warning. I wonder who will be willing to take the responsibility for 800 plus lives--vou?







WHY IS THE NURSE SO IMPORTANT?

The nurse may well be the person who gives the last comforting services to the dying patient. She can be a source of great comfort to his family as well.

The last days in a terminally ill patient's life present the nurse with one of the greatest, most difficult challenges in her nursing career, according to Nurses Claire Hoffman, Gladys Lipman, and Ella Thompson in their book, "Simplified Nursing".

The nurse knows and recognizes the needs of the patient. She learns to anticipate his requirements for comfort (i.e., a change of position, etc.). She is also alert to sense a patient's wish to talk to the clergyman or particular family members.

Nurses are schooled in dealing with the emotional stresses the patient (and family) is facing. Very often she takes special study classes in the care of the very ill for the sake of the patient and her own well-being. Like the doctor, the clergyman and funeral director, she is a very important member of the care-giving team.

Springfield near

doubled in population in the last 10 years, skyrocketing from 4388 residents in 1970 to their current 8110. Dwelling units in the township more than doubled from 1387 to 2918.

Independence recorded a modest increase. In 1970 the township's population was 16,327. Latest census figures report 20,248 residents. Dwelling units increased from 4435 to

6453.

The Village of Clarkston experienced a slight decline in population from 1034 people in 1970 to 934 in 1980. However, dwelling units rose from 359 to 413.

ABWA Awards Four Scholarships



It's Back in the Saddle for Area Residents As Urban Cowboy Scene Turns Them On

Hats and Boots Hot Stuff at Western Store

The current "urban cowboy" phenomenon has definitely got the greenbacks coming into Western stores according to Ted Remke, owner of Timberline Western and Ski Co. of Clarkston.

In fact, Remke is taking advantage of the craze by opening a branch store in the A & W Rodeo Restaurant and Nightclub, where patrons are buying Western wear, particularly cowboy hats, so that they may look "truly cowboyish" during their night out at The Rodeo.

'We sell tons of hats down at The Rodeo,' said Remke. "Sometimes we do more business down there than at the store.'

In total Timberline has enjoyed about a 35% increase in business, and Remke expects more. "We're kind of riding the crest. It hasn't peaked out yet."

Remke has some definite ideas on the sudden popularity of "the cowboy look."

"People don't have to act cool. The disco scene had to be just right," said Remke. If you didn't act right, dress right and dance right, you were an outcast.

Remke admits the current scene is a craze


or fad to some extent.

At Timberline, he marvels at the exotic boots and hats some people order from his catalogs. Leathers from elephant, shark, python and ostrich are used to make boots and Remke has had a customer for each.

Once the "cowboy craze" cools off however, Remke expects the popularity to Western clothing to continue.

"People start to wear it (Western clothing) a few nights to look cool, but once they start wearing them, they'll find them to be very comfortable," he said.

He continued, "The craze will peak out, but people will keep wearing them. Western clothes are here to stay.'

Springfield: A Progressive Community

"In the last two years I have witnessed so much more community interest than in the past," says Collin Walls referring to the residents of Springfield Township. Who would know better than Walls since he has been Springfield Township Supervisor for three-and-a-half years now. The township meetings are commonly full, area civic groups are increasing and general community interest is rising.

Also, the development of the heretofore untouched, country land in the Davisburg area is on the upswing. Until 1976 approximately forty subdivisions had been built in this area. That is 140 years to construct just forty.

In the past four years the Township Board has reviewed and approved twenty-three subdivison plans of which most have been completed. The building permits average six per month.

"This is much more than many other communities closeby Independence Township, for example, saw a drop last year in building permits, whereas Springfield Township keeps rising," said Walls.

Along with residential progress, there have been two industrial parks approved and are under construction. The Holly Greens Industrial Park which is located at Holly Road and Dixie Highway and Valentine's Industrial Park are two areas specially designed for the construction of commercial facilities.

Recently the Township Board voted to establish an Economic Development Corporation (E.D.C.). "This will alllow us to both encourage and control commercial and industrial development," maintained Walls. EDC, being a funding mechanism which allows the sale of bonds to finance industrial building at a lesser rate of interest than standard mortgage rates, will encourage building in this category.

Moreover,, this new program will enable Springfield Township as a community to control the types and location of new businesses.


Springfield Township, in the past, has offered many community services, but like most communities these days are wit-

nessing a funding problem. One impressive major service established in April of 1976 was the construction of the Springfield Township Library. The May report of this year showed over 1000 books checked out by residents according to Walls. "I think the library has shown beautiful growth."

Another development currently in progress is a vast, 2400 acre nature study area named "Indian Springs". The location of this area is encirculed by Crosby Lake, Hillsboro, Big Lake and Andersonville Roads.

Springfield Township Board has "just recently completed revising the master plan for the community making a few minor changes which may seem major to the people they affect. There will be an even larger interest in protecting the natural resources of the area and an effort to minimize the need for sewers in the future," said Walls.

There are also plans to collaborate with the Oakland County Planning Commission to explore ways to "bring back" the Dixie Highway corridor to make it more economically viable.





Davisburg Historical Society Strives to Maintain Rich Heritage

The Davisburg Historical Society is currently striving for acceptance in the National Register of Historical Places, a goal recently accomplished by the neighboring Clarkston Community Historical Society.

Belonging to the Register would accomplish Davisburg's recognition nationally as an area of marked architectural and historical value and allow private property owners to receive loans for restoring their homes at a low percentage rate. Businesses would also become eligible for Federal tax benefits should they restore their establishment to its original state.

The Davisburg Historical Society was established in 1973. During the past seven years, this group has been very fundamental in the preservation of the early American heritage of Davisburg. Two projects currently under way are the restoration of the Davisburg Harness Shop and the Davis

The Davisburg Harness Shop, otherwise known to many residents as the Shultz Building, is located at the northeast end of town. At one time this building was a combined harness shop, clock repair shop, barbershop and upstairs doctor's office. Last year, the Historical Society renovated the outside of the building and are presently doing the same to the inside.

The original intentions was to institute the shop as a historical museum. This idea has not been totally rejected but rather enlarged upon. Along with the museum there will also be a working tack shop including a harness maker plying his trade for all to see.

'We'd like to make it a usable building rather than having it just sit there idle,

maintained Diana Walls, secretary for the Davisburg Historical Society.

Renewal of the Davis house, which for many years was the Golf Course Clubhouse, is being directed by Leone Stanaback, a natural choice since she was a childhood resident of this home. The Davis house, built in 1875, is located on Andersonville Road. Upon completion it will be used for tours.

The Society is funded through private donations and through the sale of memberships, which entitles one to free tours. Annual membership fees are \$3.00 per person, \$10.00 per family and \$1.00 per student.

The current officers of the Davisburg Historical Society are: Marge Kirk, President; Oscar Haymond, Vice President; Diana Walls, Secretary; Bernice Miller, Treasurer; and Leone Stanaback, Corresponding Secretary.



Dilley Park where ball diamonds have been groomed into tip-top shape and a brand new pavilion and picnic area are available for the


But according to Ms. Graham that's only the start of bigger and better things to come.

Ms. Graham is working on a proposal seeking township acquisition of the DNR Trout Pond on Davisburg Road. The township would like to set-up hiking trails and a nature center in the swampy area that was once a fisherman's haven, but is now all "fished

Another project is the building of a bathhouse adjacent to the garage at the Mill Pond Park. Ms. Graham estimates this will cost about \$10,000.

Ms. Graham also has a few plans for the winter months at the Mill Pond. She expects to make an ice skating rink out of the Pond that is now crowded with swimmers. And in the garage, pool and ping pong will continue be played--but alongside gatherings.
