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

# editor's note

The Moscow Summer Olympics are nearly over, and it seems, the Soviet Union has managed to show most of the world, their superiority in sports. That might not have happened if the United States would have reconsidered their decision to boycott the Olympics. I still think that was a travesty and that there are better methods to conduct world diplomacy.

I talked to one person, that I know wouldn't agree with me on this particular subject last week. His name is Kareem, an employee at Oakland University and his homeland is Afghanistan. He's an old acquaintance and has been living in Michigan for approximately five years.

Unfortunately, he's not living here by choice, however. He fears for his life if he were to go back to Afghanistan to his family. He would desparately like to somehow smuggle his family out of the Russian occupied country, but he also realizes that is

Kareem tells of his father, who was forced to close up the store he owned when the Russians took over. They took everything he owned in the store and now he's living on the meager savings he managed to build-up while in business. The only way he will ever be able to operate his store again is if he loins, the Communist Party. Otherwise it's inevitable poverty.

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Kareem talks of visiting Iran, maybe attempting to sneak across the border into Afghanistan to visit his family. But he fears the Khomeini regime and doesn't want to end up a prisoner in Tehran.

So what can this well-educated young Afghan do? He says wait. He expects Khomeini will be assassinated or die of natural causes soon. When that happens he expects Russian and American influence to vye for superiority in Iran. The United States won't sit idly by like they did with Afghanistan and watch the Russians invade Iran. It's too valuable with all its oil to not be contested by the United States hopes Kareem. And then just maybe, if the United States wins back Iran, maybe the Communist leadership in Afghanistan and other parts of the Middle East will fade away.

Those hopes are far fetched. But for the sake of Kareem, his family, and others like them, wouldn't it be nice if America could regain its place of prominence in the Middle East.

Without bike paths we will certainly need EMS and tragically, maybe lose one of our procious kids


Let's get out and vote YES on August 5th, and prove where our hearts and values belong.

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# Local Veterinarians Save Swan from Certain Death

If courage, strength of will and the dedication of some very special people can reunite a family of swans, then the male swan presently convalescing with Doctor of Veterinary Medicine John Bruggeman will soon be home with his family.

It all began early one morning last week when the Oakland County Sheriff's Department received a call from a private citizen on Cass Lake located in Bloomfield Township. An injured animal had been reported to the Marine Division of the Sheriff's office. But it soon became necessary to call the Oakland County Office of

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Animal Control when officers discovered the helpless creature unable to move his head because a fish hook was caught in his head and beak. Frightened and in pain, the swan was also missing most of one wing. It took two men to capture the animal and one sustained minor injuries in the process.

A decision had to be made. Should the swan be put to sleep or should an attempt be made to save his life? For Dr. John Bruggeman and his wife Sue, both veterinarians in Clarkston, there was only one decision. The Bruggemans had successfully treated an injured owl and returned it to the wild. But a swan was indeed a special case for them. After a call to a specialist in anesthesia for exotic birds, the team set to work removing the fish hook and amputating the open and infected wing.

And now, Bruggeman says the swan is doing great! He said, "I'm just amazed that he even lived through surgery." But now, "He is eating, drinking and getting cranky again." The swan was a very unusual case but when John and Sue saw the helpless bird, there was no choice but to do everythin possible to save his life.

Carl Anderson, from the Oakland County Animal Control Office said the problen is now to locate a permanent home for the swan. Unable to fly, the swan will not be able to migrate south this winter or any winter from now on. To compound the problem. Anderson said, swans mate for life and his mate and their young are still located on Cass Lake. As a result of the monogamous nature of the swans and the thoughtless behavior of some individuals, the entire family is now in jeopardy. None of the family will migrate without the convalescing father. And unless they are relocated together, the family could die this winter. First, the family must be captured and second, a permanent year-round home must be found for them.

Anderson said the swan probably swallowed the fish hook while feeding among weeds. The hook may have become ensnared in the weeds when a fisherman was fly casting. But the injured wing was outright cruelty. Anderson said. Probably the operator of an outboard deliberately ran down the creature and severed his wing.

Anderson said there are a number of possibilities for the family. They could be relocated to a nearby lake. nature preserve or nature center. Perhaps a group of young people would like to adopt the family and purchase their food for a year. Anyone wishing to adopt this family or make a donation to keep them together, is asked to call Carl Anderson at Oakland County Animal Control, 858-1030.


#### Fall Soccer League Organizes

### WHAT DOES THE EXECUTOR OF A WILL DO?

"I have been asked to be an executor of my sister's will. What will my duties be?"

The executor named in a will is the person responsible for managing the after-death affairs of the deceased and eventually distributing his or her property according to instructions in the will. You should be told in advance the name of the attorney who wrote her will.

If you are not an attorney, you should work closely with experts who can help guide you through various federal, state and legal procedures (lawyers, bankers and accountants).

You may also be responsible for making arrangements for the funeral and burial. It is important that you know of any funeral preplanning by your sister and where her instructions are located.

Your responsibilities with a "small" estate will be less complicated, but states vary in their interpretations of a "small" estate.

Large estates are more complicated and the responsibilities are best carried out under the supervision of a competent attorney.

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# Residents Take Aim at Ma Bell at PSC Hearing

The battle between Michigan Bell and residents of the 634 exchange wages on. This week the thwarted residents "hit a milestone," said Holly resident, Roger Studley referring to the public hearing held before administration Judge Alfred A. Sullivan, of the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) at the Holly High School. The purpose of the hearing was to take statements and testimony of frustrated residents so that the MPSC can

hold a pre-hearing conference on July 30th in

Roughly 120 phone-users of the 634 exchange have filed formal complaints with the MPSC accusing Michigan Bell of unlawful discrimination against them. They maintain the 634 exchange is unable to call hospitals, schools, police, county government -- and for some - the fire department without the imposition of a long-distance toll charge.

Michigan Bell officials maintain that extending the local zone rate charge for Holly residents would set Ma Bell back approximately \$1.3 million.

With Forbes magazine in hand, Roger Studley pointed out that in 1978 and 1979 AT&T, parent company for Michigan Bell were number one in profit gross beating out even General Motors -- how could a minimal \$1.3 million hurt this company?" he asked.

Mrs. Diane Davis moved to Holly a yearand-a-half ago. At her request, because of her three teenagers, Michigan Bell installed two phone lines. "When our first phone bill



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

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

Donna Gillespie, also a Holly resident quoted the Michigan Bell advertisement jingle, "Reach out and touch someone," saying, "everytime I do this it costs me twofive dollars." Mrs. Gillespie maintained that it's cheaper to drive to a Flint business rather than be put on hold when calling there.

Holly business owners contend with the loss of customers resulting from the lack of adequate phone service. Ardeth Regan, owner of Carrie's Corner in Holly, referring to the yellow page advertising, said, "When they let their fingers do the walking, it will be right on past my business, to businesses



Nancy Howarth speaking exclusively for the people of Davisburg in the 634 exchange gave this statement for the record. "Davisburg is further fragmented because the Davisburg area includes telephones in the 625 (Clarkston) and 887 (Milford) directories. Davisburg community services, including the Springfield Township Hall, Fire Department and Library, as well as some business people have found it necessary to install 625 telephones in addition to the 634 line to better serve the area. This is an expense that most residential customers cannot justify."

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

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

#### SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 1

ROAD MILLAGE Shall one mill levy upon all property within the Township of Springfield, County of Oakland, be established for a period of five years for the years 1980 through 1984 inclusive, for the purpose of providing additional funds to be used solely for the repair and resurfacing of paved roads, repair and resurfacing of gravel roads and for dust abatement on gravel roads in the Township?

#### SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 2 LIBRARY MILLAGE

Shall the Township of Springfield increase the general ad valorem tax limitation on real and personal property by \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 of State Equalized Valuation through the levy and collection of up to 1 mill tax for a free public library, to be effective for a period of five years, 1980 through 1984 inclusive, to be known as the library fund to be used for the purpose of establishing, supporting and maintaining the Springfield Township Library as a free public library

Springfield Township voters will have two different millage proposals on the ballot in August. One proposal is to increase the general ad valorem tax limitation on real and personal property by \$1.00 per \$1000 of State Equalized Valuation allowing the levy and a collection of up to one (1) mill tax for a free public library -- effective for five years.

Springfield Township Supervisor, Collin Walls emphasized that "if this millage does not pass it will not mean the closing of the

However, Walls did site three specific reasons for the necessity of the proposal. 1. There is a need for more secure funding

for the library in order to take on new projects -- especially now that the library is becoming a more widely used asset in the community. Presently, the library is funded by a portion of the township general fund which, in turn, is established at the annual township meetings. If the millage passes,

the library will have their own fund and will \*\* not obtain money from the general fund.

Should the Tisch Amendment pass, as Walls firmly believes it will, the revenues for fire and police protection will be drastically reduced forcing the general fund to contribute money to maintain the present level of service in these operations. The library, naturally would have to take a back seat to these two vital services. Walls said, "I anticipate with the reductions from the Tisch Amendment and the loss of State and Federal funds that our General Fund revenues could be reduced as much as 30

3. Last, but not least, is the fact that the library board would know the precise amount of money they have to work with for the entire year. This would enable them to plan ahead.



voters in Springfield Township is for a one (1) mill levy to be established for five years for the purpose of paving repair, gravel repair and dust control. "Springfield Township does not anticipate any large scale paving project with funds collected from this special road millage. We do anticipate a program of ditching, crowning and graveling," said Walls.

Without a specially voted millage, the only time property taxes can be used for roads is when the township board can find funds from its general revenues, or if some residents decide to enter into a special assessment

Oakland County Road Commission has been doing as much as they feel they can with its share of the State collected gas and weight taxes. However, gas and weight tax revenues are decreasing at a time when costs to the Road Commission are increasing.

Walls said the proposed increase is to "improve the roads we now have plus make them safer. It was put on the ballot to give residents of Springfield a chance to vote on an important issue. The township board does believe it is necessary."

POLICE MILLAGE RENEWAL

Shall Independence Township extend the existing one (1) mill levy for police protection, presently levied through 1980, for an additional ten (10) years, that is 1981 through 1990. Such levy is in excess of the Constitutional limitations as set forth in Article IX, Section 6 and Sections 25 through 34?
INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 2

POLICE MILLAGE PROPOSAL

Shall independence Township levy an additional one (1) mill for police protection, for a total of two (2) mills, for the next 11 years, that is 1980 through 1990. Such levy is in excess of the Constitutional limitations as set forth in Article IX, Section 6 and Sections 25 through 34?

The subject of police protection has been a major topic of conversation for many independence Township residents in the past year. This year, voters will have a chance to express their opinion at the polls by means of two separate police millage proposals.

The first proposal renews the existing one (1) mill for an additional ten years (1981-1990). Independence Township Clerk, Christopher Rose stressed that "this proposal is not an increase but just a continuation of the millage already in effect." This money will be used to fulfill the existing contract with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

The second police protection proposal, however, requests an additional one (1) mill to be levied for a total of two mills for the next eleven years (1980-1990). This one (1) mill increase, according to Rose, is "necessary to enable the Township to provide additional Oakland County Sheriff services," which he feels are needed. "We are just making do with the police services

now in effect.' Lieutenant Hubble of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department also believes the one mill increase is a necessary action. "From our viewpoint it takes nine policemen to adequately cover Independence Township for a 24-hour shift. Currently, the Township contract calls for six men forcing us to supplement with three more." Due to vacations and sick days Hubble said, "It's important for the millage to pass to make available back-up positions and to have two cars available at any given time."

### One-Half Mill Proposed to Construct Safety Paths

INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 3 SAFETY PATH MILLAGE PROPOSAL

Shall Independence Township levy one-half (1/2) mill for the acquisition of right-of-way and the construction and maintenance of safety paths within the Township the next ten (10) years, that is 1980 through 1989 inclusive. Such levy is in excess of the Constitutional limitations as set forth in Article IX, Section 6 and Sections 25 through 34?

A 1/2 mill proposal to allow for the phased design construction and maintenance of a safety path system is also on the August 5th ballot.

Proponents of the proposal say the cost of the 1/2 mill will be approximately \$15.00 per household per year, based on an average assessment of \$30,000.

between costs \$40,000-\$60,000 per mile to construct asphalt safety paths. The Safety Path Advisory Committee, which was formed in 1978, gained approval earlier this year by the township, to budget approximately \$75,000 from Community Block Grant and federal revenue sharing funds for the construction of safety paths on Sashabaw Road, from Maybee Road to Clin-

Also earlier this year the township approved a Safety Path Master Plan, which proponents expect to be

completed by 1990. The goal of the committee is to plan for a safe and efficient means of nonmotorized travel throughout the township. The master plan provides for safety paths along all major roads. connecting population centers with school, commercial and recreational areas.

### Fire Department Needs Additional Mill to Boost Budget

INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 4 FIRE MILLAGE PROPOSAL

Shall Independence Township, including the Village of Clarkston, levy an additional one (1) mill for fire protection, for a total of (3) mills, for the next 9 years, that is 1980 through 1988. Such levy is in excess of the Constitutional limitations as set forth in Article IX, Section 6 and Sections 25 through 34.

On August 5th, voters in Independence Township will be asked for an increase of one (1) mill for fire protection for a total of 3 mills for the next nine years (1980-1988). Fire Chief "Tink" Ronk says this millage is needed because of "inflationary costs." "The budget as it now stands is less than adequate.

Should this millage proposal pass in August, the money will be used to "provide the present level of fire protection to the community, continue to employ first-rate responsible personnel, and hopefully update some of our equipment and fire stations to maintain fire protection," added Ronk. Specifically, the updated equipment would include the fire-fighting apparatus itself plus fire equipment used for personal protection of Township fire-fighters.

I went to a lot of meetings and was quite upset about how the Board handled the policing of the township. I guess I was tired of hearing myself complain...I decided to go in and see if I can offer any changes. I also have a deep interest in the way the township's going to develop.

Competency and leadership of current Board.

They are reacting to punches being thrown at them. They react instead of

Until you are there on the hotseat, it's easy to criticize. Nobody can say this Board is not fiscally responsible.

You can sit in a board meeting and watch the bickering and arguing. The fulltime officers don't even communicate. They can't agree if it's 8 o'clock in the morning.

The proposed Pine Knob Hotel. Should it be built?

My position was not to totally stop Pine Knob and their hotel...but they made it very clear that they wanted it their way. They made no room for alternate plans.

I don't want to talk about Pine Knob because they are currently asking for two variances before the Zoning Board of Appeals (on which Powell sits).

◆The problem I see, if Pine Knob wants the hotel, they can have it, according to current legal opinions. I don't particularly want it there. If we would have had professional leadership, maybe we could have struck a compromise. Now, instead of a hotel, we have a damn amusement park.

Should the township allow additional gravel mining?

I definitely don't want to see Independence become the second Gravel Pit Capital of the World. We are finally getting together an ordinance on this, but it's coming a little late. It's reacting to a knock-out punch.

I'm frankly opposed to any kind of expansion of gravel pits. We have been to court with all four gravel pits in the community at one time or another. It's easy to come in to the Board and present a beautiful picture, but no one seems to follow through.

Gravel mining does more environmental damage than anything. But if they own the land, how can we legally say they can't do it?

Are you satisified with the present police service contracting with the Sheriff's Department and do you favor the renewal and additional 1 mill on the ballot for police protection?

It was good to settle the problem one way or another. The two departments were clashing. Going with the Sheriff's Department was providing people more for their money. It's really not a loss of local control. We definitely need the renewal. If people want the additional millage, fine, I'm not against it.

I was the one in 1976 that said we should form our own department. That proposal failed 3-2. But over the years everybody reevaluates their decisions and I now think the Sheriff's Department is best for us, economically. I'm really in favor of the additional mill. With that we could add 4 or 5 more deputies. We're just way understaffed, right now

I'm a former reserve police officer and I don't believe in outside hired help. A township of this size should be able to stand on its own 2 feet. We are living on borrowed time. especially with just two deputies floating around. I'd like to see our own police department eventually reinstated. Yes, we've got to have the extra police millage

In lieu of the fire department's financial problems do you favor passage of the additional 1 mill for fire protection that's on the ballot?

It is a bad situation when you're closing down fire stations. It appears that the extra mill may be one of the ways to bail the fire department out, therefore I'm not opposed to it.

I'm in favor of the one mill additional for the fire department. We can't let Emergency Medical Services (EMS) be cut. We have worked hard to open the 3 stations, and now should keep them open.

We have a fire department we can really be proud of. We got to continue EMS. If you reduce the millage and try to save money, you are playing with peoples' lives.

Do you favor the 1/2 mill on the ballot for safety paths?

I think they are a good idea. They will be a return in the way of property values, for the safety of our children and also it's a nice way to get around the township.

I don't know about safety paths. The people are going to have to make that decision.

I can't support it at this time because we need to get our police and fire departments in order. I'm not opposed to bike paths per se, I'm just wondering about the timing. We have to get the other problems resolved first.

#### Stuart

Because of my experience and training, I think I can offer balance. I feel that I'm not looking at issues with blinders on. I feel an elected official should be a representative, not a delegate. He should vote the way the majority of the people want, not necessarily how he feels.

#### Thayer

I have enjoyed being in the process of running the government and doing something for your own community.

#### Travis

I've lived here 12 years and have seen a lot of candidates and officers come and go, and have gotten a general feeling that they didn't like the way things were going. Plus, I began complaining at meetings and thought I could contribute on a more solid basis by participating in government on the inside.

#### Vandermark

I feel a desire to serve and I have and can very effectively represent the citizens of this community, particularly with reference to zoning and planning decisions.

Certainly some of the members of the current Board lack leadership. I think this Board many times has been out of step with what the people want.

I think leadership is there, but sometimes we don't take the time to step back and get some fresh ideas. I think our township has grown so much, that the pressures put upon it, can't be dealt with without some pretty expertise handling. I don't like what I see. We have to have a business-like approach, particularly with the handling of funds.

As a group the Board lacks positive leadership. That is particularly evident in the appointments made to the planning commission. That is the weakest part of our government right now. I don't believe it (planning commission) is representative of the community.

I feel very strongly that the hotel is not in the best interest of this community. It would not serve the community well. In fact it would be a burden. You can't build that kind of attraction and not require more township services.

As far as a high rise, I'm opposed. If we have a height restriction, we should stick with it. Several years ago we approved a hotel on that site. But a massive 600-room hotel, I don't see it surviving...especially on top of that hill it would look out of place.

I'm in favor of maintaining a 35' height limitation. I think the public has stated rather conclusively that they are not in favor. I don't know what they (Pine Knob) want out of us. It's a constant source of problems.

I think ultimately what Pine Knob is looking for is a theme park type of development, i.e., Kings Island. I don't think that kind of concept fits in with the character of the community, nor does it fit our zoning or master plan.

On the basis of what it would do to landscape and environment, I would like to see that this type of operation didn't come into existence. Yet I don't want them (the Board) to spend thousands of dollars in legal fees to placate the community if it looks like they are going to lose in court (to Levy).

I guess in some places where we have wide open spaces I'm not opposed. But where they are proposing it now, I'm opposed.

I am opposed. I don't think the township needs it.

I strongly oppose that kind of development. It will simply destroy the ecology and environment. It's contrary to our zoning plan. It does not conform period.

It's the most economical way. We have got to provide adequate police protection. It's just not one of those things you can bargain with. I would support the re-Instatement without question. I haven't heard enough on the additional mill to give a good answer. If I'm convinced they need it, I will vote for

Not really. There is always the possibility the county could pull the rug out from under us...and we would have to start over again. I support the additional millage because if it passes we will have money set aside for additional police.

I'm all in favor of it. The coverage is excellent. I've heard no complaints. I want the renewal, but I haven't made up my mind about the additional. Every additional mill must be scrutinized.

It is a very good arrangement -- the most efficient arrangement we could come up with. Certainly it worked out better than we expected. I favor both millages, particularly the renewal which is an absolute necessity.

l'Il support the mill because I believe you have to have necessary fire protection for the community. But that doesn't mean I believe in carte blanche spending for the fire department. The fact that they are running out of money and have for 2 years is disturbing.

I'm in favor of the additional fire millage. We have been running with just the bare minimum. Our equipment is starting to get old and needs to be replaced. It's almost becoming more of a medical unit, rather than a fire department, and I don't think you can put a price tag on lives.

I support the 1 mill. I have watched a lot of good people volunteer a lot of good time. Perhaps with the mill they can get a leg up and hire the fulltime man they need.

It bothers me that the fire department got into such bad shape. They should have cut their costs and not walted until it was a panic situation. 1 mill is too much. I'm inclined to think if it is approved, we are going to see more expansion of the fire department. It will not improve our fire rating or decrease our fire insurance. Essentially, it is not cost effective.

I don't oppose it, but I question this community spending tax dollars on nice little projects when we got a fire department that is running in the red and have miles and miles of gravel roads.

After working in Avon Township and seeing what they got, and the number of people using them, yes I would favor it. It gives people a place to be without being right alongside the traffic.

If you have traveled like I have on bike from Perry Lake Road to the Village, you know it is a real hazard. Safety paths are really needed.

I strongly support it. It's the best buy for your tax dollars on the whole docket. The creation of well-planned safety paths would enhance the character and lifestyle of the community.



### County Parks Renewal on Primary Ballot

**Parks and Recreation** Renewal of One-Quarter (1/4) Mill for the Purpose of Acquiring, Developing and Maintaining Parks and Recreation Areas in Oakland County, Michigan

"Shall the constitutional tax limitation on the total amount of general ad valorem taxes which may be imposed each year for all purposes upon real and tangible personal property in Oakland County, Michigan, be increased as provided in Section 6, Article IX of the Constitution of Michigan for a period of five (5) years from 1982 to 1986, both inclusive, by one-quarter (1/4) mil, twenty-five (25\*) per One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars of the assessed valuation as finally equalized for the purpose of acquiring, developing, operating and maintaining parks and recreation areas in Oakland County, Michigan? (such increase being a renewal of the one-quarter (1/4) mil increase which expires in 1981)?"

More than one million people are expected to visit the Oakland County Parks this year.

Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission officials point to this fact along with high gasoline costs and increasing unemployment as reasons to support the parks millage renewal on August

"Many families will not travel long distances for vacations this summer but will seek recreation closer

to home," says Oakland and Parks County Recreation Commission chairman Lewis E. Wint.

The unemployed, he adds, are unlikely to completely give up their leisure pursuits. The need for recreation for people with time on their hands should intensify, he points out.

Since 1973, the attendance at Oakland County Parks has increased 147 percent. In 1979, some 912,500 people visited the eight parks.

The statistics point to the fact that the people of Oakland County want, need and use their parks, says

The miliage proposal calls for renewal of a one quarter mill, or 25 cents per \$1,000 equalized valuation property tax.

The current millage expires December 31, 1981.

The parks commission received unanimous approval by the Oakland County Board of Commissioners to place the parks millage question on the ballot. The request was made for this year because there is no regular countywide election scheduled for

In addition, and more importantly, a renewal now would provide the opportunity for the parks commission to plan for the inevitable increased demand for leisure services through the next decade, according to R. Eric Reickel, manager of the Oakland County Parks.

The five-year millage has been approved three times.

For 15 years, no extra tax has been requested, said Reickel.

In the last vote in 1976, the millage was approved by more than a 2-1 margin.


