



torecast

The summer heat arrived in Michigan during July, bringing with it plenty of humidity and thundershower activity. Precipitation was above normal in most areas of southeastern Michigan, as most stations reported more than 3 inches of rainfall for the month. Isolated thundershowers producing heavy rainfall amounts were a common occurrence during July; the heaviest thundershower to hit the Clarkston area occurred during the early morning hours of July 22, as the eastern Clarkston station picked up 0.95 inches of rain.

The Clarkston area received measurable rainfall on 14 days during July, which did include every Saturday during the month. Oddly enough, the Clarkston area has received measurable precipitation on every Saturday except one (June 21) since May 17. Rainfall totals from my raingage network for July are as follows (with calendar year totals through the end of July in parentheses):

Bishop Airport/Flint - 5.61 " (18.02") St. Clair Shores - 4.50" (23.10") **Davison - 4.35"**

Detroit Metropolitan Airport - 4.33 " Eastern Clarkston - 3.59" (19.63") Van Norman Lake/Waterford Township -

3.57" (20.18") Johnson & Anderson/Waterford Township

Oxbow Lake/White Lake Township - 3.37"

Union Lake - 3.19" (21.85") Elizabeth Lake/Waterford Township - 3.09"

Sullivan Lake/Tyrone Township - 3.04" Fenton - 2.86" (20.45") Northville - 2.57" (19.01")

Temperatures during July averaged about 1 degree above normal per day, with the eastern Clarkston station recording a mean temperature of 71.6 degrees. Clarkston temperatures ranged from a low of 47 degrees on the 3rd to a high of 92 degrees on the 15th. Although temperatures only reached into the 90's on one occasion during July, the Clarkston area experienced daily high temperatures in the 80's on 24 days during the month. Our warm temperatures here would have been welcome in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, however, as that area experienced dally high temperatures of over 100 degrees on every day during July.


Clark's name will appear on Michigan's General Election ballot in November along with 37 other Libertarian Party candidates for





WHAT SHOULD NOT BE SAID TO A CHILD ASKING ABOUT DEATH?

Any kind of fantasy or fairy tale about death will eventually have to be corrected or repudiated. Let's explore some common fantasies:

"She went on a long journey." This can be interpreted by the child to mean the person has abandoned him without saying goodbye. It can further foster the false hope that the person will return some day.

"God took him to heaven." If God took the deceased to heaven because He loved him, the child might conclude that God will take him too! This reaction can be fearful for a child to accept and more that he should have to at his early years.

"She is just sleeping." This can quickly cause a child to fear bedtime, believing that he will not wake up when he should.

Many more expressions could be included. The wisest course is to answer questions about death without such cliches or expressions that will have to be changed or un-learned. Even if an adult cannot provide the correct answer immediately, the search for an answer together can often help you and the child come to grips with the "truth of death."

Librarian Seeks Improvements, Greater Visability

If you want to sit down and talk to Independence Township Librarian, James Hibler, make sure you catch him when he isn't showing films to pre-schoolers, running the summer reading program, planning a Halloween costume party or conferring with any of the half dozen community groups that have taken an interest in the library.

It's been a little over a year now since Hibler assumed his post. And when asked how he likes it he says, first, "Really busy," and then, "It's great!"

do...acquisitions to the collection, planned programs, audio-visual aids, the budget, student needs.'

"I like to think of the library as an information center," he says.

"Not just books, but materials that fit into the interests of everyone in the community."

Hibler spent some time before coming here as a librarian for Market Opinion Research in Detroit, so he knows the value of good public relations. He wants to make the library more visible, a bigger part of everyday

One way he hopes to do that is by in-

creasing the number of people who frequent the library. Much of his time thus far has been spent "building up holes in the collection." The library now has several shelves of how-to-do-it books on auto repair, gardening, furniture building, etc. Additions have been made to include bestsellers in both hardcover and paperback. Browsers can read through the daily papers or the periodicals.

Of course, all government services are feeling the effect of a tightened economy. Hibler says his initial budget for this year of \$100,000 has been cut by 10%. That means his plans to replace some shelves and integrate oversize books into the regular stacks have been thwarted, at least for now.

For the time being, he is concentrating on programs, like the recently completed summer reading club for children, that depend on hard work and volunteer help for success. This year's session had 280 participants--up

from 82 last year.

He is also quick to point out, "Libraries should prosper during hard times. After all, they're free."

Librarian Hibler is nothing if not optimistic. He seems to be excited about everything he does. From working with his staff, through handling the swarms of youngsters that come his way, to coordinating the help he receives from the Friends of the Library, the Women's Club and the Garden Club.

And if the funds are ever forthcoming he says he'll know what to do with them. One project he is especially keen on would be an addition to the library building to include an activities room.

Right now, if he wants to show a film to a group of 30 or more he has to set the projector up on the circulation desk. That tends to "disrupt our normal business," he says.

The new space could also be used for township meetings and activities that require barrier-free access. The township hall itself has four flights of barriers.

For the meantime James Hibler is enjoying his tenure in Clarkston. As a semiprofessional historian and archivist (one of his degrees is a MA from Wayne in History), he enjoys working with the Historical Society. As an ex-schoolteacher (5th and 6th grade), he enjoys helping children use the library. As an amateur road-runner, he enjoys running 8 miles every morning in independence Township.

"I like it here," says Hibler.

Local Duo Score High in Soap Box Derby Finals
