editor's note

"Important Choices 1980." An appropriate title for our special election sections that will appear in this newspaper the next three weeks. This week The Reminder takes a look at the 60th District State Representative race and County Commissioner districts 1, 2, 3.

Each of the candidates in these four districts were invited into The Reminder offices and answered questions posed to them by Mike Wilcox and Dawson Bell. Their answers can be found on pages 13, 14, 19, and 20.

In interviewing the candidates, we found very little disagreement on the issues. What we did find however, in each race was a remarkable contrast in styles.

Take the state representative race for example. Both Claude Trim and Sharyn Gidday feel government bungled the Shindler Road cleanup efforts; both are opposed to the Stablex plant; both feel workman's compensation must be reworked; and neither will support any of the three tax proposals on the ballot. They do differ slightly on their

opinions about foster care.

But take a look at their styles, and you will see tremendous difference. Very few people dislike Claude Trim. He's good hearted, good natured and a good friend. He claims he's been successful in the legislature with that same philosophy. You get the feeling he'd rather work out a compromise, rather than taking an all or nothing approach.

Gidday, on the other hand, is brash, very opinionated, and issues oriented. Although her opinions may not be substantially different than Trim's, she attacks him for not doing more to find a solution for those issues. You get the feeling Gidday despises compromise. She'd rather fight for what she believes in. She'd probably create a furor in Lansing.

Which style is best? That's up to you, the voter. Just don't get discouraged because you think the candidates seem to be so agreeable on the issues. Look beyond the issues and in each race you'll see a wealth of disparity when it comes to political styles.

forecast

September in the Clarkston area saw above normal precipitation for the third consecutive month. Measurable rainfall occurred on only 10 days during the month, with most of the month's precipitation occurring in the form of thundershower activity. September precipitation totals from my volunteer network are as follows (with calendar year totals in parentheses):

Elizabeth/Waterford Township - 5.88" (37.08")

Oxbow Lake/White Lake Township - 5.25" (30.70")

Davison - 5.00"

Fenton - 4.81" (28.87")

Bishop Airport (Flint) - 4.75" (26.02")

Ann Arbor - 4.60"

Sullivan Lake/Tyrone Township - 4.53"

St. Clair Shores - 4.50" (32.30")

Johnson & Anderson, Inc./Waterford Township - 3.90" (29.80")

Eastern Clarkston - 3.56" (28.11")

Detroit Metropolitan Airport - 2.94" (32.80")

Temperatures during September were just slightly below normal. Based on data from the eastern Clarkston station, the mean temperature for the month was 61.8 degrees, which is only 0.2 of a degree below normal. Temperatures ranged from a low of 31 degrees on the morning of the 27th to a high of 83 degrees on the afternoon of the 8th.

Daily temperatures reached into the 80's on only 6 days during September. The 31 degree temperature of September 27 marked the first frost of the autumn, and occurred approximately 2 weeks earlier than normal. Long-term statistics indicate that we only have a 10% chance of frost in our area by September 25, with our normal (50% chance) first frost date usually occurring around October 11. The early frost shortened our growing season this year to 140 days, which is about 15 days shorter than normal.

With the winter season just ahead, I have been getting questions about what type of winter we can expect this year. And as usual, it seems that there are as many different predictions as there are experts on the subject, so I am going to put in my 2-cents worth too. For the Clarkston area, I predict a winter that will be a little colder than normal with higher than normal snowfall. I expect to see 55-60 inches of snowfall this year with a good chance of a snow cover at Christmas time.

Before closing, I would like to correct an error that was made in last month's report. The Ann Arbor station was incorrectly reported as having received 5.2 inches of rainfall during August. It should have been reported as 7.2 inches of rainfall.

Which Pipe to Use

The first problem encountered by the home plumber is knowing what to ask for when you get to the hardware store.

Get the right pipe:

Galvanized Iron - for all water connections - uses a threaded connection.

Black Iron - for gas connections - also uses a threaded connection.

Hard Copper - Commonly used in 1/2" and 3/4" sizes in residential water systems - connections made with a solder joint.

Soft Copper Tubing - can be used for water (such as connecting an ice maker) or gas connections. Connections made with a **compression fitting** for water or a **flair fitting** for gas.

Get the right size:

Most iron and hard copper is measured by **inside diameter (I.D.)**.

Most soft copper tubing is measured by **outside diameter (O.D.)**.

1/2" I.D.

When buying iron or hard copper ask for 1/2" pipe.

3/4" O.D.

When buying soft copper tubing ask for 3/4" tubing.

Independence Ponders Sewer Question Again

The Independence Township board tried again on Tuesday, October 7 to decide under what circumstances it would require sewer installation on new plat development.

First on the agenda was developer Fred Jacobites, who had been sent by the board to the county health department with tentative preliminary plat approval on September 2. At that time, however, the board had said that they would not rule on the sewer requirement question before first hearing from the county.

As it turned out, the county would not review the plat without a clear ruling from the township.

Hence, Jacobites reappeared with his request for "something from the township spelling out where you stand."

He also produced an additional appraisal from the township's engineering consultants - Johnson and Anderson, of on-site sewer installation costs on his plat that had been requested by DPW head, George Anderson, at the previous meeting.

Their figure, of over 1.5 million dollars, Jacobites said confirmed his claim that sewers were an "economic impossibility" in a development of this kind.

After a brief discussion the board decided unanimously to grant the request and send the plat back to the county with no provision for sewer installation as long as the lot sizes remain in their present, 3 acre size range.

Shortly thereafter the board was forced to examine the other side of the coin in the shape of the tentative preliminary plat for Pine Bay Estates, a proposed development just north of I-75 off Cranberry Lake and Allen Roads.

In considering approval for that project, which features some 93 15,000 sq. ft. lots, the board had to assess the impact of putting sewers in.

Jim Scharl, speaking on behalf of the developer Hugh Garner, said he felt that installation would have a "relatively minor im-

pact".

"There are only two other subdivisions out there," he said, "and they might ask to hook up at some point....But it's not likely to go farther."

Trustee, William Vandermark, nevertheless had some reservations.

"It appears if we continue to extend (sewers) north of I-75 we are going out of the SEMCOG area," he said.

The Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments had developed a Sewer Service Area Map with projections to the year 2000.

Vandermark said that he was afraid that if the township continued to approve sewer installation in areas outside of the SEMCOG map at some point in time, when federal assistance might be needed for increasing capacity within the designated district, township officials might be told (because of the previous indiscretion), "to go fish".

"Then," he said, "we might have to go to the taxpayers."

The township in the past has always permitted (and has often required) sewer installation where the developer was willing to bear the cost, regardless of whether it was called for on the SEMCOG map or not.

Whitey Tower, township supervisor, said, "I don't see how we can stop all of a sudden, when we've always had the first come-first serve policy." That is, whenever there has been enough capacity on existing lines to accommodate more use, that use was allowed.

And for the time being that policy will evidently continue to be followed.

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construct the portion of township safety paths which border on the property, the board passed a motion to approve the plat, Vandermark and Clerk, Chris Rose dissenting.

Garner's Winchester Real Estate was before the board on another matter too, a request for reapproval of the preliminary plat of Chestnut Hill Farms, along Maybee Road, near Birdland. The previous, two-year approval, had run out.

That proposal ran into a snag immediately, however, over an amendment to the original plat which deleted four lots.

Supervisor Tower read a letter to the board from township attorney, Richard Campbell, in which he expressed the opinion that the deletion was more than a "minor change" and was therefore unacceptable for reapproval.

Tim Palulian, Building Department head, said, "We can find no logical reason why these four lots should be left out."

The reason, logical or not, soon surfaced, however.

As Jim Scharl, speaking on behalf of Winchester, said, "We want those lots in but the people who own the property won't sign an agreement."

And the property owners, who already live in homes constructed on the lots, won't sign an agreement because they are holding out for satisfaction on what they called "unfulfilled promises" from Winchester.

Several board members expressed the wish to stay out of what they considered a matter between the disputants and not township business.

But approval of an amended plat would have removed what leverage lot owners still had with Winchester, short of court action, and a motion to approve was defeated.

The exact nature of the disagreement was not spelled out, but one of the lot owners, Ted Upcott, said later that it concerned "promised services" not rendered by Win-

chester.

Scharl called the homeowners' actions "blackmail". And Hugh Garner, himself, said, "I didn't have anything to do with building those homes. Now they want \$10,000--I don't think that's fair."

Upcott would not say whether the homeowners were, in fact, asking for a cash settlement, but at the meeting he expressed what seemed to be a consensus among the four holdouts:

"I'd like to belong (to the plat)...We thought we were negotiating with them. But

evidently their way of negotiating is to kick us out."

The board's final ruling, which was to reapprove the unamended plat precludes their being kicked out, just yet anyway.

Winchester now has one year to come to terms with the lot owners.

If they cannot, or if they feel at anytime in the next year that they won't be able to, they can return to the board with a tentative preliminary plat (the first step in the platting procedure) that excludes the four lots and ask for board reconsideration.

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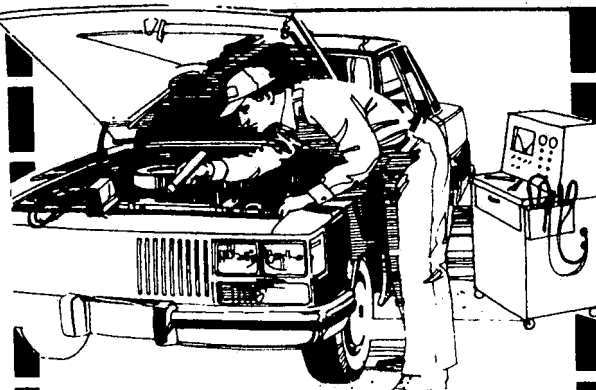
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Airman Rigoulot Graduates

News in Brief

The Independence Township Fire Department is going to borrow money from the sewer fund, but at higher interest than it had previously enjoyed.

In order to meet operating expenses until tax monies become available the fire department must borrow \$110,000, bringing its total indebtedness to the sewer fund to \$210,000.

Treasurer Fred Ritter said the money would be paid back with the additional revenues generated by the department's new mill. The township board decided to raise the interest rate on the new loan from its previous passbook level of 5-1/4% to 7%, which is closer to what it would cost the township to borrow from the bank.

The Independence Township board decided Tuesday, October 7 to reject all three bids received for construction of a portion of the bicycle safety paths on Maybee Road between Sashabaw and Clintonville. Construction was to have begun this fall, but board members felt the bids were higher than they would be next spring when inclement weather would not be as important a factor for the paving companies.

Township treasurer, Fred Ritter, also suggested that the board and safety path committee look into the possibility of selling tax anticipation bonds (based on the recently passed ten year millage) to finance construction of larger sections of the project.

The proposed adult foster care home on Timberidge Trail in Independence Township will not be occupied for at least 45 days and probably longer.

That is the conclusion of both Don Schuster, attorney for residents near the home who have been attempting to block occupancy in court, and Tom Miller, of the Macomb-Oakland Regional Center, the home's sponsoring agency.

The delay stems from a change in managers at the home. Gail Johnson, who originally applied for the license to run the home, has been replaced by Karen Adams, of K-Jan Inc.

Attorney Schuster said the change was the grounds for his request on Wednesday, October 8 to dismiss his injunction suit to stop the home.

He said the parties he represents have not yet made a decision, but will in "all likelihood" resume the suit when the intentions of K-Jan become clear.

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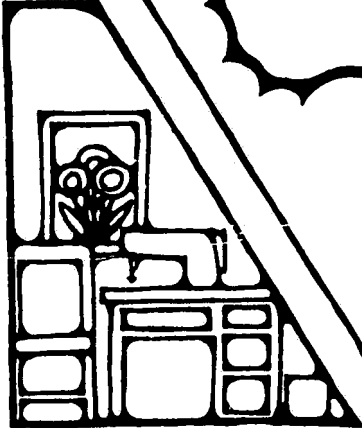
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Sashabaw Encores Debut at Board Meeting

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"Transporting school children is a very important business," according to William Dennis Director of Transportation at Clarkston Schools. Last school year Clarkston transported over 5,200 children each day. To accomplish this, 32 regular drivers, 4 substitutes and 4 mechanics managed the buses over 101 routes. Nearly 600,000 miles were traveled and 148,000 gallons of gasoline were consumed.

Dennis said, one of the greatest hazards is created when motorists do not observe the school bus flashing light system. "In Clarkston the four-light bus warning system is used. These lights are located on the front and rear of the bus near the School Bus sign and are used to warn motorists about what the bus is doing. These red flashing lights will warn that the bus is stopped to let children on or off. Motorists are required to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that displays the flashing red lights until students are safely on or off the bus," he said.

One of the most frequent complaints of bus drivers is that motorists do not obey this law. "We have about ten of these reports each month," said Dennis. "Each time this happens the violator creates a real hazard for students boarding or leaving the bus." "We haven't had anyone injured seriously because of an accident but there have been some close calls," Dennis concluded.

Claude Trim, 45, of Springfield Township, 60th District State Representative since 1974; Springfield Supervisor 4 years; Springfield Trustee 2 years; 21 years as metal modelmaker at GMTC.

Sharyn Gidday, of Highland Township, former Treasurer of Highland Township; member of Oakland County Taxpayers Association, League of Women Voters and Republican Women's Task Force.

Would you like to see Stablex build the nation's largest waste disposal plant in your district?

Trim - I vehemently oppose the operation as it now would be, particularly because of the latest moves by them (Stablex) to skirt state laws. They are not looking out for the people. I feel they have been derelict in trying to convince the community that their process is safe.

Gidday - I am completely opposed to the location of the proposed Stablex plant. The aquifers underlying the proposed site are the main source of drinking water for Holly and Groveland Townships and would be in virtual contact with the bottom of the liner containing the solidified toxic wastes. Any combination of liner failure and/or toxic leachate would contaminate the ground water.

Do you think the present practice of setting up group homes in neighborhoods for mentally retarded patients is appropriate?

Trim - If they can cope, I'm basically in favor of placing a person in the home. But they got to go through an adequate screening process to safeguard the community. Right now I've got two bills to address the problems, here. We've had homes placed where they shouldn't have been. I'd also like to see inhouse types of parents.

Gidday - The screening process has not been done properly. Supervision has been given to people who aren't capable. There has been no local input from the citizens of the community. The solution is a place much like Children's Village. People could be mainlined into cottages that would be on the grounds along with recreation, training sites and stores. From there they could be mainstreamed into a home like yours and mine.

Is there any way, you as a representative, could bring the unemployment rate down?

Trim - We must make our state competitive to do business. Workman's compensation must be addressed and made more equitable. We've got to bring that into focus. That's the major issue.

Gidday - One of the highest rates of workman's compensation in the nation is here. Plus the single business tax is totally unfair. We're losing many businesses to the sunbelt states yet nobody ever seems to get together to do anything about it.

Could you as a state representative have done anything more to prevent or help clean-up the toxic wastes in the 60th District?

Trim - I was very upset at the timetable. They put it on low priority until they discovered PCB, TCE. But we did learn from it all. It is the first site in the state to get cleaned up. Unfortunately there are some 200 more sites like this. And it shouldn't happen again with the new legislation we enacted.

Gidday - People have known about it (the dumps) for 15 years. But those we trusted with the duty of taking care of us, didn't do anything. Claude was supervisor at that time and he did nothing. A court order could have closed that place down. Too many lives are at stake. A good legislator would make sure something was done about it.

Are you taking a stand on the tax proposals?

Trim - I oppose any increase in taxes. However, I'm not taking a stand on any of the issues.

Gidday - We need property tax reform. The only solution is cutting the property taxes. But proposals A, C and D are not the solution. Tisch's 50% cut is too drastic. I'd like to have seen a 25% cut in 1981 and another 25% in 1982.

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Nelson Challenges Wilcox in Commissioner District 1

Lynn Nelson, 40, 2300 Seymour Lake Road, Ortonville. Journeymann tool grinder, employed by Fisher Body of Pontiac. Brandon Township ZBA 74-present. Lifelong county resident, in 1st District for 17 years.

Richard R. Wilcox, 50, of 981 Hummer Lake Road, Ortonville. Owner of The Reminder Inc. County Commissioner 12 years; former chairman of Board of Commissioners 2 years; former President of Michigan Association of Counties. Member of Pontiac Silverdome Stadium Authority. Brandon Township Supervisor 4 years. BA from U of M.

What would be your first priority as a county commissioner?

Nelson - We need to stabilize police costs. When Brandon Township first contracted for service in 1975 it costs \$19,000; already it's up to \$30,000. Some of

those costs should be absorbed by the county.

Wilcox - Transportation, not just public but roads. I think we have to do something about the road commission to get better service in our area.

With the decrease in fuel consumption, revenues have gone down and we're working with less money. We have to find an alternative source or convince the legislature to increase the percentage of tax on gasoline.

Are you satisfied with the present structure of county government?

Nelson - I think it would be possible to combine some of the county departments. By working from zero-base budgeting we should be able to only pay for what we really need.

Reducing the number of commissioners would eliminate some of the party politics that are played now. For the same amount of money we could have a more workable number, working full-time...perhaps even make the office non-partisan.

Wilcox - I think we have too many commissioners--we should cut to 7 or 9. If we had fewer they could work more amiably.

A lot of the bickering though is just politics...disgruntled democrats.

What's your position on the subway and membership in SEMTA?

Nelson - I guess it's not good politics to support your opponents past record but I think Mr. Wilcox is right about the subway. I would favor withdrawal from SEMTA--we need to be hardnosed.

Wilcox - I'm against, and always have been, the subway.

I've been a previous sponsor of motions to withdraw from SEMTA. And I still favor it as the only way to avoid having to pay for the subway.

I think we could provide a decent public transportation system of our own.

How should the county deal with toxic wastes and solid waste disposal?

Nelson - At some point, solid wastes are going to be a problem. The plan the county is working on now has been around for awhile. We passed a resolution on it when I was on the board in Brandon.

But we need to take a hard look at how it will be managed and how much it will cost.

I'm completely opposed to the location of the Stablex plant in Groveland Township. I don't think any township should have its right to rule on something like that taken away by the state.

Wilcox - The commissioners appointed a citizen's committee to evaluate solid waste and they recommended we go to an Energy Resource and Recovery System.

But it has problems. We would need enough solid waste to operate and that would mean cooperation from townships. We would need a market for the recovered materials. And we would need a use for the steam we would produce.

I support the people who are fighting the Stablex plant. But it's a tough problem. Like a landfill, nobody really wants it.

Is there anything you would like to add?

Nelson - There isn't any bitterness between Mr. Wilcox and me; we have a cordial relationship. I'm probably going to place an ad in his newspaper.

But if I'm elected, come two years from now, I think I'll have a good record to run on again.

Wilcox - I know Mr. Nelson thinks there's a problem with the sheriff's contracts. But it's just more economical to contract. Little communities can't afford insurance coverage; they can't buy cars and equipment as cheaply as the county can.

Any township or community that doesn't want to contract for sheriff's service doesn't have to.

Jail itself is too crowded. We're going to have to change our sentencing procedures or build for more space.

It would be better to find a way to keep some kinds of offenders out of the jail.

It's Cagney vs. Cavanaugh in District II

LeRoy Cagney, 51, of Milford, owner of Sprint Print; member of Milford Village Council 1973-77; Director of Milford Historical Society; member of American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary.

G. Margorie Cavanaugh, 35, of 783 Davisburg Road, Springfield Township. Holly Schools teacher 10 years; AA, BA, MA from Oakland University; Studied at University of Edinburgh, Scotland and St. Johns College, England; Holly Volunteer Ambulance Volunteer; Northwest Oakland County Council for the Arts trustee; founder and curriculum director for Super Saturday Program for gifted and talented children; volunteer for Holly Youth Assistance.

Are you satisfied with the present structure of county government?

Cavanaugh - County government at the top is very powerful and clandestine. Maybe there are too many commissioners. County departments, Drain, DPW, and Road overlap and don't cooperate.

The prosecutor and the sheriff are acting like two little boys fighting over a chair. They need to be more professional.

Cagney - Many of the problems of structure have to be addressed by the legislature.

We've got some strong personalities.

But the county executive form of government is a good one. And we have better management in Oakland County because of it.

What would be your first priority as a county commissioner?

Cavanaugh - I'm an environmentalist. Toxic wastes are a most pertinent issue for District 2. The County has a moral responsibility to see that money is spent to insure that no drinking water is contaminated by PCE or TCE.

The road situation is bad. The County has just taken away money for four roads in the district. There are chuckholes everywhere. I intend to fight for better roads.

Cagney - This whole thing started with the subway. I'm fed up to here with the federal government trying to push Coleman Young's monument down our throats.

What's your position on the subway and membership in SEMTA?

Cavanaugh - We won't be hoodwinked into paying for the subway. Dan Murphy should have been in Lansing, but politicians are afraid to take a firm stand on anything.

I don't think it will be pushed down our throats; there'll be some ultimate trade-off.

We do need a regular schedule of bus and rail transportation and I'm not sure withdrawal from SEMTA will solve that need.

Cagney - Maybe I would be in favor of a pull out. It would depend on the situation.

I've read about a system they have in Orange County, California, where they have 50 cities connected by busses, that's a tremendous success. They don't belong to a transit authority and I'm not sure we need to either.

How should the county deal with toxic wastes and solid waste disposal?

Cavanaugh - I think we need a county wide program to educate families about recycling their own waste. The county needs to take the lead.

We'll probably need the energy reclamation center but, more important, the people must be informed.

For toxic waste we need a county wide watchdog agency that could alert the state and make them respond to crises like we had in Springfield Township. The county shirked its moral duty in that situation.

Cagney - It's (toxic waste) too big a problem for any state or local government to handle.

But now for the first time the county is watching carefully and I think we've been lucky.

Is there anything you would like to add?


Cavanaugh - I consider the job of commissioner a public service. My whole campaign is based on serving people.

Cagney - I'm concerned about commissioners who leave the meetings early. If they haven't got time for the job, they shouldn't be doing it.

When I go to the meetings, I'm rarin' to go--I want to raise my hand, and I can't yet.

How about county taxes and what effect would passage of the various tax proposals have on the ability of the county to do business?

Whitlock - I would rather see a tax cut at the federal level. If we didn't have bureaucracies skimming the money on the way out and then again on the way in, we'd be in better shape.

O'Dean - I think taxes are too high. I would like to see a good tax cutting proposal passed. But if Tisch comes through we'll have to make some severe cuts. And you can't cut things like police in half, so some of the other programs will suffer. It will take a lot of work to come up with a good budget.

Are you satisfied with the present structure of county government?

Whitlock - I would seek legislation that would clearly define delegation of authority. We have several areas of duplication.

And, of course, there are power struggles going on in various areas.

But the executive formation is good.

The executive's security force is not a police force. They are designed to provide security for county property, parks, etc.

If we transferred that responsibility to the sheriff it would cost us \$3,000 more per man for the 60 man force.

O'Dean - There's too much duplication of service in county government. The Drain Commission and DPW do too many of the same things. One of the ways we could fund EMS would be by eliminating Murphy's private police force (county security). We spend \$640,000 per year on it now. I'm opposed to the prosecutor's strike force. It eliminates the system of checks and balances. If the prosecutor's own people are collecting the evidence, who's going to be able to tell when someone's rights have been violated.

What's your position on the subway and membership in SEMTA?

Whitlock - At first I thought we shouldn't withdraw because we would lose money for our programs. Now it looks like we'll be paying for Detroit's deficit.

The subway is useless for Oakland County. It's inconvenient and would cost more to use than it's worth.

But with the tax proposals on the ballot we are facing economic insecurity and I would hate to jeopardize things like Neo-Cart and Dial-a-Ride.

O'Dean - I believe we have to remain as members of SEMTA. But I'm completely against the subway. A subway will congest the area and make travel slower rather than faster.

I don't think we've looked into all the possible alternatives.

When the federal surveyors come in the county we should discourage them from pursuing the subway.

But SEMTA is spending 11 million dollars in Oakland County now and that would be hard to make up.

What would be your first priority as a county commissioner?

Whitlock - I think we should continue the sound administration policies that have been followed in the past.

The work force has been held to a minimum; the costs of administration have been contained.

There are 72 other counties in Michigan that have higher taxes and fewer services.

O'Dean - As a member of the AFL-CIO screening committee it seemed to me that the people running for public office were steadily getting worse.

We need county-wide EMS. We have county wide guidelines... now we need to make the service uniform and coordinated. Human life is our most important consideration.

But Brian and Phil are pleased with the way they are playing now. Brian says he is hitting the greens well now and Phil thinks his game has been pretty consistent lately.

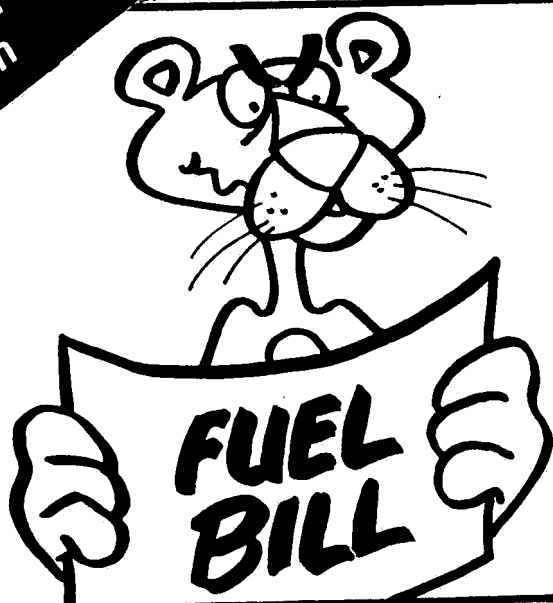
One thing is certain, both consider themselves "serious" golfers. Even in a
