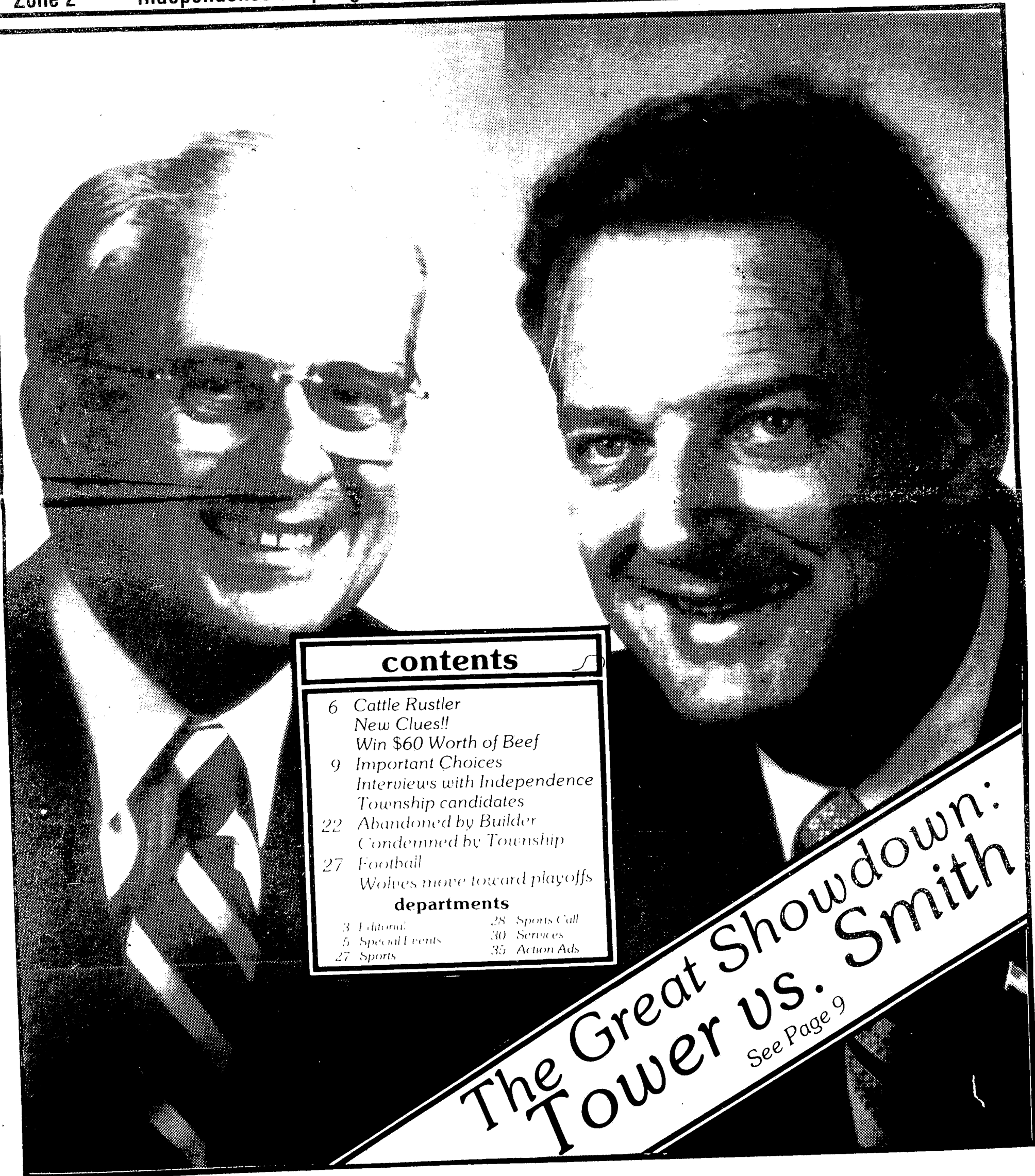

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Schools Faced with \$641,000 Deficit

With enrollment falling at a rate greater than had been projected, the Clarkston School District now faces an operating

deficit of \$641,000 on the current school year.

Superintendent, Milford Mason, in a report delivered to the Board of Education on Monday, October 13, said, "I'm not crying wolf. I like our position much better than that of other school districts around the county and around the state."

But with student "membership" figures down from 6,844 in 1979 to an expected level of 6,648.5 this year, the district will lose ap-

proximately \$333,000 in state aid. And that translates into a deficit that exceeds the \$500,000 limit the board had set previously.

Mason said he will not be able to compute the specific figures until the legislature passes a state aid bill, something they are not expected to do until after the first of the year.

He also stated that, because of Clarkston's reasonably solid equity position, there should be no cause for alarm through the 1981-82 fiscal year.

But with all the uncertainty surrounding school financing, and with lowering enrollments and no new millages in sight for the district making the present state aid picture bleak, it appears that the future bodes no good.


William Neff, administrative assistant, who had mounted an effort to track all of the students who had left the district, reported that 20 had transferred to private or parochial schools, 78 were in other public systems in Michigan, 29 out of state and 32 had dropped out of school altogether.

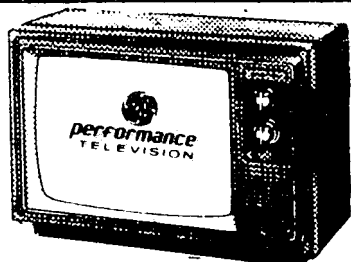
He said the transfers to private schools was "not as noticeable a number" as might have been expected from public conjecture.

Mason closed the meeting with comments on the various tax proposals that will be before the voters in November. He called the Tisch proposal the most potentially "damaging" to the district, and Smith-Bullard, which would ostensibly equalize school financing, "better than what we have now."

The system's projected budget is now available for inspection in the Board of Education Offices at 5389 Clarkston Rd., Clarkston. There will be a public hearing on the budget at a special board meeting, October 27, at 7:30 P.M.

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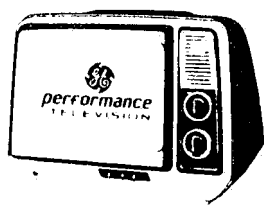
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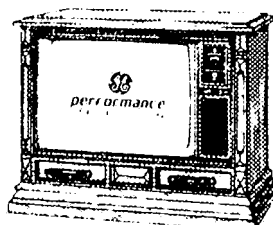

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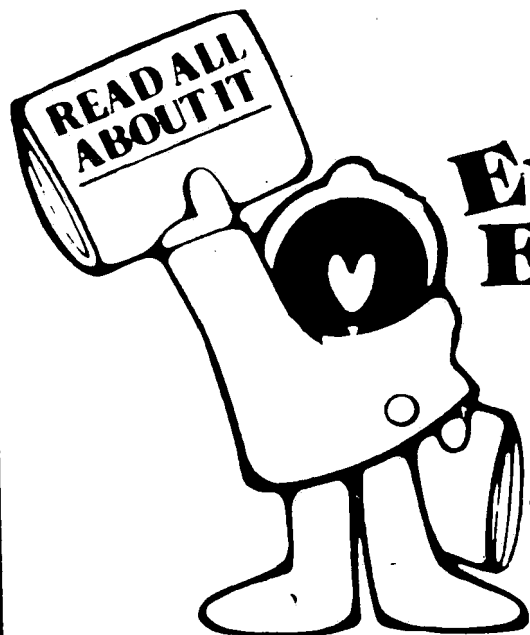


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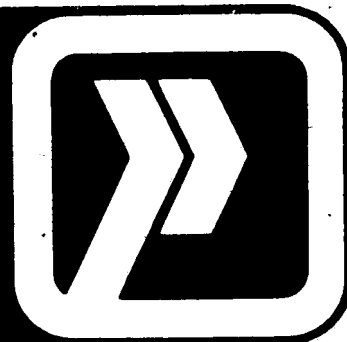


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Art Auction October 26

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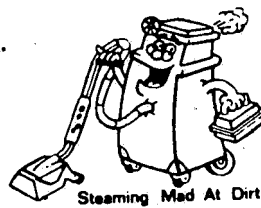
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Julie Lepere Named DAR Good Citizen

Tower, Smith Square Off for Independence Supervisor

James Smith, candidate for Independence Township supervisor, Republican. Planning Commission chairman 1977-80; Planning Commission member 1972-80; owner of Howard and Smith Inc.; vice-president of Detroit Boy Scout Council; B.A. from Wayne State.

Flord (Whitey) Tower, 49, candidate for Independence Township supervisor, Democrat, Supervisor 1977-80; vice-chairman of OCATS; member of OLHSA; delegate of SEMCOG; member of Planning Commission 5 years.

Do you agree with critics that insinuate the present Board lacks in leadership?

Smith - I agree

Tower - We have a treasurer, clerk and supervisor voted in separately, and they are not under my command. I'm only one in seven votes. I think I'm a solid leader in many aspects, but if the Board votes against me, there's not much I can do.

Do you think Independence should consider the charter township concept?

Smith - Something like half the townships in the State with a population over 10,000 are charter townships. It would be good practice to find out why and to study what they are. It's one of those things I would appoint a task force to study.

Tower - We had the opportunity to go charter awhile back, but I didn't push it because we aren't big enough population or budget-wise.

Do you think the township should consider a manager to run the township?

Smith - I have no bottom line convictions. If it becomes the will of the people I will step aside.

Tower - We just aren't big enough. Waterford has 58,000 and they don't have a township manager.

What's your opinion on the proposed Pine Knob hotel, amusement park and ski ramp?

Smith - I feel the people in this community strongly stated their distaste for a high rise structure. I believe that this, rather than the hotel, was a major turnoff.

Tower - I back the Board's 5-2 decision against, however surely the hotel on 530 acres with additional taxes and jobs generated would be better than a ski ramp and amusement park.

What do you think of Independence's present police protection and contract with the sheriff's department?

Smith - At this moment, it may be the best we can afford, but I am not convinced by any means that it will forever be the best arrangement or that it totally covers our needs.

Tower - I'm not satisfied totally. It's working, but it's not the best. It's only limited coverage, although the deputies are doing all they can. I think we are going to have to go back and take a look at it. We might ultimately have to combine our efforts with other townships.

Critics say the Board has deviated from its master plan and is allowing unorderly growth. Do you agree?

Smith - No. I think that there are areas in the master plan that do need updating, and some are under consideration by the Planning Commission. There are also elements in the plan that reflect a more rapid growth than we have realized and a effort at this time must be made to insure that it properly reflects 1980.

Tower - Definitely not. I was on the Board when we passed the master plan. Reasonableness and flexibility were a key to adoption at that time. It was designed to be changed and amendments were in order from day one.

Do you have any other concerns you'd like to express?

Smith - I'd borrow a very important page from my business experience. I would involve the best and most capable people in the community in government as volunteers in task forces. We've also got to face solid waste disposal because private landfills are filling up. We must bite the bullet and decide what our course is going to be. It also seems that more permission is being granted for private roads. These are pandora boxes. They are going to come back to haunt us.

Tower - I need the job and like the job. I spend a helluva lot of hours on the job. We are the only township that can brag about tax revenues. We are at an employee level less than what we were at 5 years ago. We are damn slim and trim right now. Also 80% of the criticism I get is on roads. We need to get money so that we can obtain matching funds from the county.

Balzarini Challenges Ritter for Treasurer's Job

Do you agree with critics that insinuate the present Board lacks in leadership?

Ritter - I don't agree. One of the strong points of this Board is that we have disagreements. I think that is important for the citizens to know. You might be able to say there are individuals on the Board that lack leadership. I personally don't feel I lack in leadership. I'm the one who led the Board in disbanding the police department, much to my own political detriment.

Balzarini - Definitely. That's one of the reasons I decided to run. There is definitely a lack of leadership and very little cooperation between board members. The board just never seems to function together at all.

Do you think a charter township and manager are concepts Independence should adopt?

Ritter - It's too early on. It's a step closer to urbanization. And I don't think we want cityhood. I don't think a manager is necessary. I think it's the function of the supervisor to perform in that capacity.

Balzarini - One of the benefits is it would change the fiscal year to January-December. It is suppose to result in more or better services to the community at less cost. I really don't have any thoughts on a township manager right now.

What's your opinion on the Pine Knob proposed hotel, amusement park and ski ramp?

Ritter - I was supportive of a hotel. When it came to it, I voted against the height. As far as the ski ramp and amusement park, I honestly feel that their effort to build these two, is in retaliation. I don't support either

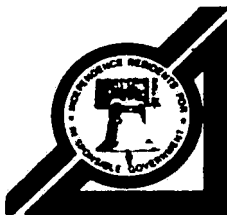

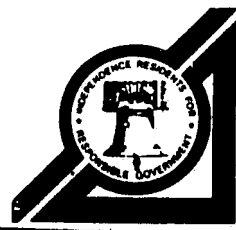

Balzarini - I think Pine Knob got out of hand because the Board failed to take a firm stand. I think they misread the community when the majority of the Board supported the hotel in the first place. If the ski ramp is approved, I don't see how a court could deny the hotel, because it's essentially the same shape and slope as the hotel.

What do you think of Independence's present police protection and contract with the sheriff's department?

Ritter - I'm very happy. I only wish we could afford an increase in service. Right now we have better service at a lower cost and a higher degree of professionalism. I'm also pleased with the reserve program that is available to us at no cost.

Balzarini - I'm not satisfied. I think we need our reserves back. They lived in the community and provided an essential service to the community. I think the people of the township have been short changed. The Village and school district never wanted police services disbanded, but their wishes were ignored.

Critics say the Board has deviated from its master plan and is allowing unorderly growth. Do you agree?

Ritter - I don't agree at all. The growth that has appeared has come in a well planned, methodical manner. Because of this the township is the most desirable place in North Oakland County to live.

Balzarini - The only change I regreted was the change that allowed the largest lots zoned to be 3 acres. Our large acreage zoning is gone, primarily because they felt it was not defensible in court. That's a sorry reason for doing away with rural areas.

Do you have any other concerns you'd like to express?

Ritter - I support a 1/2 mill for roads to be used to get matching money. The most important thing that has to be done in the township right now is to pave Pine Knob Road. Another important issue will be our ability to maintain the amount of services residents are used to in the face of drastic

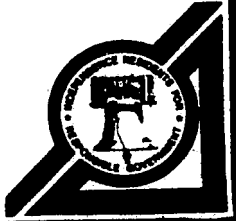

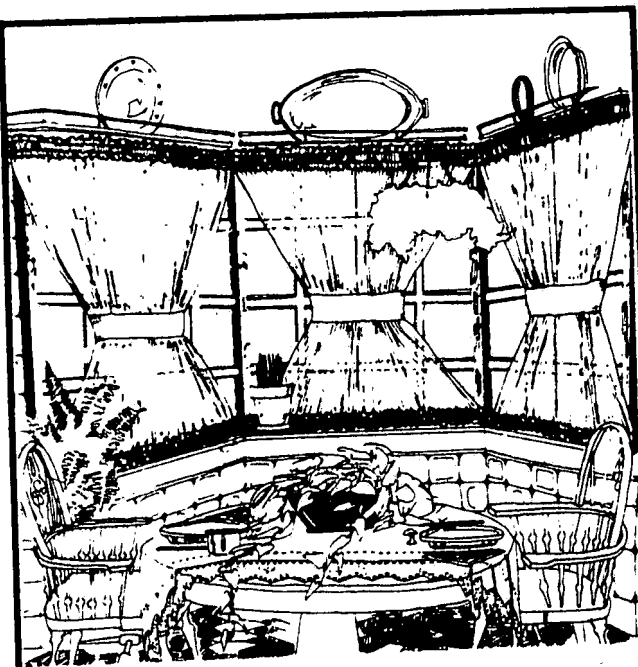



Rose - Our financial condition. We're facing budget cuts due to the loss of state revenue. Our federal revenue sharing has been reduced. We used to have 53 CETA employees; after November 1 we won't have any. And that doesn't take into consideration what passage of any of the tax proposals will do.

It has been suggested that the board now suffers from a lack of leadership, what's your response to that?

Herron - I don't think that's really a problem. How can anyone rule a township board? They're all individuals and they all vote individually.

Rose - I'm not sure that's a valid point. At

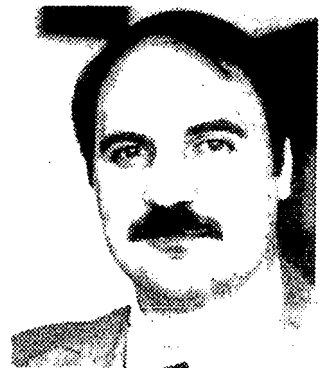

times the township government is set up to respond to problems. No one could have foreseen that a 600-acre gravel pit or a 20-story hotel would be proposed.

I think the board could have molded policy better. But we don't all agree and it's hard to make policy when you can't agree on what it should be.

What's your position on the possibility of the township going to a charter township or township manager form of government?

Herron - I believe the charter township idea is something we should look into. There is a lot to be gained by it. We're probably coming closer all the time. Charter townships are considered bigger, and therefore they get more consideration when it comes to funding.

Rose - I think the township manager idea is

attractive, a professionally trained individual taking care of business. There are problems with what the duties would be and who a manager would be answerable to. Let's face it-the person who gets elected may not always be a good manager and the good manager may not be able to get elected.


Independence Township, like every unit of government in the state, is faced with the possibility of drastically reduced, or at least drastically altered, financing. What should the township board do if any of the tax proposals passes?

Herron - Tisch is too severe. We have to do something but not that.

Rose - We face a \$750,000 loss if Tisch passes. I would propose we appoint a com-

mittee of citizens and township employees and say, 'Look, these are our finances and these are our present services. Which ones can we get along without?' The township auditor has already said he would sit down with them.

The other two proposals are, tax increases and don't deserve serious consideration. Although the passage of A alone would mean we would have to think seriously about incorporation.

What about some of the specific issues the township has dealt with recently (Pine Knob, Gravel Pit, Sewer Installation, Police, Roads)?

Herron - What can I say about gravel pits.. Nobody likes 'em and neither do I. But I was in complete favor of the Pine Knob Hotel. I think it would be fantastic. All that talk about highrises all over is nonsense, and the number of jobs created would be great.

Rose - My problem with Pine Knob is that they don't want to obey township rules. They won't consider accommodation and expect to act above the law. And I don't think they should be treated to special privileges we don't hand out to anyone else.

Comment

Herron - I don't claim I know the job now, but I'm sure Chris Rose did some learning on the job and there's no reason why I couldn't.

I know I'm not a great politician, coming out in favor of Pine Knob won't help me. But I don't ride the fence on the issues.

But I think the voters deserve a choice.

Rose - I think it's wrong to say that any of the candidates oppose growth. I think we need orderly, planned growth. Nobody is trying to shut the door.

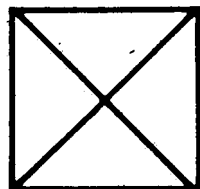

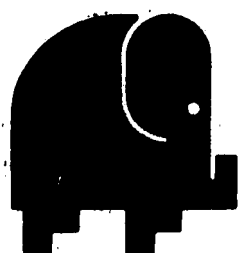

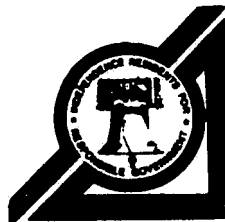

news in brief

A special public hearing was held in Springfield Township on Wednesday, October 15, to discuss a proposed adult foster care home at 8420 Eaton Road.

Neighboring residents expressed a limited concern about the suitability of the home itself as a residence for the elderly. Bortz Health Care Facility, which owns the home, intends to use it to care for six or fewer elderly residents who are in need of 24-hour medical supervision.

Previous residents had complained about an inadequate heating plant in the home, said Roger Howton of 8484 Eaton Road.

But there was none of the now customary furor associated with adult foster care home designed to provide non-institutional care for the mentally retarded.

And supervisory officials from the state and the Bortz group assured the audience that the home would be made suitable for nursing care before occupancy.

Milford is out and Waterford Mott is in. That's the latest, and only verified, change in the Greater Oakland Activities League lineup according to Paul Tungate, CHS athletic director.

But there is also the possibility that the GOAL will be expanding from its present six to eight teams within the year. Pontiac Northern and Avondale have expressed interest in joining, and Tungate said some action was likely to be taken by the league in the near future.

At present the GOAL consists of Clarkston, West Bloomfield, Rochester, Lake Orion, Waterford Kettering and the soon to be departing Milford.

Springfield Township residents who favor the implementation of the M-275 highway project got some encouragement last week.

County executive, Daniel Murphy, came out strongly in support of a major north-south highway to serve the western half of the county during the course of a televised debate with his democate oponent, Tom Lewand, on Tuesday, October 14.

Murphy, responding to a question about urban sprawl, said he could think of no other place in the country that "already (had) 250,000 residents and not one single four-lane highway".

"We're not talking about people who might move out there if a highway was built, but about people who are already there."

The M-275 project, which had at one time been set aside by the old Highway Department, has been recently reconsidered by the Department of Transportation.

Dream Home May Go Up in Smoke

Three years ago, Dan Emery inherited a building lot in a subdivision off Whipple Lake Rd. in Independence Township. At the time it seemed like a great deal. His family was growing; he was living with his parents and

wanted a place of his own; and, when, Bob Singleton contacted him and told him he could get a home built on the property for \$29,500, everything looked rosy.

Unfortunately, things are not always what they seem.

Today, Dan is wondering what he is going

to do to save his unfinished home from being used as a practice site for Tink Ronk's fire brigade.

It's been six months since the builder Singleton found for Emery, Larry Murphy of Future Home Inc., has worked on the site at 5000 E. Princeton. And in July, acting on complaints from neighbors, the township moved to condemn the building.

Emery doesn't blame his neighbors. In its unfinished state, the house is a hazard.

But if he can't convince Murphy to finish the work in the six months the township has given him, or find some other way to demonstrate that he intends to neutralize the danger to the "health, safety and welfare" of the community, Emery faces the prospect of destroying his own home or watching (and possibly paying for the privilege) the township to do it for him.

Emery thinks his chances of getting Mur-

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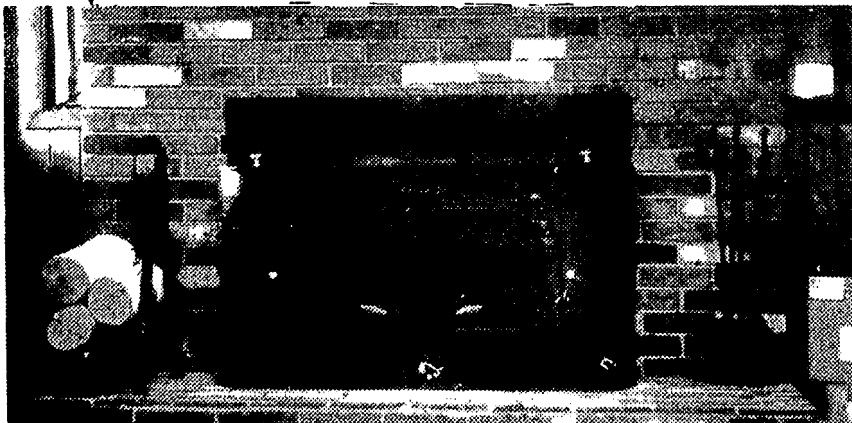

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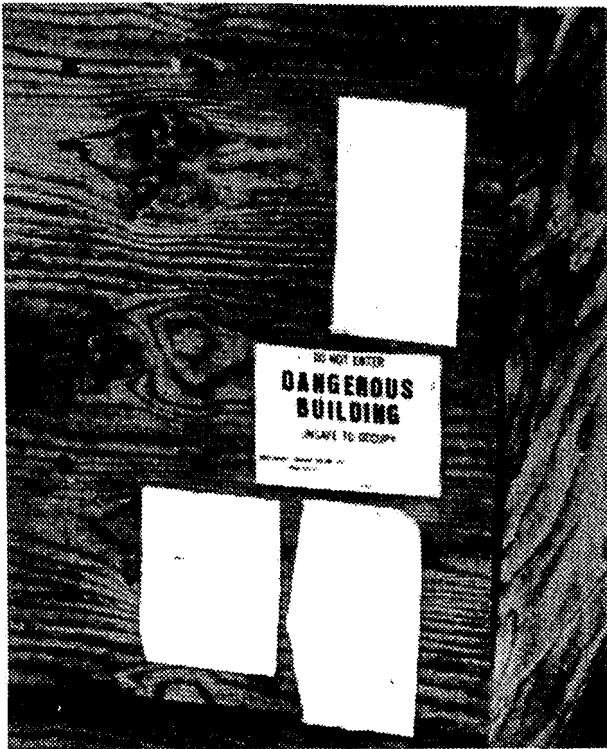

phy to finish the work are minimal.

He hasn't heard from the builder in three months. And it's Emery's opinion that Murphy just plain can't afford to finish the house.



Emery's home is plastered with warning posters.

"He bid it way too low," says Emery, "I've talked to other builders who tell me they couldn't buy materials for this house at less than \$30,000."

And Murphy has apparently written the project off. Emery says he has been back to the site only to remove some of the lumber. Lumber that Emery thought was to go into completion of his home.

With the help from a carpenter friend, Emery says he might try to finish up. Although if they can't finish by the January deadline, he says he will have to get some kind of stay from the township.

Whatever happens, Emery thinks he will

have to pay more than he had figured.

Two mortgages he received from Capitol Savings and Loan have expired without being drawn upon because the work hadn't progressed.

Emery only paid Murphy \$500 to secure the contract. But he suspects that the money Murphy has in the house may be secured with a lien on his property, in which case he will have to find some means of paying Murphy off for putting up a condemned building on his lot.

For now, all Dan Emery can do is wait and

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Chiropractors Win Bout in Court

The American Osteopathic Association (AOA), one of the defendants in a complex antitrust suit filed by five chiropractors against a number of medical societies, has consented to an injunction preventing the association

from a suit filed in 1976 by Dr. Patricia B. Arthur, Dr. James W. Bryden, Dr. Steven G. Lumsden, Dr. Michael D. Pedigo, and Dr. Chester A. Wilk, all doctors of chiropractic. The suit alleges that various medical societies sought to eliminate the profession of chiropractic through private activities designed to isolate chiropractors and their patients from professional cooperation with medical physicians and the use of hospital and other institutional facilities controlled by but not owned by the defendants.

Defendants in the suit include the American Medical Association, the Joint Commission on Ac-

creditation of Hospitals, the American College of Radiology, and numerous other medical trade associations.

In its Settlement Agreement, the osteopathic group recognizes that chiropractors and osteopathic physicians may engage in interprofessional referrals and consultation, cooperative care of patients, group practice and health care partnerships. It

opens the way for some chiropractors to seek and obtain hospital privileges for the care of chiropractic patients in a hospital setting.

The Settlement encourages osteopathic hospitals and physicians to provide x-ray and laboratory services to chiropractors and to release x-rays and records of patients to chiropractors at the request of a patient.

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Express Announces Schedule

The Detroit Express have announced the schedule for the upcoming 1980-81 North American Soccer League Indoor Season.



Wolves Clinch Crown with 41-0 Win Over Milford

The Clarkston High School football Wolves clinched the G.O.A.L. league crown Friday night with a 41-0 trouncing of Milford.

Porritt said, "Adams has always been tough for Clarkston, no matter how good we were."

With their victory Friday Clarkston is sure

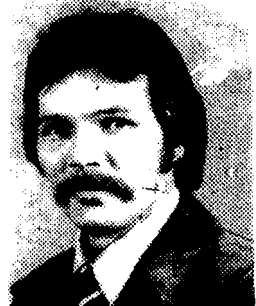

Clarkston never got untracked; turning the ball over seemed to be the game plan; and Lisa, after scoring only six points in three quarters watched most of the final period from the bench.

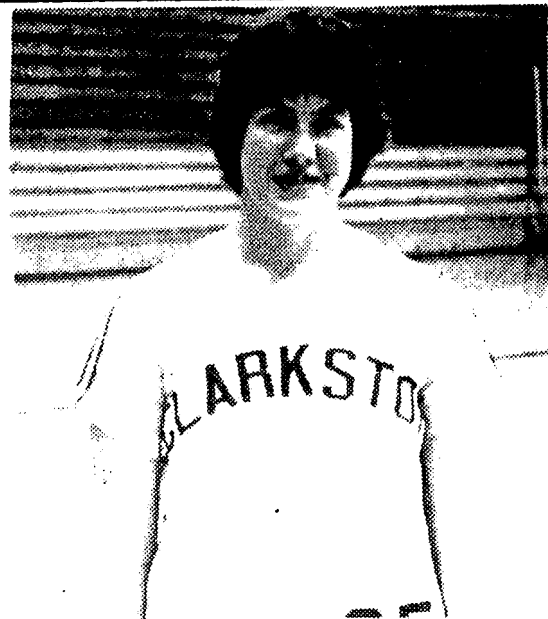
But, in marked contrast to last year's squad, Lisa says, "We've got a better attitude now. We'll be back."
