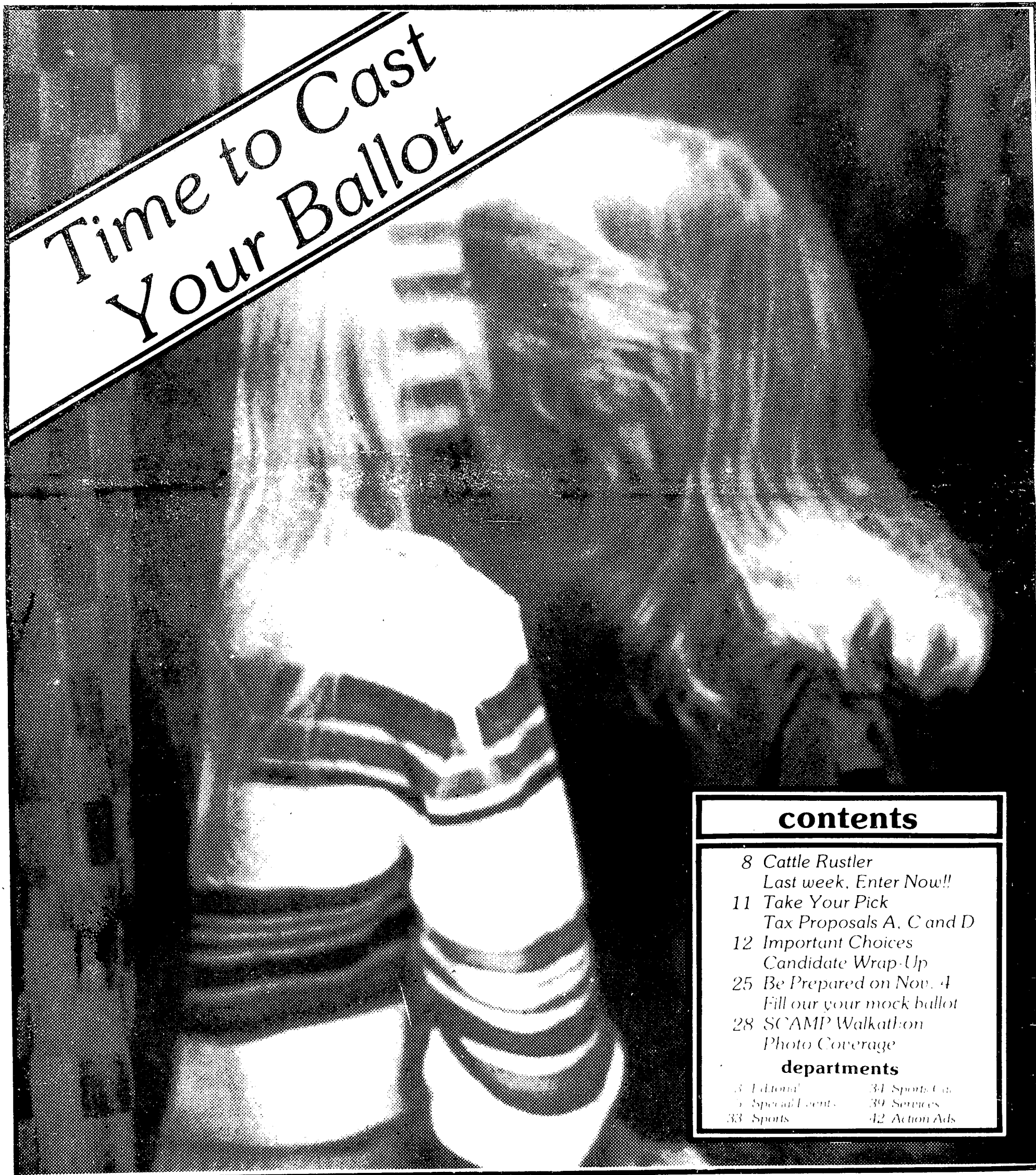

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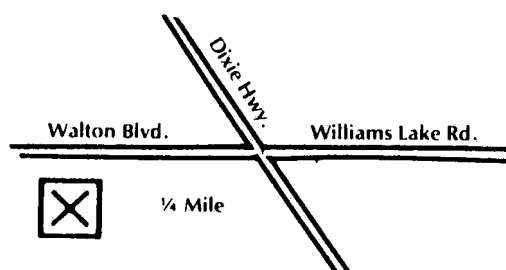

Former Supervisor Supports Smith, Balzarini

Groundwater Study Underway Near Illegal Dumpsite

A hydrogeological study, to determine the quality of groundwater directly under and adjacent to the two illegal dumpsites in Rose and Springfield Townships is under way. Four to five wells have been drilled at the Springfield site, which will be used to monitor the water below the surface. Approximately four wells will also be drilled at the Rose Township location.

During the drilling, water and soil samples are routinely collected at various locations and depths. These samples will be analyzed for contaminants associated with the drummed-wastes removed from the two locations last spring and winter. Soil borings provide a continuous pattern or map of the soil layers below the dumpsites. This "geological map-

ping" will also show any possible contaminants contained in the soil layers.

Measurements of the "static water level" are also recorded for each well. This level is determined by the following procedure: Simply stated, (1) a hole is drilled; (2) the hole is cased; and, (3) a measurement is made showing how far groundwater fills the hole. This measurement is the "static water level." The static water level, soil particle size and type characteristics will be used to define the groundwater flow rate, gradient (or elevation), and direction. Based on these findings, recommendations will be made for the treatment or disposal of water and soil, if found to be contaminated. As of this writing, no results from the hydrogeological study

are available.

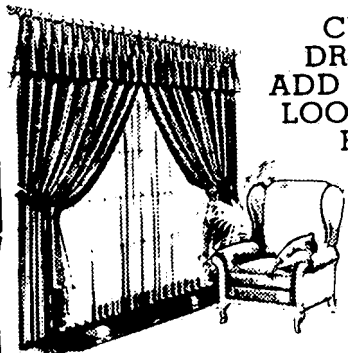
Finally: All Barrels Removed from Toxic Waste Sites

All barrels (both empty excavated drums and 85-gallon steel overpack recovery drums) and all toxic wastes have been removed from both illegal dumpsites in Rose and Springfield Townships.

The drum-disposal program began in February and continued through May, 1980. Disposal of liquid wastes was complicated. Department of Natural Resources (DNR) analysis showed that some liquid wastes had dangerously low flash points—below 140 degrees Fahrenheit. This is the lowest temperature at which the vapor of a volatile liquid will ignite with a flash.

Before these liquids could be disposed of, it was necessary to remove the flammable solvents in a special distillation process. The procedure resulted in unexpected delays in completion of the drum-removal program. An estimated 400 barrels had to be processed in this manner, out of the 1,500 drums in Springfield and 5,000 at Rose Township.

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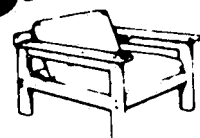
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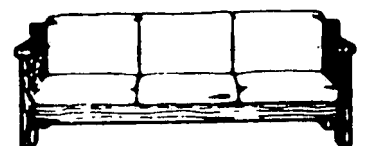
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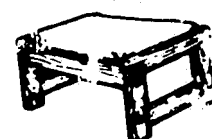

Christopher also presented a plaque to Fire Chief, "Tink" Ronk expressing his and M.D.'s appreciation.

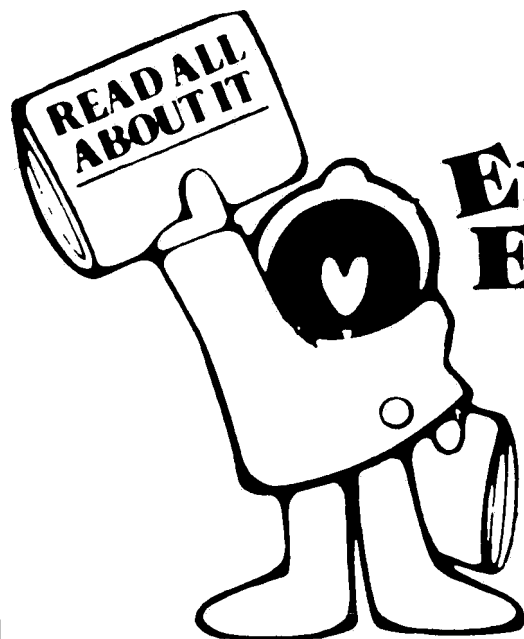

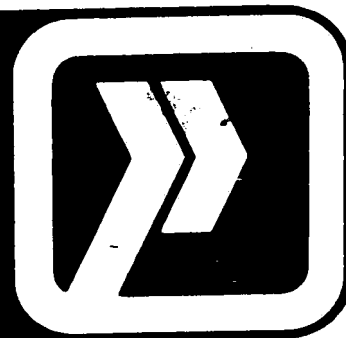


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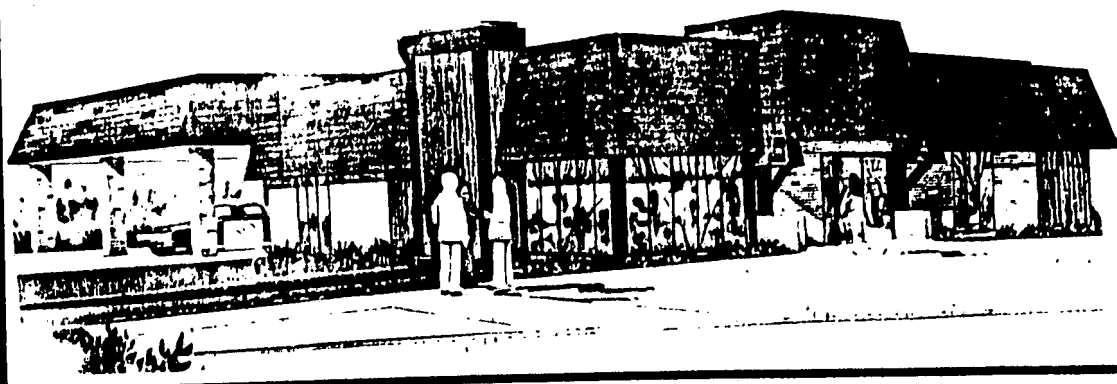

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The seventeen year old Pontiac youth arrested for the May 3rd murder of an Independence Township woman was arraigned on an open murder charge in Oakland County circuit court last Monday, October 20.

The youth, Ronnie C. Waters, is accused of murdering Deborah Ann Porcelli, during an incident in which Mrs. Porcelli's husband was asked for and refused to provide a light to one of the youths accompanying Waters.

Circuit Judge Gene Schnelz had ruled that a previous reduction in the charge to second degree murder was unwarranted by the evidence obtained in Waters' preliminary examination.

Conviction on first degree murder, one of the options a jury has under the open murder charge, carries a maximum sentence of life imprisonment. Second degree murder terms vary from two years to life with parole eligibility after seven years.

The license of a Springfield Township cemetery, Hillview Gardens on Andersonville Road, will be revoked for neglect on November 15.

The Michigan Cemetery Commission will make the move based on neglect and the disappearance of more than \$48,000 handed over to cemetery owner, Frank Pilara, for the purchase of gravestones. Another \$13,770 is missing from the cemetery's perpetual care fund.

Efforts to contact Mr. Pilara have failed and seasonal maintenance of the site, such as lawn mowing, seem to have been suspended.

The cemetery will be placed into receivership and turned over to a third party for maintenance after the revocation.

Donald Owen Powell, 25 year old Clarkston resident, was found guilty of three counts of manslaughter last Wednesday in connection with the deaths of Ortonville teens, Luann Cowie, Lynn Marion and Edward Vanderlind.

Powell had been accused of driving while intoxicated on the night of October 20, 1979 when his 1977 Grand Prix crashed head-on with a Volkswagen driven by Ms. Cowie and killed the three youths.

Jury deliberations in the trial extended over two days after testimony in the court of Oakland County Circuit Judge Robert Webster. Powell will be sentenced by Judge Webster on December 4. Maximum penalty for manslaughter is fifteen years.



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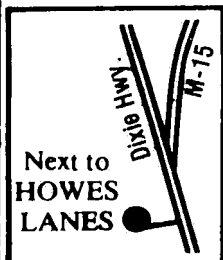

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Local Officials Have Unkind Words for All Three Tax Proposals

There are three tax proposals on the November 4 ballot. Each offers an alternative to the present tax structure and, consequently, mandate some changes in the structure of government service.

Proposal A, the Smith-Bullard proposal, and Proposal C, the Milliken-Coalition Plan, both reduce property taxes on principal homesteads, but both also include provisions to make up for lost revenues. Proposal D, the Tisch Amendment, cuts property taxes too, but it severely limits the ability of government to secure revenues elsewhere.

What follows is a brief summary of the components of each proposition and comments on how passage might effect various levels of local government:

Proposal A

The Smith-Bullard plan is intended to equalize the financing of public school education. It would greatly reduce the level of local property tax support for school operations and shift the burden to the state. Over a five year phase-in period the per pupil amount of state aid would be gradually brought up to the highest level received by any district during the phase-in period. Since the state would have significantly less revenue from local property taxes to finance what is likely to be an increase in school aid funding of \$206 million in 81-82 and \$2 billion by 1985-86, the sponsors of the bill have suggested increases in the state income tax (from 4.6% to between 6.6% and 7.1%) and an average increase of 10.5 mills statewide on business property.

The Smith-Bullard plan splits local opinion to a degree that is easily appreciated.

Superintendent of the Clarkston Schools, Milford Mason, says that equalization of state aid holds the "promise" of improving things in his schools.

Under the present formula and millage level of the district Mason says the Clarkston schools receive a per pupil average of less than half that of some other schools in the county.

Under Smith-Bullard, that disparity would be eliminated.

What Mason would rather see however is an adjustment of the present system which would include a state aid formula that better compensates schools for their costs.

On another level, Smith-Bullard is anathema. Primarily because it limits un-

chartered townships from levying anything over 4 mills. Independence is presently at a level of 7 mills (although 1 mill for sewer debt service is exempt from the limit).

Chris Rose, Independence Township Clerk, says S-B would, "take away any local options. We couldn't buy property, build a road fund or assess an extra mill for fire protection."

Ironically, Independence is at odds with the Michigan Townships Association on Proposal A. This is due largely to the fact that most unchartered townships in the state now levy something less than the 4 mills provided for in Smith-Bullard. Springfield, for instance, levys only 3.

And Collin Walls, Springfield Supervisor, says that his objection to the proposal is based, not on its effect on township operations, but on the overall increase in taxes it would mean to township residents.

Proposal C

The Coalition plan was drawn up by the Governor and the legislature in response to the Tisch amendment. It would reduce property taxes on homesteads, reduce certain other taxes, and finance this relief with increases in state sales and use taxes.

The primary beneficiaries of this plan would be middle and low income homeowners who could realize a net decrease in taxes, according to the plan's sponsors, of up to \$3000 year. Much of the burden of the increases in sales and use taxes would be borne by businesses and citizens with higher income.

The impact of the coalition plan on the local level is difficult to assess, but not welcome.

Chris Rose calls the plan, "a proposition that tries its best to confuse the issue." The increased complexity of the property assessment and tax credit system, coupled with increased legislative flexibility on terms of payment make it hard to know how much, if any, money would be lost to Independence.

The new system would also make life more difficult at the county level.

Oakland County Budget Director, James Brennan, says that passage of Proposals A or C would result in "sky-rocketing" administrative costs.

Proposal D

The Tisch tax cut plan is designed to cut

property taxes, reduce their future growth and require voter approval for any new or increased taxes of any kind.

Total reduction in property taxes would amount to about \$2.6 billion statewide under the Tisch plan. Most of the revenue lost to local governments (approx. \$2.3 billion) under this plan is supposed to be made up by the state. Since the Tisch plan makes no provision for alternative sources of revenue it is assumed that significant cuts in government spending and services will result from its passage.

James Brennan says Oakland County could lose as much as \$17 million. Chris Rose says Independence will be down \$750,000. And Milford Mason says the schools can anticipate a \$6 million loss.

All three feel the cuts required by the Tisch plan are too drastic.

There is also some concern about the plan's provisions for state reimbursement to local governments. And the accompanying fear that gerrymandering by the legislature make the ultimate outcome all that much more unpredictable.

Unquestionably, local officials are apprehensive about the passage of any of the three proposals. Although, at the same time, almost all admit that the present assessment levels have made property taxes exorbitant.

But as Rose puts it, "Neither A or C are tax cuts anyway, and if they only allowed people who understood it to vote on Tisch, it would be defeated statewide by a margin of 6-5."

It does seem certain that passage of Tisch would reduce taxes.

"If people want to give government a good, swift kick in the ass-Tisch will do it," says James Brennan.

Invariably, comment on the Tisch proposal heads to speculation. Backers say government is too fat and can go without, detractors say Tisch will cripple state services, force the closing of schools and set off legal battles that won't be resolved for a decade.

Voters, understandably, don't know what to believe. But recent polls indicate that, of the three, Proposal D is the only tax measure with enough support to give it a fair chance of passage.

Colin Walls thinks that much of the apprehension over passage of Tisch is unfounded. He says the measure, "once we figure it out", would result in "a strengthening of local control."

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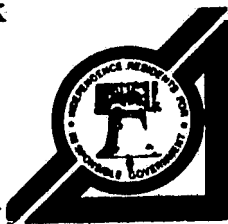

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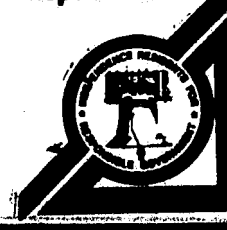
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important choices: A Last Look at the Candidates

60th District Representative

Democratic incumbent, Claude Trim-Davisburg, has held public office for the past twelve years (the last six as state representative), following 21 years with GMTC. Trim is facing perhaps his toughest challenge this year. Controversial issues like foster care homes, toxic waste and the economy have made the incumbent's seat a hot one. But there seems to be little disagreement about Trim's personal qualities. Even challenger Sharyn Gidday says her opponent is "basically a good man".

Republican Gidday is a former treasurer of Highland Township. She is an assertive force and, when some of her policy changes in Highland drew fire, was even subject to a

recall vote. But Mrs. Gidday claims she brought Highland's fiscal policies into the 20th century. In her campaign against Trim, she has questioned positions (and often what she feels are the absence of positions) by the incumbent representative on key legislative measures including removing local control in the placement of foster care home, reform of workman's compensation and taxation. Mrs. Gidday has said that she feels the district deserves more decisive representation.

District 1 Commissioner

Democratic challenger, Lynn Nelson of Ortonville, makes his third try to unseat Richard Wilcox. A former Brandon Township

Trustee and member of the Zoning Board of Appeals for the last six years, Nelson is a journeyman tool grinder at Fisher Body in Pontiac. Nelson cites a stabilization of spiraling costs as his first priority as a commissioner. He thinks the northern tier of townships has been getting shortchanged by the county.

Incumbent Republican, Richard Wilcox, has been in county government for twelve years. Before that he was Brandon Township supervisor and has been proprietor of The Reminder Inc. for 20 years. Wilcox thinks transportation will be the focus of commissioners' interest for the next few years. He says both public transportation and road service are going to have to be improved. Also of concern are solid waste disposal and overcrowding at the jail. Wilcox thinks the present Republican administration has done a good job of controlling the county budget.

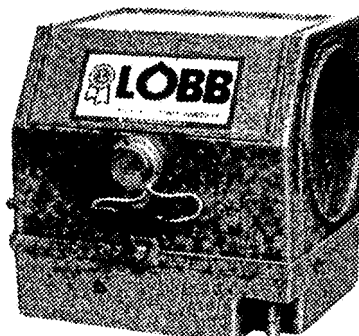

important for District II, she says, will be the handling of toxic wastes and a new program for solid waste disposal. She thinks the county will have to take the lead in plotting new strategies and that, to be successful, they will have to become more cooperative and less partisan.

Republican, LeRoy Cagney, is a former member of the Milford Village Council and an independent businessman. Cagney thinks that local government could be devastated by tax reforms and decreased revenues. He says he could provide the kind of tough decision-making that such cuts would require. Like most area commissioner candidates, Cagney is opposed to the SEMTA subway plan and thinks that some better transportation alternatives could be worked out.

District 3 Commissioner

Jerry O'Dean knows he's running in one of the most hotly contested races for county commissioner. He says the ability of Democrats to get out the vote is the key to his success. O'Dean is a Pontiac fireman and lifelong resident of Orion Township. As a public employee, O'Dean senses a need for a county-wide EMS system to insure that government is placing the highest priority on human life. He thinks that present waste in county budgeting could be eliminated to fund such a program. At the same time, O'Dean acknowledges that prospective tax cuts could eliminate all but the most essential services.

The other candidate for departing Matt Dunaskiss' seat is Clarkston Republican, Charlie Whitlock. Whitlock is a retired county sheriff and former member of the Independence Township planning commission. He thinks the present strong leadership of the executive is good for the county and should be supported. O'Dean's EMS or elimination of the county security force, he says, would be both unnecessary and costly.

Independence Supervisor

Incumbent, Floyd Tower, wants another four years to exercise his experience in the handling of township government. Tower has been under fire recently for his role in areas like Pine Knob and the management of

township growth, but he insists that the present board has done a good job of responding to problems and preparing for the future. Tower thinks his inside experience of how government, and especially the relationships of township to state and national governments, work is a major plus for him.

Republican challenger, Jim Smith, is a business owner, member of the township planning commission and 11 year area resident. Smith strongly criticizes the lack of leadership he senses on the board presently. He says decisive action, based on a maximum of citizen input is an absolute must. Smith thinks that both the charter township and township manager concepts should be studied for possible use in Independence. As a businessman he thinks that, whoever is handling the reins of government, should practice sound business principles.

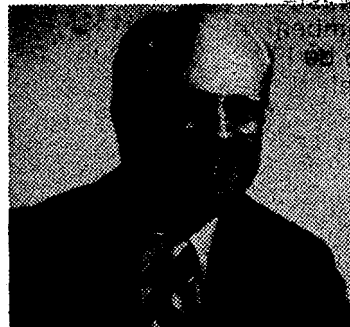

Independence Clerk

Karen Herron is no stranger to township politics. She has been running for office off and on since 1972. At that time, Herron says, she sensed a disastrous turn in township policies toward multiple development. She campaigned vigorously but was swept aside in the Nixon landslide. Now she thinks that there is a more responsible attitude on the board but that township voters nevertheless deserve a Democratic alternative.

Republican Chris Rose was first elected to the clerk's office in 1976. Before that he worked as a school teacher and postal carrier. Rose feels that the most crucial issue facing township government is maintenance of services in the face of reduced revenues. Even without tax reform, Rose says the township is going to suffer, simply because the economy is ailing. While he doesn't feel that the board has responded inadequately to problems in the past, he says the firm control is imperative if the township is to grow in a way that does it credit.

Independence Treasurer

Fred Ritter is running for a second term in 1980. Before election as treasurer, Ritter, a Democrat, served as a trustee for four years and managed the old Town Shop retail store in Clarkston. Ritter reacts sharply to the contention that the board lacks leadership. He says disagreement is one of its strongest points. Criticized for his support of the Pine Knob Hotel, Ritter says he thinks the hotel idea is a good one but that he voted against and would continue to oppose a variation in the height ordinance necessary to build a high rise. Ritter also claims his tenure as treasurer have brought Independence the highest return on its investment ever.

Carol Balzarini, Ritter's Republican challenger, has been outspokenly critical of past township board actions. She says a lack of leadership and cooperation have made progress more difficult and resulted in a reactionary attitude to problems the township faces. Balzarini says her four years as a reporter at township hall have made her aware of the workings of local government. She thinks that township residents need a more responsive attitude from their elected officials.

Independence Asks for Road Millage

The only township referendum on the ballot this fall is a 1/2 mill, 5 year levy for roads.

Proposed by township supervisor, Whitey Tower, and placed on the ballot by the township board, the money generated by this millage, approximately \$102,000 a year, would go into a special township road fund.

Tower says the fund is needed to maintain the present level of road maintenance in the township which would be diminished by cuts in the county budget.

The county road commission, is tightening its purse strings due to decreases in the

amount of revenue generated by gas and weight taxes. And Tower says too the funds previously available from the county board of commissioners can no longer be counted on.

What that means, he says, is that "we will need to have the base funds "up front" whenever there is money (in matching funds) available from the county if we want to get any work done."

"Right now we couldn't afford one-mile of paved roads even if the county was willing."

Tower said the money would also enable the township to meet some of the needs of residents who live on private roads in the township without having to resort to a

special assessment.

The township presently relies on money from the general fund to cover its share of any road related expenses, including, dust control, grading and graveling, drainage and construction.

"Adult Bookstore" shall mean an establishment having as a substantial or significant portion of its stock in trade for sale, barter, or rental, books, magazines, other periodicals or films which are distinguished or characterized by their emphasis on matter depicting, describing or relating to "Specified Sexual Activities" or "Specified Anatomical Areas," (as defined below), or an establishment with a segment or section devoted to the sale or display of such material.

"Adult Motion Picture Theater" shall mean an enclosed building used for presenting for on-premises viewing, by use of motion picture devices or any coin-operated means, material distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting, describing, or relating to "Specified Sexual Activities" or "Specified Anatomical Areas" (as defined below), for observation by patrons therein.

"Adult Motel" shall mean a motel which presents materials distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting, describing, or relating to "Specified Sexual Activities" or "Specified Anatomical Areas" (as defined below), for the entertainment of its patrons.

"Adult Personal Service Business" shall mean a business whose activities include a person, while nude or partially nude, providing personal services for another person on an individual basis in a closed room. It includes, but is not limited to, the following activities and services: modeling studios, photographic studios, wrestling studios, individual theatrical performances, body painting studios, and massage studios.

"Cabaret" shall mean an establishment which features topless dancers, go-go dancers, exotic dancers, strippers, male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers.

"Partially Nude" shall mean a person having any or all of the following body parts exposed: buttocks, genitals, pubic area or female breast.

"Specified Anatomical Areas" shall mean:

(a) Less than completely and opaquely covered human genitals, pubic region, buttock, and female breast below a point immediately above the top of the areola; and

(b) Human male genitals in a discernibly turgid state, even if completely and opaquely covered.

"Specified Sexual Activities" shall mean:

(a) Human genitals in a state of sexual stimulation;

(b) Acts of human masturbation, sexual intercourse, or sodomy; and

(c) Fondling or other erotic touching of human genitals, pubic region, buttock or female breast.

Add Section 9.02

Principal Uses Permitted Subject to Special Conditions:

7. Adult bookstores, adult motion picture theatres, adult motels, adult personal service businesses and cabarets, subject to the following:

(a) All buildings in which a use permitted under this sub-section is conducted shall be located no less than 1,500 feet of a pre-existing school or place of worship. Measurement shall be made from the building corner of the principal use permitted subject to special conditions located nearest to the pre-existing school or place of

worship to the building corner of the pre-existing school or place of worship located nearest to the principal use permitted subject to special conditions.

(b) No use permitted under this sub-section shall be conducted in any manner that permits the observation of any material depicting or describing "Specified Sexual Activities" or "Specified Anatomical Areas" from any public way or from any other property. This provision shall apply to any display, decoration, sign, window, or other opening.

(c) All buildings in which a use permitted under this sub-section is conducted shall be located no less than 100 feet of any residentially zoned district. Measurement shall be made from the building corner closest to the nearest residential district boundary line. All buildings in which a use permitted under this sub-section is conducted shall be located not less than 1,000 feet of any other building in which a use permitted under this sub-section is located. Measurement shall be made from front door to front door along the street line.

(d) No use allowed under this sub-section shall be approved by the Township Board unless all of the following findings are made:

(i) That the establishment, maintenance, location and operation of the use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare.

(ii) That the establishment, maintenance, location and operation of the use will in all respects conform to the provisions of this ordinance, other applicable Township ordinances, and any applicable State or Federal laws.

(e) Reasonable conditions deemed necessary for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of Township residents may be imposed by the Township Board with respect to the uses permitted under this sub-section. The Township Board shall maintain a list of any conditions imposed under this sub-section. Said conditions shall remain unchanged except upon the mutual agreement of the landowner and the Township Board.

(f) The Township Board may require the posting of a performance bond pursuant to and in accordance with Section 16.09, with respect to any improvements required to be completed as a condition of approval under this sub-section.

ADD a new Section 16.07(2)(f) providing as follows:

Sec. 16.07(2)(f)

It meets the minimum requirements and standards for grading and surface drainage and for the design and construction of storm sewers, storm water holding facilities, water mains, and sanitary sewers as determined by the Township engineers and set forth in Springfield Township Design and Construction Standards adopted by resolution of the Township Board and copies of which are available at the Township Offices.

AMEND the following portions of the site plan checklist as contained in Section 16.07(3) to read as follows:

1. All site plans

(18) The location, design and construction of sanitary sewers, existing and proposed.

(19)(b) Water main design and construction, hydrants and building services and sizes.

(c) Storm sewer design and construction, site grading and drainage storm water holding facility design and/or other pertinent facilities.
