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Davisburg Finds Wastewater Disposal Expensive

Davisburg's wastewater disposal problems don't admit to an easy solution and the Springfield Township Board officially recognized that condition last Wednesday by tabling indefinitely any action on an expensive proposal to install a joint use sewer system to serve the downtown area.

Engineering on the plan had been com-



pleted last month and submitted to the board for review. The wastewater study was commissioned by the township in February to explore possibilities for disposal which would allow for further development of the downtown district.

The Oakland County Health Department has refused to issue permits for the installation of any new, traditional disposal systems because of Davisburg's very high (only 2 feet-3 feet below the surface) watertable.

It was thought a joint use system which handled wastewater for the entire district might offer a solution. But cost estimates of between \$160,000-\$440,000 for the recommended alternatives, off site transport and disposal, seem to have put a near permanent damper on the board's hopes.

Glen Vermilye, in making the motion to table, said bleakly, "I think we found out what we wanted to know."

Engineer Robert Gaines did, however, offer some encouragement to prospective downtown developers. He said, while none of the full scale joint use proposals seemed economically feasible, the county might accept smaller alternatives if they could be properly formulated.

The most optimistic possibility, he said, might be a modest "mound" system, in which a septic field is raised higher above the water table by the construction of an earthen mound.

"If property owners get an engineer and sit down with the county with a specific proposal I suspect something might be worked out," he said.

He said the requirements for a small joint use mound system would probably be both physically and economically more feasible than any other system.


The board adopted Gaines suggestion to include some information on the scaled down alternatives in the full report, which is to be circulated to Davisburg property owners.


The Titanic Junior Historical Society, a Clarkston-based non-profit organization, is open and welcomes new members.

Clarkston School Board Tables Gifted Children Allocation

The Clarkston Schools Board of Education tabled a recommendation from Superintendent Milford Mason to establish a program for "gifted" children in grades 4-6 at last Monday's monthly meeting.

Board members requested further information on the program, which was to have begun by October, from Elementary Schools Administrator, William Neff, prior to making a decision on the program.

Mason, in making his recommendation, referred to a 1979 board resolution which made the gifted program a district priority. He said those priorities should be acted upon if they were to maintain credibility.

But some board members were reluctant to go ahead with the special program in light of recent budget paring.

Ferdinand Sanchez said he felt the community had voted three additional operating mills (in a June 8 election) for the district to restore threatened basic programs, rather than for the establishment of new ones.

The estimated cost of the gifted program, which would serve 31 students in 1981-82, is \$51,200, although Mason said that figure was probably higher than actual cost.

The gifted program would be designed to serve those children who might not be sufficiently challenged by the school's regular curriculum.

Two teachers from the district's present staff would be hired to serve as instructors (and their positions filled by teachers presently on layoff). Students would travel to North-Sashabaw Elementary, where the gifted classes will be held, two days each week.


Students in the gifted program would be selected on the basis of teacher recommendation and test scores. The data on each student would be anonymously reviewed by a committee of teachers, administrators and parents. No student would be admitted to the program without parental permission.

Neff said he feels the time for a gifted program in the Clarkston Schools has come.

'We conduct all sorts of special programs for students in special education, but virtually nothing for students who are capable of doing more.'

He said the delay would probably push back the initiation of a gifted program to November, and lead to a greater disruption of classrooms, but that he was still hopeful the idea would be adopted by the board.

Sanchez, however, indicated he would like to see the gifted program integrated with a

community education program (which was approved by the board, see related story). And another board member, Addison Hubbard. said another district goal, of establishing physical education in the elementary schools, might be deserving of attention.

The tabling motion was passed on a 4-3 vote -- board members, C. Vincent Luzi, Carolyn Place, Sanchez, and Hubbard voting aye, and Janet Thomas, Steven Werner, and Mary Jane Chaustowich nay.

The question is expected to be resubmitted at the September 14 meeting of the board. Meetings are held at the administrative offices, 6389 Clarkston Road and begin at 8 p.m.

Community Ed Coming in January

Until January of 1982 the Clarkston Schools will continue to be one of the only districts in Oakland County without a community education program.

But not after that, by virtue of a decision made on Monday, August 10, when the Board of Education approved the establishment of the program, effective January, 1982, and the hiring of a director to administer it.

Although some start-up costs will be in-

curred by the district in initiating the program, the board is working under the assumption that community education will become self-supporting within the first year of operation.

The program will be based on the recommendations of a committee which studied the issue through the course of the 1980-81 school year. It is designed to allow the district to better serve the needs of the whole community, rather than only those involved in K-12 education.

A full slate of credit and non-credit course offerings are expected, with the initial emphasis on high school graduation credit courses. Students in credit courses provide the district with state aid revenue which would be required to help pay for the program's costs.

The board followed the recommendation of Superintendent Milford Mason in adopting the community education program, who said the director interviews would be too time? consuming for the program to begin with September's school opening.

Community education in the Clarkston system has previously been administered part-time by Clarkston High School teacher Howard Webster.

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





Our first reaction at the news of the tragic death of a young woman stabbing victim was outrage at the act and deep sympathy for her, her family and friends.

Our second reaction was anger that Northland Center was mistakenly identified by the Detroit Free Press Tuesday morning, August 11, as the scene of the tragedy.

That error has inflicted needless fear and anguish on hundreds of employees of Northland Center merchants and on their tens of thousands of customers, even though the Free Press reported the following day it had made a mistake. The paper reported August 12 the stabbing actually occurred in a parking lot on Northland Drive west of the Lodge Freeway, a quarter-mile away from the Center itself.

Radio and TV reports also were corrected after the first round of newscasts had already spread the false word. Unfortunately, because of the nature of the news business, the false story had an eve-catching headline and the correction next day was easy to miss. Many of the listeners who heard the false reports on early radio newscasts didn't hear the later corrections.

We don't know whether or not your publication was caught by the untrue report but we'd appreciate your help in correcting false impressions still held by many Detroit area readers and listeners:

We've been doing everything in our power to ensure that Northland employees and shoppers are safe and that our parking lots are secure. We've had to overcome problems shared by many in this metropolitan area. We don't think tragedies which happen elsewhere should be laid on our doorstep.





Springfield Halts Gravel Mining Permit

For twenty-three years various parties have been mining sand and gravel from a parcel of land on the southeastern border of Springfield Township without a permit.

Last week, the Thompson-McCully Company appeared before the township board to request the issuance of a permit and they may end up sorry they tried to be honest.

The company wants the township to sanction continued mining on the site, which is located northwest of White Lake Road, to periodically serve their asphalt plant, which lies in Independence Township.

But the township board's discussion of the question last week brought to light a condition which could serve to make the issuance of a permit more difficult than had been anticipated.

Thompson-McCully officials told the board that no mining has taken place since last year and it is possible that the site's status as a non-conforming use may have lapsed. The property, owned by the Detroit Edison Company, is zoned residentially and mining has been allowed since the township adopted its mining ordinance in 1973 only because it was an existing non-conforming use. But if the use has been discontinued for more than six months under the terms of the ordinance it could be void, according to township attorney Tim Patterson.

He said the company could then be required to seek rezoning and, in contrast to an existing non-conforming use, be required to meet the full terms of the mining ordinance. The ordinance carries fairly, strict guidelines for the development and reclamation of mining sites, and empowers the township to require a performance bond

from the developer.

· Patterson said the company had offered to comply with the terms of the ordinance under the permit, but the township's regulatory power would be reduced. Three sand and gravel mining operations presently operate in Springfield, all under "grandfathered", non-conforming clauses.

Thompson-McCully wants to extract the aggregate material over a period of 10 to 20 years for contingency use at the asphalt plant. They say the mining would probably take place on three different occasions of eight weeks each over that period. Approximately 300,000 tons of sand and gravel would be removed.

Township supervisor Collin Walls said the company had come in of its own accord to seek the permit, and that he had not known, prior to their request, that the property was distinct from another mining site in the same area.

Go Carts Too Loud --**Race Cancelled**

The cancellation of the race came after Independence Township had agreed to allow it

if noise levels could be kept at minimum levels established in test trials Tuesday.


The township's ordinance prohibits offsite noise levels of higher than 55 decibels. Two go-carts in the trials registered at 76 decibels, but township officials agreed to permit the race anyway if that level was not exceeded.

The township first became involved when neighboring residents to the Waterford Road track complained of the noise generated in practice by the high-powered go-carts.

There have been long standing disputes between those neighbors and the track's operators over the weekend racing. And the track is regulated under a court ordered consent agreement which specifies number of races and practice days per month.

Bids Out on Fire Station No. 2

It may be only one piece at a time but Springfield Township is committed to the construction of a second fire station.

And with that condition in mind the township board moved last Wednesday to authorize the bidding process for the facility to be located at the corner of Dixie Highway and Rattalee Lake Road.

The board has been socking away funding for the new station from federal and fire fund monies for the past two years, but township officials still fear that the cash on hand (\$98,800) may not be enough to cover the costs of a completed building.

Plans for the new station include 3 bays, a hose tower, a dispatch room, bathroom facilities and a community room. Original estimates for construction were pegged at



around \$148,000.

But by leaving some portions of the building unfinished or by self-contracting construction the township could cut costs significantly, according to supervisor Collin Walls.

He suggested the project be put up for bids, with breakdowns included for phased construction. Both the hose tower and the community room could conceivably be completed at a later date, Walls said.

Trustee William Whitley agreed: "We need to know what the whole thing is going to cost and then trim whatever is necessary."

Walls cautioned that the self-contracting concept could present deceptive savings if it also required the township to hire someone to handle construction supervision.

But, he said, "We can definitely build an apparatus room and put a bathroom in it."


The township presently has two new fire department vehicles, a tanker and an emergency medical van, that will remain homeless until the new station is erected.




Corvette Carnival at Rademachers
