**Lapsed Policy is a contract no longer in effect

because the premium was not paid. **Nonforfeiture Option is an alternative to letting a policy lapse; if there is a cash value, it can be withdrawn or used to buy either a certain amount of term insurance, or a reduced amount of paid-up permanent life insurance.

**Contingent Beneficiary is the person who will receive a policy's proceeds if the primary beneficiary is no longer alive.

**Agent is the person who sells life insurance and services the contracts (sometimes called a life underwriter).





To pay for the excessive public assistance and the thousands of state employees the State robs from money earmarked for education. Each year the percentage local schools receive from the State declines drastically.



FRIEND OF THE COURT

In divorce actions, joint custody arrangements are more frequently being considered as an alternative to the traditional arrangement where one parent is awarded sole custody. However, many people are unaware as to what is meant by the term "joint custody". Some definitions are probably helpful, as such terms as "joint custody", "shared custody", and "split custody" are often used interchangeably, though their meanings differ.

Joint "legal" custody involves a situation where both parents share responsibility and authority with respect to the children, and involves parental discussion on major decisions regarding the children. These decisions could include such things as education, religion, financial support, medical and psychological care, and extracurricular activities. Legally, the parents assume an equal role in this decision

Where joint "physical" custody is involved, the children live with each parent on a shared or part-time basis. Each parent then makes the day-to-day decisions as to the children when they are residing with that parent. This arrangement can also be referred to as "shared custody".

Parents may have joint legal custody (decision making) and "split custody" or "divided custody" whereby one or more children live with the mother and one or more children reside with the father. Joint legal custody is not necessarily present in this arrangement, though it may be appropriate. Split custody without joint legal custody is the traditional sole custody arrangement with the children divided. Each parent has complete custody of one or more children.

The court will not award joint custody if the parties are incapable of communicating as to the "best interests" of the children. Joint custody without proper communication is a fallacy. Before it can work, the parents must both be mature and reasonable enough to place the welfare of their children above any distrust or animosity that they harbor against each other and have the ability to cooperate for their children's benefit. Implicit in this arrangement is the assumption that the parents share similar values, as serious diversity in lifestyles and will result in repeated attitudes disagreements between the parents and create instability for the children.

Michigan's statute as to joint custody is found in Michigan Compiled Laws section 722.23 (6). If the parents agree on joint custody, the court is directed to award it, unless it can be shown by "clear and convincing evidence" that this arrangement is not in the best interests of the children.





One of the first activities sponsored by Springfield Township's new Community Care Council is a series of farmer's markets scheduled for several Saturdays this sum-

The markets will be set up at Davisburg's Mill Pond Park and will be supervised by three area food coops. The first will be held July 17. Booth space will be provided free.

With the economy like it is we thought why not let people bring their extra produce in and sell it," explained Helen Vergin, CCC spokesperson.

She said the group would welcome all types of food booths as well as flea market types. The only stipulation would be that booth participants must live in the immediate area.

'We're trying only to help the immediate area. No outsiders will be permitted in," said Mrs. Vergin.

The farmer's markets concept was

unanimously approved at the CCC's June 28th meeting.

In other action, members of the CCC, which make up representatives from various Springfield organizations, voted to elect a five-member board at their next regular meeting. Once the board is elected, they will be expected to meet once a month.

Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls informed the group that their name, "Community Care Council", was unacceptable to the State, and that the group would have to come up with other suggestions in order to become registered with the State.

A list of five possible names were chosen including Neighbors for Neighbors, Care & Share, Care to Share, Communities for Each Other and Reaching Aid. Walls will submit the list to the State in an effort to get acceptance of one of the names.

It was also agreed to rotate the council's meeting sites between the Springfield Township Hall, Indian Springs Nature Center, Rose Township Hall and the new Springfield Township Fire Hall.


Another project receiving considerable support was the establishment of a community calendar. Talk centered around a community newsletter in which the calendar would appear. Nothing, however, was

A World's Fair Primer

Long Lines, Fascinating Exhibits Await You

The 1982 World's Fair has been criticized for being crowded, hot and expensive; but no one has ever suggested any ways to try and cope with the masses of people or given any hints on what to do to get around the lines.



It is true that the fair is crowded and there have been as many as 100,000 people on the grounds in one day, but it is still possible to see a good part of the fair in one day, even though it could take up to a week to see everything.




The day should start between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. by getting to the grounds and purchasing tickets, which cost \$9.95 for adults and \$8.25 for children 4-11. After getting in, one should head directly for the China pavillion to wait in line. This exhibit is by far the best of the fair, although it contains nothing about energy, the theme of the fair. It is as if the best from every cultural museum in China was brought over and put on display. There are beautiful rugs, lengths of silk cloth, paintings, ivory, stone and gold carvings, and other artistic creations.


The pavillions do not open until 10 a.m., and if the line seems to be more than two hours long; it would be better to come back to the line at about eight or nine in the evening. After the China pavillion, choose between the Canadian, Japanese, Australian, and Peruvian pavillions. All have equal appeal and equal lines of 45 minutes to two hours. The Egypt pavillion has a long line also, but unless viewing statues in the semi-darkness is pleasurable, skip it.

Somewhere in-between these pavillions or while waiting in line, lunch is usually nice. There are many booths with fast foods available, reasonably priced. The food to be found is as diverse as all of the Hart Plaza ethnic festivals combined. Many people send one of their party for food while the others wait in line.

In the heat of the afternoon, when everyone starts to get a bit cranky, the kids may want to take an hour to visit the amusement park. This is the only place in the park where there are no lines. This is due to expense, some of the rides cost up to \$1. A book of twenty-five tickets costs ten dollars. Adults may want to sit for a while and Ten-







nessee Amphitheatre is a good place for that. Free, open-air concerts are given at two or three hour intervals by everything from: symphonies to choirs to soloists.


The Federal Express pavillion is something that should not be missed. Its slide show, movie and laser exhibition are one of the most interesting things of the fair.


Now it is time for dinner. The Mexican restaurant is highly recommended. It is run by a family from Mexico City and has a warm friendly atmosphere as well as good food. There is one draw-back in that one must wait in line and go through the pavillion first. If Mexican food is not your style, there are a few beer, pizza and spaghetti houses; along with a fine Irish pub-type restaurant.

After dinner, one is thoroughly sick of standing in line, but feels guilty about just standing around. The European pavillions come in handy now. None are very spectacular and all contain nearly the same things about energy, but at least one is not wasting time without looking at something.

At about 8:30 it is time to head for the US pavillion. The line dies down drastically by then, but one should be sure to be able to get through by 9:30, the time of the last showing of the US movie. After the movie, a fireworks display is usually put on and is worth staying for. Everything closes up then and everyone files for the gates to go home.

Dress for hot weather, wear comfortable shoes, and if possible take a small folding stool for the waits in line. The World's Fair is large and crowded, but can be a wonderful experience if one is prepared.



Now "Author, Author" hasn't exactly sold out the house. Nor has it received rave reviews. In general the press has panned it. And that's hard to do considering it stars Al Pacino and is directed by Arthur Hiller.

But, I've learned to disregard critic's reviews over the years. They've made successes out of some of the worst (ala "Atlantic City") and sunk some of the best.

"Author, Author" is not one of the best, but it is very cutesy and entertaining for the most part.

As in "Kramer vs. Kramer" the father Al Pacino gets dumped with the kids, five this time, when mother Tuesday Weld decides life's more exciting with her accountant boyfriend.

Playwright Pacino, who is trying to put together a hit on Broadway, besides babysitting with five youngsters, lands a famous. movie actress Dyan Cannon to play the production's lead. As you might expect Pacino becomes involved with Cannon.

The movie's funniest moments are provided by the children. Eight-year-old Geraldo keeps the audience roaring.

Too bad, however, the adults were unable to match the kids. Pacino should leave comedy to the comedians. He's one of the best dramatic actors on the screen today, but he isn't funny. And Weld and Cannon. They've always been good to look at, but as actresses they've never made the grade. Their performances in "Author, Author" won't get them any Oscars.

But don't let the acting stop you from seeing the movie. What with E.T., Poltergeist, Star Trek II, Megaforce and all the other science fiction movies flooding our theatre screens, it's good to take in a good, down-to-earth family flick once and a while.

Unfortunately, Spielberg, at times, gets too caught up in his special effects, and worries too little about the developing plot.

Rocky III - PG - The saga continues. Sylvestor Stallone as Rocky, this time is matched against a new opponent in an effort to regain the title he lost. Same plot, same cast of characters is beginning to make a mockery of what was once a great movie.

Star Trek II: The Wrath of Kahn - PG - Early reviews indicate this sequel to be better than Star Trek I. Captain Kirk and crew must do battle with the evil Kahn, ably played by Richardo Montalbian, who is bent on destroying the Universe. Also stars William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy and Deforest Kelley.

Annie - PG - After breaking most box office records on stage, the hit musical "Annie" comes to life on screen starring Albert Finney and Carol Burnett. The screen adaptation is not as strong as the stage play but is still worth the price of admission.
