

-RIEND OF THE COURT

The Office of the Oakland County Friend of the Court does not deal solely with divorce cases involving minor children, although these cases constitute the majority of its 42,000 cases. In addition, as mentioned in earlier articles, it also deals with paternity, family support, and U.R.E.S.A. (Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act) cases. In general, these three types of cases are instituted by the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Social Services. They may, however, be filed by private counsel. The Friend of the Court does not file these cases, but once a judgment of support is entered, the Office assumes enforcement responsibility.

A paternity case is instituted against a man when an unmarried woman bears his child. The biological father owes that child a responsibility to assist in his support. Often,

Mr. Fancher:

I have been following the articles in **The Reminder**, of the Friend of the Court.

In the March 11, '82 issue, I have to disagree with you on a couple of statements you mentioned.

First one, is about the bench warrants. Anyone, who has had to go in, and sign one, against the father, knows that very seldom, if ever, is the person arrested. Your article makes it sound as though these fathers are picked up that same day. Wrong, from my experience, they do not try very hard at all. A person receives their paper to appear at a certain time. You go and, if the father doesn't show, maybe after an hour or so, when they figure he isn't going to show, you're asked to fill out the bench warrant, with a description of the guy. This takes another twenty minutes or so. So you've had to take all this time off from work, thinking, oh well, they're going to arrest him. That's a laugh. I got tired of waiting three months, so I call Friend of the Court and was told, that they were doing the best they could. Another laugh. I then called my attorney and asked why they were having such a hard time picking him up.

an agreement will be reached, and the father will consent to the entry of an order requiring him to help provide support for the child. If no agreement is reached, or if the alleged father denies paternity, a trial may be needed before a support order can be entered.

A family support action is sometimes used in a paternity situation where an agreement is reached, but generally such action is instituted where married parents separate and the children begin receiving Aid of Dependent Children (A.D.C.). Where this occurs, the State, through the Prosecutor's Office, will file an action to require the absent parent to assist in supporting the children by payment of support.

An URESA action is initiated where the children and custodial parent live in a different state (or sometimes different country) than the non-custodial parent. In this situation, one state will request the other state to require the absent parent to pay

when they had his address and where he worked. My attorney told me, they would not pick him up, unless the police happen to stop him for a traffic violation and found out there was a bench warrant out against him.

The other statement was on the wage assignment. Unless your ex-husband's case isn't up for review, or you don't notify the Friend of the Court he's not paying, the wage assignment means nothing. My ex signed one and was even told by Judge Gilbert, if he missed just one week's payment, the assignment would go into effect. It just don't happen the way you print it. My ex payed fine for a few weeks and then started skipping a week here and there. So after waiting to see about the assignment, I called Linda Hallmark's office, and talked to someone on her staff and told her of the situation. She told me his case wasn't up for review for awhile, but she would pull his file out and put it on Ms. Hallmark's desk. Well it's been a month and a half, my ex still pays two or three weeks, skips a week and I have heard nothing from her office in regards to this.

I'm sure I'm not the only one who has gone through this, with that office. But for those who do not deal with the Friend of the Court, paint the picture like it is. Thank You Gail A



support. For example, if the children reside in Michigan and their father resides in California, an action can be filed in California for support. In return, Michigan agrees to assist California in collecting support for children in that state with a parent in Michigan.

These three types of actions are quite different from divorce actions. They are not based on the breakdown of a marriage. Also, they generally deal solely with the support obligation, and not with the issues of custody, visitation, property settlements, etc. They deal only with the children's right to support, and not with any rights of the parents.

Late Spring Shouldn't Hinder Steelheading

Michigan's spring steelhead fishing season may peak later than usual because of this winter's heavy snows, but the excellent runs expected should be worth the extra 7- to 10-day wait, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Anglers should watch for peak runs in early to mid-April in West Michigan, mid-April to mid-May in East Michigan, late April through mid-May in Southeast Michigan and in mid-May across the Upper Peninsula.

"The snowmelt which helps trigger the steelhead's spawning urge could be later in parts of northern Lower and Upper Michigan because of the heavy snowfall," stated James Drury, Auto Club Travel Operations manager. "The melting snow would keep rivers cold, meaning a longer-than-usual period of stream temperatures below the optimum 40- to 45degree range needed for spawning activity and best fishing."


Some 300,000 six- to 15-pound silvery fighters planted as six- to 10-inchers in 1979 and 1980 will enter the 36 streams listed on Auto Club's Spring Steelhead Guide. There also should be a good run of immature "skippers" weighing 2 to 4 pounds.

"Best West Michigan fishing should be on the St. Joseph River up to Buchanan and the Grand River system," Drury said. "Both streams have received heavy plantings and the Grand will have runs nearly within sight of the state Capitol because of new fish ladders between Grand Rapids and Lansing's Moore's Park Dam."


Other productive spots along the western shore include the Muskegon and Manistee rivers. Lake Huron standouts should include the Oscqeoc River near Huron Beach, the Au Gres River's East Branch, and the Au Sable near Oscoda, which should peak in



Potholes: A Primer for State Drivers

Q. What causes potholes?

A. Mositure seeps into the soil beneath the road surface after snow or rain. Then, when temperatures drop below freezing, the moisture freezes, the ground expands, rises and pushes the pavement up. When temperatures rise, the ground returns to normal level before the pavement does, creating a cavity. When cars and trucks drive over this cavity, the machinery, making for a more permanent, well-sealed patch. Q. Who is responsible for fixing


potholes? A. Michigan Department of

Transportation crews, county road commissions or municipal maintenance workers, depending on the location of the pothole. The transportation department directly maintains all state highways (routes marked by an "M", "US" or (deterioration) sets in, it moves rapidly. Roads which don't get fixed when they should eventually need to be completely reconstructed -- an extremely costly process.

Another key to pothole reduction is restricting weight loads during the "spring break-up" time when pavement is so vulnerable. In Michigan, weight restrictions on trucks are imposed when the ground first begins to thaw, and rain seeps into the soil below the road surface. This moisture freezes when temperatures drop below freezing, causing the gound to expand, rise and push the pavement up.

Then, when temperatures rise, the ground returns to normal level before the pavement does, creating a cavity, or pocket between the ground and the pavement.

ANATOMY OF A POTHOLE

Michigan's climate enchances this proliferation of potholes. Our northern winter climate is modified by the Great Lakes, resulting in heavy winter snows and frequent freeze/thaw cycles -- perfect conditions for the formation of potholes.

Q. How are potholes repaired?

A. Several ways. When the weather is still cool, as in March and April, maintenance crews usually apply a "cold patch" to potholes. The patch is comprised of bituminous, or asphalt, materials. It is considered a temporary remedy until crews can return when the weather warms up and apply a "hot patch" of heated asphalt.

A newer type of cold patch made of asphalt materials and a patented "secret ingredient" has helped crews in recent years because it can be applied in holes containing water and moisture. The regular cold patch process requires crews to remove and dry all moisture in a hole -- a tough job on busy, potmarked highways.

Once temperatures stabilize above 50 degrees fahreneit, crews may apply hot asphalt to potholes and roll over them with heavy

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"I") in 21 counties, and contracts the work out in the other 62 counties to county road commissions. The county road commissions also are responsible for maintaining all other local and primary roads except those in cities or Villages, which are maintained by the local government.

The Michigan Department of Transportation estimates it will use approximately 18,000 tons of patching materials during the sixmonth period from January through June of this year to patch potholes on the state's 9,500-mile highway system. Cost of the work is estimated at \$1.8 million.

Q. What can be done to reduce the number of potholes?

A. The key to stopping and preventing potholes is ensuring we have good roads. Roads with good drainage and well-sealed surfaces help keep water out of the subbase where potholes begin.

Michigan's 1,728 miles of freeways, constructed with elaborate drainage systems and reinforced pavement aine or 10 inches thick, generally have fewer potholes than lightly paved roads. But many freeways, and many highways too, are growing older. As pavement ages, it's harder to prevent potholes.

In Southeast Michigan, best steelheading should be on the St. Clair River for trollers and on the Huron River for shore and wading fishermen.

Upper Peninsula anglers should find peak action at Thompson Creek's mouth and on the Big Cedar along Lake Michigan, the Ontonagon, Little Garlic and Two Hearted along Lake Superior and the Carp on Lake Huron.

Auto Club advises steelheaders to check specific rules for individual rivers in the DNR's Michigan Fishing Guide. Some

rivers are open year-around while others open April 1 or April 24, the start of general trout season. The guide is free to anglers purchasing license passbooks.

Although contaminant levels of Great Lakes gamefish are declining, the State Department of Public Health continues its advisory that steelhead from Lakes Michigan and Huron should not be

eaten by children, pregnant women, those expecting to bear children or nursing mothers. All others should consume no more than one steelhead meal per week.

Running and Your Health

With spring approaching many people will again start exercising more. Running is one of the oldest and most popular exercises, and with good reason. It's something anyone can do, with or without other participants, it doesn't require equipment (only proper clothes and shoes), and it's inexpensive. If you are one of those people who are considering running for exercise, the following information may be of interest to you.

If you haven't been running because of the weather, you should start out at a slow pace and work toward a reasonable goal. If you would like to get a jump on the weather, you might try skipping rope indoors until spring arrives.

When deciding on a pair of running shoes, two essentials to look for are shock absorption and biomechanical stability. Good shock absorption in running shoes are important to eliminate or prevent problems with arches, ankles, knees, hips and low back. The pounding of your feet, legs and spine can be devastating to your health. It can cause not only present problems, but future problems as well. Shoes should have good shock absorption in the

heel, but also at the ball of the foot where the impact takes place.


Stability is important in controlling the rolling motion that occurs during running. If you are a runner with shoes you have put a wear pattern on, you can see if the shoes are wearing too much in one area, such as the edges. This may be due to instability, or it may be due to a physical problem with the foot or a hip being misaligned.

One way to check for possible misalignments in your body structure is to stand in front of a full length mirror disrobed, and close your eyes for a moment, get relaxed and stand in the posture that feels normal to you. Then without moving, open your eyes and see if one shoulder is higher than the other, or one hip is higher. If they aren't even it is an indication you have a structural problem. If you suspect a structural problem you should consult a chiropractor, he's an expert on spinal structure.

According to some authorities running can even become addictive. However, this addiction is a positive addiction, unlike some addictions. Some runners describe a feeling of euphoria. This may take months, runners say. Although most people start running for a various number of reasons many may continue, in part, because of this positive addiction.

Whatever your reason for starting or continuing to run, make sure you don't move to a higher goal of running too soon, that your shoes are good shock absorbers with good stability, and that your body is in good structural shape. This will insure that you are improving your body, not damaging it.





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
