Imagine a petite, 15 year old girl taking up the sport of powerlifting.

Then imagine her setting two state records the very first meet she competes in.

Imagine no more. Adrienne (Buffy) Blum, of Rattalee Lake Road, Springfield Township, in a little over six months' time has become one of the world's premier powerlif-

And it all happened by accident. Buffy was a rising young track star for Holly High School. But in late September of 1981 she had a leg injury resulting in torn cartilage and ligaments.

Her doctors suggested she take up powerlifting as a means of working her leg back into shape.. Buffy contacted Bill Stiff of Fenton, who was coach of a powerlifting team, and he consented to let her workout with the team in his gym.

Well, it wasn't long before Buffy began showing some ability in the sport and on January 16, 1982 she entered the Flint Olym-

pian Games to see what she could do.

She did the incredible. Buffy placed first in her division, setting two state records the very first time she had ever competed in powerlifting.

Buffy's father, Art, was overjoyed with the accomplishment. "She was doing it for therapeutic purposes and then all of a sudden it started taking off," said Blum. "It's amazing after \$5-6000 worth of medical bills, she walks into Flint and does it."

This spring Buffy had to choose between track, her first love, and powerlifting. She chose powerlifting because, "I like it better than anything I have ever done."

in mid-May Buffy competed in the Michigan Teenage Powerlifting Champion-ships in Swartz Creek. There she was judged the overall best while setting three state records in the bench press, dead lift and total accumulated points for girls 14-16. Her total score was also higher than anyone in the 17-19 age group.

Buffy has rejected the typical powerlifter

stereotype. She appears neither masculine nor muscular. Many of her competitors grunt and groan as they attempt to lift the weights, but, Buffy goes about her lifting with nary a sound.

"I can't do that," said Buffy. "To get

"I can't do that," said Buffy. "To get myself psyched up I just sit and relax and tell myself I have to get it."

Buffy claims there are a lot of misconceptions about powerlifting. The sport is dominated by men. Women, often times feel it's unfeminine to lift weights. Buffy disagrees.

"A lot of women don't get into it because

they don't want to develop big ugly muscles. Look at me. My muscles aren't big or ugly," said Buffy.

Next competition for Buffy will be the nationals in Greenberg, Pennsylvania August 6. The best from the country will be on hand to contest Buffy for national medals.

With her new state records, Buffy stands a good chance of becoming the national champion. Her scores are in fact better than previous national champions. Her 545 overall total scored at Swartz Creek is only 45 pounds short of a world's record.

Buffy's father, Art, figures the world's record is well within reach. "Why a 25 pound improvement in the deadlift and fifteen pound improvement in the squat and bench press and she'll have it," said Blum.

Reapportionment put has Clarkston/Davisburg right in the center of what should be one of the most exciting congressional elections ever held.

Finally, after many months of litigation, the 1980 census mandated reapportionment been established. Congressional districts, as they are every ten years, have been adjusted to meet changing population patterns.

Our district for the past ten years (19th) has been represented by William Broomfield. But now the area has been tossed into a new configuration that stretches from Lansing to Pontiac.

The current incumbent in the new 6th district is Lansing Republican James Dunn. He is being challenged by the man he narrowly defeated two years ago, former Congressman Bob Carr.

The two, who are already campaigning feverishly may be challenged by a candidate or two from Oakland County. County Executive Dan Murphy is expected to decide this week whether he will contest Dunn in the

Republican primary. Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn has also shown interest.

But what makes this contest worth writing about is the political composition of the district. It is believed to be nearly 50 percent Democratic and 50 percent Republican. It is also believed to be a true test of President Ronald Reagan's popularity because Dunn has been a true blue Reagan supporter and Carr just the opposite.

Already the race for the 6th District seat has received nationwide attention. The "Dallas Morning News" calls it "Dogfight in Michigan" and says "few congressional races across the country can epitomize so well the national debate over President

budget cutting and defense increases.' For that reason, most of the national media will be focusing on the 6th District. And because of its national focus and competitiveness, the campaign coffers of Dunn,

Regan's economic policies of tax cutting,

Carr, and possibly Murphy, will be swelling. In 1980 when Dunn unseated Carr, both spent nearly \$300,000 on their campaigns. This year they anticipate spending even more.

And if Murphy does decide to enter the race one of the major reasons will be because Oakland VIP's feel, since Oakland County makes up the bulk of the 6th District's population, the congressman should come from here and not Ingham County, home of both Dunn and Carr.

So for the first time since Congressman Broomfield faced off against then Congressman Jack McDonald, after reapportionment in 1970, this area is in the midst of a real congressional battle. It should be interesting to watch.

I've been putting up posters for Words Against Weapons, the anti-nuclear arms benefit coming up Monday, June 7, at the Birmingham Unitarian Church at Lone Pine and Woodward (see page 5 of this issue).

It's an amazingly effective conversationstarter.

The thought of nuclear war is not a thought easily translated; it is a thought wrapped in fear, illusion, and a feeling of hopelessness.

But it is not really hopeless. There is work to be done. And people seem to want to do it. Even a simple act like putting up a poster helps alleviate the sense of hopeless frustration that goes along with the issue. I had the feeling people knew that however fleeting or temporary a thing like taping up w that poster was, it was something. And it mattered.


One man, a slender grey-suited man in his mid-thirties, held the poster for what seemed like a long time, all the while nodding at my explanations.

He looked up worriedly.

"A lot of my clients are pro-nuclear."

I swallowed before I spoke, feeling a sadness move through me at the thought that anyone could be "for" nuclear war.

'That's too bad," I murmured. Dumb as



they were, those words were as close as I could get to the truth of what I was feeling.

Then he said, "And I'm a Vietnam vet and kind of on the fence about this thing myself. I saw what went on over there." He kept looking at the poster. I looked past him out the arched window to the street beyond where afternoon sun was underlining everything, making the scene seem surreal. I was telling him lamely how I understood about business vs. controversy, et cetera, when he held up his hand and brightening said, that he could place the poster in an area, an entrance foyer, where people would see it but where its message wouldn't offend his clients.

I thanked him; for I truly was grateful to this person who had had his philosophies forged in the unholy fires of the Vietnam controversy. Grateful for his willingness to push his doubts back under, relinquishing the space to this, the nuclear arms issue, the issue that goes beyond even the dark trenches of Vietnam.

Most judgments of divorce contain a provision similar to the following: "The custodial parent shall not remove the domicile of the minor child of the parties from the State of Michigan without the prior authorization of this Court." This does not mean that the parent needs permission from the court to take the child on a brief out-ofstate vacation.

It does mean that the legal residence of the child cannot be moved outside the State of Michigan without the permission of the court. If you intend to move out of Michigan and you plan on taking the child, obtain permission from the court before leaving.

There are many considerations involved in making such a move, and they are generally much easier to resolve when you are still in the area. The court has a duty to attempt to maintain a relationship between the child and the non-custodial parent. Visitation rights must be defined and clarified. Obviously, weekend visitation may no longer be appropriate, and extended, less frequent visitation in the summer and over holidays should be considered. If the child is moving to California, who pays the cost of sending him back to Michigan for visitation? Should the parents share transportation costs? Should the non-custodial parent pay these costs to insure visitation? If so, should the amount of support to be paid be reduced to compensate for the transportation costs? These questions should be resolved before the move.

Once out of Michigan, the parent and the child are beyond the jurisdiction of the court. If this has occurred without the permission and against the wishes of the non-custodial parent, certain remedies are still available to the aggrieved party. He may petition the court to terminate support until the child is returned to Michigan or until acceptable visitation arrangements are made. He may also seek support credit for transportation expenses, or to lower the support amount.

In any event, the court is not likely to look with favor upon a custodial parent who has ignored the court order by leaving the state without permission, in extreme cases, the court has been persuaded to find the custodial parent in contempt; and issue a warrant for his or her arrest. The court may also issue a writ of habeas corpus for the child. Then, if the custodial parent and the child return to Michigan, the parent can be arrested and the child placed in protective custody until a hearing can be held.

If you are a custodial parent and plan on moving out of state, contact the Friend of the Court. The attorney to whom your case is assigned will advise you as to what actions are necessary before making such a move.

Cable Firm Opens Office

He Wants Clarkston to Take Notice

It's a far cry from New York's city lights or Hollywood's ritzy Rodeo Drive, two locations displayed prominently on posters hanging on his office wall, but for Gilbert Clark, Clarkston is where he wants to be.

Clark is chief operating officer of Multi-Cablevision, one of three firms vying for Independence Township's cable television franchise.

Unlike his two competitors, Omnicom and Concord, Clark has begun to familiarize himself with the community and vice versa. He has established an office in downtown Clarkston and is running paid advertisements in The Reminder, asking people to drop by and get acquainted.

All this despite the fact that not one public hearing has yet to be held on the subject of

Explains Clark, "We feel very confidently that we have the best proposal.. We want to make the public aware of that before the

The flagship of the proposal is Multi-Cablevision's claim to wire 100 percent of the township. Omnicom and Concord intend to wire 70-80 percent, leaving out some of Independence's more rural areas.

Another feature of Multi-Cablevision's proposal is their community/educational TV and radio studio they hope to locate at Clarkston High School. Fulltime program director Terri Surbrook, a graduate of Oakland University, is already on the job contact with community organizations and school faculty who might be utilizing the facility.

Multi-Cablevision's basic monthly charge would be \$5.95. Additional pay TV services, which are optional, could bring your cable bill to \$30 a month.

What's different from their competitors, said Clark is the addressable converter that Multi will install initially, and Omnicom and Concord promise later. The addressable converter will allow Multi subscribers to watch closed circuit events like the Holmes-Cooney or Hagler-Hearns fights.

If Multi-Cablevision has a weakness, it may be its track record, or lack of.

Concord is fairly well known, as it recently won the Oxford franchise. Omnicom, a subsidiary of Capital Cities, which also owns The Oakland Press, has systems in operation all over the U.S.

Multi-Cablevision was just formed to capture the Independence franchise. However, Clark claims the principals behind the company are old hands at operating cable TV.

Gilbert Clark Sr. built the first cable TV system in Michigan. That was in Petoskey.

His son has been in the business since 1966 as a technician, service manager, director of acquisition, program manager and part owner of a Manistee Cable company.

The third partner, Richard Leslie, has been involved with cable TV since 1964.



Both the Independence Township Fire Department and the Sheriff's Department were at the scene.



Homemaker and mother Jan Greenberg lives in Southfield with her husband Larry and two-year-old daughter Rachel. She enjoys cooking, housekeeping and taking care of her darling daughter.

Jill Gregory and Jan Jan Greenberg are the same person.

Jill or Jan explains, "When I first started writing I thought, how am I going to write these sex scenes? Everybody will know that I wrote them. So I told myself I would write with a pseudonym and if I get published lewonter tell anybody I wrote the book. Yet I knew if I was published I was going to tell everybody in the world. I just had to tell those lies to myself so that when it came time to write those scenes I wouldn't be inhibited.'

Apparently the idea was a winner because Jan Greenberg, er, ah Jill Gregory hit the big time with her very first book.

Ms. Gregory grew up in Chicago and earned her degree in English in 1974 at the University of Illinois. Frustrated in her attempts to find a teaching position after graduation, she worked as a secretary. A year later she quit to become a fulltime homemaker and parttime writer.
