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

# Sunshine Acres Seek Road Improvements

Residents of Sunshine Acres, a group of homes in the Mary Sue, Oak Park Road area, attended last week's Independence Township Board meeting to seek funding for road improvements.

They left with promises from board members to do all they could to support the project if and when the residents went through the necessary steps required by the Oakland County Road Commission.

The Road Commission, which has had two meetings with Sunshine and area residents is preparing actually two projects in the area - one for the Sunshine area at a preliminary estimated cost of \$317,000 and the other for Pine Knob Trail, estimated to cost \$120,000.

Once the proposals are completed they will be presented to the residents. Fiftyone percent of the residents within the proposal's boundaries must sign a petition allowing the County to place a special assessment against their properties to finance the proposals.

The amount of the assessment depends upon whether the township participates in

the funding procedure.

'It is general practice for the township to participate in 25 percent of the work," noted Supervisor James Smith. "That assumes of course there is availability of funds."

Residents voiced concern about the availability of revenue sharing funds and traffic created by the American Legion Hall at the south end of Mary Sue.

Earlier in the year the Township committed \$30,000 of federal community development funds to road improvement, after residents of Pine Knob Trail attended a public hearing, held to earmark federal

revenue sharing funds.

Sunshine Acres residents were dismayed to learn Pine Knob Trail had \$30,000 already in their "kitty"

But township board members claimed that was not the case.

'I do not remember this Board saying that when you get the signatures (Pine Knob Trail) we will pay 25 percent. The money went into the road improvement fund. Given that fact,

there are considerable stretches of road that need paving..." said trustee Dale Stuart. The American Legion traffic has been a problem, claim residents, for a long time.

They asked the township to either put a stop to it or find another access to the hall.

Smith said that would be impossible, however. And he added, "It (Mary Sue) is a country road and we have no jurisdiction in blocking traffic down the road."

Treasurer Fred Ritter told residents to follow the guidelines set up by the Road Commission. That is the best way to get the road paved he said.

And Stuart applauded the residents in attendance. "This is the kind of iniative we need to encourage. It seems to me we should be able to come up with something to help."

# Track Promises Sound Report July 6

Representatives of Waterford Hills Road Racing will present results of their sound study to the Independence Township Board at its regular July 6 meeting.

Waterford Hills, after pressure from the township board, commissioned a private Ann Arbor consultant to take decibel

readings on May 8-9.

At first the racing officials had decided not to share the results with the township. But after the Board threatened to shut the track down (its license expires July 4) Waterford Hills reversed their decision.

In fact Waterford Hills President James McIntosh had planned to present the results at last week's meeting, but was unable to obtain them from the consultant.

Township Supervisor James Smith explained, "He (McIntosh) was suppose to be here with the report at 2 p.m. today (last Tuesday), but Professor Barnett (the private consultant) was unavailable. McIntosh was very apologetic and said he would have it here well before the next meeting.

Homeowners near the race track have long complained of the noise and safety hazards emanating from the track. They have attended several township meetings in an effort to force the track to reduce noise levels and be more safety conscious.

# School Board Levies 31.29 Mills

True to their word, Dr. Stephen Werner and Ferdnando Sanchez, introduced a motion to set the Clarkston Schools millage rate at 31.2921 at last week's School Board meeting. They were joined by Vince Luzi and Addison Hubbard in passing the motion 4-2.

School administrators were seeking a higher figure, specifically 31.5225, which would result in a small tax increase over last

But at a public hearing held a week earlier, first Sanchez, and then Werner, spoke in opposition to increasing the rate.

"I feel keeping the same rate is appropriate in these times," said Dr. Werner. "And 31.291 mills would give the taxpayer an identical rate of what he paid in 1981.

Board Secretary Mary Jane Chaustowich disagreed. "I'm in sympathy with your sentiments, but I don't think we can afford not to levy the full amount."

She was supported by administrators and

several members of the audience.

Assistant Superintendent William Neff said curriculum and building maintenance needs were tantamount. According to his figures the school district needs to buy \$196,000 worth of textbooks and other educational materials. In addition building maintenance costs are staggering. Nearly \$319,000 is needed just to repair roofs.

"I question how the community can turn its back and not collect all or most of the voter authorized millage," said Neff.

Clarkston Education Association President Al Bartlett pled before the vote, "We strongly urge the Board of Education to adopt 31.5225 mills tonight. To do less is going to create more of a problem for our educational system."

But the Board majority felt differently, and with the exception of Chaustowich, Board President Janet Thomas and Carolyn Place, who was absent, voted to levy 31.291 mills.

Holly School District residents are encouraged to apriticipate in the selection of a new superintendent for the district.



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
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




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
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
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#### Clarkston Can Be Proud of Its Accomplishments



I was being given a second chance.


This time, I bought a pound.

and flatter., He got it not a moment too soon.





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
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# Victims Tell What Tornado Was Like

The tornado that briefly touched down in the Clintonville, Mann Road areas last week caused a gas main break, knocked down several power lines and sent trees and large branches sprawling all over houses, streets and cars.

Until clean-up operations prevailed, Clintonville Road was blocked off at two points.

incredibly however, no one was reported injured. Nor were homes destroyed. The tornado that began at 5:40 p.m. Tuesday afternoon and ended five minutes later brought fear to many residents of the area, but the amount of destruction it brought was minimal.

The Reminder talked to several of the people in the area of the tornado, to get their reaction to what happened. Here's what some of them had to say:

Lee Howard of 2933 Mann Road lost a corner of his porch and part of his fence in the storm. "My fence was torn down and one

corner of my porch was taken off and several trees were blown down across my driveway so I couldn't get in or out," said Howard.

He added, "I had to cut the trees up, and clear them away. The windows I was going to put in the porch were all broken, I think that some of my fence and porch ended up over there in that barn."

Delbert Wilson of 2640 Newberry saw his barn destroyed. "I thought my pony was dead because the barn had a tree straight through the building destroying it. It looked like Iran around here. Trees everywhere,' recalled Wilson.

"I started pulling boards out of the way. I had a loft with loose hay and it was all down, so I started looking through the boards and hay. I finally got to the pony and I could

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swear she was dead. But when I reached out and touched her leg, she kicked. She was uninjured with the exception of a few scratches from nails," said Wilson.

Carol Wilson recalls what it was like before the tornado touched ground. "I have never been afraid of storms, but this one was really severe. It got really white and you could see the windows moving. There were leaves coming from everywhere hitting the doors and windows. All you could hear was

Persons doing their shopping at the Clintonville Market also had a ringside seat for the tornado. Although it was in the heart of the storm, the market was not damaged with the exception of debris on the roof and overturned food shelves inside.

"It was really weird," said Carol Seffar, who works at the market her parents own. "All of a sudden we looked outside and it was white. You couldn't even see the cars that were parked right in front of the door. We tried to push our front door closed, but the wind was so strong it was impossible.

And then it went away.' There was no time to react. You look out and it's all white and the next minute or so and it's over," described Al Nay of 2881

Mann.

Isa Irby of 2605 Mann Road was petrified. "I heard a big crack from limbs coming off the tree. I was so frightened. I heard another crash and ran to the front door and saw another limb in another tree down. The front yard was completely covered with water just like a lake and it was running on my patio and I thought it was coming in the door.'


"There was nothing I could do. The people on either side of me were not home. I didn't know what to expect next.'

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

# Victims Question Worth of Tornado Sirens

Residents that experienced the tornado that touched down briefly near the Clintonville and Mann Road intersection expressed concern with the fact that Oakland County's tornado siren system did not activate until ten minutes after the tornado had left the

Carol Wilson was one of those bewildered residents. "It had been at least ten minutes before the siren went off at 5:50. Everything

was all done."

"The last time they were right on the ball. We were alerted before the tornado went over the Pontiac-Oakland Airport. This time they had no idea anything had even happened out here. When I called the dispatcher even asked if we were sure what it was:"

Al Nay said he was already outside clearing with a chainsaw when he heard the siren and Carol Seffar and others shopping in the Clintonville Market almost panicked because they did not want to experience a repeat of what had just happened.

According to Paul Pheips, division manager of Oakland County Disaster Control, the only way the tornado sirens can be touched off is by a confirmed tornado sighting by a qualified person, or by receiving word from the National Weather and Oceanic Bureau in Romulus that they have confirmed a sighting on radar.

In this instance, two Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies saw the tornado, called their dispatcher, who in turn called Disaster Control. The National Weather Bureau was unable to confirm the sighting on their radar, but instructed the sirens to be sounded at 5:50, over ten minutes after the tornado had touched down.

A spokesperson for the Oakland County Sheriff's Department said the 123 Oakland




The VanDruska home on Mann Road received damage to the roof and TV antenna.

County sirens are activated only when a tornado is sighted. Their main concern is to warn people in the immediate vicinity to take cover. There is always the possibility of more than one tornado touching in an area.

The National Weather Bureau had issued a tornado watch at 1:35 that day. It was to continue until 8 p.m. A tornado watch means the weather conditions are favorable for tor-

Another surprise feature of the tornado was the direction in which it came from. According to the National Weather Bureau, the normal direction of a tornado is southwest to northeast. Residents in the Mann Road area say their storm came out of the northwest and was heading southeast. All the trees in the area that were toppled were also found to be laying in the northwest to southeast direc-















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
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

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### ORDINANCE NO. 45-A **Township of Springfield**

PREAMBLE: An ordinance for the purpose of licensing and regulating mechanical amusement devices as herein defined for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Township of Springfield. THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD ORDAINS:

ARTICLE I: General Provisions
1.1 Short Title. This ordinance shall be known as the Springfield Township Mechanical Amusement Device ordinance.

1.2 Requirements. It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, maintain, control or operate within the Township of Springfield three (3) or more pool tables, mechanical amusement devices or combination thereof at an establishment without first having procured a license as provided for in this ordinance.

ARTICLE II: Definitions 2.1 "Mechanical Amusement Device" is hereby defined as any machine, apparatus or contrivance which is, or may be used or operated as a game or contest of skill or amusement, by a person initiating, employing, or directing any force generated by the device. This definition specifically includes, but is not limited to, any machine, apparatus or contrivance which requires the insertion of a coin, token or slug to be operated or used.

"Person" shall mean any natural person, firm, association, partnership or corporation, or any other legal entity.

"Pool table" shall mean any table the primary purpose of which is the playing of

2.4 "Establishment" as used in this ordinance shall mean any premises, lot, parcel, building, structure or room, under the separate ownership, possession or control of any person, in or upon which pool tables or mechanical amusement devices are located or proposed to be located.

ARTICLE III: Application
3.1 Application Content. Application for a license to establish, maintain, control or operate pool tables or mechanical amusement devices shall be made to the Township Clerk on a form as determined by the Township Board, which form shall contain the

(a) Name and address of applicant. If applicant is other than a natural person, then the nature of the entity and the names and address of all those having an ownership interest in the entity.

(b) The nature of the applicant's ownership or possessory interest in the establishment including the attachment of copies of any written deeds, contracts, leases or other contracts or agreements evidencing same.

(c) Address of the establishment where the activity will be maintained.

(d) Name of pool tables or mechanical amusement devices to be operated at the establishment.

(e) Age of applicant or applicants.

(f) Whether applicant, or if applicant is other than a natural person, if any of those having an ownership interest in the entity, have ever been convicted of any crime.

3.2 Insurance Requirement. The applicant shall maintain insurance providing to the public general comprehensive liability insurance in the amount of at least \$500,000 per person and \$1,000,000 per occurrence, and shall provide certificates of proof of insurance to the Township Clerk prior to the issuance of the license. The applicant shall notify the Township upon discontinuance or alteration of this insurance coverage for

ARTICLE IV: Approval Procedurés

4.1 Submission to Township Board. The Township Clerk, upon receiving a completed application including all required information and documents shall submit the same at the next regular meeting of the Township Board and advise the applicant of the day and time of the meeting and that applicant should appear at the meeting personally, or through an authorized agent or representative.

Township Board Review and Decision. The Township Board shall review and consider each application according to the standards and criteria set forth in Section 4.2(1) of this Ordinance, and at the conclusion of said review, may approve, approve with conditions, deny or table consideration of, the issuance of the license in accordance with the procedures set forth hereafter.

(1) Standards and Criteria. The Township Board shall approve issuance of a license on affirmative findings that the following factors and criteria have been met by each

بن plication. (a) That the applicant has or is able to meet all the requirements for licensure as set forth in this ordinance, other applicable Township ordinances, and applicable State

(b) That the proposed physical location of the mechanical amusement devices or pool tables will not impede the safe and orderly passage of persons to, from and within the establishment.

(c) That the establishment, as proposed, will not interfere with the normal and regular operation of existing uses in the immediate proximity of the establishment, specifically including schools.

(d) That the hours or proposed hours of operation of the establishment are not

likely to create a nulsance or disturbance of the peace to existing uses and residents.

(e) That the number and layout of parking spaces and traffic control devices provided or proposed are sufficient to insure the safe and orderly ingress, egress and parking of vehicular traffic as related to probable increases in the volume of said traf-

(f) That sufficient adult supervision and control at the establishment and over the mechanical amusement devices and pool tables will be provided.

(g) That adequate provision is made for the safe and orderly parking and movement of bicycles at the establishment so as not to interfere with pedestrian and notor vehicle traffic, specifically including the provision for bicycle racks where ap-

(h) That licensing of the establishment will not interfere with the protection of the health, safety and general welfare of the residents of the Township.

(2) Approvals and Conditional Approvals. The Township Board may approve an application or approve an application subject to conditions related to the criteria and standards set forth in Section 4.2(1), which shall be specifically stated upon the record. Upon such an approval or conditional approval, the Township Clerk shall be directed to issue a license in accordance with Section 4.3.

(3) Denials. If the Township Board denies an application for a license, the denial shall be based upon the criteria and standards contained in Section 4.2(1) which shall be specifically stated upon the record, with written notice of the denial and reasons to be

furnished the applicant by first class mail, postage prepaid. (4) Delayed Decisions. If the Township Board finds insufficent information has been presented to allow a review and consideration of the application under the criteria and standards contained in Section 4.2(1), decision on the application may be tabled or delayed until the next regularly scheduled Township Board meeting, with the applicant furnished written notice of the day and time of said meeting and the criteria or standards upon which more information is required.

4,3 Issuance and Term of License.

(1) Upon approval or conditional approval of an application of license under Section 4.2, the Township Clerk shall prepare a license to be issued which shall include the name, address and place of business of the licensee, the number of pool tables and/or mechanical amusement devices to be maintained at the establishment, any conditions or restrictions imposed upon the issuance of the license by the Township Board, the expiration date of the license and a place for the licensee's signature under oath acknowledging that he/she has read, understands and agrees to conduct his/her

business in compliance with the license and any conditions or restrictions indicated

(2) Upon payment of the established license fee and acknowledgement under oath by the licensee of understanding and intention to comply with the license and any conditions or restrictions imposed upon its issuance, the Township Clerk shall issue the license by affixing his or her signature together with the date of issuance upon the license.

(3) The license granted under this ordinance shall be valid for a period of one (1) year

from the date of Township Board approval.
4.4 Renewal Applications. Any license issued in accordance with this Ordinance may be renewed on the same terms and conditions and subject to the same requirements provided by the Township Board herein for the original license. If the licensee desires to affect a change in the place of establishment, a new application shall be made by the licensee containing the place of new location.

4.5 Non-transferability of License. No license issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be assignable, transferable nor shall any person, excepting the person to which the license was issued, be permitted to do business thereunder, either directly or in-

directly. 4.6 Revocation of License. Every license may be revoked for violation of any of the prohibitions under this ordinance. If the Township Board or a person authorized by the Township Board shall determine that the violation of the ordinance has occurred, notice of such violation shall be sent to the licensee, by first class mail at the address specified in the application. This notice shall set a date at which the licensee shall be required to answer to the alleged violation. The hearing on the alleged violation shall occur not later than ten (10) days after the mailing of the violation. The hearing shall be at any regular or special meeting of the Township Board. Following the hearing, if the Board shall determine that a violation of this ordinance has occurred, they shall be authorized to revoke or suspend any license issued under this ordinance.

**ARTICLE V: Inspections** 5.1 The establishment of any licensee shall be subject to periodic inspections by the Township Board or its authorized agent for the purpose of determining whether its operation is in compliance with this and other Township ordinance provisions.

**ARTICLE VI: Prohibition and Restrictions** 6.1 Prohibited Acts. It shall be unlawful:

(a) To gamble, or to sell or use any intoxicating beverages at any establishment in which there are maintained pool tables or mechanical amusement devices, except that intoxicating beverages may be allowed at establishments holding a Class C liquor license issued by the State of Michigan.

(b) To establish, maintain, control or operate any mechanical amusement device, which contains, or is so constructed that it may be converted to contain, any automatic or semi-automatic payoff device for the return or discharge of coins, tokens, slugs, merchandise, checks or other legal tender to operators therof.

(c) To permit any person under the age of seventeen years to remain in or loiter in or about any establishment maintaining pool tables unless said person is accompanied by a parent or guardian. No person under the age of seventeen years unaccompanied by a parent or guardian may remain in or loiter in or about such establishment or falsely represent his or her age in order to gain admittance into such establishment.

(d) For a licensee under this ordinance to operate pool tables and/or mechanical amusement devices or any combination thereof so as to constitute a public nuisance.

(e) For a licensee under this ordinance to allow any establishment, licensed under this ordinance, to become overcrowded so as to constitute a hazard to the health, safety or occupants therein.

(f) For a licensee under this ordinance to allow, suffer or permit any disorderly conduct as defined in the Springfield Township Ordinance #29, to occur at the

establishment. 6.2 Hours of Operation

(a) In the case of an establishment holding a Class C liquor license issued by the State of Michigan, the hours of operation shall be those allowed by said liquor license and State law.

(b) In cases where the Township Board, in approving the issuance of a license, has imposed conditions or restrictions upon the hours of operation, the licensee shall comply with those conditions or restrictions.

6.3 Zoning. It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, maintain, control or operate a pool table or mechanical device except in a C-1 Local Business District as provided in the Springfield Township Zoning Ordinance.

6.4. Posting of License. The licensee shall be required to post the license in a prominent place at the establishment for which the license was procured.

**ARTICLE VII: Exemption** 7.1 This ordinance shall not apply to the operation of any pool table or mechanical amusement device in a private home, public institution, church or club house of any legally incorporated association the use of which is confined to the members only of such association, and the use of which is incidental to the principal activities of said

**ARTICLE VIII: Penalties** 

**ARTICLE IX: Fees** 

8.1 Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500.00, plus the costs of prosecution or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not to exceed 90 days or both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the

9.1 The Township Board shall establish fees to be paid pre-requisite to the issuance of a license, as provided in the Springfield Township Fee Ordinance No. 40. **ARTICLE X: Separate Offense** 

10.1 Each day of operation in violation of this ordinance shall be deemed as a ARTICLE XI: Repealer

11.1 All ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**ARTICLE XII: Severability** 12.1 In any section, sentence, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be declared to be inconsistent with the Constitution and/or the laws of the State of Michigan and so held void by any court of competent jurisdiction, said section, sentence, clause or provisions so declared to be unconstitutional and void shall thereby ceaser to be a part of this ordinance, but the remainder of this ordinance shall stand and be in full force and effect. **ARTICLE XIII: Section Headings** 

13.1 The section headings used in this ordinance are for convenience only and are not part of this ordinance.

#### **AMENDMENTS TO** SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP'S **ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 26**

Purpose: Provisions for acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes and approaches.

ADD a new Section 14.12 reading as follows:

14.12 Acceleration, Deceleration, Passing Lanes and Approaches

(1) Definitions

(a) For purposes of this ordinances, acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes or approaches are considered necessary to insure the safe movement of traffic and are, therefore, considered to be improvements for purposes of the performance guarantee requirements of this ordinance found in Section 16.09.

(b) Acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes or approaches are defined as those areas on either side or in front of a driveway of a use or proposes use providing access to and from a paved or gravel roadway which shall be designed and constructed as determined by the Township Engineers and set forth in Springfield Township Design and Construction Standards adopted by resolution of the Township Board and copies of which are available at the Township Offices, so as to provide for the safe movement of traffic to, from and past the use or proposed use.

(2) Requirement

All uses or proposed uses which are subject to the site plan review requirements of this ordinance as set forth in Section 16.07 (1) which have driveways providing access to and from paved or gravel roadways shall be required to provide acceleration, deceleration, and passing lanes or approaches prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy except where this requirement is waived by the Township Board as set forth below.
(3) Waiver

The requirement for acceleration, deceleration, and passing lanes or approaches required by this Section may be waived by the Township Board if the average daily traffic volume upon the roadway to which the use or proposed use has access, as deterrs ner day and/or the applicant mined by the Township Engineers is verifies conditions or factors found in Article 17, Section 17.02 (3). AMEND Section 16.07 (2) (b) to read as follows:

(b) There is a proper relationship between major thoroughfares and proposed service drives, driveways and parking areas and provision has been made for acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes or approaches so as to encourage the safety and convenience of pedestrians and vehicular traffic.

AMEND Section 16.07 (2) (f) to read as follows:

(f) It meets the minimum requirements and standards for grading and surface drainage for the design and construction of storm sewers, storm water holding facilities, watermains, sanitary sewers and acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes or approaches as determined by the Township Engineers and set forth in Springfield Township Design and Construction Standards adopted by resolution of the Township Board and copies of which are available at the Township Offices.

ADD a new Section 16.07 (3) (24) to read as follows:

(24) Acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes or approaches as required by Section 14.12 of this ordinance.

These amendments shall be effective immediately.




#### Carr Announces Candidacy


MONDAY, JULY 5


# **Sidewalk Sales** and Concerts

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
# Sesqui-Centennial Calendar




# Western Band Concert & Barbeque

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
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
