

### Meet Clarkston's Newest Millionaire

Clarkston's million dollar lottery winner doesn't expect to change her life much. She'll continue to seek the company of her seven great-grandchildren, occasionally embers on a trip to Europe or California, and buy two lottery tickets every week at Food Town or Krogers.

That's how it was for Margaret Bernard, a widowed seventy-five year old grandmother from Clarkston before she hit the \$1,000,000 jackpot at the Michigan State Lottery Drawing in Saginaw Thursday night.

"I might accumulate some money and give some away," explained Mrs. Bernard.

Mrs. Bernard will not get a million dollars in one lump sum. Rather, she will receive \$1000 a week until she dies. The difference will then go to her heirs, minus the \$200,000 or so the IRS will get.

Mrs. Bernard, who has won several small jackpots, but nothing over \$100, took ten four-leaf clovers that she had picked in her backyard and a novelty license plate entitled "God made the Irish" to the Saginaw drawing.

Upon learning that she had won, Mrs. Bernard was skeptical. "I thought they must be wrong. It must be a mistake. I couldn't even conceive how much a million dollars is."

She added, "I would have been perfectly content to win \$10,000 or \$25,000. It wouldn't have made any difference to me. It's all free gratis. Actually the taxpayers are the ones that bought the ticket. I should thank them."

Mrs. Bernard, originally from Detroit, was married 35 years to a family doctor. After practicing several years in Detroit, Mrs. Bernard remembers a yearning to go north.

"We stopped in Traverse City and a young man told us Kalkaska needed a doctor. We went over and oh, was it a town! It didn't have any street numbers or names. You couldn't shop or do anything," recalled Mrs. Bernard.

But the Bernards grew to like Kalkaska and settled there for several years.

Mrs. Bernard is a frequent traveler having been to Hawaii four times, and to London and Austria twice. Her favorite places are Austria and Switzerland, where she enjoys the breathtaking scenery.

One of the first things Mrs. Bernard expec-



ts to do is write some of her friends. She's been the subject of a little good natured kidding, because of her weekly lottery expenditures.

"I'm going to write to them and tell them I won a million dollars. They are going to be floored."

She added, "SomeBody has got to win. I would suggest to my friends that don't believe in it to go for it.

"Besides I figure I'm entitled to it. I don't go to shows. I don't go to dinner very much. So what the dickens?" appliances & television

Earlier this year Oakland Schools conducted a telephone survey throughout Oakland County in an effort to find out what people thought about their public schools. The compiled data was released to local school districts earlier this month, with some noteable surprises.

Here's a portion of the survey:

Respondents were asked to grade their schools with an A, B, C, D, OR E in the same manner as students' work is graded. Forty-five percent of those surveyed gave their schools an A or B. This is higher than the 36% given schools in the 1981 nationwide Gallup poll and the 42% in the statewide Project Outreach poll in December 1981.

When asked what they like about their community's public schools, good teachers (13%) and curriculum (13%) were most frequently mentioned. Special services (10%), good school facilities and resources (8%) and sports and athletics (6%) were also frequently mentioned.

When asked to name what they did not like about their public schools, "some teachers" (10%) was the response most often given by respondents. Second was school's poor discipline (9%) and weakness in curriculum (9%) and finances (8%).

Finances are seen as the biggest problem facing schools in Michigan. In the statewide Project Outreach survey conducted in December 1981, 34% of problems mentioned facing boards of education were related finances and millage. In Oakland schools, 35% of the responses referenced finances and millage as the greatest problems facing local boards of education.

In Oakland County, the second most frequently named problem was closing schools (9%), followed by teacher negotiations and strikes (8%). In twenty-three percent of the responses, the person called indicated he or she could not name a major problem.

Public schools have enough money in the opinion of 52% of the residents surveyed in the Oakland Intermediate school district. Thirty-six percent of the respondents said the schools did not have enough.

Thirty-one percent of those surveyed said the schools do a good job of spending their money. Thirty-one percent also said they did only a fair job of spending money and seventeen percent said they did a poor job.

Survey respondents were read a list of ways to save money and were asked if they favored or opposed these measures.

Ideas which were met with favor by the majority of respondents were reducing the number of administrators (80%), sending students in small advanced classes to a neighboring high school for these courses (69%), combining with a neighboring high school for low enrollment vocational classes (75%) and having students pay for drivers' education classes (79%).

Fifty-one percent of the respondents said

they would oppose reducing the number and kinds of courses offered while 41 percent would favor this.

61 percent would favor reducing transportation costs by increasing the walking distance. 36 percent would favor a regional school bus service and 44 percent would oppose it 45 percent of those questioned said they would favor parents paying for bus transportation. 50 percent would oppose this idea.

Cost saving ideas that were opposed by the majority of the respondents were reducing teaching materials (697), reducing athletic programs (61%), reducing music programs (58%), reducing custodial services (69%), reducing counseling services (71%), reducing the number of teachers by increasing class size (63%), reducing reading services (80%), discontinuing the hot lunch program and contracting with a neighboring district for this service (56%).

Presently, township taxes for schools and other local purposes are levied in December and collected after school has started in September. If the local unit of government approves, the law allows for a change--to a summer tax collection. This would save the school district a good deal of interest it must pay to borrow money to begin the school year. Would you favor or oppose changing the collection of all school taxes from December to mid-summer?

Frankly, I was quite surprised by the degree of support our public schools seem to have. Mind you, this was not a weighted survey. 65.1 percent of the respondents did not have any children attending public school.

Yet time and again the answers indicated strong support for our public school systems. And that in a time when they are financially floundering is good news.



### FRIEND OF THE COURT

A Judgement of Divorce can always be modified as to the matters of child support, visitation, and custody. Before any modification can be ordered by the Court, there must be some significant change in the circumstances of the parties and/or the minor children.

The most frequent area in which change is sought is that of child support. As one or both of the parties have changes in earnings, or the needs of the children change, it may be appropriate to modify the court order to

increase or reduce the support.

A change in the support order can be accomplished in several ways. The Judge has the authority to alter the order on his own initiative if facts come to light which indicate the ordered amount is inequitable. Generally, however, the modification is sought by the filling of a motion with the Court which requests specific changes. When such a motion is filed, a hearing will be scheduled and the Court will hear the evidence presented by both sides. The Judge will then determine if the circumstances warrant a revision in the previously ordered amount. If so, the Court will direct that the support be increased or decreased, and a

written order will be entered setting out the changes. An increase in support can only be retroactive to the date the written modification motion is filed with the Court. A downward revision can be retroactive to whatever date the Court feels is appropriate under the evidence presented.

The party who seeks revision of the judgment has the burden to show that there has been a "change in circumstances" sufficient to justify the modification. If the moving party does not show this, he has failed to meet his "burden of proof" and his motion will be denied.

In some instances parties are able to discuss the matter of child support between themselves and agree to change the amount. This change is not legally binding or enforceable, however, until it is put in the form of a written order, signed by the Judge, and filed with the Court. If agreement is reached, the parties can contact the Friend of the Court attorney assigned to their case. The attorney will then prepare a written Consent Order. After the parties sign this order it will be entered with the Court. This procedure involves much less conflict and is also much less costly and time consuming than going through the procedure of filing a motion with the Court.

If you have questions regarding modification of support in your case, make an appointment with the Friend of the Court attorney who handles your file. The attorney can not change your order; this is solely within the power of the Judge. However, the attorney can review your particular situation and give you some guidance as to what may be done to resolve your concerns.

Similar procedures are involved in modifying custody and visitation arrangements. Details of these modification procedures will be discussed in later articles

### SCAMP Scores High Marks with Schools, Kids

For a short five weeks each summer, nearly 200 youngsters congregate at Sashabaw Junior High to participate in Clarkston's Summer Camp (SCAMP).

SCAMP, the only camp of its kind in this area, caters to youngsters with handicaps or special needs. In addition it offers a preschool for all kids.

According to Assistant Director Greg Seaman, who has been with the program since its inception seven years ago, SCAMP's approach is to mix the kids homogenously according to disability. The student-teacher ratio is 1-3, compared to normal public school ratios of 1-30.

"Academically we really want to work on maintaining skills," said Seaman in explaining SCAMP's educational philosophy. 'And we have been very very successful at doing just that."

Seaman said a youngster that doesn't attend SCAMP can lose 3-4 months worth of the skills he learned the previous year. That doesn't happen with SCAMP'ers.

SCAMP isn't totally a classroom experience. Not by a long shot.

Consider the schedule for a two-week period this year. On July 12, SCAMPers were treated to a picnic courtesy of the Clarkston Rotary. That night, some of the SCAMPers, made it an overnight affair, camping out at Independence-Oaks.

Three days later it was "truck day" with SCAMPers getting a chance to observe the

finer aspects of the large rigs. That same day financial sponsors of SCAMP were invited in to observe the program.

July 19, a hot air balloon visited the school, as SCAMPers oogled its size and color. Two days later Detroit Tiger Kirk Gibson made a return trip to SCAMP to sign autographs and talk with the youngsters. The same day another group of SCAMPers headed to the 300 Bowl, to try their luck at that sport.

Just a typical week at SCAMP, where swimming, camping, music, art and field

trips are as much a part of the curriculum as normal classroom courses.

SCAMP is funded through tuition and donations. It cost a Clarkston youngster \$100 (\$110 non-resident) to attend SCAMP. The bulk of the \$55,000 annual budget is earned from donations and fundraisers.

The financial arm of SCAMP is called the SCAMP Funding Corporation, and is made up of interested citizens and businessmen. A softball tournament, bottle drive and beer tent are a few of the fundraisers that earn money for SCAMP.





zoned C-3. Garner is requesting a change to multiple. Both the Planning Commission (6-1) and Oakland County have approved the change.

But the Springfield Township Board has the final say and they weren't about to let the rezoning pass without the consent judgment in hand.

Supervisor Collin Walls also questioned the need to build a 10,000 square foot medical clinic in the complex.

"That facility will be competing with a facility already in the township. I would hate to see both of you buck your heads and neither of you make it."

Garner countered, "This facility (senior citizen complex) will accommodate up to 462 people, thus we have to have a lot of services."

Garner said he should know within 90 days whether his project will get off the ground. Currently, a Chicago firm is conducting a feasibility study to see whether the area needs Garner's proposed project.

In other action the Board tabled approval of an application to operate a video arcade until they receive a more detailed floor plan from applicants Larry and Joann O'Dell.

The O'Dells plan to operate their 15-20 machine arcade in the Larron Cabinets building at Dixie Highway and Bridge Lake Roads.

Joe Gorka, who made a name for himself as a spokesperson for Shindler Road homeowners during the toxic waste controversy two years ago was appointed to the township planning commission. Reappointed was Zona Sommers.

The township board also approved the rezoning of property near I-75 and Holly Road from R-1 to C-3, to accommodate a proposed supper club. The rezoning, which had been approved by the planning commission and Oakland County, passed 3-1, with trustee William Whitley the lone dissenter.







## Ballenger Walks the State in Search of Votes

Betcha can't tell me who William Ballenger is?

The former Lansing legislator is walking from the very southern tip of Michigan to its very northern point in an effort to gain publicity and support for his bid to capture the Republican nomination for U.S. Senator.

Whether the walk will have been a success or not, will be decided at the polls August 10th, when voters will choose between Congressman Phillip Ruppe, Robert Huber, Deane Baker or Ballenger, as the person best fit to challenge Senator Donald Riegle in November.

Ballenger thinks the walk is working. Other than Ruppe's battles to stay on the ballot, the Ballenger walking effort has gained more publicity than anything else in this somewhat lackadaisical senatorial race.

It's lackadaisical (Ballenger likes to use the word "somnolent"), said Ballenger, because most everyone's attention is focused on the gubernatorial race.

For the first time in twelve years, Michigan will have a new governor and the media is focusing its cameras often upon those Democratic and Republican candidates.

Thus, Ballenger expects only about 500,000 people total will be voting for a

Republican senate hopeful.

Besides being offbeat, the walk has enabled Ballenger to talk issues.

"The walk has focused the news media on me. That enables me to start talking about issues," claimed Ballenger.

The issue he most likes to talk about is opponent Ruppe, and how he messed up a simple campaign requirement.

Ballenger doesn't think it's fair that Secretary of State Richard Austin could intervene to put Ruppe back on the ballot after the State Board of Canvassers ruled irregularities found in Ruppe's required campaign documents were sufficient enough to disallow his candidacy.

"I think it's difficult to believe that someone who is running a campaign at such a high level, could make such a mistake," said Ballenger.

If he were senator, Ballenger said he would attempt to decrease the federal deficit by taxing OPEC oil and repealing the safe harbor provision.

"I would slap a \$5-\$10 fee on OPEC oil," said Ballenger. "It would not increase the price at the pump but would cut the U.S. deficit in half."

He added the safe harbor leasing provision, which is a tax loophole for large



corporations, costs the treasury \$8-\$10 billion a year.

"If you do those two things you could save as much as \$60 billion a year," Ballenger explained

Although a strong supporter of President Ronald Reagan's economic program and most other policies, Ballenger thinks our foreign policy could be improved.

"We have had a somewhat muddled, ambivalent foreign policy," said Ballenger. "I believe the appointment of George Schultz will make a big difference. He's an economist and it is about time we had someone like that in that job."



## Schools Scheduled for Roof Repair

Clarkston Elementary and Clarkston High School will undergo roof repairs this summer at a price of \$40,152.

William Dennis, an administrator in charge of building maintenance, recommended at their regular board meeting last week, that the School Board accept the low bid of \$40,152 from the G.M. Newton Co.

After some discussion, the Board voted unanimously to accept the bid.

Dennis warned the Board that he would be back, probably next month, to ask for help in repairing the Clarkston Junior High roof.

He listed several priorities including an effort to salvage rotted beams, adding eight additional sump pumps, removing leaking skylights, and taking off a portion of the double roof that exists over the gymnasium.

"We are going to take care of as many of these priorities as we can," said Dennis.

### ABE Receives \$29,000 Federal Grant

Dennis Jacobs, Director of Adult Basic Education (A.B.E.) for Clarkston, Holly and Brandon school districts, was on hand at last week's July school board meeting to report the progress of his program.

A.B.E. offers educational opportunities for persons who never attained the 8th grade level in school. Basic education classes are taught in Clarkston, Holly and at Camp Gelman, a state correctional facility on White Lake Road.


In addition SOLEC, a program for the men-

tally impaired is taught at several foster homes. Nursing homes are also recipients of A.B.E. classes.



### Fife's Drive, Experience Will Make CHS A Winner

He was born in Illinois and in 1957, at the age of eight, his parents moved to a small suburban city in Michigan whose population was about 800. That city was Clarkston.

In 1967, he graduated from Clarkston High School (CHS), and took with him a reputation that would follow him forever. He was a star

baseball and basketball player at CHS, and after the summer of '67 he left Clarkston to continue his career in Ann Arbor at the University of Michigan (U of M).

Four years later, after graduating from U of M, he was drafted by the Detroit Tigers Major League Baseball Club.

In 1973, the Tigers dealt Clarkston's hometown hero to the Minnesota Twins. At Minnesota he was finally given an opportunity to pitch in the majors.

However, arm problems throughout the '73 season sidelined him and his major league career for good. Nevertheless, youth and adults all from Clarkston raved to both friends and relatives that they finally had a phenomenal athlete from their hometown

who broke into the big leagues.

In 1975, he accepted a coaching position at the U of M under former Wolverine

Basketball Coach Johnny Orr. However, by 1978 He had returned to Clarkston to manage Spring Lake Country Club.

In 1980, He helped the U of M recruit Tim McCormick for their basketball program. McCormick, a concensus All-American in '80, shattered his old basketball scoring record by contributing over 700 points in his three year stint on the Wolves Varsity Team.

As 1981 rolled around, he found himself as Head Basketball Coach at Sashabaw Junior High School. His record was 15-2, the best-that Sashabaw has ever had.

Following the Wolves '81-82 basketball campaign, he became the team's new coach succeeding Gary Nustad.

His name is Dan Fife.

"In the 1964-65 season, when Fife was a freshman," states CHS Principal Dom Mauti, "he played for me for three games and then moved up to the varsity level."

"He was strictly a guard back then, but he progressed to the point where he could play the center and forward positions as well. He wasn't that big, but he had the moves and ability to drive the lane and score."

Mauti continues, "Fife's a very competitive person, and I feel that he'll do an excellent job as our new coach. Just look what he did with Sashabaw last year."

Clarkston Junior High School Physical Education Instructor John Craven shares the same feelings toward Fife as Mauti does.

"With Fife's experience on the college level," exclaims Craven, "I feel he'll do a wonderful job as the team's new coach and he'll probably have an excellent '82-83 season."

"He works well with the kids and can get the most out of each and every one of them. If I had a son coming up as a player," concludes Craven, "I'd want him to play for Fife









because of all the connection he has at the college level.

Harry "Bud" McGrath, Fife's former varsity coach and currently a counselor at Clarkston Junior High, has nothing but praise for the new Wolves mentor.

"Fife was not only a fine ball player," said McGrath, "he was also a fine person and still is. I was blessed to have coached him throughout his playing days."

"I remember he took over the point guard position," continues McGrath, "right around Christmas of '64. The reason we brought him up was the fact that he was a hustler and his desire to play ball was spectacular."

"I feel Fife will give Clarkston a very respectable ball club. I'm very proud of him, concluded McGrath.

Fife, without reluctancy, opines about the Wolves upcoming season, "We're not that fast from base line to base line, but we're big.

"It will take them (the players)," continues, Fife, "Time to adjust to my system, which is to run more fast breaks and to be more defensively sound than in previous years.'

Indeed, with Fife's background, he should be able to improve on last season's .500 ballclub, with all last seasons starting lineup returning including Mike McCormick, Tim's brother, and Ray Kubani the Wolves will be bidding with every high school team in the state for a Championship Ring come early March of '83.






