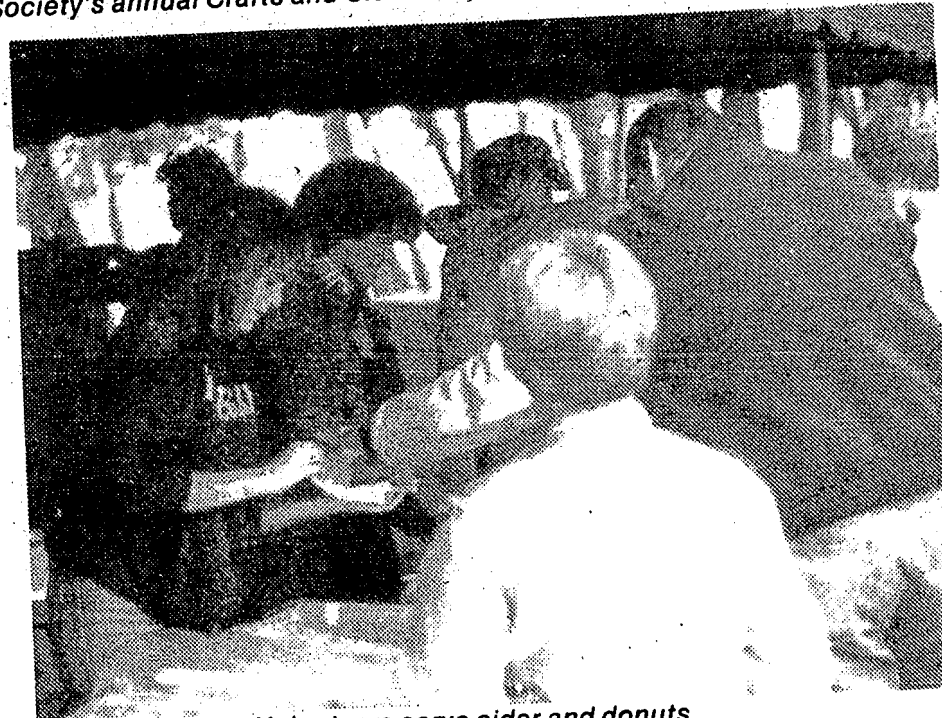

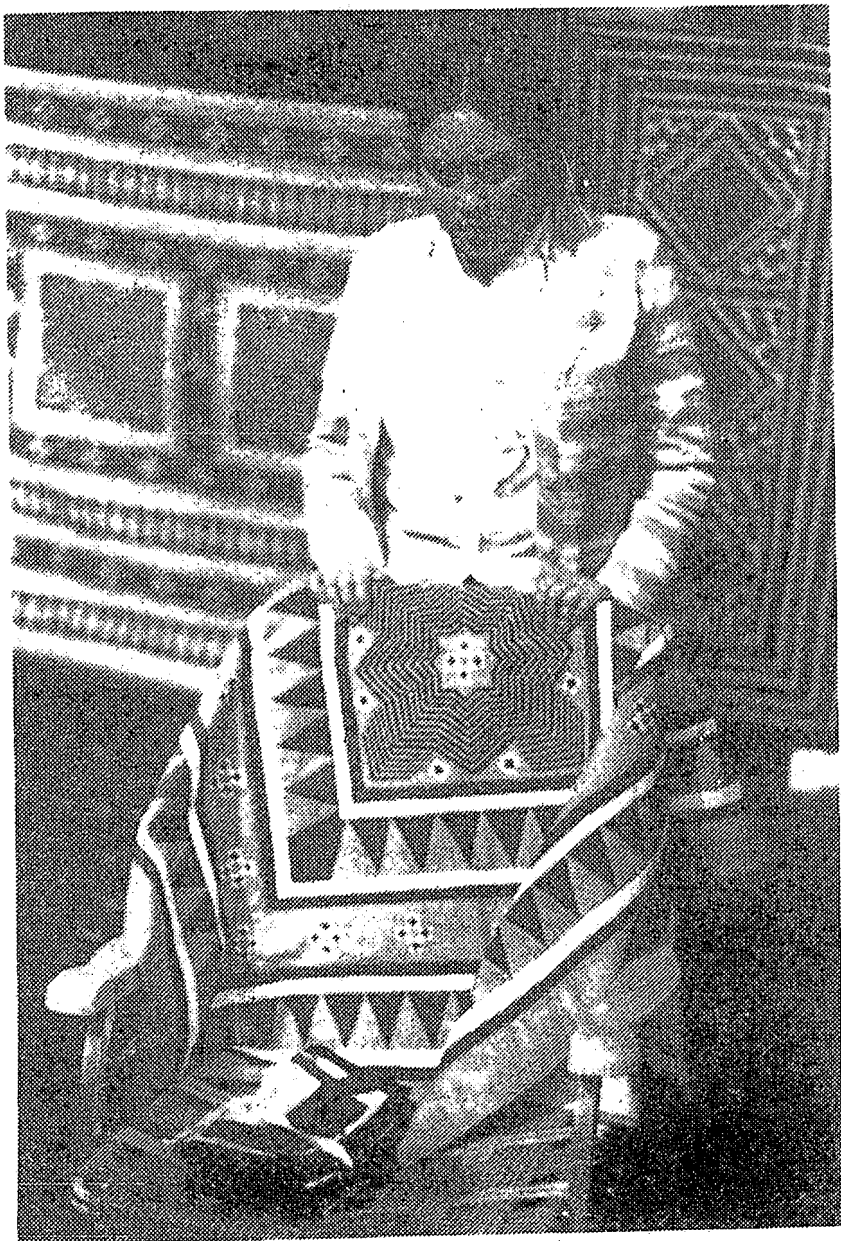

Registration Deadline Oct. 4

Secretary of State Richard Austin reminds all individuals that Monday, October 4, is the last day to register to vote in the November 2 election.

Austin, whose office is responsible for conduct of elections in Michigan said that statewide, approximately 5.5 million individuals are registered out of a potential of nearly 6.5 million.

All Michigan citizens over 18 are eligible to register providing they have resided 30 days or more in the city or township where they live before election day.

All individuals may register to vote at any of 180 statewide Secretary of State branch offices or at the office of the city or township clerk where they live.

City and township offices will be open between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. on October 4.



Nureyev Comes to Masonic

Rudolf Nureyev, in his first Detroit appearance since 1973, will dance six performances of "Don Quixote" with The Boston Ballet at the Masonic Temple Theatre, Wednesday, September 29 through Sunday, October 3.

"Don Quixote", a full-length ballet in three acts inspired by Miguel de Cervantes' epic novel, was first staged by Mr. Nureyev in 1970 with the Australian Ballet, a production which made its American premiere in San Francisco in 1971. Unlike Marius Petipa's "Don Quixote", first presented by the Bolshoi Ballet in Moscow in 1869, and George Balanchine's "Don Quixote" presented in New York in 1965, Mr. Nureyev's version presents Don Quixote as a character which provides pathos as well as comedy.

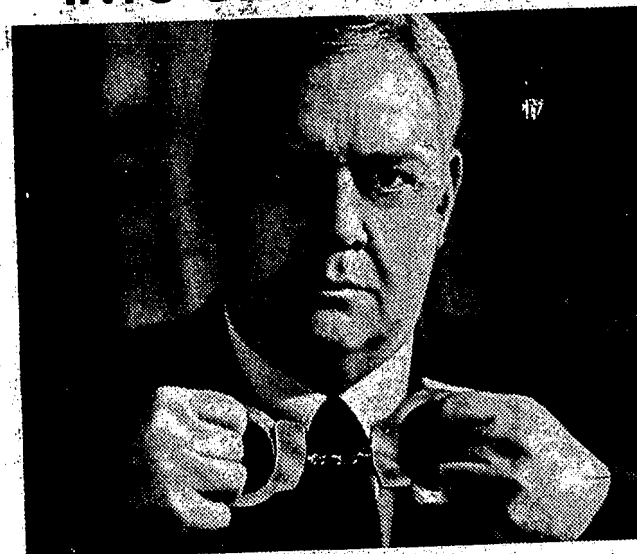

It's Full Steam Ahead for Community Ed.

A whole lot of action is going on these days at the former South Sashabaw Elementary School on Maybee Road.

The school building, closed last year due to declining enrollment in the Clarkston

School District was reopened this fall as a Community Education Center.

And new Clarkston Community Education Director, Kathleen O'Donnell is a veritable whirlwind of activity, running here and there, coordinating this and that, all for Clarkston School District's first year of Community Education.

Mrs. O'Donnell was charged with the duty to provide the widest range of services possible to all age groups. To that end she has organized (or is in the process of) comprehensive adult education completion program, inservice workshops, enrichment programs for youth and a broad-based cultural and fine arts network.

The cornerstone of the Community Education Program is the Adult High School Completion Program. Persons who would like to earn a high school diploma can take courses up to four days a week free of charge. The courses include many of the normal high school offerings such as English Composition, History, Math and American Government as well as several vocational offerings like Total Office Procedures, Metal Machining and Diesel Mechanics.

The classes are taught by accredited teachers at the Community Education Building and at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center. Persons who have a diploma but are under twenty years of age can take any of the courses free of charge, also. The courses are open to other graduates at a tuition fee of \$40-\$50.

According to Mrs. O'Donnell, "We have a

lot of youth aged 16-18 that are now coming back to school. They found things weren't so rosy in the real world."

A second important aspect of any Community Education Program are the Enrichment Classes it offers to the general community. Clarkston's program offers a wide range of activities and classes from aerobic dancing to money management courses.

But in addition to Adult Enrichment, O'Donnell and her staff are developing a few academic enrichment programs for youth that they hope will get off the ground. A pilot program has been started at one of Clarkston's elementaries at which after school specials and super Saturdays are being held for students that want to learn more academically, but in a fun-type atmosphere.

Mrs. O'Donnell hopes to eventually design the same type of program for each Clarkston elementary.


The broad-based cultural and fine arts program will offer numerous opportunities for area residents.

Mrs. O'Donnell hopes to establish a center of fine arts that will have an artist in residence as well as offer art classes to the public. Community Education is currently applying for a grant from the Michigan Council of the Arts to fund the center.

"We have a wealth of writers, journalists, painters, sculptors, etc. in this area," said Mrs. O'Donnell. "At some point in time we hope to draw some really fine people."

Inservice programs have not been established yet, but Mrs. O'Donnell would like to organize specialized workshops and

programming for business groups, community organizations, etc.

In addition to these programs, Community Education is involved in "job club", which is essentially employability training for Department of Social Services clients who are looking for jobs. Clarkston teachers show the DDS clients how to write resumes, conduct job searches and other aspects of finding jobs.

To say the magnitude of Community Education is overwhelming is an understatement. It takes a real go-getter to direct the program.

Kathleen O'Donnell seems to fit that bill. She hails from San Diego where she graduated from San Diego State University, majoring in Elementary Education and Social Science. She taught elementary for several years until she and her husband moved to Michigan.

In Michigan, Mrs. O'Donnell completed her masters from the University of Michigan, and was named Cass City Community Schools first Director of Community Education. She held that position for four years until Clarkston appointed her to direct their initial efforts into the Community Education field.

Clarkston schools have entered the field of Community Education rather late, if you consider the schools surrounding them. Holly, Brandon, Oxford, Waterford have all been operating Community Education Departments for at least four-five years.

Mrs. O'Donnell thinks it's a necessity, particularly since our population is shifting from school-age children to more and more adults and senior citizens.

"The schools are now getting into a whole new role," she explained. "If they are to survive they must serve the adults in the community."

Mrs. O'Donnell also attempted to quell the fears of some residents who think Community Education in the end will be an additional cost to the school district.

"The whole program has to be self-sufficient. I pay my own salary. My assistants have to generate their own too...if we don't have the money to run a particular class, we won't run it."

A Community Education Advisory Council was appointed by the Board Education to assist Mrs. O'Donnell, as well as advise her on certain aspects of the community. The council was chosen for their community involvement. They meet once a month.

Members of the council are Karen Ohrnberger, Virginia Walter, Dr. Gary Symons, Martha Huttenlocher, Jim Kaminski, Martha Wheeler, Robert Olsen, George White, Carolyn Place, Michelle Gaskell, Jean Saile, Alberta Ellis, Marilyn Hanson, Nancy Planck, Barbara Banker, Sue Learmont, Elaine Schultz, and Reverend Alex Stewart.

Mrs. O'Donnell said she is deeply indebted to the council and to Superintendent Milford Mason.

"I will do anything it takes to support the confidence they have in the program and me. I feel fortunate to work in Clarkston," she said.

Last week residents of Independence Township and the Village of Clarkston were treated to their second public hearing concerning cable television for the area. The three bidders, Concord, Multicablevision and Omnicom once again tried to convince elected officials and members of the audience that their particular company should be chosen to bring this area cable television.

Before that decision is made, Board members should take a careful look at surrounding communities that already have cable television. There is a lot to be learned from their trials and tribulations.

One community that has had its share of trials is Waterford Township. Before Michigan Cablevision laid half their cable they decided there wasn't any money in the franchise and sold out. This was only months after they had spent a great deal of money and time convincing Waterford Township that they were the company best suited to run Waterford's franchise.

Now that's all in the past. Waterford Cablevision, a subsidiary of McLean-Hunter, seems to have done a creditable job of picking up the pieces and getting the franchise untracked.

But for Independence and Clarkston officials there is a wealth of information to be learned from the problems Waterford encountered. And no doubt the same could be said about other franchises in the area. Very few cable systems are built problem-free.

So again, we reiterate, Independence and Clarkston officials should not award the franchise hastily. Study the capabilities, but also study the consequences.

Last week we had the opportunity to turn over a hefty sum of money to the Waterford Central Boosters, the organization responsible for raising money for Waterford High School sports.

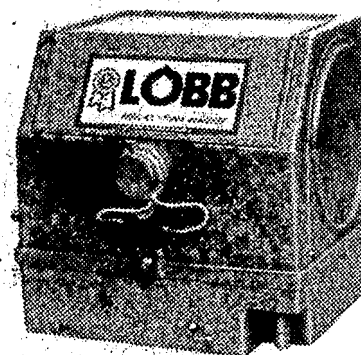

There is no way of knowing into which denominators medicine will split next. Certainly not the lowest common one.

Over-specialization threatens the infrastructure of modern medicine, weakened as it is becoming by its own splindly legs of just too much hair-splitting.

With science providing a virtual black hole of information about the human body, breakthroughs in technology fanning the fireseekers to learn more and more, the medical profession has become almost schizophrenic in the name of diversity, a condition that is rendering the individual physician incapable of the hands-on diagnosis needed to make sound decisions.

Where does, for instance, a Nellie Lucas from Hobeoken fit into a picture that is dangerously out of range of recognizing the Nellies and the Charlies as the infinitely complex, but nevertheless spiritual beings they are?

This feverish need in our culture to know more and more about less and less has caused medicine to become a field congested with people who have ceased to be able to view the dynamics of the whole, to see the hyman body in its entirety as a part of another, larger system.

It's hard to know where the blame lies. Fixing the blame is like trying to count the marbles in the jar using simple observation.

It has, I suspect, something to do with our

Ruling May Force Mentally Retarded Out of Home

Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Hilda Gage ruled last week that six mentally retarded persons living in a group foster care home at 5127 Timber Ridge Trail in the Lake Oakland Woods Subdivision, Independence Township may have to move from their home.

Gage's precedent setting opinion stated a deed restriction limiting subdivision occupancy to single families was not in violation of the U.S. Constitution. She also stated that the group home residents could not be termed "single family."

"A family means one person or a group of two or more persons living together and inter-related by blood, marriage, or legal adoption," said Judge Gage, in her opinion.

The suit against Patrick K. Bossenbery, owner of the home and Kay-Jan Inc., the non-profit organization that runs the home, was filed in 1980 by William and Marie Craig of 5139 Timber Ridge and Duane and Martha Kuzak of 5115 Timber Ridge, as representatives of subdivision property owners.

The foster care home has been occupied since January of 1981. Before occupancy Donald Schuster, attorney for Lake Oakland Woods had attempted to get a restraining order from Judge Gage, but failed.

Independence Township has also attempted to stop the foster home by claiming it violated zoning ordinances. The township's suit contended the foster home was a commercial use placed in a residential area.

Judge Gage's opinion is expected to be appealed.

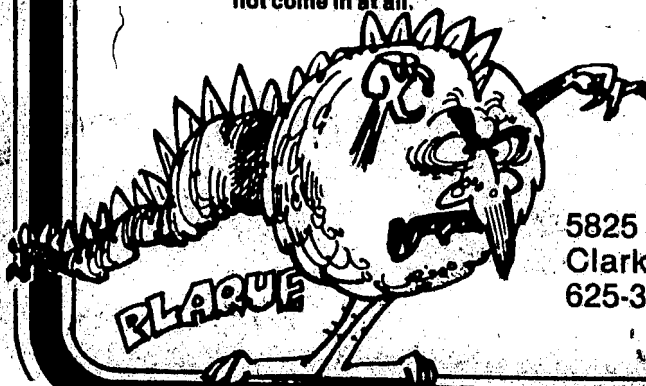

He was throwing only in the mid-80s and getting hit hard early this season, but he bore up well.

He came back to become Lasorda's entire bullpen for May, June, July and half of August. In his big run, before coming down with a sore shoulder, Howe went 39 appearances and gave up an earned run in one of them.

Looking at Howe, it is hard to believe this could have happened to him. He looks so middle class. He is bright and did well in school. He excelled as an athlete from childhood ("I never lost a baseball game in my life until I was a senior in high school. How's that?") He was anything but a thug.

But this was Clarkston, Michigan, not far from Detroit, and Howe says the way it was, was just the way it was. It is staggering to think that kids in the wealthiest country on earth grow up this way, but they do, and Howe did, barely.

"I used to fight at least four times a week," he says. "There was crime around, drugs, you name it. We were all working-class people. I didn't give anybody any trouble, but I didn't take any."

"I've got lots of scars. I was hit in the back of the head with a lead pipe. I was hit in the head with a baseball bat. I hurt my knee in a car accident. I got shot once with rock salt. You want to talk about something that stings, rock salt gets under your skin and then it dissolves."

"We fought with lead pipes, knives...I personally liked bottles. You broke a bottle, you had about six knives. The only thing I regret, I

could have used it. I could have stabbed somebody. I never had to.

"It started; I won a fight once. That makes you the baddest and then everyone else always wants to be the baddest. And I didn't look like the type of guy who'd fight. I'm not that big (grown up, he's 6-1 and 180 pounds). But if you said you wanted to fight, before you got the "T" out of your mouth, you got punched. When you fight in Detroit, the guy who wins is the one that can stand up..."

"The lead pipe, that was a Friday night, after a football game. It was 'bout 10 on 10. We were at a McDonald's. I had a friend who was the only black guy at our school. Racism is really bad in Detroit, and some other black guys messed this guy up because he was running with white guys. Then we found them and messed them up. I got hit in the head with the pipe. My first reaction, I wondered if I could get up. Then I thought, 'If I don't, I might get hit in the head again.'..."

"I had friends who got stabbed. None of them died in fights, but some of them died later on, things like car accidents, Viet Nam. I had a buddy who went to Viet Nam came back and blew his head off..."

"I was one of the fortunate ones. I got to leave that life style. But I think it was a good way to grow up. Now I appreciate things. I appreciate things more than anybody else, I think. I take advantage of what I've got...Some kids make it big, and who gives a damn? I give a damn."

"My kids won't have to go through the things I went through. They won't have to see the things I saw...But kids are going to be kids. They're going to experiment. People can't understand why I don't like to go to certain functions. I'll do anything to help a kid, anything for charity. But some of these functions, where everybody stands around saying, 'I have a Mercedes, I just bought this,' and their kid might be in a hospital. I can't understand that."

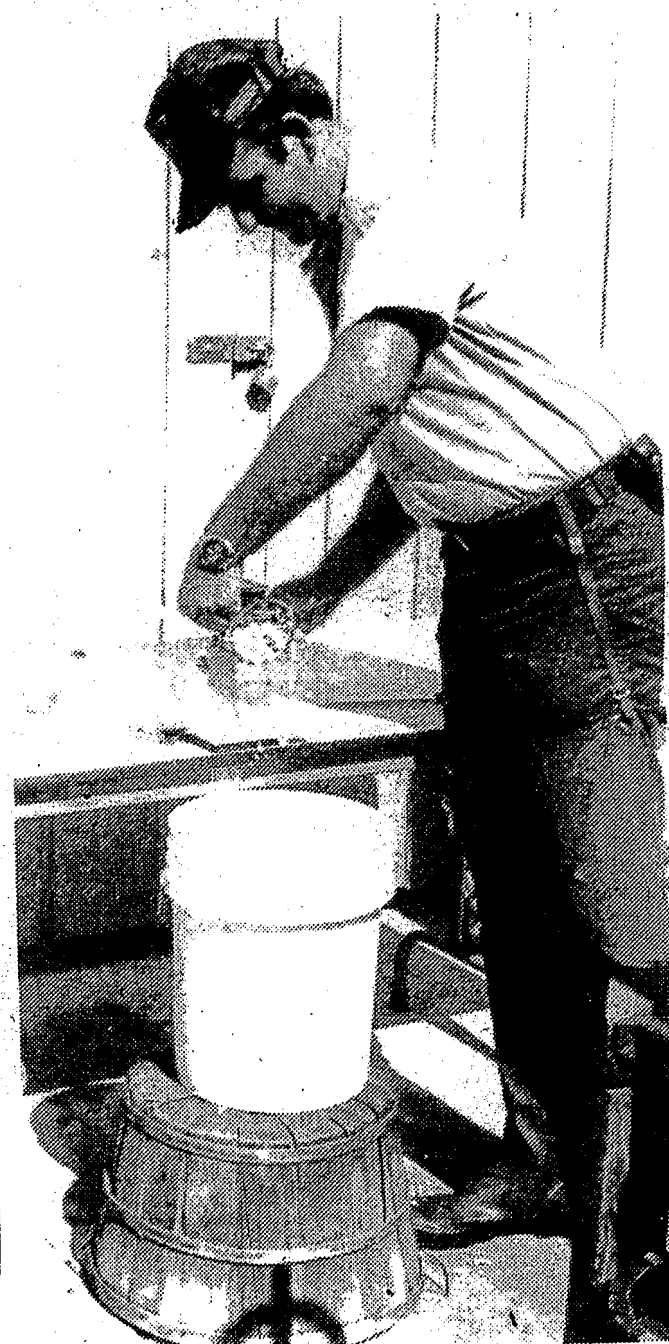
