



C.A.T. Encourages Clarkston's Gifted

When William Neff, Elementary Curriculum Director for Clarkston, was asked how to describe Clarkston's rather new program, C.A.T. or Clarkston Academically Talented, he gave this response: "We provide a program for that percent of our student body who is operating at the top end of the scale in ability, so they can achieve as much as they can in our school system."

Neff, who is also Principal of Andersonville Elementary, and Milford Mason, Superintendent of Clarkston Schools began the first initial study into the possibility of a "gifted" child program for Clarkston, eventually formulating the structure for the program that is now in its second year of service.

Neff would prefer to omit the word gifted from discussion of Clarkston's program. He prefers the word "Talented", stressing that from the C.A.T. Programs inception the emphasis was to be on "ability". Particularily the ability to achieve.

The gifted child who may excel in a specific and or limited area is not necessarily singled out in the Clarkston program. In C.A.T., potential is not denied due to lack of expressed achievement. Instead, the child's underlying ability to achieve is examined for an above average level.

Neff credits a national trend in the conscience of educational priorities with retiring the old adage, "if they're bright, they'll get it anyway." He feels there is a keener sense of recognition for the problems of the academically talented and is glad to be able to help dispell some of the 'smart kid' stereotyping that has been made. In fact, the first unit of study in the program is centered

around helping the child to see who he is. Attitude, Neff stresses, is a most important issue in the C.A.T. Program.

Other determining factors Neff suggests, in the development of improved study programs is the quality of trained instructors in that field and aware parents. Both are offshoots of the national attention given in the last few years to the above average child.

During the 1982 school year, 120 Clarkston children will benefit from the C.A.T. Program. That is roughly 2% of Clarkstons school population, coinciding with national averages and up from the 81 students involved last year.

It includes children in grades three through seven with a high percentage found in the sixth grade. Neff feels the sixth graders dominate due to their familiarity with testing and to their teachers.

To determine a child's potential for advancement within such a program a compilation of criteria must be met for acceptance into the program.

The criteria consists of three basic elements; teacher identification of a possible candidate by completion of a twenty-two question form that asks questions such as, "Does the child or can the child grasp abstract concepts?" and is answerable by varying degrees of responses: "Disagree, strongly disagree, strongly agree, etc."

Accompanying the form is a written assessment of the child by his/her teacher. And finally, there are of course, the tests. Two tests in particular are used in assessing C.A.T. candidates. They are the Metropolitan Achievement Test and the Otis-Lennon Test. When these three steps are completed they are reviewed as a whole entity to arrive at the

School Ability Index, which is a resultant over-view of achievement as compared to ability.

The final stage of the process involves a screening board where the child's records and data are stripped of all identifying information and a numerical identity is given to the file to be reviewed.

All in all, it is a sound and fair method, insuring the absence of any geographical or social barriers in the child's consideration for placement, said Neff.

When asked if any such distinctions had occurred after acceptance procedures had been completed and identifiable data was available, Neff, announced that "NO" none had been found stating, "I couldn't have equalized it better if I had planned it out."


The children in C.A.T. attend their regular in-district schools four days of the week. One day a week however, each school, having its own day, sends its C.A.T. students to Clarkston Elementary where they are instructed in all areas of study by two very dedicated women.

These two women correlate independent subject material into an inter-related experience often utilizing instructors from other institutions such as Lawrence Institute of Technology.


Neff describes them as being close to superwomen and the "cream of the crop." They are Susan Banworth and Joette Kunse. Both had to meet academic and apptitude requirements of their own before becoming a part of the C.A.T. Program.

Both teachers maintain a close working atmosphere with their special students, visiting them each Friday at the child's



CAN CHILDREN UNDERSTAND THE MEANING OF DEATH?

In our experience as funeral directors, we have found that one of the most frequent questions is whether or not children can be helped to understand the meaning of death. Research has shown that children progress through three stages in such understanding.

From ages three through five, nearly all children deny that death is a normal and final event. Children this age often think of death

as "sleep." From five to nine, children can understand that death occurs, but not that it will happen to everyone. At this age, children often believe that they are immortal.

Between the ages of nine and eleven comes the adult realization that death is final and inevitable for everyone.

Lucky Fletcher: Clarkston's Outspoken Watchdog

He's beaten cancer on a number of occasions because in his words "I refuse to die." He's picketed City Hall because he felt our youth were being shortchanged. He's the self-proclaimed king of the Geritol set.

He's Luther (Lucky) Fletcher, outspoken political watchdog, who has made a career out of "Telling it like it is," or at least how it should be according to the gospel of Lucky.

School boards, village councils and township boards -- none of the local governmental units escape the scrutiny of Fletcher. But it is the township board that receives his closest attention.

And according to Fletcher, the current administration needs a lot of watching.


"They are listening to the wrong people," Fletcher says of the township board. "We need to consider the people of the township, not just the village.'

Fletcher holds a special grudge for the Village of Clarkston. He thinks a small group of people within the village control the fates of everyone within the township.

"That small group is running everything," explained Fletcher. "They have got an attitude toward businesspeople and against growth. I don't think that's right, the township has a right to grow."

Then the fast-talking Fletcher adds, "So many people come out here to build their dream home surrounded by virgin timbers, and complimented by a virgin in the bedroom. They seem to want to retire and die, and they want the township to retire and

Fletcher's had plenty of years to perfect his caustic tongue. He won't reveal his exact age, but does claim to have three-quarters of

a century wrapped up.

He has spent his life being a "Jack of all trades", being born on a farm, enlisting in the Army and serving several years, and then working as a carpenter and salesman later

Fletcher's career in the Army was cut short when by his own admission, "I was in the wrong place when a bomb went off." The bomb sent him to the hospital for eight mon-

After a slow recovery, Fletcher was sent to the Detroit area, Palmer Woods to be exact, to install some cabinets for the Chicago firm he was working for. That was in 1950.

"After two months I still wasn't quite done so they gave up on me, "recalled a laughing

He and his wife decided to make Michigan their home anyway, choosing Clarkston because Mrs. Fletcher had grown-up in the

In the late 1950's, Fletcher had his first bout with cancer. He was taken to a Chicago hospital where they operated on him, and miraculously, he lived. It was to be the first of many operations -- most at Ann Arbor's University Hospital.

"I refused to die. I have the right of refusal. I took the 5th," joked Fletcher.

Cancer did not keep Lucky out of politics. His heyday was in the mid-60's, when as Waterford Village Democratic Precinct Delegate he was honored as "having the highest turnout in the State of Michigan," during one election:

Fletcher is also proud of the fact that his precinct, which was highly Republican until he became a delegate, voted solidly Democratic.

Fletcher's one attempt at political office came much later when he ran for Supervisor of Independence Township. He stepped in for Jim Harmon who decided to withdraw from the race.

"Believe it or not he still got more votes than I did even though he refused to run,"

Despite being a devout card-carrying Democrat, Fletcher's loyalties have wavered in his later years. He won't admit it, but some of his favorite people are Republicans.

"I believe in the Democratic Party, but not in the Socialist-Democratic Party," said Fletcher. "I believe in the unions, but I worry that the Michigan Education Association has their hand in everybody's pocket, even their own."

His reference to the Socialist-Democratic Party is a serious one. Fletcher gets dead serious when he talks about Communism and how he feels it is infiltrating our

Democratic process.

Fletcher claimed a few years back, guys like Carl O'Brien, a former Oakland County State Representative, were Communist types, who had been successful in gaining influence in our state and local governments. He still claims there are Communists with considerable influence in our government.

"At the rate they are going, they are going to rule this country," said Fletcher in reference to the Communists.

Fletcher recalled taking Political Science courses at Oakland University during the mid-1960's. George Romney was governor of Michigan at the time and Fletcher didn't have a very high opinion of him.

In one Political Science class he made a speech that suggested Governor Romney was a Communist. That faux pas almost got the intensely patriotic Fletcher expelled from the University

the University.

Fletcher has always had a penchant for speaking his mind. He doesn't mind speaking it when he has something unkind to say about local public figures, either. A few of his favorites are:

Clarkston Assistant Superintendent and former Zoning Board of Appeals Chairman Mel Vaara: "Some of the things he has done just aren"t quite kosher."

just aren't quite kosher."

Township Attorney Richard Campbell: "He carries a whole lot√of political wallop in this township...way too much...and I never could

take him."
Former Supervisor and now State Tax Commission Chairman Robert Vandermark: "I could never understand why after a month or so after his second election he resigned to spend more time with his family and then he took a job in Lansing that caused him to spend even less time with his family."

Over the years Fletcher has carried the torch for a couple of causes that he considers very important.



Number one, he feels that youth need much more guidance than they are getting. He would like to see the schools and the township pay more attention to helping youth, particularly youth in trouble, than they are doing.

Fletcher felt so strongly about the issue that a couple of years ago he picketed the township. That's right, the precoclous Fletcher set up a one-man picket line in front of Township Hall.

"At the time," he remembered, "they had three dog catchers, animal control officers to be polite, but not one officer for the kids. I'm for the kids. Us old people, why it's too lete."

His second pet project has been narcotics. Fletcher believes, like he does with Communism, that the big pushers have too much influence in our society, thus they seem to be protected from the law and are able to spread their poison potion to the younger generations.

Fletcher would like to see just once, a politician announce publicly that he would do everything in his power to stop drug trafficking.

ficking.
"I don't think that will happen, however, because they are afraid of the biggies in the game," said Fletcher.

Fletcher had a few words of wisdom for

the sleeping masses.

"People wait until it's too late to get involved. Others yell the loudest and usually don't have the best interest of the general public at heart. People must encourage and do everything they can to get their friends, family and neighbors involved. That's what

Democracy is all about."

Fletcher also had a few words for Independence Township officials.

"I sure hope they don't raise my taxes after reading this," concluded a concerned but tongue-in-cheek Fletcher.



This letter is in response to the "Open letter to Claude Trim" which appeared in The Reminder on September 23 written by Marie E. Remmert. The fact that she is running for the same seat in the House of Representatives sheds a different light on her criticisms of Claude Trim.

The first criticism is of House Bill No. 5930 which she said Claude Trim and his committee introduced. The bill requires that a citizen or group of citizens who want to recall an elected official must pay 1/2 the cost. She then says that Claude Trim is afraid of the people and indicates that he is not doing a good job. I say two things in response: 1. I believe the bill was introduced to counteract several frivilous and repeated recall efforts aimed at local officials in some townships Claude Trim has represented. These recall elections are too expensive and too disruptive to the governmental process to be entered into lightly. 2. In my opinion Claude Trim has done a superb job of representing his constituents. He cares about people and their problems and is a man of honesty and integrity.

The second criticism is of the legislators putting in short and few working days. She indicated that the Legislature was in session for one hour and two minutes on September 1, 1982 and that as of August 31st the House convened only 83 out of 160 possible working days. The bulk of the work of a legislator must be done in his office, in conference, and elsewhere. I know that Claude Trim also receives numerous phone calls at home and is constantly handling Legislative business and constituents problems at home. For Claude Trim the short and few working days is a myth. Claude Trim is a hard working Representative.

Finally I would like to say that I have no axe to grind. I am writing this letter to counteract some unjust criticism., I live in Rose Township which is no longer part of Claude Trim's District. I have known Claude Trim for many years and I have seen him work effectively at the State level. I encourage the voters in the newly redrawn 61st District to vote for Claude Trim in November for State Representative. David J. Brown To Whom It May Concern:

Friend of the Court

by Roland C. Fancher, ESQ. Last year about this time, I wrote an article dealing with statistical information regarding the volume of cases handled by the Office of the Friend of the Court. I recently was provided with some "historical" information of some interest which shows how this volume has increased.

In 1975, the Office of the Friend of the Court handled 20,015 divorce, paternity and family support cases, of which 6,899 involved public assistance. At the end of 1981, the Office bore responsibility for 41,886 cases, of which 14,394 involved public assistance. At the beginning of September, 1982 the active cases numbered 43,250, including 15,221 public assistance cases.

In cases involving public assistance, Oakland County receives fifteen (15%) percent of monies collected by the Friend of the Court. This money is received through payment from the federal government under the cooperative reimbursement program as an incentive for collection of child support. In 1975, the county received \$285, 155 in these cooperative reimbursement funds. By the end of 1981, this figure had risen to \$1,122,444 annually. This money_goes into the Oakland County General Fund, and assists in the overall county budget, not only that of the Friend of the Court.

As anyone with a domestic relations case with our office is aware, state law requires that an eighteen (\$18) dollar annual service fee be paid on any case involving support payments through the Friend of the Court. These monies also go into the general fund. In 1975, \$256,769 was paid in service fees. In 1981, this amount had increased to \$419,038.

If a case is taken before a judge and involves court time, the judge may assess court costs. These are usually in the amount of fifty or one hundred dollars. In 1975, \$12,975 was assessed in court costs. In 1981, this figure had increased to \$31,283. Until recently, this money also went into the general fund. Now, however, this money goes into a Friend of the Court fund. Exactly how these monies will be used has not yet been determined.

In 1978, the federal cooperative reimbursement program began assisting the county with payment of a portion of the administrative costs involved in support enforcement in non-public assistance cases. In that year, the Oakland County General Fund received \$165,373 in such reimbursement. By 1981, this figure had increased to \$608,840. (While many counties maintain separate employees to handle public assistance cases, Oakland County does not. In Oakland County, the same employees handle both types of cases.)

In summary, in 1975 Oakland County received \$554,899 through the operations of the Friend of the Court. In 1981, \$1,161,379 was received. Obviously, this money assists in maintaining the operations of county government. While the primary goal of the iend of the Court is to insure that minor children receive the support to which they are legally entitled, the taxpayers of Oakland County also receive financial benefits as a result of Friend of the Court operations.

Those designated as Semifinalists are being honored publicly as the highest scorers in their respective states; in addition, they are being identified to colleges and universities in the hope of increasing educational opportunities for these academically able young students.
